Mr. Willingham, 86, who'l warked and saved during his life, came to Waco last Friday to the home of his nephew, Leland Willingham at 3017 N. 24th st. and passed out \$21,000 to nieces and nephews from all over Texas.

He'd quit school in the 4th grade and went to work to help supportt 16 brothers and sisters, working as a farm and ranch hand and steam fitter. He took a little soving from each pay check for 45 years, and sometihes as much as \$100.

The nephews and nieces gathered, thinking it was a family reuhice and one was in a hospital in Verrville, another in Boston, Massachusetts, and another's whereabouts is unknown. Before springing the surprise, he asked Rev. Len Layne of Brookwiew Methodist Church, who he'd asked to come, to lead the family in prayer. Then, he distributed the cashier's checks.

One request he made was that they save the money, and "Don't put this money into any automobile".
