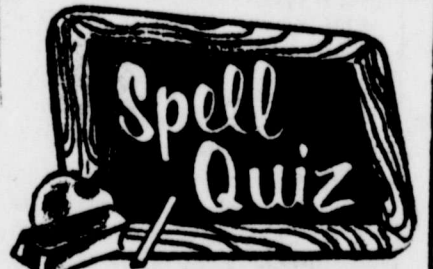

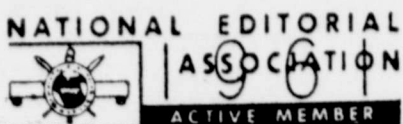

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS" BY C. WILSON HARDER

Of more than passing interest is some of the testimony being taken in the hearings by a Federal examiner of the affairs of Fox Markets, now operating under Chapter XI of the Bankruptcy Act.

This 45 unit food chain in Los Angeles recently found itself unable to pay more than \$10 million owed principally to packers and wholesalers.



Two items especially, C. W. Harder so far, are of great interest as a comment on contemporary times and business mores.

Edwin J. Fox has already testified that one of the nation's largest dairy operations made it possible for him to get a half million dollar bank loan.

Asked why the dairy company "cooperated" to make it possible for him to get this loan, Mr. Fox said "I was able to put their products into Fox Markets."

Thus, it is established, that until the dairy company "cooperated" it was seemingly impossible for Mr. Fox to stock their products in Fox Markets.

Mr. Fox himself testifies in his opinion that the biggest factor in the chain getting into distress was trading stamps. His markets handed out the oldest nationally known trading stamps, while most of his competitors give out Blue Chip stamps.

Blue Chip stamps are owned and controlled by a number of

market operators in California and was presumably set up to drive other trading stamps out of the market and eventually eliminate trading stamps. As Blue Chip stamps are operated without any desire for a profit, it is reputed they give more value per stamp than their competitors.

Mr. Fox said he underestimated the power that Blue Chip stamps would have in the Los Angeles market, with the result that his markets did not draw the volume of patronage he had projected.

It is interesting to note in the list of published creditors that the largest creditor, by a substantial margin, with the exception of a bank loan, is the trading stamps company with which Fox Markets did business.

The records show that this stamp company alone is owed more than \$600 thousand.

This then shows up one of the merchandising fallacies of the times. One is the widespread feeling spread among consumers that trading stamps are a "something for nothing" device.

As illustrated by the Fox example, when stamps are given out, they are a major part of store overhead and must be passed on to the consumer in some manner.

A business depending on a build up there is being given something for nothing is built on shifting sands, as it will collapse when anyone comes along and sells the idea they will give even more for nothing. Perhaps it could be said that Fox was out-foxed.

Is it time to Renew, Lew?

A DID IT OURSELVES HOME IN DALLAS: BRICK BF BRICK NAIL BY NAIL: 'S DONE

DALLAS, Tex. July 17 (AP) — Do-it-yourself amateurs who can't make things fit and who end a project with surplus parts can take hope from A. B. Dickard's courage. Dickard knew he was no brick mason. But he plunged ahead and built himself a brick house. Each nail, board and brick that went into the home was put there by Dickard.

His wife offers a small dissent: "I at least held the boards while he nailed them," she says. Mrs. Dickard did considerably more than that. She designed and decorated the house.

And she picked out the antiques which fill their home.

Dickard took the beat-up, worn-out antiques and refinished or rebuilt them.

How did Dickard have the courage to start the project? "I just did it," he explains.

Actually, he's good at anything mechanical. In particular he was a fair carpenter before he began building.

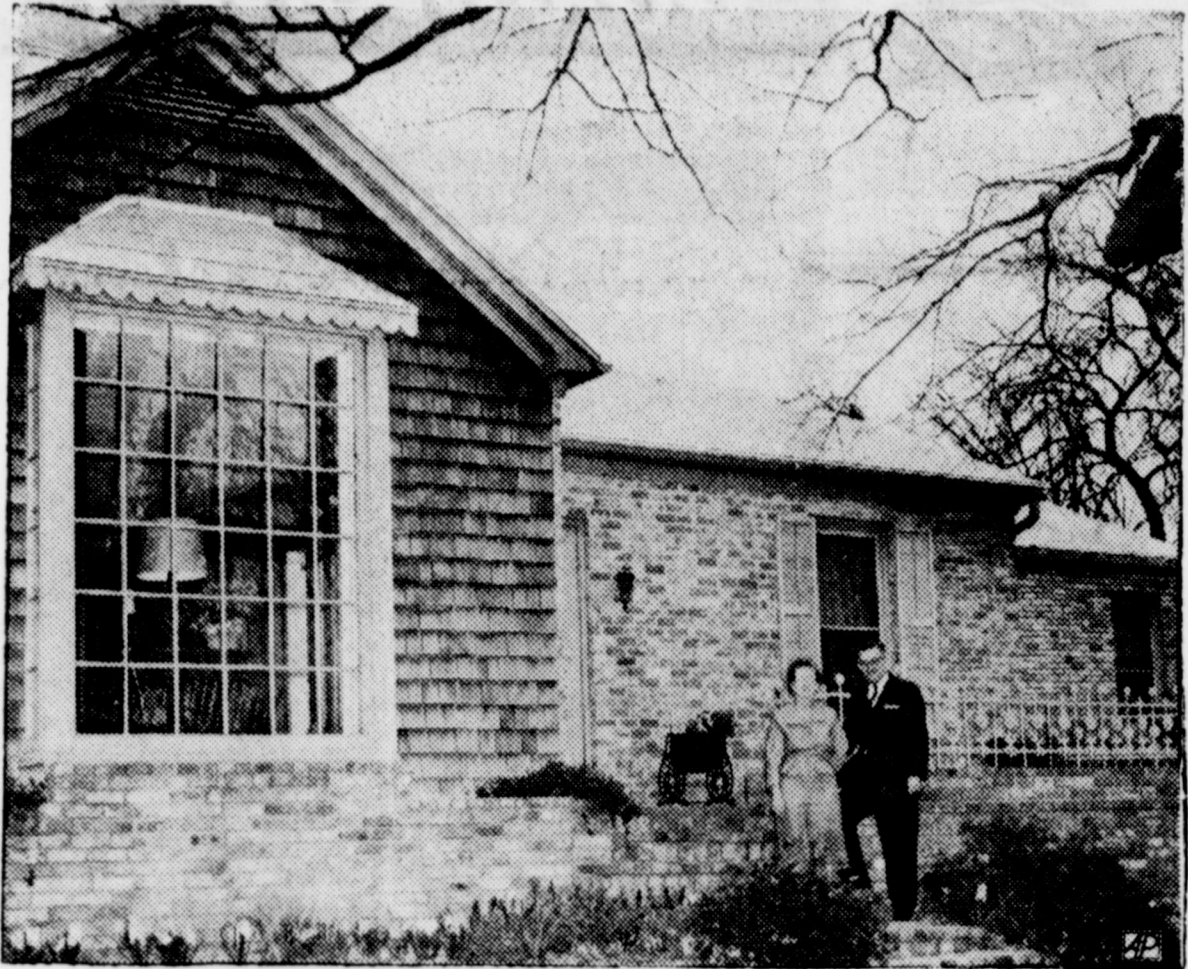

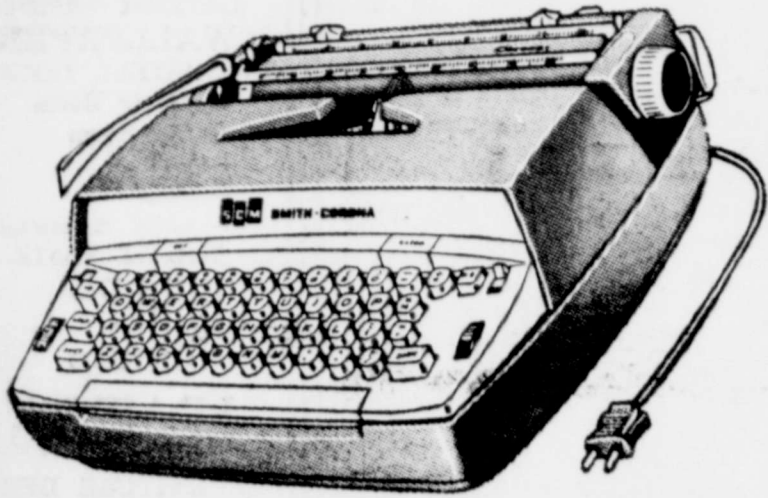

II shortages.

They even salvaged nails from the old home, beat them into a semblance of straightness and used them again. In that period a keg of nails was all the government permitted for a new house.

Despite their first trial and error efforts, the Dickards completed the house in 1948 and moved in.

By then, building was a habit. And they haven't stopped working on it after 13 years.

For instance—brass door knobs are being replaced by restored antique black or white porcelain knobs.

The structure has 2,000 square feet of floor space, rather large for a couple.

It is furnished completely with antiques, whose restoration takes up any slack moments not devoted to the house itself.

The couple's search for Colonial and early country English antiques has taken them throughout the nation and into parts of Canada and Mexico.

Dickard possesses little interest in hunting antiques, says Mrs. Dickard. So while she hunts, he wanders off to inspect historical sites.

"He cringes when I load up items that look valueless because of their poor condition," she says.

"But when we get home Dick won't go into the house until he has unloaded the antiques and started studying how to restore them."

She adds, "He has the knack of an expert at restoration. And the remarkable thing is that he had no experience of this sort until we started this hobby."

In his restoration work, Dickard uses hand and power tools, but mostly, he says, the restoration boils down to hard work by hand.

"You'd be amazed to see what we find sometimes under six or seven coats of paint," he said. "Usually we find beautiful wood, and when we reach that point we find the natural wood a thing of value."

The Dickards have enough unrestored antiques stored away to keep Dickard happily busy for several years. He plans to retire in about four years, and sees his retirement as an opportunity to pursue his hobby even more intensely.

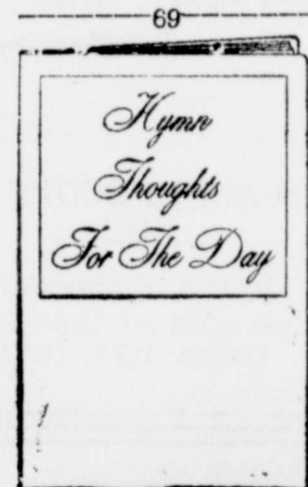

What To Do In a Tornado

- People in open country can view the approach of a tornado and move at right angles to its path. If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression, such as a ditch or ravine.
- In towns or cities, seek shelter inside, preferably in a substantial building. Stay away from windows.
- The southwest corner of the basement of a frame house is safer than in a brick or stone house. If there is no basement, lie down on the first floor under a table or bed (preferably in the southwest corner).
- Urban schools: Stay inside, away from windows; remain near an inside wall on a lower floor. Avoid auditoriums and gymnasiums.
- Rural schools of frame construction: Teachers should remove children to a ravine or ditch if storm shel-

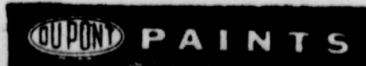

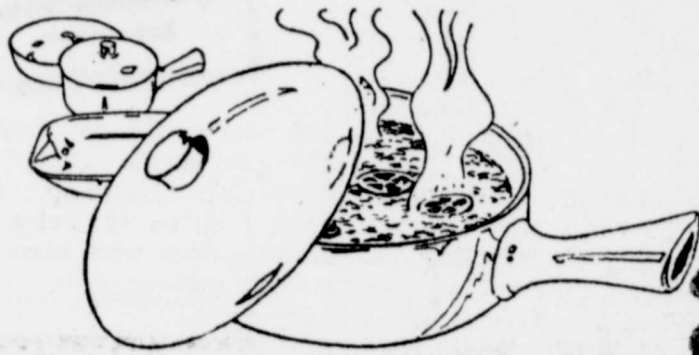
