





Dear Friends:

It had been my intention in this letter o discuss the action of the House on the Foreign Aid Bill. We had expected to complete that bill last Thursday night. Actually, we are still working on it, ant it will be tonight or possibly next week before final action is taken.

The great volume of amendments which are being considered seems to me to point up the multitude of weaknesses and pittfalls which exist in this legislation. I have repeatedly pointed out that I believe that it should be possible to develop a Foreign Aid Program in which the interest of the United States is paramount. I would gladly vote tor such a program, but as I see it, our State Department has too long concerned itself more with the welfare of foreigners than of Americans. The whole program is shot full of provisions for gifts and loans to, and construction of roads, power plants, etc. for foreigners on terms far more favorable than those accorded to our own citizeens at home. I cannot support such an arrangement.

I want to see the best possible program, it should be the very ge, Phone 46 or 369. best we can devise.
