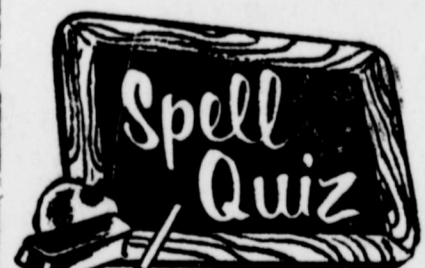
He was a member of the First Baptist Church here.

## THE CIVIL WAR CENTENNIAL

"The South may have lost the Civil War, but it is going to win the Centennial" one author was inspired to write recently concerning the four and a half year-long Civil War Centennial which was officially launched on Sunday, January 8.

And chances are he was pretty close to being right for the states of the old Confederacy have tak-

en the lead in preparing for the Centennial and the preparations are expected to bear fruit in the form of millions of tourist dollars. In fact, tourism during the next year and a half years will probably become the South's second largest industry.

Each of the old Confederate states, as well as most of the other states in the Union, have set up elaborate organizations to plan and execute observances of both local and national significance. Virginia alone will spend \$1,387,-

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000 on re-enactments, observances and commemorative ceremonies under the direction of its Civil War Centennial Commission. Many other Southern States will follow suit as their Centennial Commissions plan and carry out elaborate ceremonies.

The Centennial observance got off to a rousing start with ceremonies in many parts of the nation including special programs in churches all across the land and a special message from President Eisenhower calling on all Americans to participate in the greatest commemoration ever to be staged in this country.

The special programs, all designed to call attention to the Centennial, were expected to inspire Americans to a greater appreciation of the privileges they share because their ancestry of a century ago were able to stack arms after a destructive war, lay aside their differences, and work together in building the mightiest nation on earth.

Church bells all across the land tolled the eleven o'clock hour as a symbol that the Centennial had begun and clergy of all faiths, backed by a special booklet prepared by the National

Centennial Commission, went into their pulpits to call attention to the "Times that Tried Men's Souls."

Three of the most elaborate ceremonies were those at the tomb in New York of General U. S. Grant, at Lexington, Va. of General Robert E. Lee, and at the Citadel in Charleston S. C. where a three-day program was underway marking the firing on the Federal ship "Star of the West" by cadets from that school.

These are only the beginning of a long program of activities which will be designed to commemorate events of both local and national significance and we'll be hearing much about them in the months to come.

This writer's name is on the mailing list of most of the Centennial Commissions of the various states and hardly a week passes that we fail to get copies of materials being published by these commissions. It's interesting to note the many activities going on in these states and also to notice the names of the commissions. Most of the states call their organization simply a "Civil War Centennial Commission." But North and South Carolina refer to their

state group as Confederate Centennial Commissions and Mississippi calls hers "The Mississippi Commission on the War Between the States."

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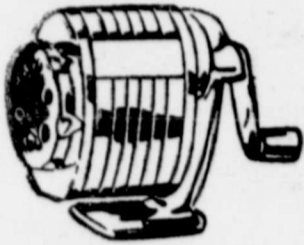

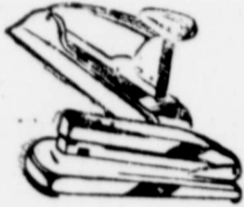
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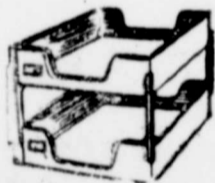

from our Congressman **BOB POAGE**

Dear Friends:

It had been my intention in this letter to discuss the action of the House on the Foreign Aid Bill. We had expected to complete that bill last Thursday night. Actually, we are still working on it, and it will be tonight or possibly next week before final action is taken.

The great volume of amendments which are being considered seems to me to point up the multitude of weaknesses and pitfalls which exist in this legislation. I have repeatedly pointed out that I believe that it should be possible to develop a Foreign Aid Program in which the interest of the United States is paramount. I would gladly vote for such a program, but as I see it, our State Department has too long concerned itself more with the welfare of foreigners than of Americans. The whole program is shot full of provisions for gifts and loans to, and construction of roads, power plants, etc. for foreigners on terms far more favorable than those accorded to our own citizens at home. I cannot support such an arrangement.

I want to see the best possible bill passed. If we are to have a program, it should be the very best we can devise. I shall, therefore for every amendment which seems to me to give us a more responsible and constructive program, including the right of the President to program plans for several years. I think this is the only way we can hope to get anything like reasonable results from our money. Of course, should I be satisfied that we had achieved a sound program, protected from the type of poor administration which we have heretofore experienced. I would support the measure. I cannot, however, foresee any way in which this program can be made even reasonably acceptable. Therefore I expect to vote against the bill.

Next week our Subcommittee on Livestock and Feed Grain begins hearings on several bills which are intended to strik at the heart of "vertical integration" in the livestock industry. Years ago the Supreme Court entered what is known as the "consent decree" against four of the big meat packers. This keeps these four companies out of the retail business, but it does not keep the big grocery chains out of the packing business, nor does it apply to a number of the

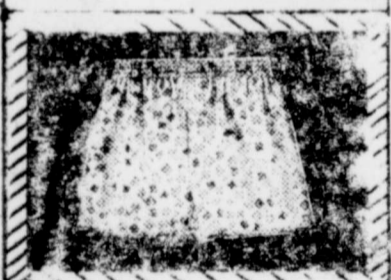

**CHANGES  
IN  
SOCIAL  
SECURITY**

About a million and a half older people—the widows, dependent widowers, and dependent parents of workers who have died—are due to receive increased payments under the new amendments to the social security law.

The benefits payable to widows age 62 or over will be raised about 10 per cent. Widows eligible for the increased payments do not need to get in touch with

their social security offices. The increase will be added automatically to the checks they will receive early in September.

Congress called this increase "one of the most needed changes in the social security program." Aged widows not only get lower benefits than do retired workers, but they also have less income from other sources than retired workers have.

The average benefit being paid to an aged widow early this year was \$57.80 a month. The yearly income for half the women receiving widow's benefits, not counting their social security benefits was less than \$270 a year.

Aged dependent widowers and some aged parents of deceased workers are also due automatic raises with social security checks payable to them in early September. However, an increase in a parent's benefit check will be made in those cases where only one parent is receiving benefits based on the deceased son's or daughter's work under social security, where more than one dependent parent is receiving benefits there can be no increase.

A number of widows age 62 or older are now getting retirement benefits based on their own work under social security. Because of the change in the law increasing widow's benefits, it is possible that some of these widows now getting monthly retirement benefits of less than

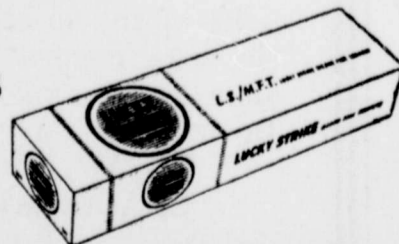

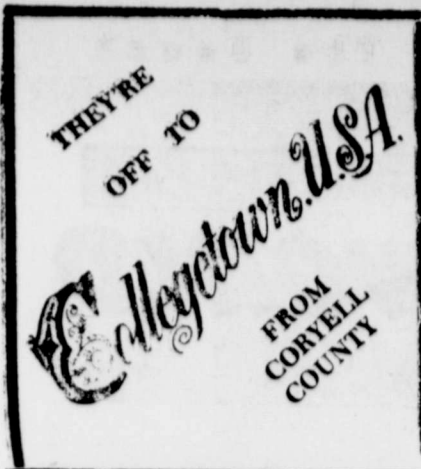

### SPORT SHOTS

#### 29th ANNUAL TEXAS COACHING SCHOOL AUGUST

Less than three weeks away is the start of the football season. It won't be training or playing but it will be the Texas Coaching School and that's when they start thinking about football and game preparations for it.

The twenty-ninth annual clinic will be at San Antonio Aug. 7-10, returning to the place where first saw the light of day—in 1933. Sixty-five coaches gathered in the Alamo city for this new venture. D. X. Bible, then coach of Nebraska, was the first instructor. In fact, he was the only one.

When this year's coaching school is held at San Antonio 3,000 coaches are expected to enroll. That will be seven more in the all-time record set last year at Dallas.

The coaching school is sponsored by the Texas High School Coaches Association, which was founded at Houston in 1930, with late Johnnie Pierce of Corsicana as the guiding light. It was 27 years later that the coaches set up enough nerve to put on a school. Two years after that they started the all-star football game. In 1946 the all-star basketball game was inaugurated.

Today the Texas coaching school is the largest in the world. It has a "faculty" of top football, basketball and track coaches of the country. And this year it returns baseball to the curriculum. Bobby Bragan, the former major league manager and now assistant to the general manager of the Houston Club in the National League, as the lecturer.

Baseball was dropped for several years because of a lack of interest. It was embarrassing to have a baseball expert show up to lecture and nobody come out to hear him. But the coaches decided they had been missing something that should be important to them, and they returned the diamond sport to the curriculum.

With more than 600 schools playing baseball in Texas it is a wonder that it was dropped from the school's courses in the first place. It is hoped that with its return there will be sufficient interest to warrant an all-star game.

Golf had been put on the coaching school schedule but it will not be this year because the clinic was cut to four days. The reason for this was that most of the high schools start football practice on Monday, August 15, and by closing the clinic on Tuesday instead of Friday, as usual, the coaches will get a chance to return home and have Saturday and Sunday to prepare for the start of training.

Lecturing on football will be John Bridgers of Baylor, Frank Broyles of Arkansas, Blanton Collier of Kentucky and Claude Gilstrap of Arlington State. Harold Bradley of Texas and Frank McGuire of North Carolina will handle basketball. Johnny Morris of University of Houston will lecture on track and Weaver Jordan of Baylor will discuss athletic training.

The all-star squads will arrive in San Antonio on Saturday, Aug. 5, and begin workouts on Monday. The seventeenth annual basketball game will be on Wednesday night, Aug. 9, with O. W. Follis, Lemesa coaching the North and Hal Lambert of Spring Branch handling the South. The South won last year at Dallas but still is well behind in the series. The North has ten victories to six for the South.

The twentieth-seventh all-star football game is scheduled Thursday, Aug. 10, with Joe Goding of Wichita Falls coaching the North and Pete Ragus of Corpus Christi Miller the South. Here, too, the South could use a victory. The series now stands fourteen victories for the North, nine for the South and three ties. The South hasn't won one since 1953 series.
