Two, Charles E. Lowe 17, and Robert Lee Sarter 17, have already been charged. Low is from Sundown and Sarter is from Mesquite.

FARMERS, NOTICE, ASCS TELLING YOU AGAIN! IT'S ABOUT WHEAT

No farmer can plant wheat, without penalty unless he has received notice of an allotment or a permitted acreage for his farm. The 15 acre or 199 bushel provision is no longer in effect. The reduction from 15 acres to 131-2 acres is not true.

Notices were mailed 3 weeks ago to all eligible producers stating thier amount of wheat allotment or permitted acreage. There is a provision whre a farmer can enter into an agreement with the county committee to plant up to 30 acres of wheat for feed, but

CORYELL COUNTIANS GO TO HAMILTON HORSE SHOW AND WIN!

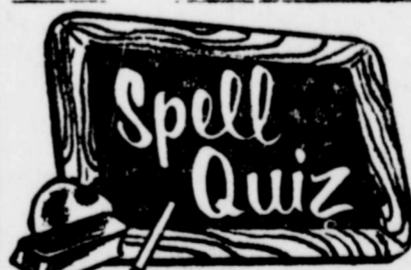
Coryell County Horse enthusiasts attended Hamilton Horse Show last week, which drew a large number of entries.

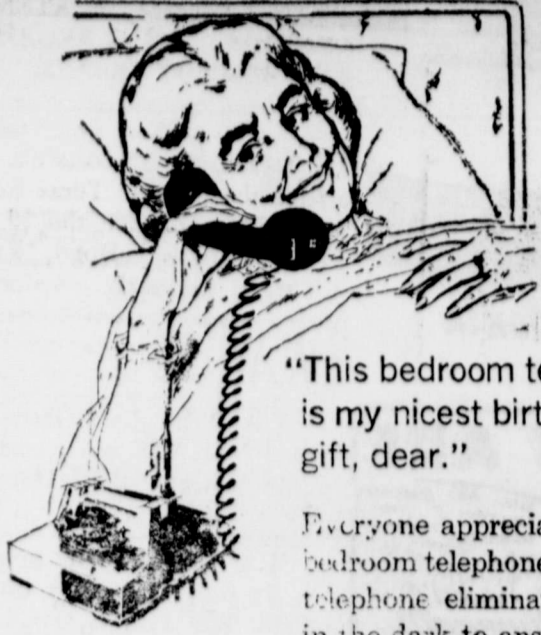

**FARM NEWS**

**DEFERRED GRAZING**

Stockmen should take a look at their ranching operations and plan on making adjustments in stocking rates so they may be able to defer their pastures.

Native grasses should be deferred until after frost to build a winter hay supply and improve range conditions. Generally, the fall-produced seed crop is much better than seeds produced at other times during the year.

In most cases ranchmen can set up a deferred rotation grazing system without doing any additional fencing, but some adjustment in livestock numbers need to be made so the native pastures will not be overgrazed.

Grasses should not be grazed for at least six weeks after the seed heads are produced in the fall. The grass should be given time to restore itself after producing seeds and to cure properly before it is eaten and trampled.

For more suggestions on deferred grazing, see your county Agriculture agent or invite him out to your place and make plans to get set for this winter. So adopt the slogan, "Practice deferred grazing and cut out the winter feed bill."

Though barley ranks well down on the list of feed grains produced in Texas, many growers will soon have to make a decision on whether or not to participate in the 1962 feed grain program. Winter barley has been added to the program and seeding time is not far off. ASC officials can supply details on the program.

Texas wheat producers and those in the other 38 commercial wheat growing states voted on August 24 to continue wheat marketing quotas another year. In the nation, 79.4 percent of those voting favored quotas and in Texas, 78.9 percent voted yes. A two-thirds majority was needed to continue quotas and make operative the new wheat stabilization program. Growers can get detail of the new program from the county ASC office.

Pinkeye has been reported from many areas of the state and Dr. C. M. Patterson, extension veterinarian, advises cattlemen to keep a careful watch for symptoms among their cattle. It can cause permanent blindness. He suggests that a veterinarian be consulted if pinkeye is suspected.

**FARMERS WHO DID NOT PLANT 75 PERCENT OF THEIR ALLOTMENTS**

This is particularly for farmers who did not plant 75 percent of their allotments.

Regulations state, a farmer must plant or release as much as 75 percent of his allotment in order to preserve his full history.

If due to excessive rain, flood, hail, drought, or illness of the farm operator or any other producer on the farm which are hereby determined to be conditions beyond the control of producers on the farm, the farm operator or owner shall file an application in writing with the county committee not later than TODAY, Sept. 15, showing failure to plant at least 75 percent of allotment was due to one or more of the above conditions.

Remember, TODAY, Sept. 15, is he last day!

We passed dozens of bills with a very minimum of debate. Since Wednesday we have done practically nothing, and we are advised that while there will be debate on

week that I will be Wednesday (September 13th) before we have any more roll calls.

It is hard to explain this "iff again-on again" procedure, and I will not attempt to do anything more than to say it surely does not represent the wishes of the average member, but it makes us all realize more clearly than ever just how important Speaker Rayburn's stabilizing influence is in the Congress. (Mr. Rayburn went home last week with a bad back).

Early this week we passed a bill which if approved by the Senate, will continue both the payments to schools in impacted areas and the Federal College Loan and Scholarship programs. I look upon the "Impacted Areas" bill simply as a recognition of the obligation of the Federal Government to pay for the services which have been rendered by the local schools for the benefit of Federal employees. In this sense, it is not aid but repayment. It is especially vital to communities like Killeen, Connally, Gatesville and Copperas Cove. The College Scholarship and Loan program encourages, in the cheapest way I know, the training of at least part of the specially trained people we must have if we are to continue the race with the U. S. S. R. I voted FOR the bill.

We also voted on the appropriation for Foreign Aid. I have heretofore explained my opposition to our existing Foreign Aid Program. I think that it should be phased out rather than increased. We have several billion dollars of unspent appropriations now. I voted Against more money.

Apparently the House will very nearly complete its work by next Wednesday night. The group representing the United States at the Interparliamentary Union Conference in Brussels was first scheduled to leave Sunday (September 10). This date was advanced till Wednesday at 8:00 a. m. The Conference opens Thursday at 10:00 a. m. We feel that the United States should be represented. Six p. m. Wednesday is the last hour we can leave and arrive in time to go from the airport to the session and this will mean an all night flight. We all want to be here for the work of the House, so we have postponed our departure till that hour.

I am one of the eleven delegates from the House. While the Conference actually continues through September 22, I feel that I must get home and I shall therefore probably attend only three days, as there will be a plane returning at that time.

## Hornets vs Bulldogs ... What Gives!

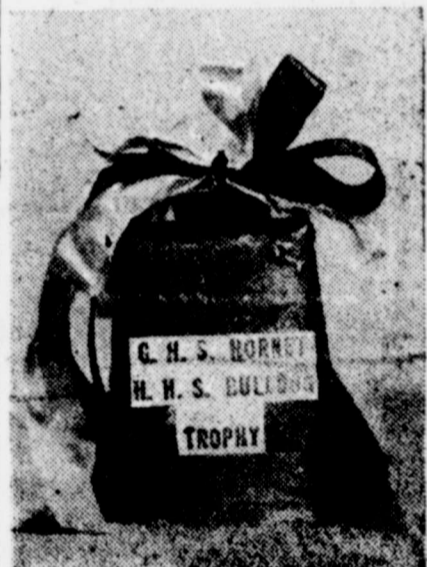
