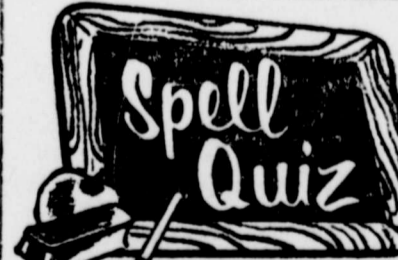

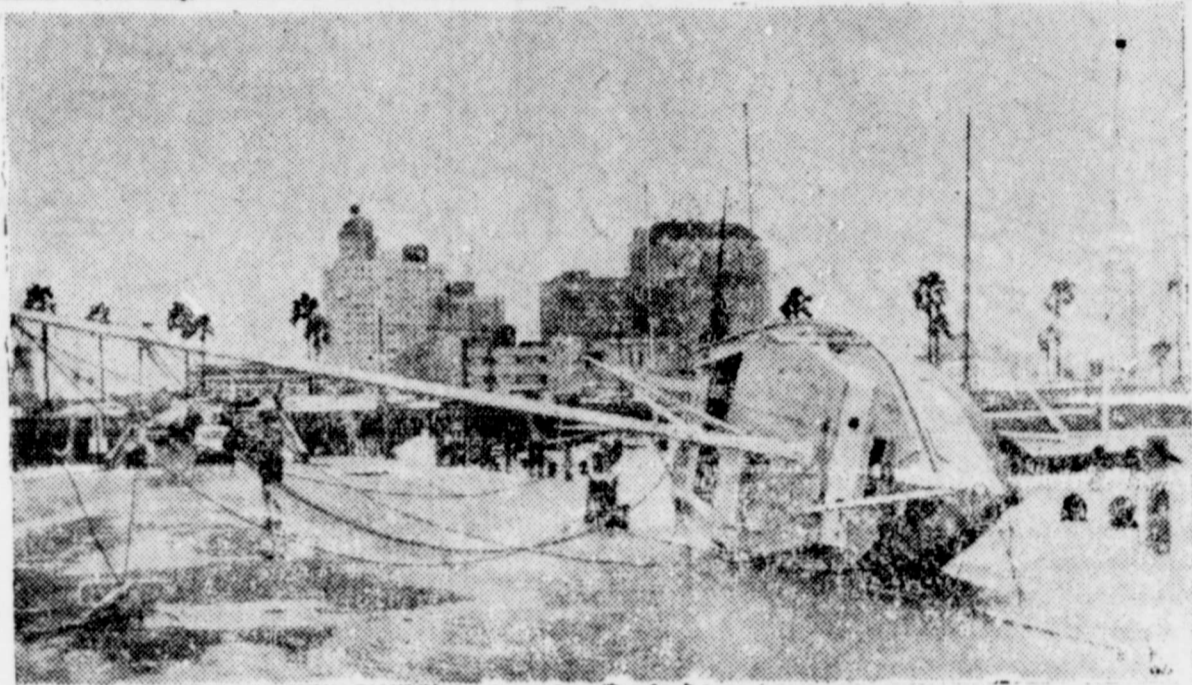

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## Study Of Water Situation Possible Heist In Water Rates

City Council Tuesday evening approved an engineering survey of Gatesville water and sewer rates with a possible "adjustment."

It's possible either that, or a second issue to enlarge the sewer system and build a new disposal plant, and aldermen want to know what the water and sewer rates will have to be to pay off this obligation.

The aldermen have tentatively approved a survey which will cost \$250 to \$300.

Seal coat the past summer cost \$15,903.57, and another \$1,468.11 has been spent on Cottonwood Drive, and they voted to spend \$4,100 more on street improvement during the present program.

## LET'S SWING FROM THE GROUND

The readers of this newspaper are respectfully, but urgently, requested to join an honest-to-goodness grass-roots campaign to save America from going bankrupt.

## TYLER TEACHER USES WIRE DOGS AND SUCH IN ORDER TO WIN "PALS"

TYLER, Tex., Sept. 14 (AP)—Friendship costs a child a nickel when he's making "Pals" in Tyler.

That outlay pays for one cloth-espun, two paper clips, and three pieces of electrical wiring in short, long and medium lengths.

And with those materials and a teacher like 20-year-old Kay Tomlin, making "Pals" always roves a cinch during any art and crafts session at one of the recreational playgrounds of the East Texas City.

Miss Tomlin says she got the idea for maing the offbeat canines after reading a book on wire sculpture. An illustration of a wire-sculptured dog caught her eye.

"I felt it could be revised sim-ply for children," Miss Tomlin

arts and crafts teacher, said. "This dog had to be simplified because the kids we cater to are, ah, 5 to 6, or 12, so of course it couldn't be too complicated."

"Pals," if their limbs are twist-ed correctly, end up on their haunches. And as the final touch to their clothespin heads, teacher and pupils "ink" in the eyes and nostrils with a black felt pencil.

Although she had to cut ex-penses of the materials "to the bare minimum" to make "Pals" inexpensive Miss Tomlin feels the enthusiasm shown by the chil-dren is worth it.

"After all, the object is not to make money but to let the kids have fun and express themselves," she said.

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### HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT, CITY COUNCIL AGREE ON ROW REQUIREMENTS

Mayor Dan McNeil, reported last week the State Highway Department and City Council have agreed he total right-of-way requirements have been reduced from 80 to 70 feet. Actual width of the highway will be 64 feet from face of curb to face of curb. Footage required for utility and public purposes has been reduced to 10 feet.

The City will obtain easements instead of deeds to the property needed, this being due to the unsettled question between the City and the number of property owners as to the amount of ROW that the City owns. This, possibly, could not be answered without lengthy and costly court proceedings, and this is the reason for the easements, and it will minimize damages, if any, to existing property or business, and reduces the ROW requirements.

The City does not relinquish any claim it may have to the land involved, but merely agrees that there is a question of title involved.

J. Albert Dickie has been retained, and will contact each property owner from 10th street to the railroad, and explain the situation, and will request property owners to sign the easement, granting the City and State permission to construct a street on property outlined in the easement.

Dickie will ask each owner if he desires the existing sidewalks be replaced on his property, and if so, the City will reconstruct these sidewalks at no expense to the property owner.

Questions Mr. Dickie cannot answer regarding the project, the City Council will hold a special meeting and attempt to answer them. Also, property owners desiring to consult their attorneys prior to signing the easement will be advised to do so.

The Council has signed an agreement with the Highway Department agreeing to secure the ROW for the project, and the plan is thought less expensive to the City, as well as for the citizens.

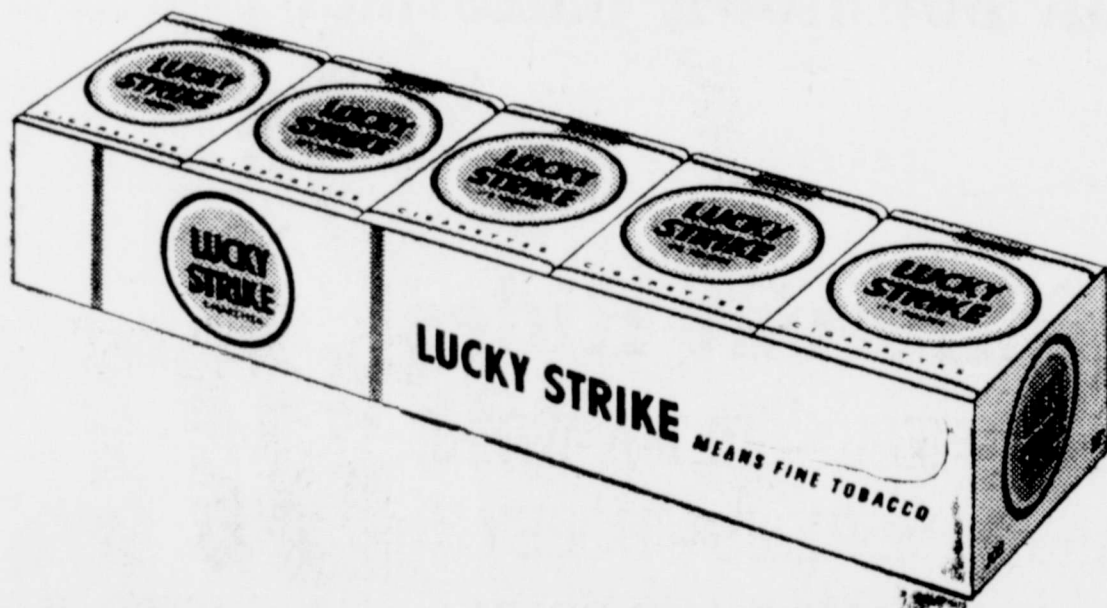

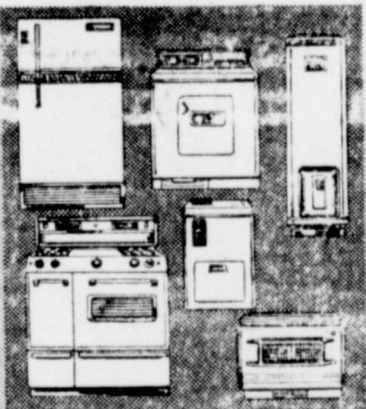
