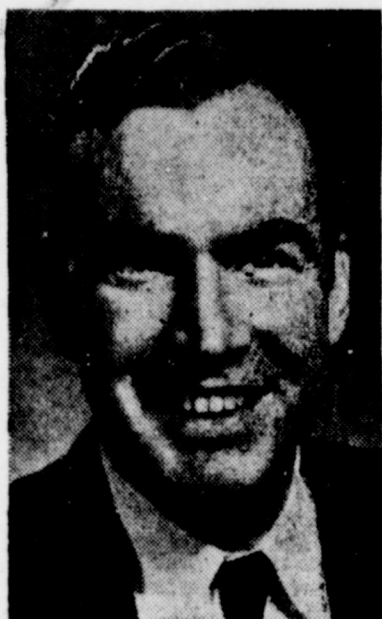

Laws said the first Negro admitted to a TNG unit enlisted in one of the 49th's tank companies about 6 weeks ago. Most NG units in the South are terribly under strength and yet they will not accept Negro servicemen. The 49th is 5,000 under authorized strength

Dallas police captured 4 SSBs when their stolen car crashed into a parked vehicle after a 10 mile chase thru country roads.

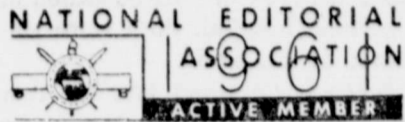

EMPLOY THE PHYSICALLY HANDICAPPED WEEK— OCTOBER 1-7.



LETTER OF RECOMMENDATION

The week of October 1-7 has been designated by President Kennedy as "National Employ the Physically Handicapped Week," and in that connection there's good news for the physically impaired men and women looking for jobs in American industry.

Once again, the National Association of Manufacturers is urging its 19,000 member companies to review their employment activities, looking to further possible openings for the handicapped.

In an open letter to the NAM membership NAM President John W. McGovern wrote in part: Today and every day the physically impaired compete with the able-bodied and ask no special favors.

"Disabled employees in industry throughout the land have written a record of accomplishment which more than justified

the confidence management placed in them.

"It is, of course, in the best interests of the nation, if industry and the persons concerned to give those individuals equal opportunity with the able-bodied for jobs they are qualified to fill.

"I strongly urge you to use 'National Employ the Physically Handicapped Week' (October 1-7) as a timely opportunity to survey your plants for additional job openings for the disabled."

It is newsworthy to report that since World War II, greater progress has been made on this problem than any other in the social field.

Industry should be rightly proud of its efforts in helping the physically impaired become self-supporting members of society.

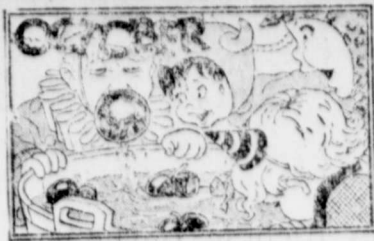

Post Labor Day Reappraisal

The stock market recently has displayed a great deal of buoyancy in spite of the bad news of the auto strike, the crisis in Berlin and the Administration's pressure on the steel companies to hold the price line. This action is encouraging and technical factors lead us to believe that selected stocks will go higher over the short term. Interest has switched from the high flying glamor stocks into the investment grade stocks and we believe that emphasis should be placed at this time on quality issues where true statistical values exist.

Our earlier forecasts of domestic passenger car production of 5,530,000 units still appears valid providing the General Motors strike does not last for any extended period of time. In making any selections in the glamor stock category we suggest the following yardsticks: First, in most cases stocks selling over 30 times 1961 earnings should not be purchased; second, there should be assurances of improved earnings in 1962 over 1961 and evidence of further growth; third, competitive factors should be taken into careful consideration.

Looking over these stocks at the present time we feel that Avco is probably the best candidate for investment.

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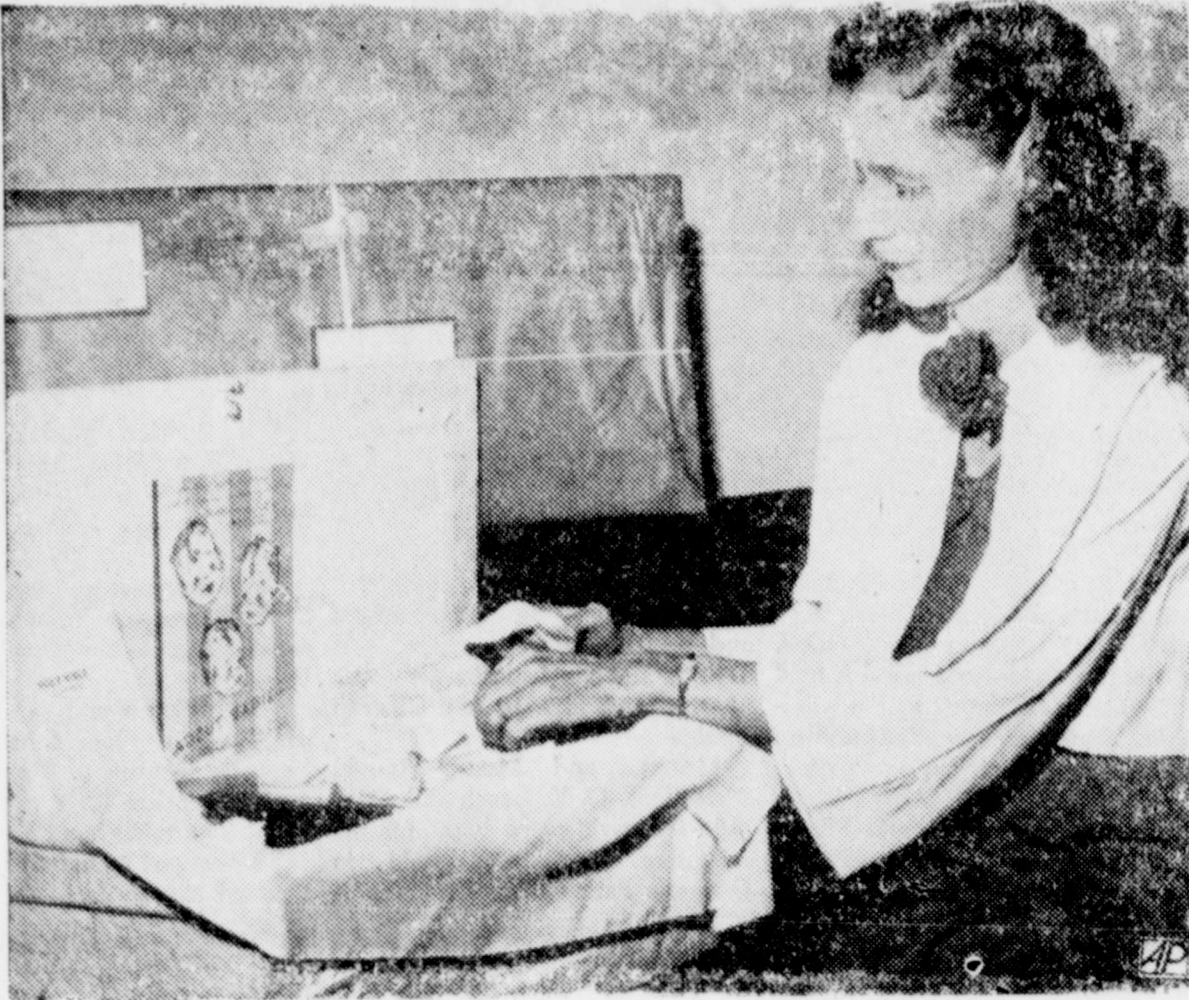

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS" BY C. WILSON HARDER

For some time, to curtail the ravages to American business and employment brought about by the flood of cheap goods from low labor wage areas, Sen. Keating and colleagues have had before Congress a measure which would set tariff rates according to the prevailing wage scale of any nation exporting to the U. S.

This problem of having an economy undermined by goods produced with cheap labor is not alone an American one. In England, the present government, is trying to get England into the European Common Market.

The European Common Market to which practically every free Europe nation belongs, except England, is a plan whereby goods are moved between nations without import duties or tariffs.

However, since the Macmillan government started the drive to bring England into the Common Market, there has been, according to public polls made in the British Isles, a distinct opposition to the Macmillan government which some believe will cause its fall.

A major spearhead against the plan is the Beaverbrook newspapers who are currently running front page boxes on the affect joining the European Common Market would have on British welfare.

Quite a typical example of

Translated into American money, this means the British textile worker gets 53 cents per hour, the Italian worker 25 1/4 cents per hour.

Thus, the British opposition to tearing down their tariff walls that protect their business and employment is a great lesson that American policy leaders who have taken steps that have already destroyed a great part of the American textile industry should take note.

The British know, despite their efficient production methods, that they cannot compete with a nation who pays the workers half as much as the British pay.

Thus, it is difficult to see, the stary eyed State Dept. dreamers to the contrary, how U. S. industry can compete with a wage scale that is about four times that of the British scale.

There is perhaps another lesson to be drawn from this situation in England.

The British People seemingly will permit their leaders to engage in many strange maneuvers, but when they adopt a course that threatens the welfare of the man in the street, a mighty storm is set up. Nobody is going to destroy Alf's job without having a fight on his hands.

Congressman **BOB POAGE**

Dear Friends:

I am happy to announce that Secretary Freeman has advised me that in furtherance of the plan to consolidate all agricultural activities in Central Texas that the Internal Audit and the Com-

pliance and Investigation Division of the Commodity Credit Corporation and the Southwestern Headquarters of the General Counsel of the Department of Agriculture will be moved from Dallas to Temple during the coming year. This is in addition to the Soil Conservation Service and the Farmers Home Administration and establishes Temple as the center of agricultural activities in the Southwest. It also assures the Department of friendly, sympathetic surroundings.

Another week has passed and Congress is still in session. It seems clear that we will not adjourn until sometime next week,

but I cannot see any more business of importance.

Recently we have had lots of mail suggesting that Congress should stay in session. I understand the concern of those who have made this suggestion, but I fear that they have overlooked the fact that every legislative body passes a lot of frivolous bills when it stays in session after completing its major work. I think that it would have been a good thing had Congress adjourned two weeks ago. Not only do Members seem to think up unneeded bills, but in the confusion and pressure of adjournment many measures slip through. As I see it, good legislation is best achieved with a firm and clear timetable adopted early in the session.

This week the House voted for an Arms Control Commission. This is a worthy idea. Everyone wants the nations of the world to control, reduce and finally abolish all armaments, but every thinking person realizes that this can only be done in concert with the U.S.S.R.—and we must know that Russia is complying. That is, we must have inspection. As originally introduced, this bill was very vague and seemed to allow broad authority to be transferred to the United Nations. I supported an amendment to clearly set out the supremacy of our own government and our constitution in making decisions under the bill. When this amendment was adopted, I voted for the bill, believing that we should give all the evidence we can of our willingness to negotiate meaningful and enforceable limitations on world arms.

GATESVILLE HORNETS OUT WITH MARLIN BULLDOGS 14-8

Marlin, Sept. 29— The Gatesville Hornets have never had a greater moment than they had his Friday night in the game between the Gatesville Hornets and the Marlin Bulldogs.

The Hornets, the underdogs, outfought their hosts in a life and death situation for the upperhand and victory of 14 to 8.

Marlin sarded a 60-yard scoring drive on the final play of the first period when Tomy Pecina reeled off eight yards on a keeper to the Bulldogs 48.

Byer, the night's hardest runner collected a first in two bursts to the Gatesville 49. Jones streaked to the 34 and teamed with Byer and Billy Greensage for a first and the Hornets 22. Byer like big brother pulled the trigger on the Marlin touchdown with a Texas A&M type power sweep down right sidelines for a 22-yard scoring gallop. Excellent blocking by tackle Brazos Mason and Greensage paved the way on the touchdown road.

Jones rode the backs of three Gatesville tacklers into the end zone for the extra points and an 8-0 lead for the host Bulldogs.

Keener, playing a magnificent defensive game, Tate and Lauder-

dale kept the wraps on the Gatesville runners and Scott started his passing wizardry for a short drive to the Marlin 33 before Greensage intercepted as the half closed.

The Class AA powers slugged it out, toe-to-toe during the third period with Donald Volter, Tate and Meyer supplying their defensive jolts for Marlin and Gatesville countering with Bond, Tommy Pews, Scott and Pat Roach.

Marlin appeared to have the upper hand when Keener, Meyer and Voeltr began to apply brutal pressure on the Hornets jassing game and forced a punt to the Marlin 17 with 7:45 to play in the final quarter.

The Hornets started their first TD drive on its own 46 following a 38 yard kick by Marlin's Joe Jones.

At the controls was the Hornet played with the champions of 1960. He found a leak in the Bulldog pass defense and threaded three key passes. The third hitting Stanley Everett in the right flat, then he faked a defender out and went head first into the end zone for the first touchdown. Gatesville made the conversion and the game was tied 8-8. There were 2 minutes and 30 seconds left in the game.

On the kickoff, following the tying touchdown, the ball took a big hop right over the Marlin receivers head and bounded to-

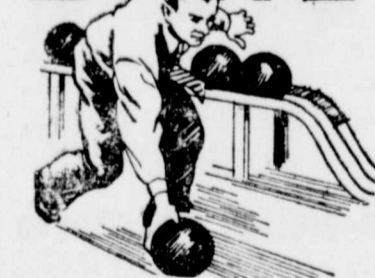
Bobby Carothers made six points for the B Hornets and Larry Harold made he conversion.
