of them got 51) and Mrs. James Barron 7.

COPPERAS COVE

Copperas Cove re-elected George Leonhard mayor with 497 votes. He defeated J. A. Darosett who received 215 votes.

Councilmen elected were Lonnie B. Walker with 595 votes, and Charles Baggett with 493. Other councilmen candidates were Theron Bishop who received 261 votes and Buck Henry who got 142. Walker was an incumbent.

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

"Scam" is a term used in the P. T. Barnum "carny" world, best defined as fleecing the public, or in Barnum's own words, "There's a sucker born every minute."

But then, the patron of a show of exoticism, or a game of chance knows, if he possesses normal intelligence and sophistication, that his prospects of winning aren't very high.

The new "Scam" operators, however, pursue their "con-game" as legitimate businessmen, and are responsible for having bilked honest American business of some \$60 million so far.

Behind these "con" operators lurks the familiar shadow of the Cosa Nostra, known as the syndicate, and Mafia.

The Wall St. Journal recently ran a revealing expose of these "fraudulent failures," who are milking smaller areas as well as the country's metropolitan capitals. These "Scam" operators move innocently into an area, open a seemingly legit business, and proceed to request credit for all they are worth. The merchandise thus obtained is sold fast on a strictly cash basis, or in some cases secreted away to other locations. Soon, the inevitable bankruptcy is declared, and, of course, the creditors hardly know what hit them.

How are such shady operators able to obtain such extensive credit?

A case in point occurred in the West where a group of operators bought control of an unpretentious furniture retail store, and proceeded to order appliances and furniture totaling \$125,000 on the previous owner's credit, acting as agents for the former owner.

In a particularly brazen case of fraud, the Wall St. Journal tells of another group of operators who bought out the capital stock of a lumber firm for a small amount, and began purchasing in small amounts and paying cash. Then came "D" day: on Saturday the operators ordered \$12,000 worth of door units from a wholesaler. Although a credit check was run on the store the following Monday, the operators called the wholesaler at daybreak demanding immediate need for the lumber, and sent the store van over to the lumber yard to pick-up the goods. About half the ordered doors were loaded onto the truck.

The Better Business Bureau offers advice on spotting "scam" operators. Beware of any sudden acceleration of orders from little-known operations demanding immediate delivery. This may signal that the firm is not legit, and is attempting to rush the supplier into settling for a superficial credit check so as to grab the goods and run.

Prosecution is difficult, as the Syndicate operates as many legitimate businesses as illegal, and tracing the "black hand" is difficult. And in the case of the immediate proprietors filing bankruptcy, it is difficult to pin the goods on them unless violation of Federal bankruptcy laws can be proven on basis of fraud perpetration.

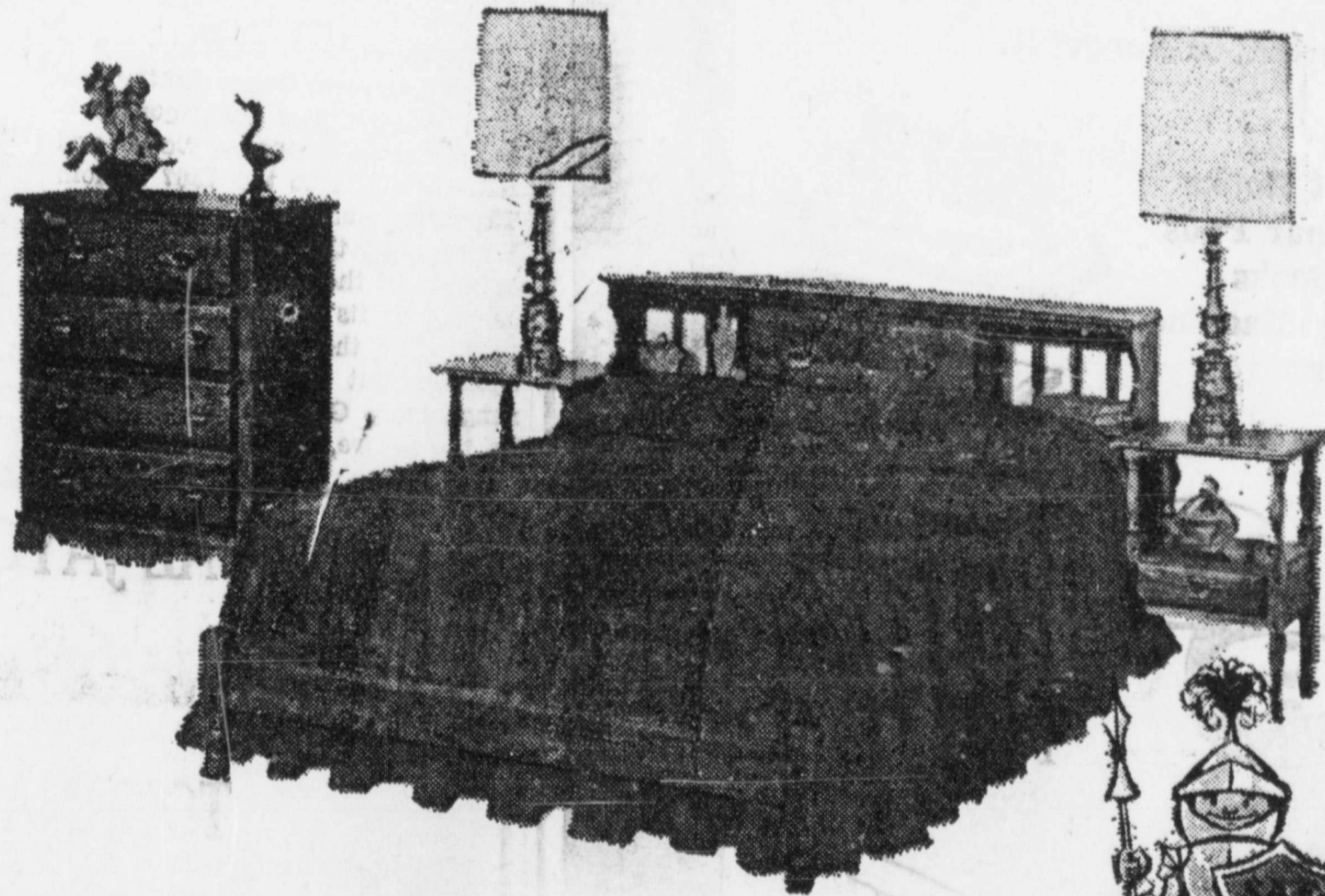

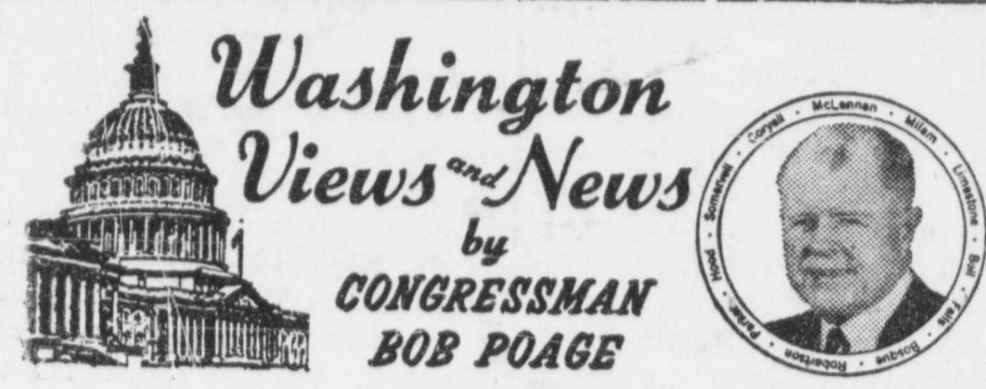

I often wish I could sit down and write a personal letter to all my good friends in the 11th district. However, that seems to be impossible, so the next best thing is the opportunity to occasionally write a newsletter to everyone there.
I wish you could all be in Washington next week, as it is going to be one of the most exciting weeks of the year. The cherry blossoms should be in full bloom for the beginning of the Cherry Blossom Festival, which lasts for several days. The Cherry Blossom Princesses come from every State in the Union. The one from Texas this year is Kathryn Burris from Corsicana. The meteorologists and the botanists all try in advance to arrive at a determination as to when the blossoms might show themselves in a given year, and it is amazing how often they "hit the nail on the head"; yet, there have been seasons of disappointment when everyone is celebrating a Cherry Blossom Festival without any blossoms because they came too early or possibly had been rained off the trees. So you can see, it is always a "guessing game."
In our way of thinking, of more major importance is the return of Congress from their Easter Recess (one week) at the beginning of next week. This Congress seems to have gotten off to a more active start than most new Congresses do. Much important legislation has already been studied and will be resumed next week. For example, the Agriculture Committee, of which Congressman Poage is Chairman, will continue hearings

on the REA Supplemental Financing Bill on April 4 and 5. These two days have been reserved for testimony from farm organizations. Members of Congress, and other interested groups not included in the categories heard the first week — March 21, 22, and 23. Comments are constantly coming to us from the constituents and from the rest of the nation as well as to the splendid job which Congressman Poage is doing as Chairman of the Agriculture Committee. We had thought Mr. Poage had a tremendous amount of prestige and responsibility as Vice-Chairman of the Committee, but have noted a considerable increase in both in that move from second place to first place. The Chairman of a Committee in Congress (there are only 20 Chairmanships of Standing Committees in the House of Representatives) is one of the most important people in Congress. It is an honor which we in the office, as I know do all of you, cherish. Since Congressman Poage for such a long time has been considered one of the foremost authorities on agriculture and its related industries in the world, there has probably never been a Chairman prepared and suited for a Chairmanship of a Committee who was better man. One other thing which has so greatly impressed me about his Chairmanship is his determination that all matters pertaining to the 11th District come first with him. Becoming one of the most important men in the nation has not changed him. He is still realistic, practical, and modest person he has always been.

We hope to see all of you from time to time. If any of you want special reservations made to certain government places in Washington which require them, let us know by letter one month in advance, as this is oftentimes the requirement. However, most government places do not require reservations.
