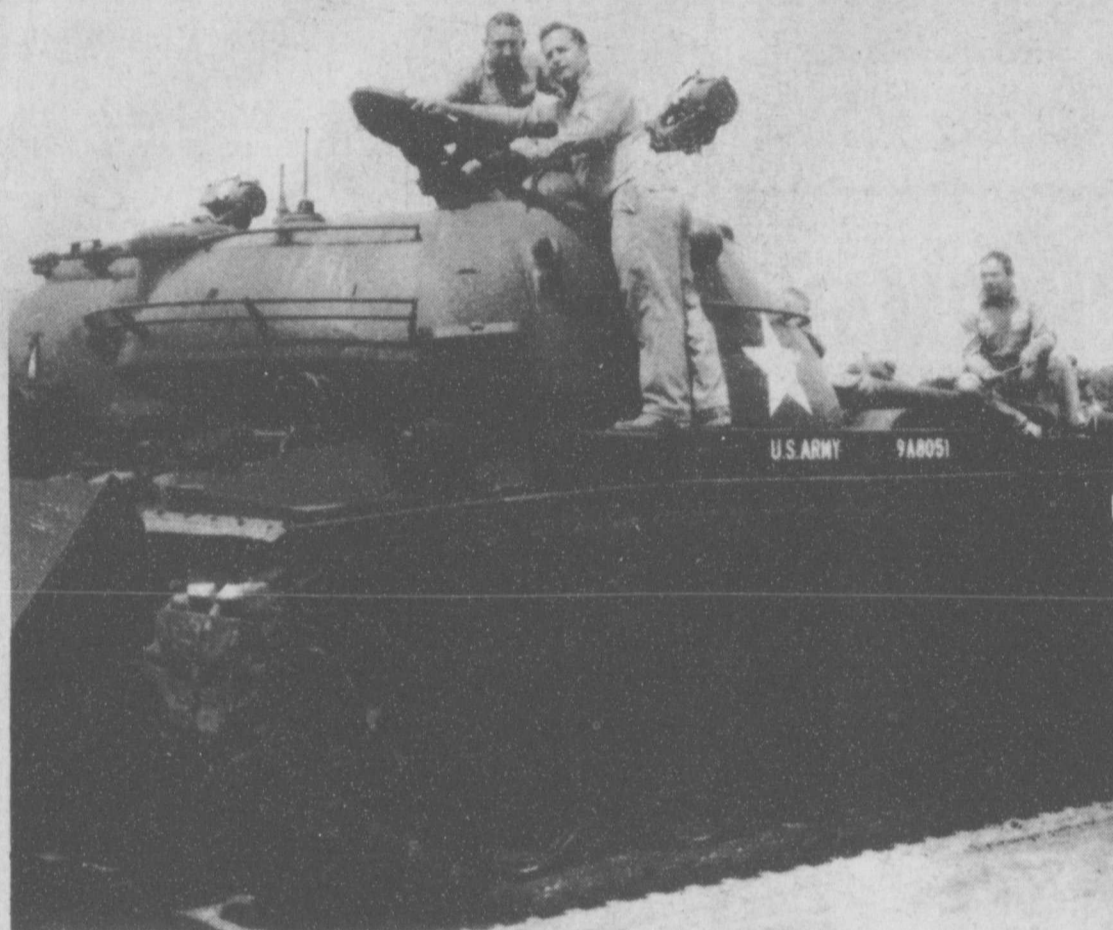




## Local Guard Unit Mobilized



Jerry Barton, Earl Wolske and W.C. Millsap, Jr. are employees of the North Fort Hood Concite. Wolske and Millsap will both be affected by the latest call up.

The 113th Light Maintenance Battalion is always in a high state of readiness because in some areas, their civilian jobs are identical to their military duty.

The 113 Light Maintenance Battalion has been mobilized for possible duty in Vietnam. The official notification reached Captain McGlothlin at 10:20 a.m., Thursday morning. Most of the guardsmen in the Gatesville area are civilian employees at the North Fort Hood Consite.

Colonel James T. Yows, in charge of the Consite facility, reported the unit would report to Fort Hood on May 13 for processing and assignment. Yows pointed out that information indicated that 10,000 of the guardsmen would have Vietnam assignments.

The Gatesville-Lampasas is the Central Texas unit affected by the latest mobilization. The guardsmen can be on active duty for up to two years.

Col. Yows commented, "The unit is fulfilling the purpose for which it was organized. . . ."

"It will create hardships, they understand this and will

accept it." The recent realignment of the Texas National Guard classifies the Lampasas guardsmen as maintenance personnel and the men will probably need training before assignment.

Yows pointed out that the mobilization station was Fort Hood, but no mission had been set for the unit.

The May 13th mobilization late gives the guardsmen one month to attend to personal business and report to Fort Hood.

Guardsmen at the Consite had varying views of the activities, but most felt disrupted and insecure.

Donald Gartman, guardsman with the 113th commented, "It is going to be awfully hard on my business - farming and ranching."

Guardsman Dewey Jones, a civilian employee of the North Fort Hood Concite commented similarly, "It looks like somebody is going to have to go,

However, activation stops my new cattle interest."

Mr. O.K. Davis pointed out, "Most everybody will lose financially. All of us realized the possibility of call up."

At last report, no additional information was available as to the type duty the locals would be assigned.

Captain McGlothlin expected more information to be available in the next week.

### City Council Accepts Revised Well Cost

The new Gatesville City Council was sworn in at Tuesday night's regular meeting. The council meeting started at 7:00 with retiring Mayor, Wendell Lowrey in charge of the swearing in ceremonies.

The new council wasted no time in considering swimming pool requirements, street improvements, sewer system changes, well and pump financing and pipe lines.

The new council determined that the old swimming pool would probably be in use for the coming season with some minor improvements. Annual start up cost of the city pool is \$300 to \$400. With the parks and recreation committee seeking to build a new pool no major repair work will be undertaken.

A mutual aid agreement for fire protection between Gatesville and Killeen, has been signed by the mayor. The agreement establishes a method of reimbursement for losses of equipment and materials used when equipment is called to assist.

The Texas Highway Department is attempting to secure permission to install new signal light equipment and coordinate signal lights at the intersections of Main and 8th and the intersection of Main and Lutterloh.

The new light would be in addition to the present system. The co-ordinating system would

create a smooth flowing traffic arrangement.

The council has arranged payment of \$2000 for the present water system, along Golf Course Road by May 1.

The City will be required to begin construction work on a new six inch water line along Golf Course Road to the intersection of Lovers Lane and Golf Course Road.

The job calls for 5600 foot of cast iron pipe and five fire plugs.

Cost of the pipe will be \$10640, with additional fittings costing \$1500 and cost of laying the pipe set at \$4150. The total cost of the project is set at \$16,291 as compared to original council estimates of \$22,000.

The City Council voted Tuesday night to authorize payment of \$36,877 for the well construction. The well, originally called for 750 foot of casing, 70 foot of liner and 60 feet of screen.

Well test showed a larger formation of water producing sand than originally predicted, causing changes in the structure of the well.

Twenty feet additional casing was used. The liner section of the well was reduced by 15 feet, creating a slight savings. To take advantage of the sand formation, 30 feet additional screen was required at an additional cost of approximately \$950.

### Blankenship Will Appear In Mozart's "Magic Flute"

William Blankenship, well-known Gatesville tenor of the Vienna State Opera, will appear in the role of Prince Tamino in the San Diego Opera's May production of Mozart's "Magic Flute".

Mr. Blankenship, who is presently the leading lyric tenor of the world renowned Vienna Opera, is pictured in that House's recent production of the seldomly performed "Die Schweigsame Frau" (The Silent Woman) by Richard Strauss. Mr. Blankenship was highly praised by the strict Viennese critics and opera public. In addition to this opera, which Mr. Blankenship calls an absolute farce because of the improbable title, he will be featured in Staatsoper productions of "Barber of Seville", "Capriccio", "Magic Flute", "Don Giovanni" and "Danton's Death" during the forthcoming Vienna Festival Weeks which begin on the 18th of May.

Following his San Diego appearances, Mr. Blankenship plans to visit relatives, friends and colleagues in Texas and New York before returning in mid-May to his Austro-Texas family, (wife is a Connally from San Antonio and four children) who await his return out in the small village of Sulz in the Vienna Woods: to prepare for the Festival performances.

Mr. Blankenship's last operatic appearance in Texas was with the Houston Opera, also in the role of Prince Tamino, which marked the first time that he had sung this role in English, after having performed it more than a hundred times in German.

Also during this last visit to his home, the Gatesville Mayor, Dr. Wendell Lowrey, proclaimed a "Bill Blankenship Week" which the tenor believes to be a rare event as Texas has mostly so honored only its singing Cowboys, Pro-Footballers and Politicians in this manner.

Refined estimates of the new well show the two separate contracts, well construction and pump installation, to be approximately \$2000 above the original cost of the well. However, the sand trap feature of the well has been ruled unnecessary, saving an expense of \$3,000.

Summing up the revised price of the well, City Manager, Eiland Lovejoy, estimated cost at \$52,981.

The project is expected to be complete in early May.

Because of the loss of the first day of absentee voting, Henson will open April 20th and 27th from 8 a.m. to 12 noon to allow voters to vote in person.

### Easter Seal Society Campaign Has Last Minute

A last minute appeal for support of the Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults and its program of services to the handicapped was issued today by Mr. Ray H. Byrom, who is the Easter Seal Representative in Coryell County.

The Easter Seal provided treatment and services for 17,622 physically handicapped children and adults in Texas, last year, Mr. Byrom said, and this program needs to be expanded. Many people are going without services that would increase the productivity of their lives and make them happier. With increased growth of the Easter Seal Society, more and more of these people will be reached, he added.

The Society is carrying on a continuing program to seek out the disabled who are doing without services and see that they receive the services they need.

As Easter Seal Representative, Mr. Byrom is the person to contact for services from the Easter Seal Society.

The Texas Easter Seal Society helps support 21 treatment facilities in Texas where crippled children and adults are treated, regardless of their ability to pay. Physical, occupational and speech therapy are offered to help the handicapped overcome their disabilities. A complete referral program to ensure equal rehabilitation services to every person in Texas is included in Easter Seal Society Services, he added.

Mr. Byrom asked that anyone in need of services contact him at Guaranty Bank & Trust Company in Gatesville, Texas, 76528.

He added that the Easter Seal Appeal will close Sunday, April 14 and full support should be given the Easter Seal Society by every citizen of Coryell County.

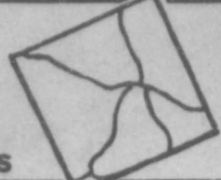

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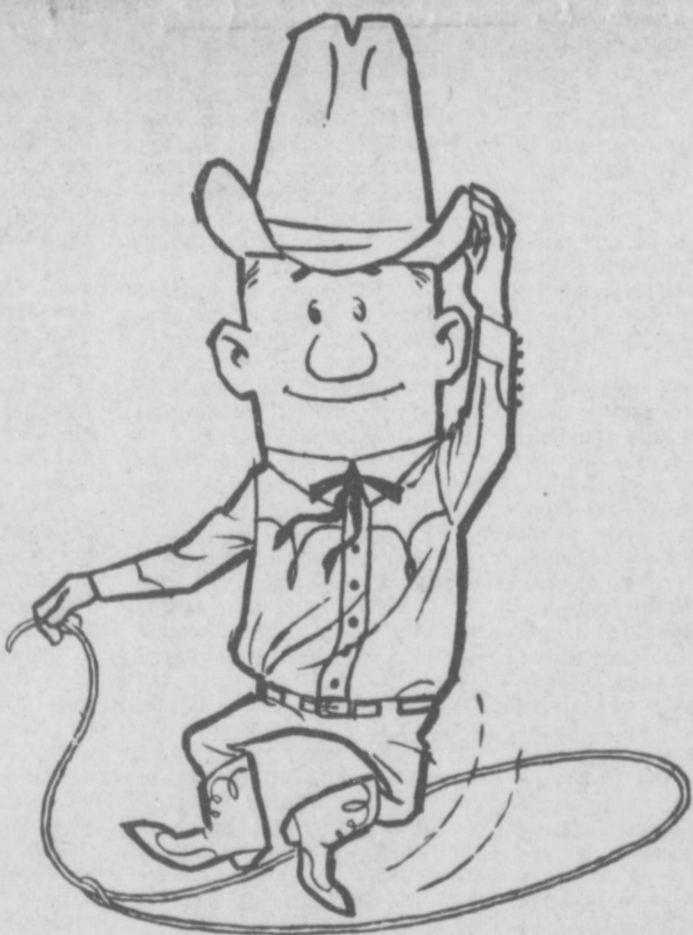

### Rites Held

Mr. John Wesley Houser was born near Gatesville, in the old Fort Gates Community, August 12, 1885 to Mr. and Mrs. David E. Houser.

He spent all of his early life in this Community.

He was married to Miss Olive Lee Hudgens in 1906 at Martindale, Texas. They made their home in Hamilton County until 1921, when the family moved to Garza County, Texas.

To this union were born 3 sons, one of whom preceded him in death, May 28th, 1966. Ten daughters, five of whom preceded him in death, two in infancy and three in the new London School Disaster in 1927 in East, Texas. His wife died March 19, 1931.

In 1924, the family moved to Lea County, New Mexico, where they established their home. They lived in New Mexico until 1936 when they moved back

to Texas. They lived a few years in Marble Falls and Johnson City, then moved to Dallas about 1943 and lived there until his death.

As a child, Mr. Houser became a Christian and united with the Methodist Church at old Fort Gates near Gatesville. Death came on Sunday a.m., March 17th, 1968 at the age of 82 years, 7 months and 5 days.

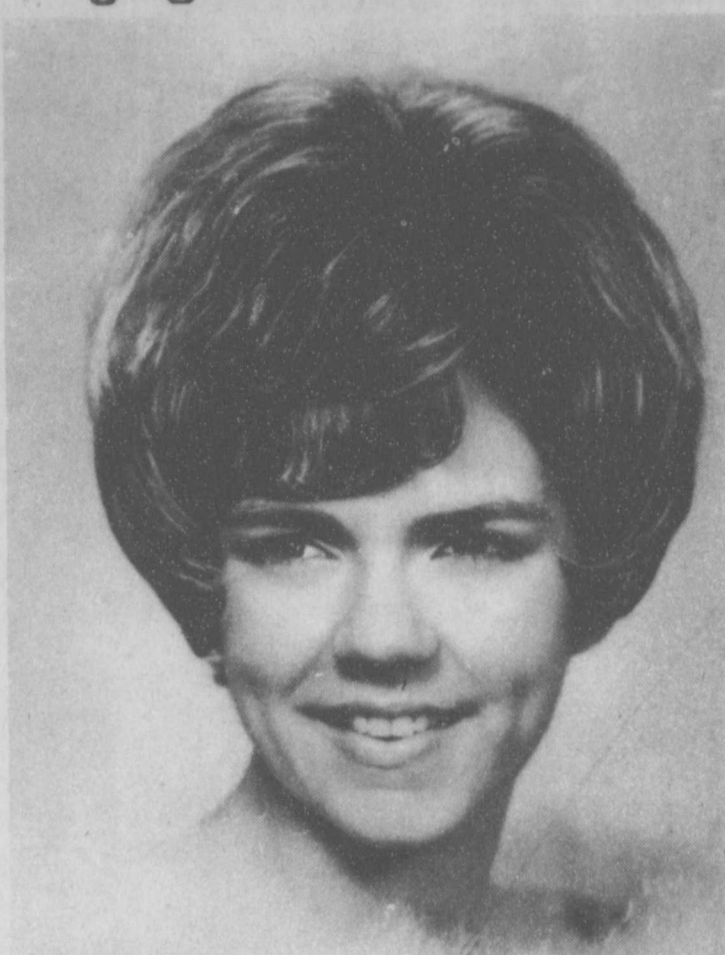

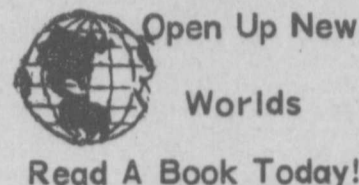

Mistress Mary Quite Contrary, how does your garden grow? It wasn't by accident that contrary Mary appeared in a garden; all people are contrary some of the time, but gardeners are usually a little worse than others. When it rains, we moan because we can't work outside, but when the sun shines, we're afraid a douth is about to begin. Those who live in the South want to grow Alpine flowers while those in the North wish for oleanders and bougainvilleas. If we have a nice sunny yard, we try to raise azaleas, ferns or lily-

of-the-valley, while our neighbor up the street who has lovely trees says nothing will grow because it is too shady. So just as a help (or hindrance) to our contrariness, let's try growing sun loving flowers in the sun and shade loving ones under the trees, there are many beautiful ones in both categories. The flowers which grow well in shade arenaturally used to the leaf mod which results from the trees so add plenty of humus to your shady gardens. Some flowers that will do well in these areas are: foxgloves, hosta, nasturtium, nocotiana, balsam, hemerocallis, bleeding heart, most of the spring bulbs and for shrubs, nothing makes a brighter splash than azaleas. If your trees are very thick and a dense shade results, an evergreen ground cover of ivy,

ajuga or vinca may be the best answer for a problem spot where even grass refuses to grow. Now for the sunny garden, which is easier since all plants require a little sun. Everyone is acquainted with sun loving marigolds, zinnias, roseos, alysium, gaillardia, poppies, amaranthus and snapdragons. Some of the more unusual ones might be gazanias, wish-bone flowers, ice plants, or the blue Tahoka daisy. The versatile petunias, day lilies and iris will grow in either area. Of course there are exceptions to every rule, so don't mind being contrary once in a while, you'll get a great feeling of accomplishment in growing some plant in an environment where they said, "it couldn't be done."

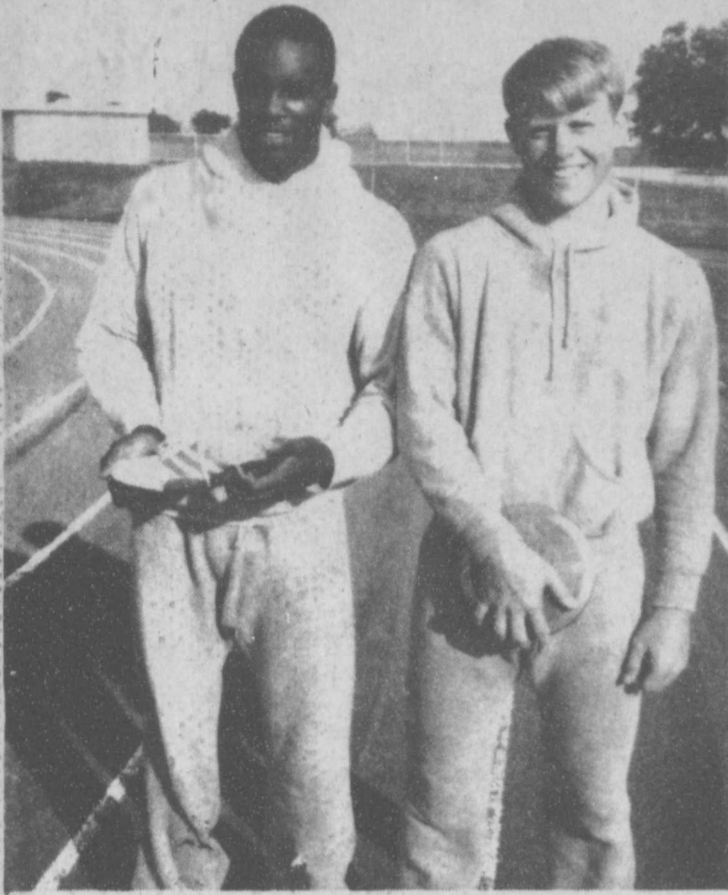

## Cole And Reeve Qualify For Regional

Bobby Cole and Mark Reeve continue workouts in preparation for Thursday, Friday and Saturday, April 18, 19 and 20. The two Hornet "banner barriers" at the Regional track meet in Corpus Christi, Texas, will be after first or second place in their specialty for a berth in the State 3AAA meet. Bobby Cole secured his place in the regional contest with a second place finish in both the 440 yard dash and the broad jump.

Mark Reeve made the grade with his discus throw of 139' 6". Reeve has been hard at his work this week and Wednesday he hurled the discus 145'. Coach Bishop and Reeve both estimate that it will take 150' or better to qualify for the state meet.

Bobby Cole must train for two events, however, training will fall into a similar pattern for both events. The 440 yard dash of course, calls for much running and leg conditioning. The broad jump calls for the same exercise with only a more precise arrangement of steps. Cole will do very little jumping before the meet.

Coach Bishop was glad to see the warm weather Wednesday. He pointed out that track athletes can get into condition easier in warm weather. Cole went through a tough

Wednesday workout with some warm-up laps and then four 330 yard dashes. Bobby has not run a 440 yard dash for time this week, however, he was timed at 40.1 seconds on a 352 yard run.

Coach Bishop pointed out that in the broad jump, Cole would face two of the state top 3 A broad jumpers both jumping over 23 feet.

Coach Bishop plans to take his regional qualifiers to either Dallas or San Antonio for competition this weekend.

If the tracksters go to Dallas, Chris Montgomery, miler, John King, miler, and Gary Kafer, high jumper, will be able to compete.

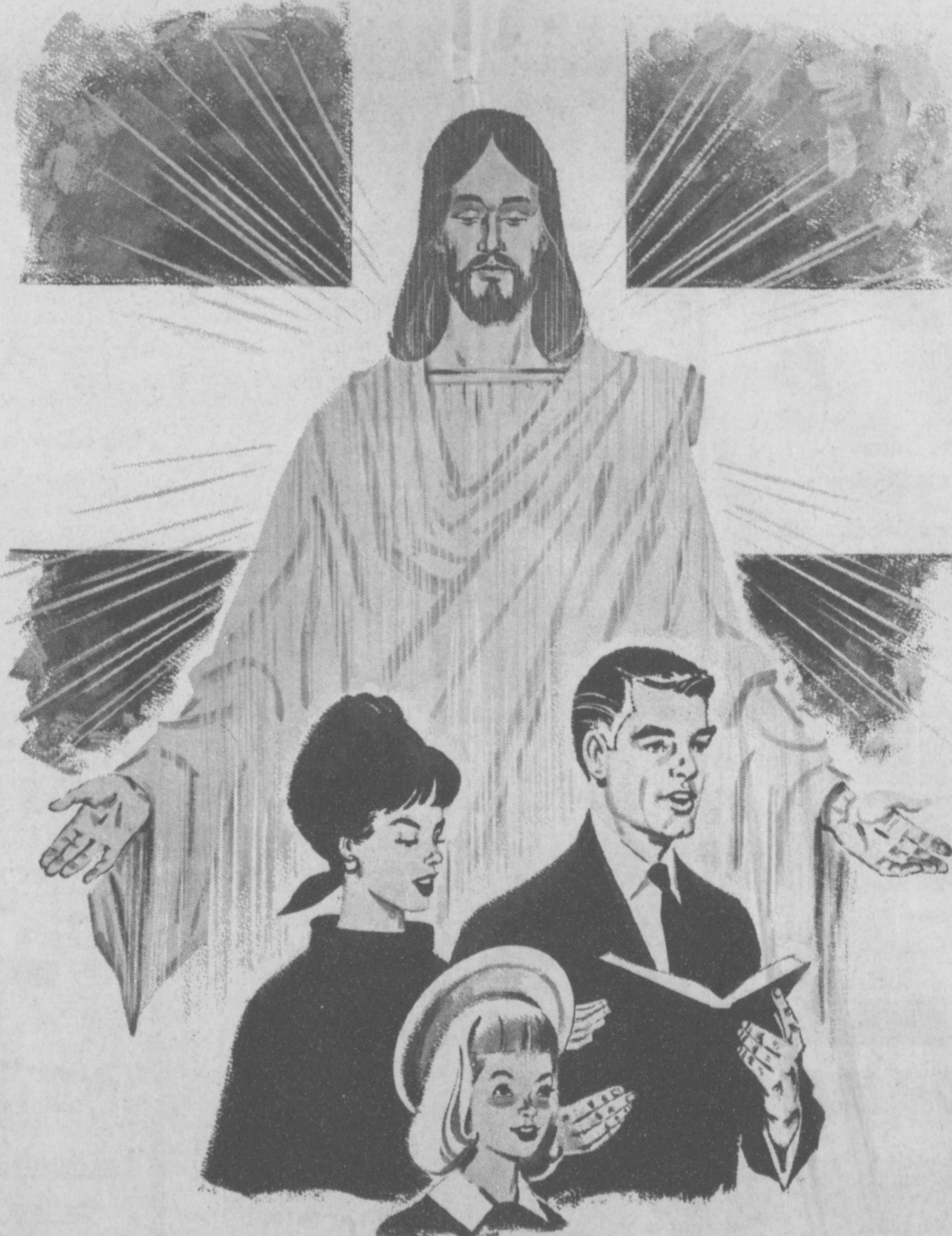
