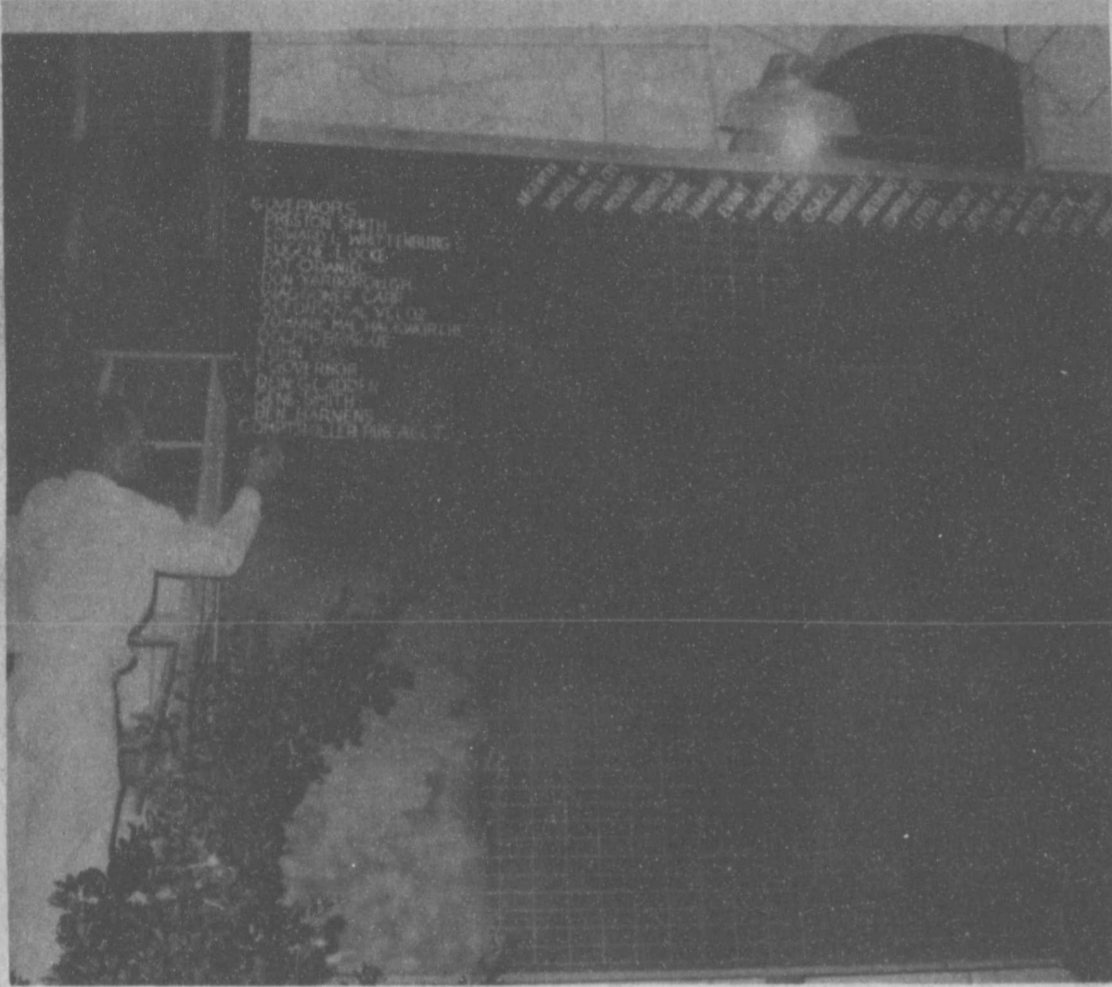

Primary Elections To Be Held May 4th.

C.E. Shirey works on the display board for tomorrow's Democratic Primary election. The voting boxes will report results as they are completed and the totals will determine how we live in the next couple of years. Be a statistic - vote in the Democratic Primary, May 4th.

The May 4th Democratic Primary is the first big political day of the politically packed year, 1968. In Coryell County, like many Texas counties, the Democratic Primary is the main line to the November general elections.

On the state-wide scene and on the local level, some of the races will probably be narrowed to two contestants for a special June run-off primary. To receive the Democratic nominations on the first primary ballot, a candidate must have a clear cut majority of all votes cast in the primary.

Because of the Democratic Party's domination of the Texas and county political scene, it is often overlooked that the Republican Party is holding its first primary election, Saturday, May 4th.

The polls will open in all voting boxes at 8:00 a.m. and close at 7:00 p.m. Citizens must vote in the voting precinct where they live.

On the county level, six contested races have developed. The race drawing the most candidates is for County Commissioner, Precinct 2. Pat Hollingsworth of Gatesville, Ben E. Mickan of Copperas Cove, J.C. Tension of Gatesville and Mrs. Ruby Evetts of Flat are all seeking the nomination.

The only county-wide elections will be for the nomination of County Tax Assessor-Collector with Holice B. Barton and the incumbent, Jack B. Whigham both running for the post.

In Precinct 1, two races have developed. Three men are seeking the nomination for Constable, R.C. (Bobbie) Manning, Ed Spradley and P.R. (Slim) Galaway.

Commissioner, Precinct 1 will also be decided Saturday with Otha Medard and Curtis Smith both seeking the position.

In Commissioner's Precinct 3, the ballot will have a selection between incumbent Jim Searcey and Roland Wright.

At the state level, there are ten Democratic candidates seeking the gubernatorial nominations: Preston Smith, Edward L. Whittenburg, Eugene Locke, Pat O'Daniel, Don Yarborough, Waggoner Carr, Alfonso "Al" Veloz, Johnnie Mae Hackworth, Dolph Briscoe and John Hill.

For Lieutenant Governor, Don Gladden, Gene Smith and Ben Barnes are seeking the nomination.

State Representative Bob Salter is unopposed for his seat in the Texas House.

Three referendums are to be voted for or against. Voting on the referendums is only to determine public opinion and will have no effect on legislation.

Question number one is seeking an expression of public sentiment on whether the Texas legislature should enact a law legalizing the sale of liquor - by - the - drink in wet areas which approve such sale in local option elections.

Question number two seeks public opinion on whether the State should legalize horse racing and pari-mutuel wagering on a local option basis.

Question number three asks the public to say whether a state commission should be created to fix the wholesale and retail price of milk.

Railroad Hearing Completed Thursday

The Texas Railroad Commission held a hearing to determine whether or not to discontinue the Gatesville Agency.

The St. Louis Southwestern Railroad's Attorney presented their case for a non-agency station, first claiming that local merchants wishing to use the rail facility can complete the necessary communications with the Waco office as conveniently as with a local agent.

The Cotton Belt representatives pointed out that a 24 hour office was available to shippers using the Waco office with complete tariff schedules and routing information as opposed to the present "skeleton schedules" maintained at both Gatesville and McGregor.

A discussion concerning the condition of the track between Gatesville and McGregor was raised by Attorney, Bob Cummings for the Chamber of Commerce and Gatesville. Trains traveling to Gatesville have a minimum speed set at 20 mph.

Railroad officials pointed out that track maintenance depends upon volume of traffic. It was pointed out that the "local" is scheduled for three round trips to Gatesville each week, since May 1, Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays.

Information furnished during Cotton Belt officials testimony pointed out that the North Ft. Hood - Gatesville area had net income for two years, 1966-67 of \$44,562.79. A monthly breakdown of the net income show that at no time did the St. Louis Southwestern railroad lose money. The lowest single month was July, 1967 with \$23.01 and the biggest single month was October of 1966 with \$13,276.95.

The Chamber of Commerce is handling the protest of the proposed non-agency station with Attorney Bob Cummings representing local interest.

At 11:30 a.m., Thursday, the railway representatives had completed their presentation and a short recess was called to allow last minute preparations for the Chamber of Commerce presentation.

Attorney Bob Cummings called witnesses to testify concerning the conveniences of an agent at the local station.

Letters from all local shippers were entered into evidence as was the testimony of the

interested shippers who appeared in person.

Both sides had completed testimony at 12:15 and the hearing was adjourned. The Texas Railroad Commission will now review the evidence and make a ruling either for or against the non-agency proposal.

Wildcat Show Slated For May 4-5



The Coryell County Collectors Club will hold their annual Wildcat Show, Saturday and Sunday, May 4th and 5th at the Community Center.

The show has received reservations from collectors as far away as Florida and Mississippi. Reports are that the table reservations have been running at the same level as last year. With 33 tables, estimates are that by Saturday at Show time, some 77-8- tables will be full of displays from coins to bear traps.

County Judge, Norman Storm,

estimated that merchandise valued at approximately \$100,000 would be on display. Pictured above are Jim Phillips and Jim Miller displaying parts of the collections they will show. Phillips displays a collection of pennies.

Family Can Fight Pandering Advertising

A family receiving a pandering advertisement which it finds offensive now has authority under a recently passed Federal law to ask that its members receive no more mail of any kind from the sender. An advertisement is considered pandering if it offers to see material which is, in the opinion of the recipient, "erotically arousing or sexually provocative."

Under this new law, the mail patron is the sole judge of whether an advertisement is offensive to him and whether he wants to continue to receive that sort of material from the sender. Last year the Post Office Department received some 140,000 complaints -- we handled about 25 of those at the Gatesville post office -- from those offended by pandering advertisements. In most cases those ads were not legally obscene and were therefore mailable. Because the new law gives a mail patron the sole right to decide what is offensive, and does not deny others

the right to receive the same mail, the Congress felt it does not violate Constitutional guarantees of freedom of speech. If a person receives an advertisement through the mail which he considers to be pandering, he should bring it and the envelope in which it was mailed to the post office. It is important that we have the envelope as well as the advertisement. He will be asked to sign a request that the mailer refrain from mailing further advertisements to him. The mailer is then ordered to remove that person's name from his mailing list. If the mailer does not comply, a Federal Court order may be obtained directing compliance. Failure to observe the order may be punishable by a fine or imprisonment.

While the patron's complaint will only be directed to the sender, we believe that one or two complaints will provide substantial protection because the bulk of this advertising comes from fewer than 20 so-called "smut dealers" who are frequently swapping mailing lists.

THE ROAD AHEAD

Steel labor negotiations this summer will have an important effect on the national economy, and could very well determine to what extent Uncle Sam will become the ultimate arbiter at the negotiation table.

As R. Conrad Cooper, Executive Vice President-Personnel Services United States Steel Corporation, said in a recent address: "Let us start with my often-expressed belief that we have concentrations of collective bargaining power in this country which are unwieldy, unfair, unmanageable, economically unhealthy, and strategically not in the public interest."

"We see too little evidence of good-faith collective bargaining in practice today. Instead we see a succession of massive power plays, tactics which I believe are heading us in a direction that endangers both collective bargaining and the competitive free enterprise system of the country."

"We of steel management constantly strive to encourage traveling the road of a more constructive use of collective bargaining power. We see little evidence of congressional will to legislate the second road--namely, to establish a proper balance of collective bargaining strength as between management and labor."

Any shutdown in this key industry would materially affect our balance-of-payments problem, through the increase of imported steel. In any settlement where wage increases exceed productivity, an inflationary spiral of the entire domestic economy is the end result.

Let's hope this is given serious thought and consideration by both parties.

Nation's Capital Railroad Terminal to be United States Visitors' Center

A new National Visitor Center is being constructed in Union Station, Washington, D.C.

The conversion of the railroad station into visitor facilities is expected to be completed within 20 months, according to Rep. Kenneth Gray (D-Ill.).

The Washington Terminal Company will spend up to \$16 million to alter the old station to serve tourists and to construct a 4,000-car garage. The Interior Department will lease the property from the company. It has been recommended that the exhibits and information services encourage tourist travel throughout the United States.

Washington Views and News

Some days ago, the Department of Agriculture issued a survey on hunger and malnutrition which I think was very misleading. The Department had testified before our committee last fall that they had all of the authority to feed hungry people anywhere they might find them and that they had them money with which to do it. Our committee felt that under those circumstances, it was rather foolish to establish another program to do the same thing, but another committee of the Congress has recently authorized exactly such a third program. We think this is an extremely wasteful and utterly unnecessary procedure.

But all of the government reports are mild compared with

ties are in the 11th District. The report also identified three more counties in our district as "suffering with serious hunger problems". I do not believe there are very many people in the 11th District who are seriously hungry and who can't get a job to pay for their own food or assistance from a relief agency to meet their immediate needs.

As a matter of fact, just yesterday I received a copy of an advertisement placed in a local paper on April 6th in one of these counties which are supposed to have a large number of starving people. The ad sought to get someone "with or without experience" to work raising broilers. I also have a letter from the businessman who put the advertisement in the paper stating that he had only had one call with reference to the advertisement and that the party already had a job.

I know there are people who need help. I know there are people who are disabled, or who for some reason can't get a job, and I think we should help all those who can't provide for their own needs. But most people in Central Texas can get a job if they want to. If they can get a job, there is no need for them to starve, and I believe that if an able-bodied man can get a job, he ought to have to do so rather than to have the government support him. I think it is much more important to build new industries and new business and to support him. I think it is much more important to build new industries and new business and to support a prosperous agriculture and to thus create more jobs than it is to duplicate and, indeed, triple our food distribution programs.

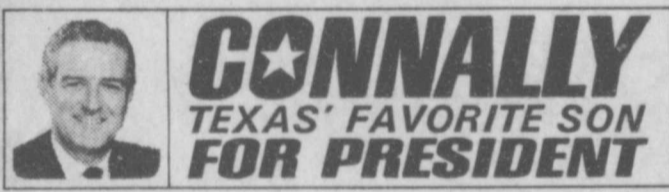

Support of Interstate Education Compacts By Industry Urged

Solution of state educational problems, as outlined in the "Compact for Education," is being sought by the Education Commission of the States. Industrial executives are now being urged to participate in the activities of this compact.

The Commission is gathering, analyzing, and digesting information on current educational issues. It publishes the results in a form convenient to governors legislators and others. It also assists states in educational problems, voices the opinion of the states on federal legislative developments, shapes policy in the educational field to bring about improvements and constructive change, and serves as staff to the Governors Conference on Educational Matters.

A number of studies are being carried out on vocational education, higher education and other areas by the Commission.

Dr. Wendell Pierce, Executive Director of the Commission, has recommended that industrial executives should promote regional inter-state compacts on vocational education, support financially research studies in the vocational education field, and back legislation that reduces the red tape of educational funding. The National Association of Manufacturers is cooperating with higher education professional associations, and in forming an inter-state committee on vocational education.

Soldiers Pack Pouches For Vietnam Patrols

Packaging is lightening the load of the American combat soldiers in Vietnam. Soldiers on long-range patrols carry their meals in lightweight vacuum-packed pouches containing new freeze-dried entrees. This new food and package form is not a replacement for canned "C" rations, nor hot food served to soldiers in the field, but is being employed by special action forces in remote areas where resupply may not be possible for at least 10 days.

Each vacuum-sealed pouch—a lined canvas waterproof bag—contains an entree, individually wrapped dessert, cookies or candy bar; and packets of powdered coffee, cocoa, cream and sugar.

Each canvas pouch weighs about 12 ounces. Available freeze-dried meals are: beef hash, beef stew, beef with rice, chicken stew, chile con carne, and scalloped potatoes and spaghetti with meat sauce, plus seasoning.

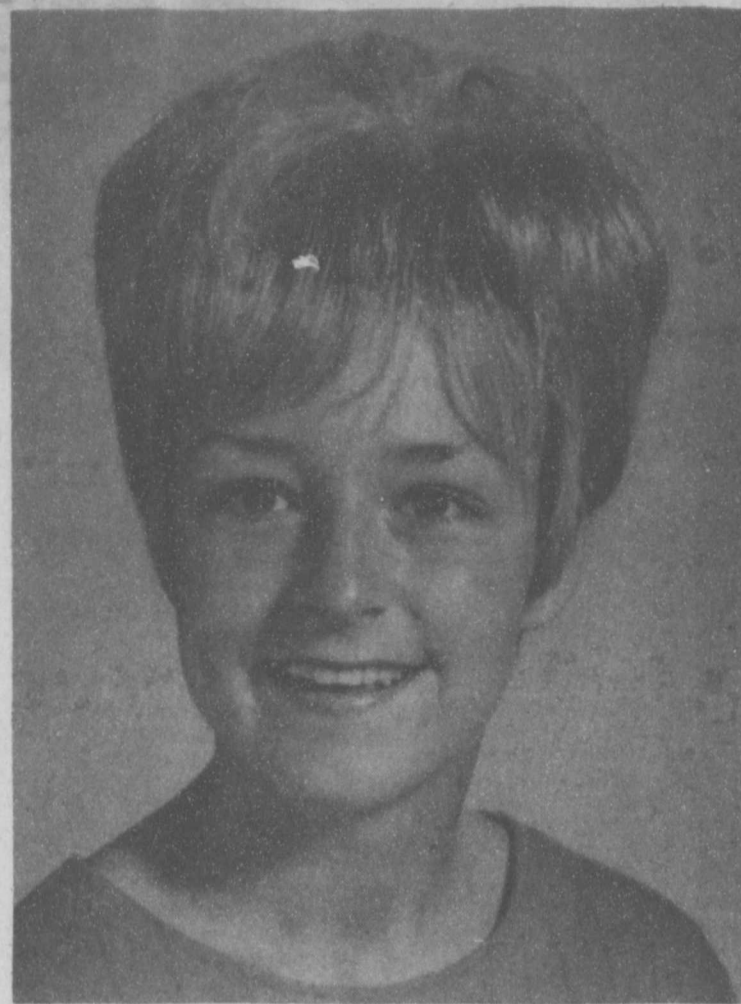

Croquettes Use Leftovers

If ever in doubt as to what to do with leftover ham, there are always croquettes. The recipe here is exceptional. After frying croquettes, top with cheese slices and place in broiler until cheese is melted.

Ham Croquettes

- 2 tablespoons margarine
- 3 tablespoons corn starch
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1 cup milk
- 2 cups ground, cooked ham
- 1/2 tablespoons chopped parsley
- 1/2 teaspoon lemon juice
- 1/2 teaspoon grated onion
- 1 egg
- 1 tablespoon water
- 1 cup fine dry bread crumbs
- Corn oil, for frying (about 1 quart)
- Mozzarella cheese strips (optional)

Melt margarine in saucepan. Blend in corn starch and pepper. Remove from heat. Gradually add milk, mixing until smooth. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until sauce thickens, comes to boil and boils 1 minute. Remove from heat. Mix in ham, parsley, lemon juice and onion. Chill.

Shape mixture into 6 balls. Beat egg and water. Roll croquettes in bread crumbs, coat with egg mixture, then roll in bread crumbs.

Meanwhile, pour corn oil into sturdy, deep fryer or skillet filling utensil 1/2 full. Heat over medium heat to 375 degrees F. or until 1-inch cube of bread turns brown in 40 seconds or use electric frypan following manufacturer's directions. Fry croquettes in hot oil until golden brown, about 4 minutes. Drain on absorbent paper. If desired, top fried croquettes with strips of Mozzarella cheese and broil until cheese is melted. Makes 6 servings.

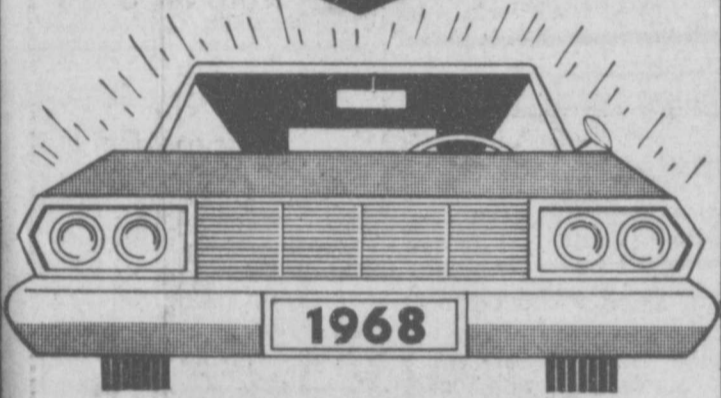

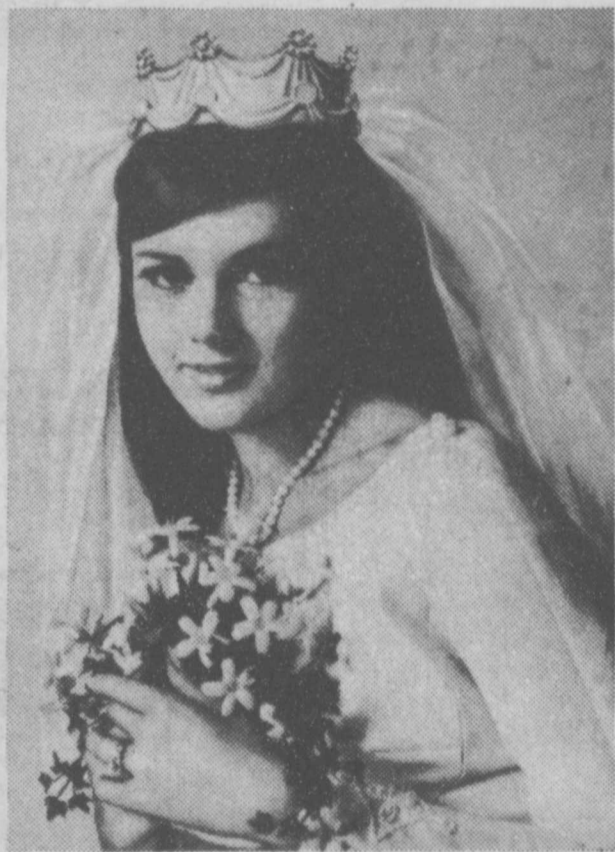

After a short wedding trip to the Buchanan Dam area, the couple are making their home in Gatesville.

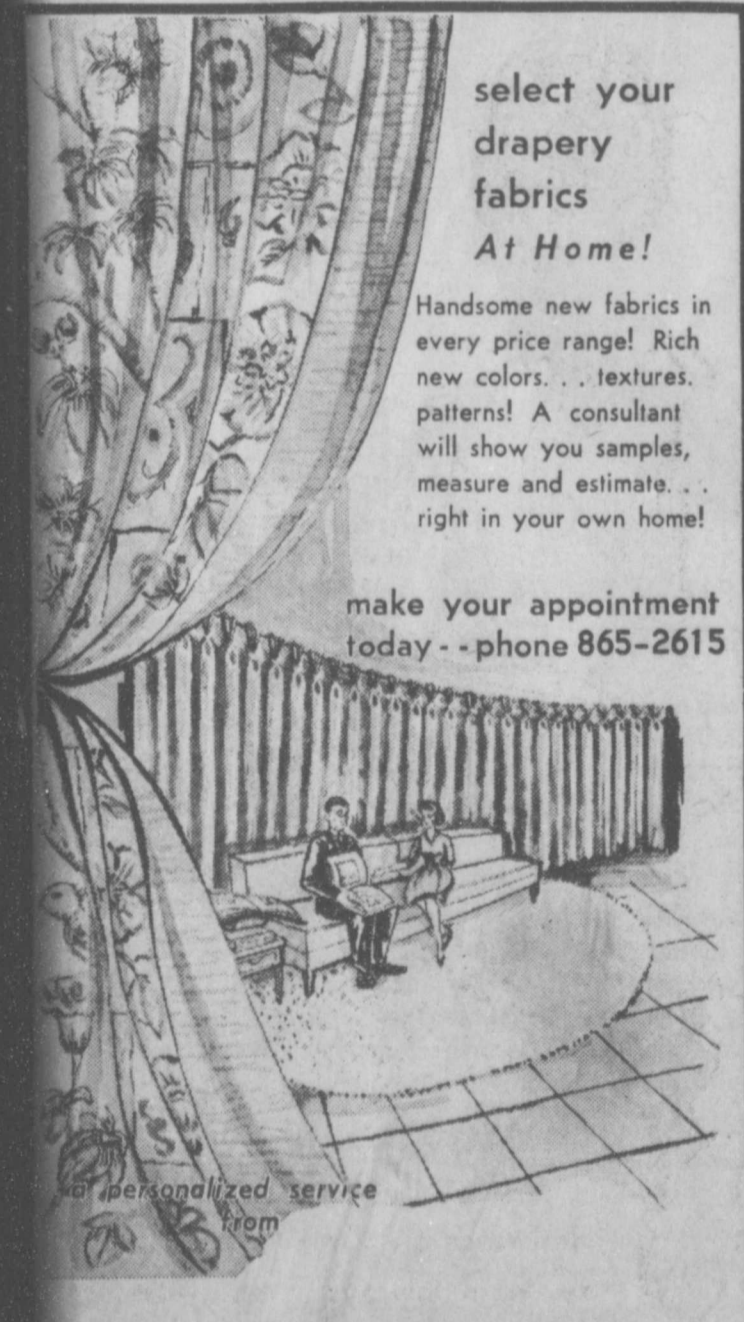

HOME DEMONSTRATION REPORT

The County Home Demonstration Agent accompanied Mrs. Sam Patterson, Mrs. Bill Shoemaker, Mrs. C. C. White and Mrs. C. L. Lipsey to Lampasas to attend a Housing Clinic on April 24th. Information was presented to Home Ownership, Home Insurance, Home Wiring and Home Lighting. The

group felt the program was beneficial and plans to attend the second session of the clinic on Wednesday, May 8th. Any Home Demonstration Club Ladies who are interested in attending the day-long affair are urged to contact the Home Demonstration Agent. The second meeting will be on Kitchen Planning and Appliances.



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Have you eaten any flowers lately? "Of course not!" you may answer. But we regularly eat the flowering parts of cauliflower and broccoli. At other times in man's history many flowers were used as foods and confections. Calendula or pot marigold petals are now used to color butter and the dried petals are added to herb tea blends for both color and flavor. In olden times these also went into meat sauces, cheses and soups. Recipes could also be found for a salad made from chopped onions and westeria petals, day lily soup and eggs scrambled with calves brains and rose petals.

Candied violets and rose petals have long been made by brushing the flower with egg white, dusting it with sifted powdered sugar and putting it carefully aside to dry for several days. These may be stored in air tight containers and used as edible cake decorations or additions to the candy dish. Rose petal jam is sold in food specialty stores. Spicy nasturtium petals and leaves are a favorite salad addition and the pickled seeds are used as a substitute for capers.

Borage is an herb much prized for the cucumber flavor of its leaves and its blue star shaped flowers may be scattered on a dish of sliced tomatoes or candied and used to decorate a cake. Squash blossoms and clusters of 3-derberry blossoms are made into delicious fritters by dipping them into a batter made by beating the yolk of one egg with 1/2 cup milk. Add 1 tablespoon melted butter, one tablespoon sugar and three-fourths cup flour. Fold in the stiffly beaten egg white. These are fried in deep fat, drained, and sprinkled with powdered sugar. In parts of New Mexico, squash blossoms are also added to a stew containing meat, string beans, corn and tiny squash. The pretty purple blossoms of chives were a favorite addition to omelets made by the Shakers.

So as you plant your flowers this year, think of the ones you might eat as well as look at and smell.

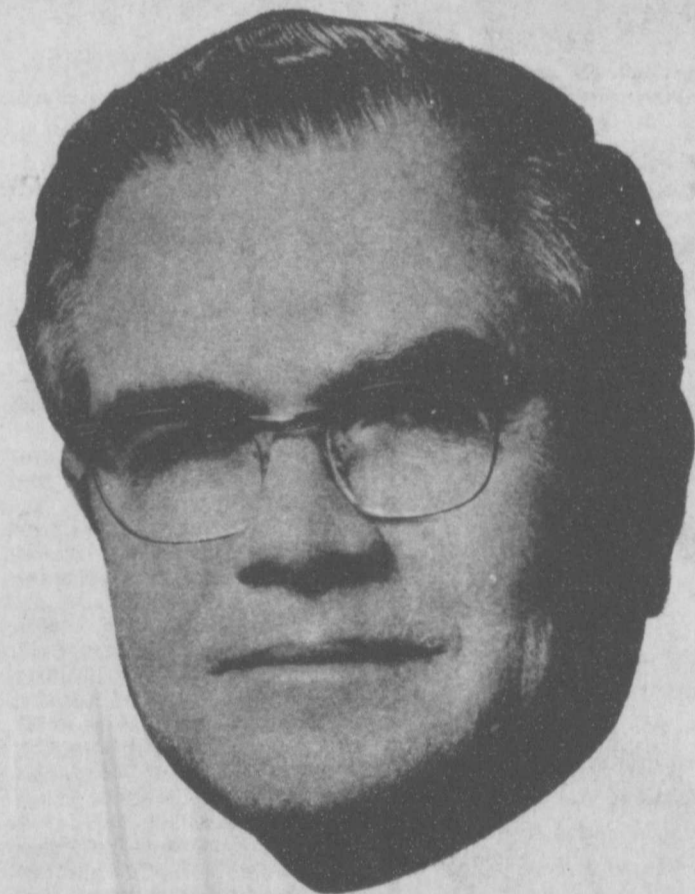

- Have all ingredients chilled. Arrange fruit and sherbet on lettuce-lined serving plate or individual salad plates. (If desired, substitute your favorite in-season fruit for any of the above.) Pass Lemon-Honey Dressing.
- Lemon-Honey Dressing: Mix 1/2 cup frozen lemonade concentrate, thawed, 1/2 cup honey, 1/2 cup salad oil and 1 teaspoon celery seed in small bowl. Beat thoroughly with rotary beater. Makes 1 cup.
- Swiss Cheese Stars
- 1 cup New Bisquick
 - 1/2 cup milk
 - 1 cup shredded Swiss cheese
 - Paprika

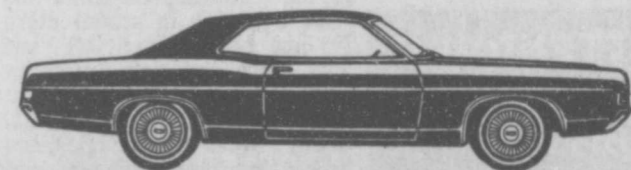

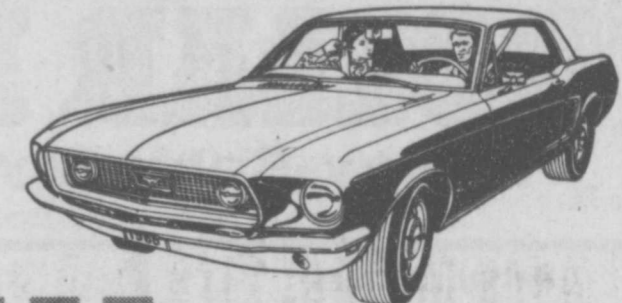

FISHING NAVIGATION

Navigation as practiced on the "high seas" has little application on the average fishing waters, but navigation — of a sort — can be an important aspect of every fishing trip.

Seldom is a knowledge of marine navigation necessary to most anglers, say the fishing experts at Mercury outboards. However, they add, an acquaintance with a few rudiments won't hurt, either. For example, knowing how to determine the boat's approximate position on a large lake not only helps keep one on course, but the same procedure enables a man to locate a hidden bar or dropoff where the fishing's good.

Necessary tools include compass, chart, ruler and pencil. Using the triangulation method, it becomes a simple chore to establish the boat's position in relation to compass readings from prominent landmarks.

The easiest way is to align the chart's "north" arrow with the compass needle. Hold a ruler over the chart and take a sighting at a feature on shore that also shows up on the chart. Draw a line on the chart along the straight edge.

Then repeat the procedure on another landmark — on the opposite shore, if possible. Where the second line intersects the first you have your approximate position.

By reversing the steps, it is possible to run a boat up to a certain compass bearing and then jockey along it to reach the cross reference point where you want to fish.

This system is only as good as the operator, note the Mercury lads, but with practice it can become reasonably accurate.
