



## Farmers Union To Receive Charter May 14

Roland Wright and Tump Grady of Oglesby, co-chairmen of the newly organized Coryell County Farmers Union, have announced that the organization will receive its official charter at a meeting to be held in the Civic Room of the First National Bank building in Gatesville, 8:00 p.m. on Tuesday, May 14.

Texas Farmers Union President Jay Naman of Waco will officiate at the charter presentation and will discuss the Farmers Union program and legislation of interest to farmers and ranchers which is now being considered by the Congress in Washington. Naman says that he is particularly anxious for Coryell County farmers and ranchers to know what Farmers Union is doing to get them the legal authority to bargain for a price.

Naman has been state president of Farmers Union since 1961 and serves on the National Farmers Union Executive Committee.

Waco, a marketing cooperative and served as its president for four years. Naman has served as assistant steer superintendent at the Heart of Texas Fair in Waco since 1953.

In 1957, Naman was selected the Outstanding Young Farmer in McLennan County in the Waco Jaycees sponsored contest. He is past president of the Waco Farm and Ranch Club and past chairman of the Agriculture Committee of the Waco Chamber of Commerce.

He serves on the seven member Executive Committee of National Farmers Union, of which the Texas organization is an affiliate, and serves on several boards which manage the business entities of the National Farmers Union.

Naman resides in Waco with his wife and two sons.

Farmers Union is well organized in most Central Texas counties and there have been a few members in Coryell County for a number of years. It is considered the fastest growing general farm organization in Texas.

The co-chairmen for the meeting Tuesday night are inviting all Coryell County farmers, ranchers and businessmen to attend the meeting whether or not they are members.

Jay Naman, who is the 42-year-old president of the Texas Farmers Union, has served in this office since December, 1961. He is a native of McLennan County, Texas and has farmed there since 1949.

Naman graduated from Waco High School and Baylor University where he received his B.A. degree in 1947. Prior to this he attended college at Mississippi College as part of his Navy training and served overseas as a naval officer.

FORT HOOD -- Unexploded 40mm rocket shells found near the bodies of Lee Bryan Veit and Charles Anthony Taylor may help to explain their mysterious deaths Sunday at Fort Hood.

Officials at Fort Hood confirmed Wednesday a report that 40mm rocket lay around the bodies and that there were enough rockets to make armfuls for two men.

"Dud" 40mm rocket rounds are sensitive enough to be exploded by a small temperature change, such as being held close to a human body, an Army spokesman said.

## A.S.C.S. NEWSLETTER

The Coryell County ASCS office will mail out ballots to all cotton farmers and their wives today (Friday), May 10, 1968, in order that producers may vote in 1969 upland cotton allotment transfer referendum the week of May 13 through May 17, 1968.

For a ballot to be counted, it must either be in the ASCS office by the close of business May 17th or be postmarked by midnight of that date.

The referendum will decide only the question of whether 1969 upland cotton allotments may be transferred by sale or lease to another farm outside the county during the next year. In no case may transfers be made outside the State.

The vote will not affect the transfer of upland cotton allotments by sale or lease from one farm to another within the same county. This is already provided by law. Neither will the vote affect transfers by a farm owner from one farm to another owned or controlled by him, as provided by regulations. These transfers may be made across county lines within the State without regard to referendum results.

If at least two-thirds of the growers of upland cotton, voting in the county, mark their ballots "Yes", new transfers of allotments outside the county may be made during the authorized transfer period for the 1969 crop. (A lease is for a specified number of crop years; a sale, of course, is a permanent transfer of allotment.)

If more than a third of the growers voting mark their ballots "No", new transfers of cotton allotments outside the county cannot be made for the 1969 crop year. This is the final crop for which the Food and Agriculture Act of 1965 authorizes such a referendum.



While the House had an active program and a number of votes every day this week, we have not been dealing with any of the really critical issues except based on a misunderstanding of the whole program.

We are trying to balance supply with demand so that economic law will assure a fair price structure for everyone. Certainly this can only be done by encouraging the larger operators to participate in the retirement program. I think we need the cooperation of all farmers, large or small. I voted against the proposed amendment, which failed.

This morning our Committee completed its hearings on an extension or modification of the existing farm programs which will expire next year. While there is much criticism of our laws and certainly many changes need to be made, I don't believe that there was a single witness who stated he felt that it would be wise to wipe out all our farm laws and go back to the old policy of unlimited production with no floor under prices. To me it seems clear that our programs should be continued. I would like to see some changes but right now it is probably more important that we have a program that farmers know they can rely on than that we hold things up while we argue about relatively minor amendments. There is, however, certain to be considered "politics" in the consideration of this bill. No one knows who will be in charge of the Congress next year. Some members would like to put off any decision in the hope that they will be in a better position to influence action at that time. I think the best "politics" as well as the best interests of our country is to give our farmers assurance that they will have a continuing program and then consider the changes that various groups feel should be made. We don't make our labor laws expire in one or two years. We don't provide three year subsidy programs for our airlines and I don't know of any reason why we should subject our farmers to the uncertainty of short-term legislation.

There is still no agreement on a tax-appropriation program, but inflation gets more critical each day. As I have repeatedly said, I feel that we should restore the income tax cuts which were made three years ago, and that we should agree to reduce all appropriations (by as much as we cut the agricultural appropriation bill).

Be sure it is really a saving to buy the large economy package. Read labels to learn the quantities the different sizes contain then compare the price per unit (pound, ounce, etc.) before you buy.

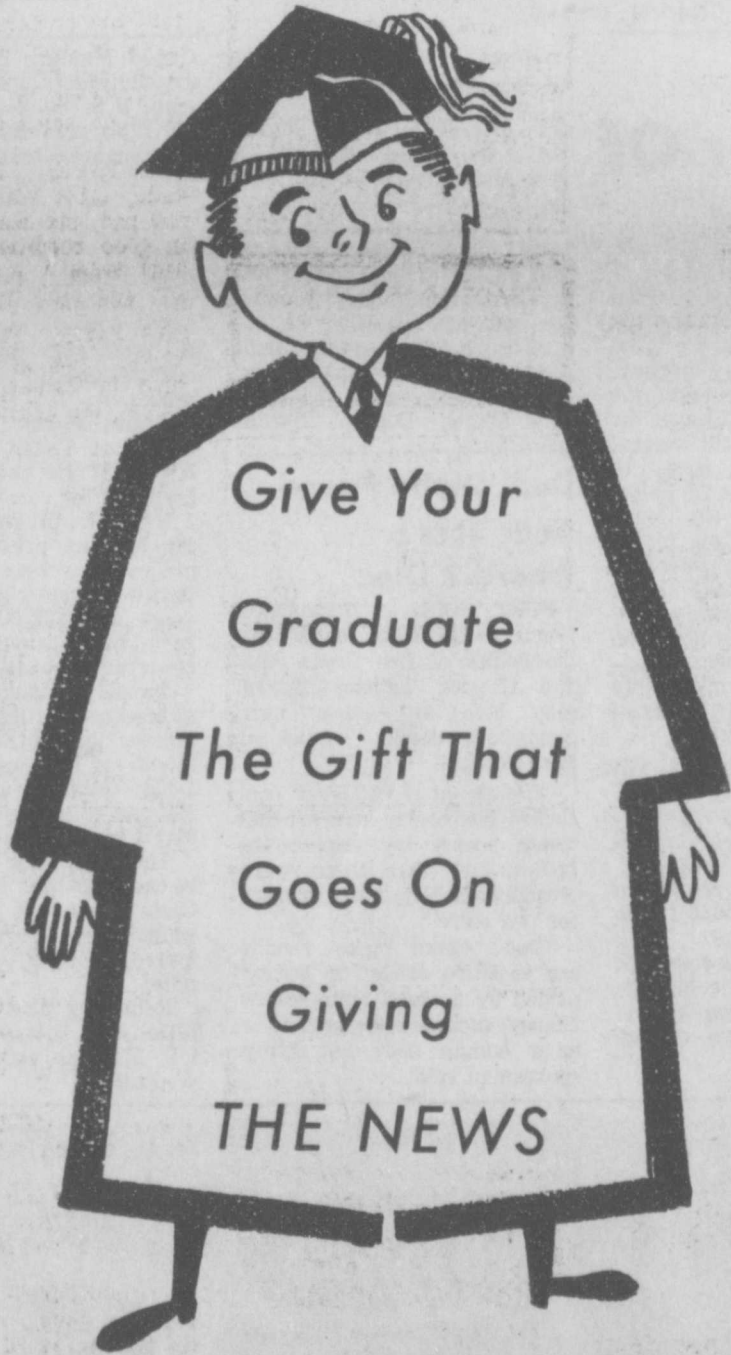

With all the moisture we have had this year, the arrival of warmer weather has brought a multitude of bugs and worms to our gardens. There are many commercial preparations guaranteed to get rid of these pests, but the funny thing about this stuff, it can't tell a helpful bug from a bad one. If we kill all the insects there will be none left to pollinate our beans, tomatoes, etc. so they will set fruit. One answer to this problem is the use of herbs in our gardens. These strong smelling plants are usually obnoxious to harmful bugs and yet very attractive to bees.  
Some herbs seem to go especially well with certain other plants. Basil, the Dark Opal variety, is good with tomatoes, not only to protect them from pests but a few leaves added when cooking the tomatoes is also very good. Summer savory and beans also form the "go together" combination, both in the garden and the cooking pot. Any plant of the mint family is good protection for the cabbage family. Flies do not like spearmint and plants of this by the kitchen door and around dog houses and chicken pens will keep your life more free from flies and ants this summer.  
Many flowers are also good insect repellents. One of the best is the strong smelling marigold, not only for above ground pests, but also for nematodes which attack potatoes and other root crops. Nasturtiums are disliked by cucumber beetles and may be planted in the hills with all your vine crops as added protection. The pyrethrum or painted daisy can be grown in the garden or the dried flowers may be ground up with water and used as a spray. This is so effective that a commercial insecticide is made from these flowers.  
Members of the onion family will protect roses and fruit trees from aphids and other pests but the best one to use for this is the garlic. If this plant is too untidy for the rose garden, chives will do fairly well. These methods will not destroy all the insects you have but anything that will might get you too!

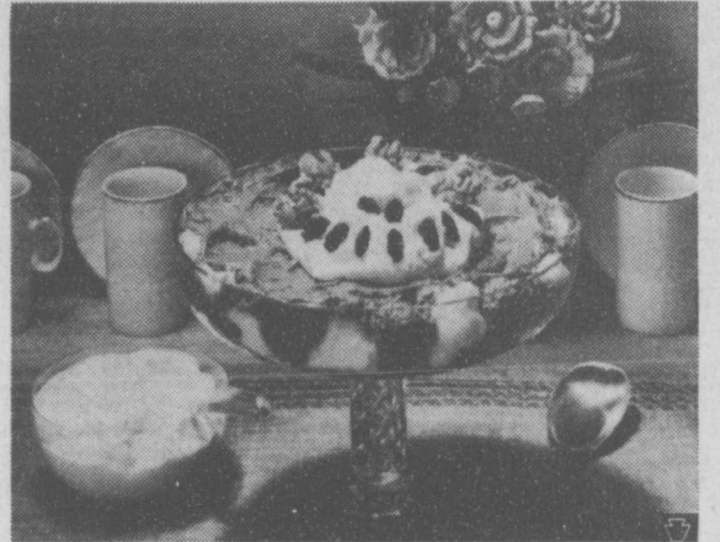
mentary and one woman shows which she presents for many groups and organizations each year.

It's Strawberry Sauce

As a switch from strawberry shortcake, make a fresh strawberry sauce to serve over ice cream or sponge cake.

**Fresh Strawberry Sauce**

1 pint fresh strawberries  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/2 cup light corn syrup  
1 tablespoon corn starch  
1/2 cup water

Red food coloring, optional  
1/2 teaspoon lemon juice

Wash and hull berries. Cut up enough to make 1/2 cup; mash, mix with sugar and then with corn syrup. Blend corn starch and water. Combine with mashed berries in saucepan. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until mixture is thickened and clear. Add a few drops food coloring, if desired. Cool. Cut about half the remaining berries in two. Sprinkle lemon juice over whole and halved berries; add to cooled mixture. Chill until serving time. Makes about 1 1/2 cups.

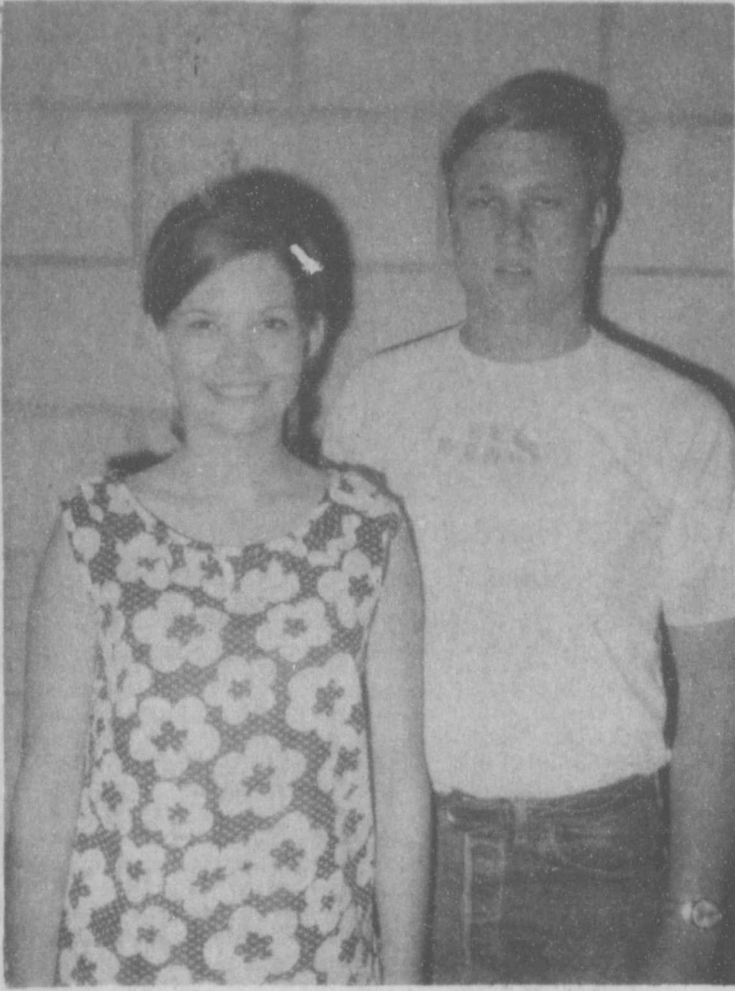
