Jack D. Phillips
Found Dead in Home

Mr. Jack D. Phillips, 67, was discovered dead late Saturday, by H. J. Smith at the Phillips home in the Mountain Community.

Justice of the Peace Stony Hammock pronounced Phillips dead at 5:20 p.m., of natural causes. Mr. Phillips had lived in the Mountain Community for the past twenty years.

Mr. Smith, a long-time friend of the deceased, normally checked with Mr. Phillips, who lived alone, each week.

The Copperas Cove State Bank Reports

Increases in Deposits Through First Quarter

Growth at Cove State Bank for the First Quarter of this year has been very outstanding, reports Reuben Lambert Jr., Bank President. On December 31, 1968, the bank had total assets of \$3,585,241.67, and in only three months time, at the close of business March 31, 1969, the bank's total assets had grown to \$4,313,413.05. Hornet Golfers Win Regional Tournament

The Gatesville High School Golf Team Made History this week-end winning the regional 4 AAA golf tournament in Corpus Christi.

Never before has G.H.S. been able to qualify a team for the state tournament in golf. The Hornets managed the feat by consistent shooting throughout their ranks. For the two days the Hornets carved out two 326, 18 hole totals to surprise the field.

After Friday's round the Hornets were in fifth place, 16 shots behind Kerville's Tivi High School. In the first days play over the 6810 yard par 72 Corpus Christi Country Club, the Hornets were bunched together Butch Price and Jim Thomas 79 with Bob Thomas, Clay McClellan and Mike Thrasher all at 84.

Kerville powered into the first round lead with an impressive 310 lead by Otis Gips with a 73. Otis won medalist for the regional tourney with a 151.

The weather for the first round on the sand trap spotted course was mild and calm with the wind picking up in the afternoon.

Saturday began with a gulf breeze blowing at 30 miles per hour. The Hornets met the challenge and turned in a winning performance Butch Price 77, Clay McClellan 80, Jim Thomas 84, Bob Thomas 85 and Mike Thrasher 97.

Gary Kafer Advances to State Track Meet With Outstanding Regional Performance

Gatesville's outstanding sophomore high jumper, Gary Kafer, cleared 6'1" to win the regional medal and qualify for the state track meet. In order to win the event, Kafer had to out jump Rodriguez of Falfurrias and Davis of Copperas Cove, who took second and third places respectively. This jump equaled Kafer's best of 6'1" which he cleared in winning the district meet at Taylor last week. Kafer improved from a jump of 5'10" at the Hornet Relays, to 6'1" at the district and regional meets.

Hornet flash Raymond Cole ran the best race of his track career in the 100 yard dash Saturday but was beaten by two-speedsters from south Texas. Cole ran a 9.9 hundred, beating his old rival, Robert Ford, of Belton who finished fourth. Cole, who led most of the way, was nipped at the tape by Efron Gibson of Refugio who won the event in 9.8 and M. L. Best of Falfurrias, who took second in a time of 9.9.

Gatesville pole vaulter, Steve Palmer cleared a height of 12' to equal his second place performance of the district meet, but only captured sixth in the regional competition. He just

barely missed at 12'6", which would have been the best vault of his career.

Plentl Trial Set For June 16.

28 Enter Pleas In 52nd District Court Arraignments

Saturday, 52nd District Court Judge Truman Roberts held arraignments for 27 of the cases indicted by the special session of the January Grand Jury.

Eight cases were completed by the court Saturday, with sentences ranging from fines and cost to two-ten years.

Andrew Jackson Grumbles plead guilty to the charge of burglary in connection with the Mittel's Department Store case. Grumbles was sentenced to two to three years in the Texas Department Correction at Huntsville. Robert A. Faught also indicted in connection with the Mittel's burglary plead guilty to the charge and was sentenced to two to three years in Texas Department Correction.

Baltazar Guevara, former inmate at Mountain View, plead guilty as charged in connection with the stabbing attack on Juan Perez at the school. The court sentenced Guevara to two to six years in Texas Department Correction on the assault to murder charge.

Teddy Poindexter was sentenced to two years in Texas Department Correction on theft charges. Fritz L. Heller was sentenced to two to ten years on theft charges by the court. Gary Robinson was sentenced to two to four years in Texas

Department Correction on theft charges by the court.

Jackie Pierce plead guilty to the charge of burglary and sentenced to two to three years in the T. D. C. at Huntsville. Pierce was charged in connection with an incident occurring on April 13. He was indicted by the Grand Jury on April 14 and 15 and sentenced on Saturday, April 19.

In nineteen cases defendants entered pleas of not guilty before the court on Saturday.

Wallace Plentl, represented by Bob Cummings and Jack Prescott entered a plea of not guilty to the charge of murder in connection with his wife, Janice's death on March 13. Judge Roberts set May 5 for filing of pre-trial motions with hearings on pre-trial motions set for May 12. Judge Roberts set June 16, 1969 as the trial date.

Charles Enderson, who was indicted for robbery by assault, plead not guilty to the charge of wrongful removal of mortgaged property and trial was set for May 26, 1969.

Cecil Chandler plead not guilty to the charge of burglary with trial date being set for May 26, 1969.

William Dale Brumblaw plead not guilty to the charge of assault with intent to mur-

der. Brumblaw is accused by the State of the December 25 attack on Walter Gohlke, an attendant at the state school. Brumblaw plead not guilty to

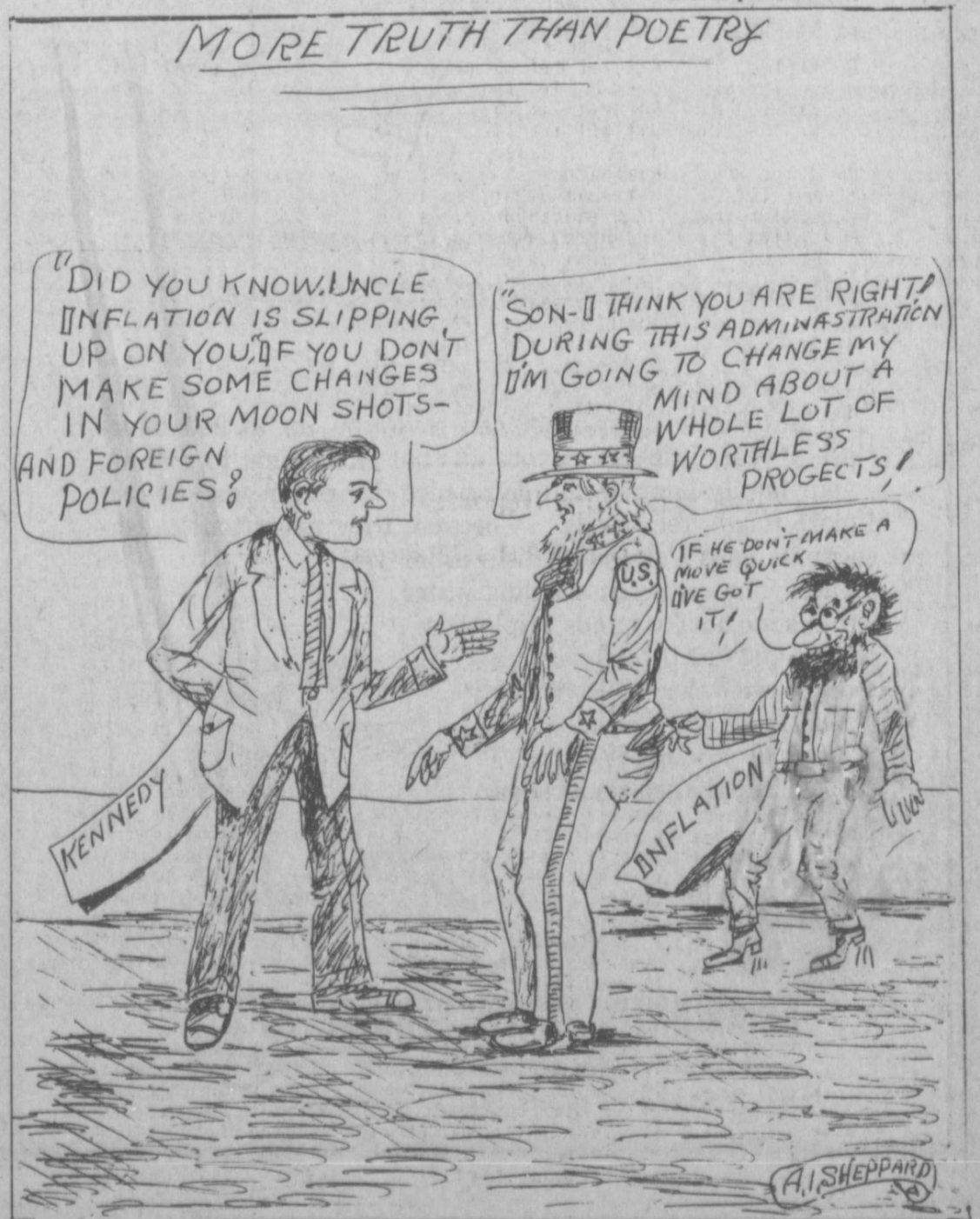
A. I. Sheppard to Provide Cartoon Humor in News

Hornet miler Chris Montgomery, who finished third in the district meet, got a chance to compete in the regional contest when the district winner from Copperas Cove dropped out of the competition. Montgomery tried hard, but was off form and could only capture sixth place. His time of 4:52, while quite respectable, was considerably slower than his fine 4:44 clocking in the district competition.

Belton and Copperas Cove each qualified two athletes for the state meet. David Griffith of Copperas Cove won the 880 yard dash in 1:57.9, and Preston Clemons of Belton took hurdles with a time of 14.4 seconds. David Bartek of Belton qualified in the shot put as did Barry Lightfoot of Copperas Cove in the discus.

Other finishers were Charles Estill of Belton; fourth in the 880; Robert Ford of Belton, third in the 220; David Mathinia of Copperas Cove, fourth in the 440; Preston Clemons of Belton, fourth in the 330 yard hurdles; and Copperas Cove, fourth in the mile relay.

During 1968, nearly 18,000 former students gave over \$400,000 to the fund. Goal for 1969 is \$1,650,000. This includes \$1,250,000 for Endowed Scholarships to Texas A&M for high-achieving students, who have demonstrated responsible leadership during their high school careers.

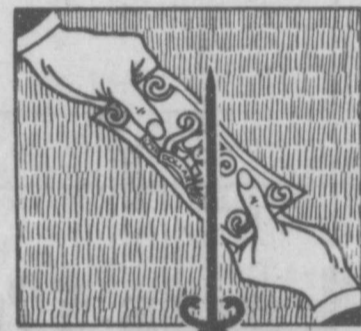

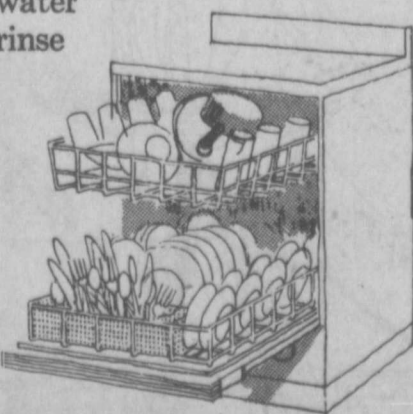

The wedding will be at 7 p.m., May 24th in the Chapel of Columbus Avenue Baptist Church in Waco.

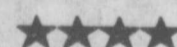

The Hornets played well this season with several members of the squad contributing outstanding performances.

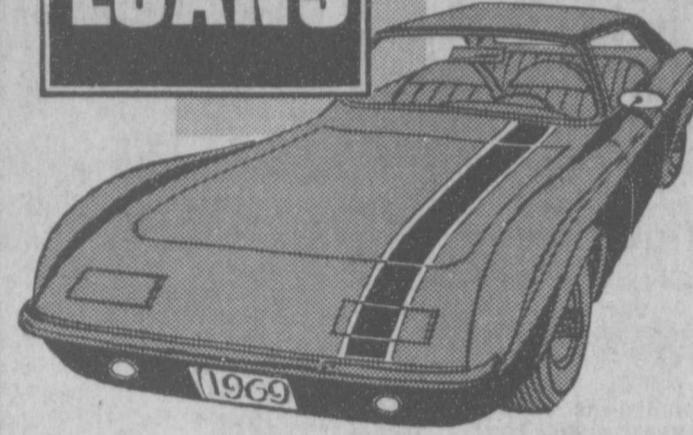
At Brady in the second tournament of the season, Hornet Clay McClellan shot a 3 over par 75 to capture 3rd individual for the tournament.
