ARRL TO ORGANIZE CORYELL RADIO OPERATORS

Charles L. Wilson, WA5QQY, Route 1, Box 240, Gatesville, Texas 76528 has been selected to lead an organization of Coryell amateur radio operators prepared to furnish organized emergency communications in time of disasters, it was announced today by Communications Manager George Hart of the American Radio Relay League, U. S. and Canadian association of radio amateurs. Mr. Wilson's assignment, which carries the title of Emergency Coordinator of the Amateur Radio Emergency Corps, is to band together members of the amateur radio service in his community to perfect arrangements for emergency radio communication by hams in the event of natural disasters or other emergencies. In addition to use of fixed radio station equipment working from commercial power, amateur stations use self-powered radio transmitting and receiving equipment as needed and can often deploy portable and mobile units to accommodate a particular emergency requirement. Mr. Wilson as ARRL Emergency Coordinator, will call local meetings of amateurs, establish common operating procedures, and arrange regular drill periods when the hams' personal stations may be mobilized under simulated emergency conditions. His duties also include liaison planning with relief and public welfare agencies, as suggested in working understandings the ARRL Amateur Radio Emergency Corps has with the Red Cross, Civil Defense, and other agencies. Liaison will be established also with local protective services, such as fire and police departments. Wilson, a long time radio "ham" has worked with the American Radio Relay League as part of a net-work of hams acting as messengers for the public. He explained that each

week East Texas operators tune in for a 55 minute period to accept and transmit messages as a public service. Wilson is part of the "East Texas Net" which is on the air at 10:00 to 10:55 p.m. each night. Wilson explained that anyone wishing to send a message through Coryell County can call him and he will relay the message. Wilson handles messages which are addressed to Vietnam and all parts of the world. Common messages include "notice of safe arrival", "send money" and probably "I love you", types. No original death messages can be handled by the radio net work, Wilson cautioned. Wilson explained that messages coming and going follow a similar route. For example a message to Vietnam originating in Coryell County would be forwarded by Wilson to the District 8 Net Center in New Orleans at 10:00 p.m. From New Orleans the message would be relayed to the West Coast relay net work for transmission to the Western Pacific and Vietnam. Relays to all points on the globe are possible through the network of amateur radio operators. Wilson explained that the amateur radio operators consider this part of their civic obligation and he encouraged use of the network. Call 865-5129 and I will be glad to help anyone with a message", he explained.

In announcing the appointment, Hart pointed out that radio amateurs have traditionally had the responsibility of being in constant readiness to offer assistance in time of need with ham-acquired skill, emergency-powered transmitters and a wealth of community spirit. "When sleet storms disrupt telephone and telegraph service, or floods isolate whole communities," the League's Communications Manager said, "it is amateur radio that comes to the rescue with operators and self-powered equipment, often as the sole agency able to transmit messages calling on the outside world for aid for the stricken community." "To be prepared for this function required not only a highly organized program of preparedness locally," Hart continued, "but hams outside the disaster area must be prepared to act as outlets and relay points for emergency traffic. Planning and organization are necessary in either eventuality and that is the job Mr. Wilson is doing for this area."

34 Persons To Die Over July 4 Weekend

Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety said, June 29 the DPS Statistical Services Bureau estimates that 34 persons will be fatally injured in traffic accidents in Texas during the 78-hour July 4 holiday period.

The holiday period is considered to run from 6 p.m. Thursday, July 3, to midnight Sunday, July 6. During this time, the Department of Public Safety will activate a special "Operation Motorcade" and will place all available uniformed patrolmen on duty to enforce traffic laws in an effort to reduce accidents and assist motorists.

Speir urged all Texans to plan their holiday trips so as to allow ample time to drive without speeding or driving too fast for conditions. He also cautioned motorists to watch out for pedestrians, especially on beaches and parks, during the holiday period.

The DPS director also warned that the department will vigorously enforce state laws relating to driving while intoxicated.

"Drinking drivers are involved in 40 to 50 percent of the fatal rural traffic accidents in Texas, and I urge all drivers to avoid the use of alcohol prior to operating a motor vehicle," Speir said.

City sales tax payments totaling \$10,436.56 were received by the City of Gatesville, last Thursday in payment for collections during the first quarter of 1969.

Gross collections for the January - February and March periods totaled \$11,181.81 of which the State Comptroller Office retained two percent for clerical work and retained 4.76 percent to cover possible losses and refunds.

The \$10,436.56 check is better than many had expected originally, but fell short of later estimates. Annual estimates of from \$30,000 to \$50,000 are now seen as somewhat low.

Eiland Lovejoy, city manager said the collections represents the lowest period of consumer activity during the year. Federal taxes, license plates, and state and local taxes all are paid during the first quarter.

Lovejoy noted that even four times the first quarter figure would mean \$42,000 annually to the city and consumer activity picks up with Easter, Mothers Day, Summer, Back-to-School, Fall and Christmas.

Conservative estimates now place annual revenue from the city tax at \$50,000 minimum.

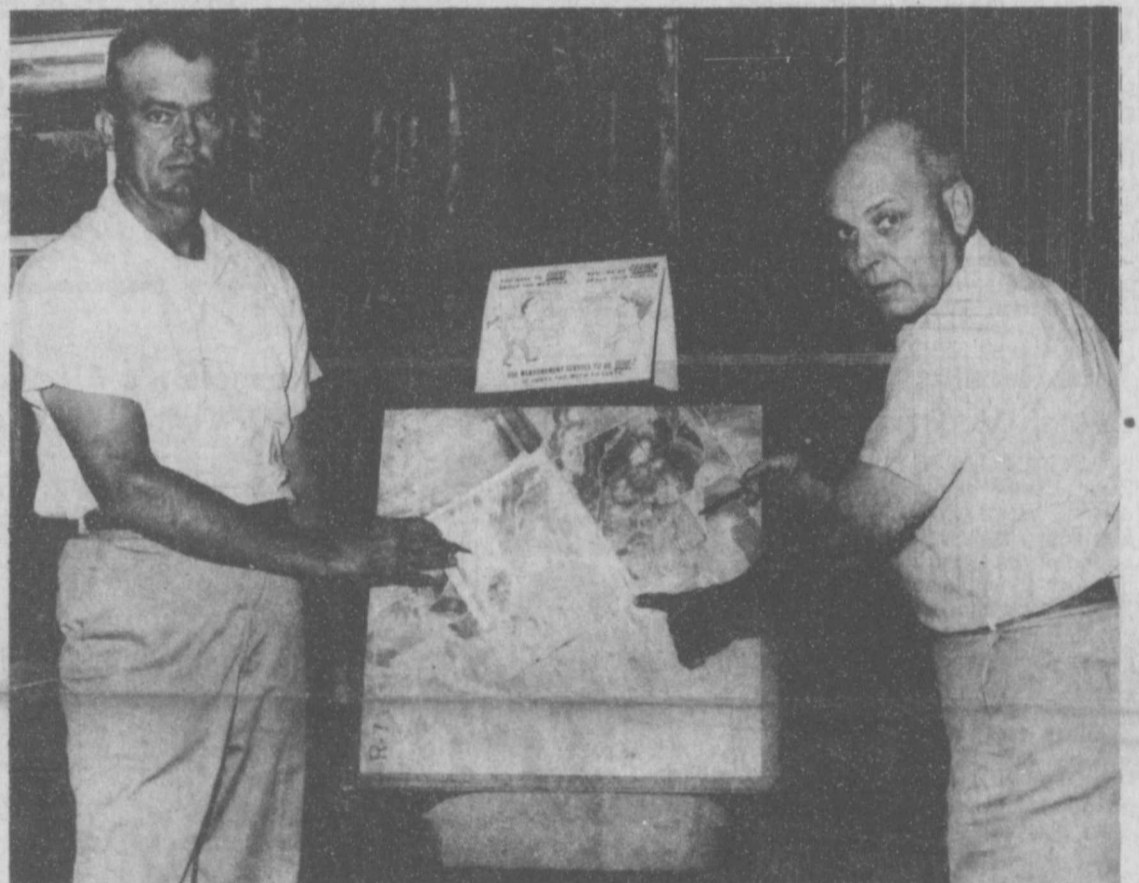
Miller named at least ten major street projects which are presently in need of repair. The projects are all being con-

Certification Program Explained

Farm Bureau Queen

Certification of acreage planted began in 1968 for Coryell County farmers. Prior to last year ASCS field personnel made actual measurements of planted acreage.

The new system includes use of photocopy of aerial photos in the ASCS office. Clois Stone, ASCS office manager, explained that farmers can do the measurements themselves or have the ASCS measure and pay for the labor.

Stone explained: "Up until 1968 the ASCS office employed high school boys and men as reporters to go to farms that are signed up under programs to measure the planted or diverted acres on that farm. Due to the ASCS office only employing reporters for about two weeks, they become hard to get to work such a short time, so the department went to the system of excepting the farmers reported acreage and then spot checking 20 percent of the farms."

"The office has furnished a photo copy map to each farmer with the permanent acreage put in each field and between each terrace.

The office feels that they are getting some very accurate reports, but they urge farmers to get these acreage correct to avoid being out of the program or by having a penalty for not having the acreage reported correctly.

August 1st is the last day that farmers have to certify their acreage to the county ASCS office. Failure to certify could cause loss of payment."

Harold Shulze, County Performance supervisor offered the following helpful hints in making measurements: "The farmer utilizes the photocopy to the fullest extent. He locates his crop acreages and land uses that must be reported on it and outlines them for easier identification. Any measurements that need to be made should be done in feet or chains instead of stepped as this will insure greater accuracy. With

Congressman Poage

Introduced

Food Stamp Act

Legislation making permanent the existing farm programs and the food stamp act was introduced today by Chairman W. R. (Bob) Poage, D-Tex., of the House Committee on Agriculture, in keeping with a statement he issued last week.

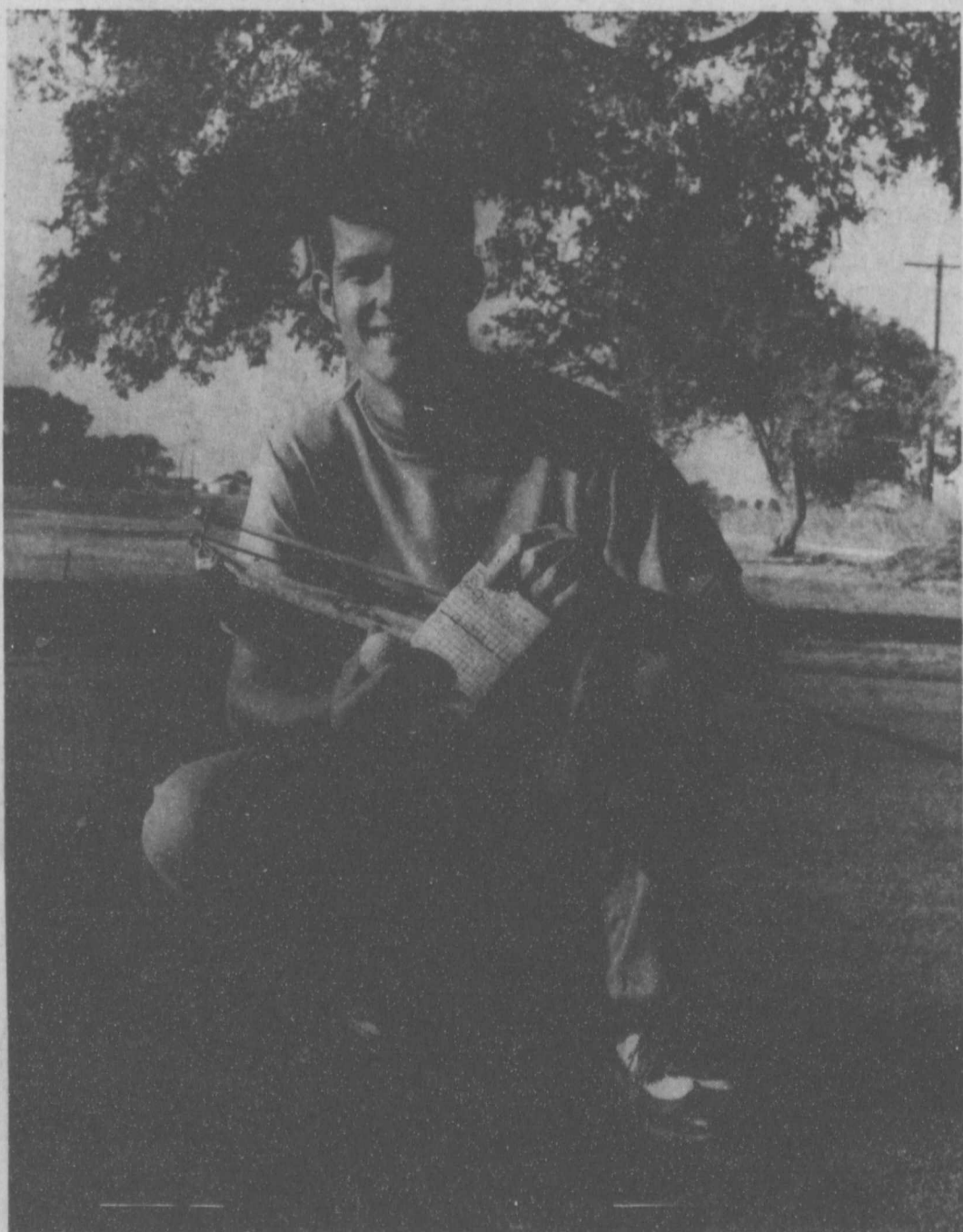
The measure combines the existing Food and Agriculture Act of 1965 and the Food Stamp Act of 1964, which are now scheduled to expire on December 31, 1970. It contains an "open end" provision as to the amount of money to be authorized for food stamps, leaving the amount to be determined annually in regular appropriations legislation.

"Obviously, the production and the distribution of food is closely related and should be considered at the same time", said Poage. "I announced hearings on both general farm legislation and food stamps some days ago and specifically pointed out at that time that the two items would be considered together.

"These hearings have been scheduled to begin on the fifteenth of July, which, in view of the July 4th recess of the Congress, is about as early as it would be possible to start. "We have invited the Secretary of Agriculture to open the hearings and I have introduced legislation to extend both the farm program and the food stamp program, and to remove all of the ceiling on appropriations for food stamps."

The Chairman said the Committee would not only hear from those supporting his bill, but also from those backing the Senate-passed food stamp measure and other proposed amendments.

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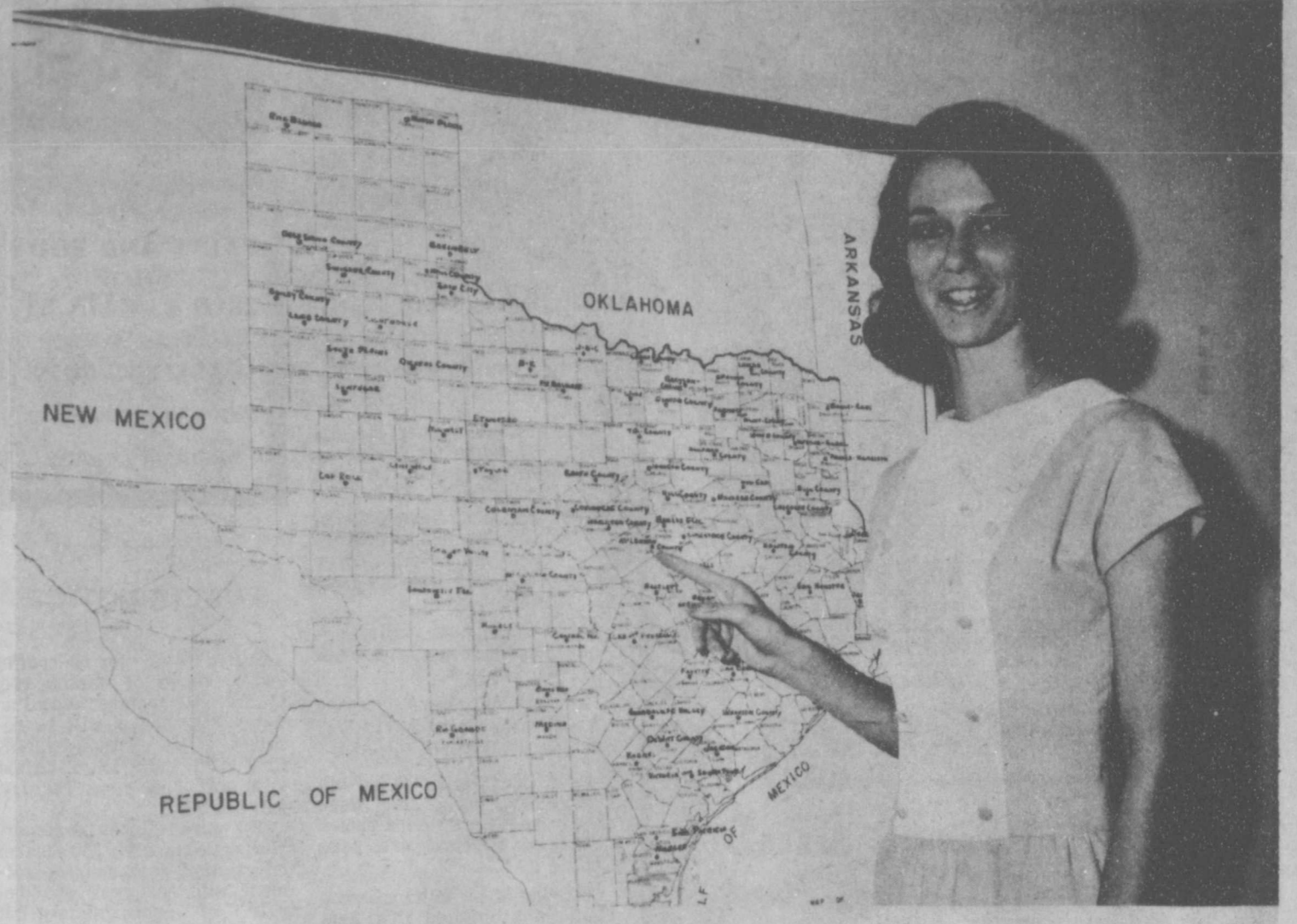

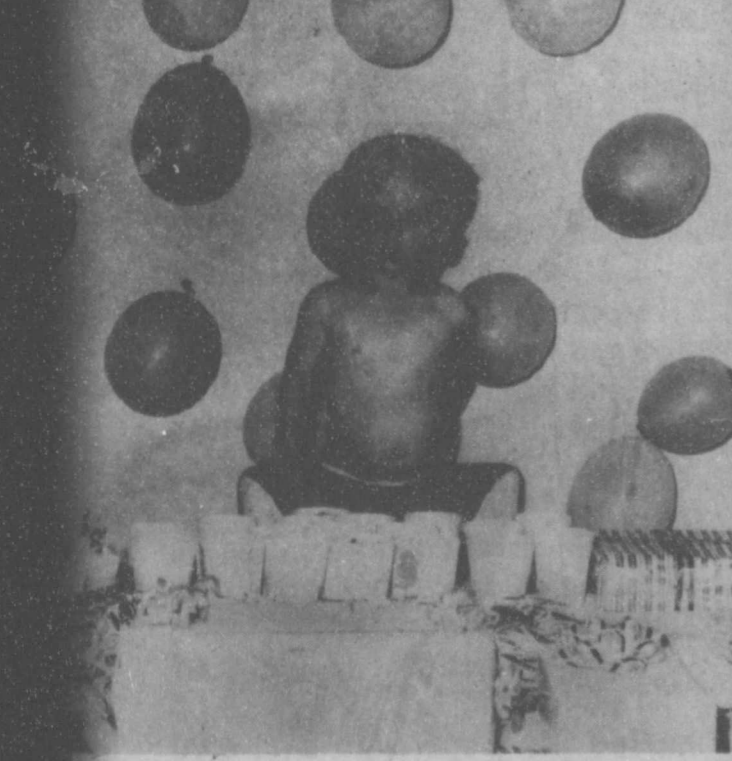

ARRL TO ORGANIZE CORYELL RADIO OPERATORS

Charles L. Wilson, WA5QQY, Route 1, Box 240, Gatesville, Texas 76528 has been selected to lead an organization of Coryell amateur radio operators prepared to furnish organized emergency communications in time of disasters, it was announced today by Communications Manager George Hart of the American Radio Relay League, U. S. and Canadian association of radio amateurs. Mr. Wilson's assignment, which carries the title of Emergency Coordinator of the Amateur Radio Emergency Corps, is to band together members of the amateur radio service in his community to perfect arrangements for emergency radio communication by hams in the event of natural disasters or other emergencies. In addition to use of fixed radio station equipment working from commercial power, amateur stations use self-powered radio transmitting and receiving equipment as needed and can often deploy portable and mobile units to accommodate a particular emergency requirement. Mr. Wilson as ARRL Emergency Coordinator, will call local meetings of amateurs, establish common operating procedures, and arrange regular drill periods when the hams' personal stations may be mobilized under simulated emergency conditions. His duties also include liaison planning with relief and public welfare agencies, as suggested in working understandings of the ARRL Amateur Radio Emergency Corps has with the Red Cross, Civil Defense, and other agencies. Liaison will be established also with local protective services, such as fire and police departments.

Wilson, a long time radio "ham" has worked with the American Radio Relay League as part of a net-work of hams acting as messengers for the public. He explained that each

Introduced Food Stamp Act

Legislation making permanent the existing farm programs and the food stamp act was introduced today by Chairman W. R. (Bob) Poage, D-Tex., of the House Committee on Agriculture, in keeping with a statement he issued last week.

The measure combines the existing Food and Agriculture Act of 1965 and the Food Stamp Act of 1964, which are now scheduled to expire on December 31, 1970. It contains an "open end" provision as to the amount of money to be authorized for food stamps, leaving the amount to be determined annually in regular appropriations legislation.

"Obviously, the production and the distribution of food is closely related and should be considered at the same time", said Poage. "I announced hearings on both general farm legislation and food stamps some days ago and specifically pointed out at that time that the two items would be considered together."

"These hearings have been scheduled to begin on the fifteenth of July, which, in view of the July 4th recess of the Congress, is about as early as it would be possible to start."

"We have invited the Secretary of Agriculture to open the hearings and I have introduced legislation to extend both the farm program and the food stamp program, and to remove all of the ceiling on appropriations for food stamps."

The Chairman said the Committee would not only hear from those supporting his bill, but also from those backing the Senate-passed food stamp measure and other proposed amendments.

week East Texas operators tune in for a 55 minute period to accept and transmit messages as a public service.

Wilson is part of the "East Texas Net" which is on the air at 10:00 to 10:55 p.m. each night. Wilson explained that anyone wishing to send a message from Coryell County can call him and he will relay the message.

Wilson handles messages which are addressed to Vietnam and all parts of the world. Common messages include "notice of safe arrival", "send money" and probably "I love you", types. No original death messages can be handled by the radio net work, Wilson cautioned.

Wilson explained that messages coming and going follow a similar route. For example a message to Vietnam originating in Coryell County would be forwarded by Wilson to the District 8 Net Center in New Orleans at 10:00 p.m. From New Orleans the message would be relayed to the West Coast relay net work for transmission to the Western Pacific and Vietnam. Relays to all points on the globe are possible through the network of amateur radio operators.

Wilson explained that the amateur radio operators consider this part of their civic obligation and he encouraged use of the network. Call 855-5129 and I will be glad to help anyone with a message", he explained.

In announcing the appointment, Hart pointed out that radio amateurs have traditionally had the responsibility of being in constant readiness to offer assistance in time of need with ham-acquired skill, emergency-powered transmitters and a wealth of community spirit. "When sleet storms disrupt telephone and telegraph service, or floods isolate whole communities," the League's Communications Manager said, "it is amateur radio that comes to the rescue with operators and self-powered equipment, often as the sole agency able to transmit messages calling on the outside world for aid for the stricken community."

"To be prepared for this function required not only a highly organized program of preparedness locally," Hart continued, "but hams outside the disaster area must be prepared to act as outlets and relay points for emergency traffic. Planning and organization are necessary in either eventuality and that is the job Mr. Wilson is doing for this area."

Policeman Returns

34 Persons To Die Over July 4 Weekend

Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety said, June 29 the DPS Statistical Services Bureau estimates that 34 persons will be fatally injured in traffic accidents in Texas during the 78-hour July 4 holiday period.

The holiday period is considered to run from 6 p.m. Thursday, July 3, to midnight Sunday, July 6. During this time, the Department of Public Safety will activate a special "Operation Motorcade" and will place all available uniformed patrolmen on duty to enforce traffic laws in an effort to reduce accidents and assist motorists.

Speir urged all Texans to plan their holiday trips so as to allow ample time to drive without speeding or driving too fast for conditions. He also cautioned motorists to watch out for pedestrians, especially on beaches and parks, during the holiday period.

The DPS director also warned that the department will vigorously enforce state laws relating to driving while intoxicated.

"Drinking drivers are involved in 40 to 50 percent of the fatal rural traffic accidents in Texas, and I urge all drivers to avoid the use of alcohol prior to operating a motor vehicle," Speir said.

CITY RECEIVES SALE TAX TOTALLING CHECK \$10,436.56

City Sales tax payments totaling \$10,436.56 were received by the City of Gatesville, last Thursday in payment for collections during the first quarter of 1969.

Gross collections for the January - February and March periods totaled \$11,181.81 of which the State Comptroller Office retained two percent for clerical work and retained 4.76 percent to cover possible losses and refunds.

The \$10,436.56 check is better than many had expected originally, but fell short of later estimates. Annual estimates of from \$30,000 to \$50,000 are now seen as somewhat low.

Eland Lovejoy, city manager said the collections represents the lowest period of consumer activity during the year. Federal taxes, license plates, and state and local taxes all are paid during the first quarter.

Lovejoy noted that even four times the first quarter figure would mean \$42,000 annually to the city and consumer activity picks up with Easter, Mothers Day, Summer, Back-to-School, Fall and Christmas.

Conservative estimates now place annual revenue from the city tax at \$50,000 minimum.

Copperas Cove received their returns last week as did several other Central Texas cities. Cove received \$12,657 from its \$10,000 population during the same first quarter. Belton, east of Waco totaled \$8,866 and Belton received \$14,680 in city sales revenue. Merchants will be comparing

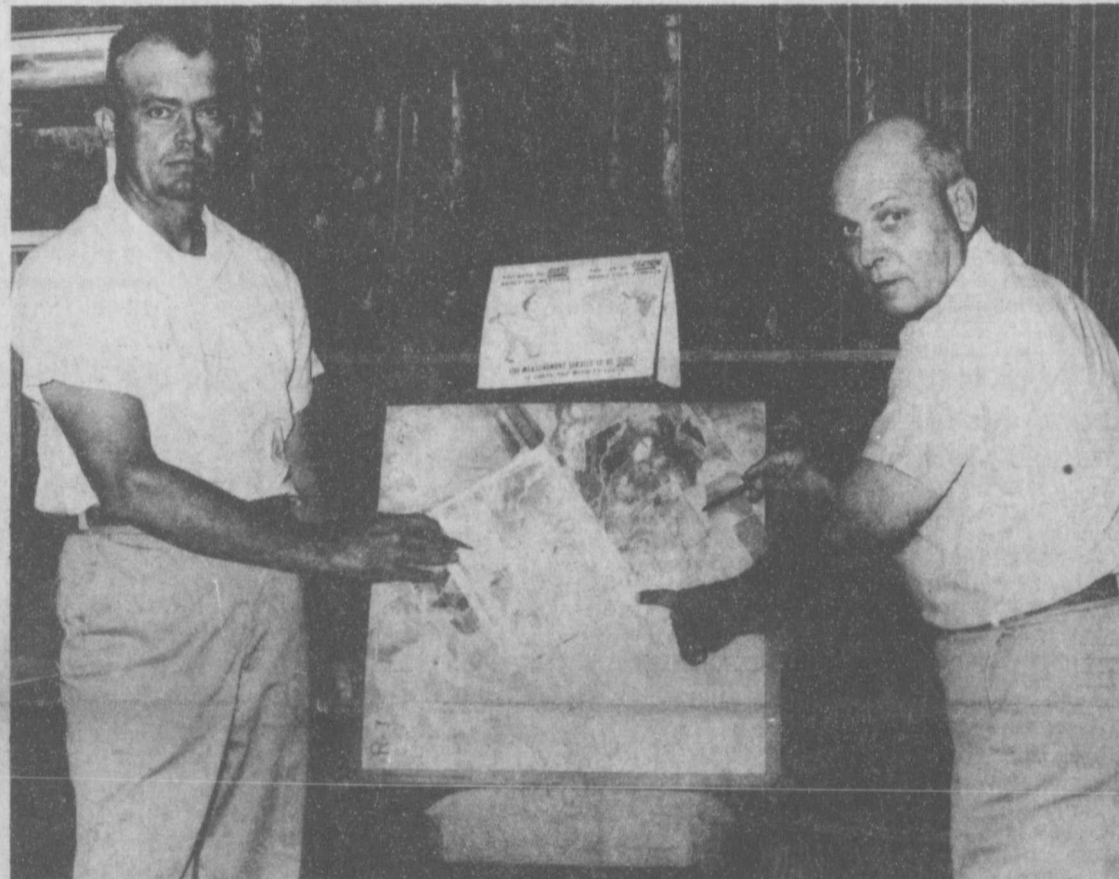
local figures to surrounding communities as a barometer of the economy.

Mayor Bob Miller said, "it is a little more than we anticipated and we are well pleased with the amount. He said the city has plenty of places to use the funds. 'Street improvement, Miller said, that is our Number One problem.' Miller named at least ten major street projects which are presently in need of repair. The projects are all being con-

sidered but obviously all can not be started immediately.

Previously the Highway Department had contended that the traffic light was not needed at the intersection. Certification Program Explained

Certification of acreage planted began in 1968 for Coryell County farmers. Prior to last year ASCS field personnel made actual measurements of planted acreage.

The new system includes use of photocopy of aerial photos in the ASCS office. Clois Stone, ASCS office manager, explained that farmers can do the measurements themselves or have the ASCS measure and pay for the labor.

Stone explained: "Up until 1968 the ASCS office employed highschool boys and men as reporters to go to farms that are signed up under programs to measure the planted or diverted acres on that farm. Due to the ASCS office only employing reporters for about two weeks, they become hard to get to work such a short time, so the department went to the system of excepting the farmers reported acreage and then spot checking 20 percent of the farms."

"The office has furnished a photo copy map to each farmer with the permanent acreage put in each field and between each terrace.

The office feels that they are getting some very accurate reports, but they urge farmers to get these acreage correct to avoid being out of the program or by having a penalty for not having the acreage reported correctly.

August 1st is the last day that farmers have to certify their acreage to the county ASCS office. Failure to certify could cause loss of payment."

Harold Shulze, County Performance supervisor offered the following helpful hints in making measurements: "The farmer utilizes the photocopy to the fullest extent. He locates his crop acreages and land uses that must be reported on it and outlines them for easier identification. Any measurements that need to be made should be done in feet or chains instead of stepped as this will insure greater accuracy. With

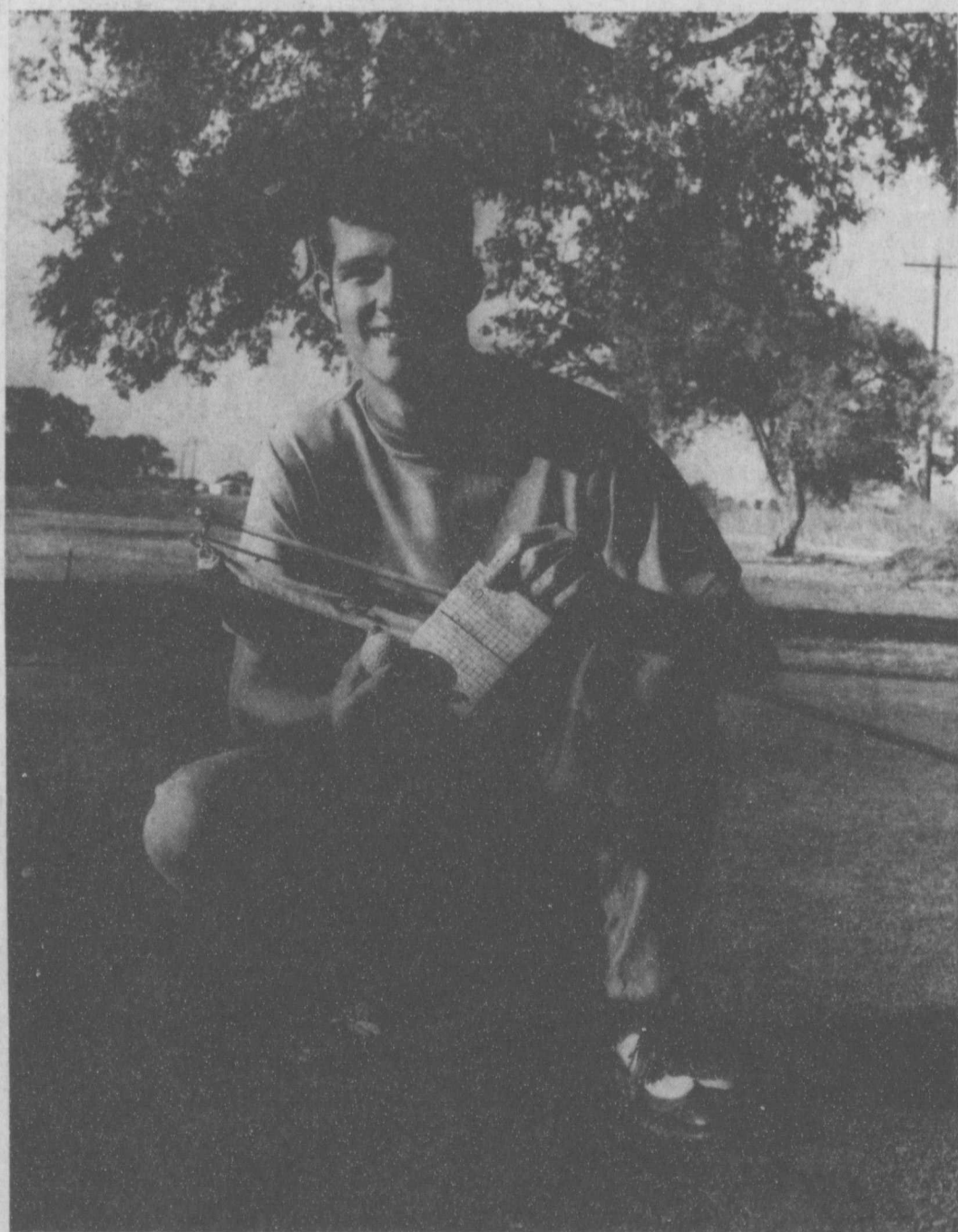

these measurements more detailed plot acreages may be secured from the county office photograph of the farm at the time of certification if the farmer is unable to arrive at an acreage due to odd-shaped plots, turnrows, etc. The acreage that is to be reported is to be a measured acreage or a whole plot acreage taken from the photocopy or aerial photocopy, not an estimate or guess. There are severe penalties for a variance between the certified and actual measured acreage, even though the farm is not over-planted. In any case where the farmer is in doubt he should ask for measurement service which will guarantee the acre-

age for the crops or land uses measured. This should be asked for well in advance of the August 1st deadline for certification so the work may be completed and the farmer notified. The farmer makes any changes that must be done before he certifies, as there is no chance for adjustment following the filing of the report. Any ineligible crop must be removed from the diverted land before this time, as well as trees and sprouts from land that is otherwise eligible. Turnrows not planted will not be considered in a crop if the farm is measured so allowance for this should be made when certifying. This is especially important where the farmer is planning to earn full price support by planting only 90 percent of the maximum acres for payment. The acreage that is determined by a farm spotcheck on a minimum of 20 percent of the farms under each program will be used as a balance against that reported. Where discrepancies exist payments will be changed as required, while too great a difference could cause the loss of the payment. An erroneous certification could cause the loss of other program payments as there would be no opportunity to withdraw from a program. Under a good certification program the acreages reported will be just as reliable as those measured, which is the basis for the limited amount of farm visits under this system."

Hodo Promoted To Airman 1st Class

By Product Of Cottonseed Oil Used To Prevent Disease

Texas A & M University researchers have found that an inexpensive by-product of the cottonseed oil refining process contains a factor which prevents common scours in calves. The by-product is acidulated soapstock (acid oil), which is an excellent source of fat in milk replacer formulas for calves and has a unique anti-diarrheic quality. Research dates back to 1956 when Dr. R. E. Leighton of the A & M Animal Science Department discovered an anti-scour substance in a methylated

product made from cottonseed oil soapstock. Later attempts to isolate the factor revealed that it was in the non-distillable, hexane-insoluble, saponifiable fraction of the product. Because this finding indicated similar results might be obtained from a less sophisticated soapstock product Leighton and co-workers explored the use of a number of cottonseed oil by-products. Leighton said excellent success has been reached in the past two years with dairy calves fed a milk-replacer formula containing 15 percent acidulated soapstock. The material was supplied by Anderson, Clayton and Company. The researcher noted that the cottonseed oil refining industry formerly regarded the product as of little value. Disposal was often a problem. Later, uses were found in the feed industry, but it is currently the least expensive fat ingredient in calf milk replacers. Cost per pound is five cents or less in large quantities. "The ever-increasing use of milk replacer formulas in feeding both dairy and beef calves, plus the surprising reduction in calf diarrhea which results when the acid oil is used in the diet, suggests that this finding will be of considerable importance to livestock feeders, feed manufacturers, veterinarians and the cottonseed oil industry," Leighton said.



Dusty old tax bills are being pulled out for discussion now that Gov. Preston Smith has vetoed the one-year spending bill and called the Legislature back into special session. Governor Smith made it clear that he expects the special session to adopt spending proposals for a full two years starting September 1, and to levy new taxes to finance whatever is spent. Tax bills must originate in the House and Speaker Gus Mutscher says he believes the money can be found without raising the state sales tax. But, first he wants to hear what the Governor has to propose as a source for the money. Smith has indicated that he will recommend a program substantially different from what he suggested last winter. But he said he will not propose a state income tax. So far, legislative leaders have not shown any intention of passing another one-year spending bill and then going home without levying new taxes. Smith's contention that the tax bill will be smaller if it is passed now instead of waiting until 1970, apparently won some statewide support. Smith has one ace up his sleeve. He vetoed a big stack of Senate bills because they were not properly passed and sent to him by adjournment of the legislative session. He said that he will allow the special ses-

sion to consider re-passage of those bills, after the legislature passes the two-year-appropriation bill.

Only the Governor can select the subjects to be considered in a special session. So authors of the bills he vetoed may be anxious to help put over his program, in order to try to pass their bills again.

Among the vetoed bills, and one of wide interest, is that by Sen. Murray Watson of Mart creating 27 new district courts.

Here is what governor Smith will ask the legislators to do: *Enact a budget in the neighborhood of \$5.6 billion for the 1970-71 fiscal period.

*Levy a balancing tax bill, which he estimates at around \$300 million or slightly less.

*If there is time in a 30-day special session, then take up the bills he vetoes because they were not signed in the presence of the legislators.

There has been some speculation that lawmakers may just hand Smith another one-year budget and see what he does. However, Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes and House Speaker Mutscher pledged cooperation in supporting a biennial appropriations pattern this time.

Tax bill remains the big question, and nobody seems to have any clear idea where to go from here.

School Transfers

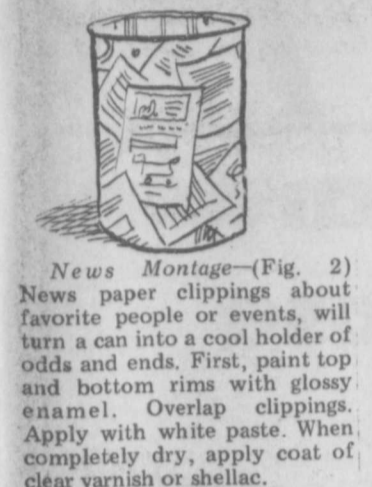
Under the new law some confusion has existed pertaining to school transfer dead line. The State Board of Education set July 15, 1969 as the last date to transfer. This applies for the current school year only.

Student transfers are made to the school superintendent in which the student desires to attend. Transfers are not made through the County Superintendents office.

If a transfer is made by July 15, 1969 the Gatesville schools will not charge tuition on grade students (Grades 1-8).

If a student desires to attend the Gatesville Public Schools, it is of utmost importance that a transfer be made in due time. High school students should transfer by July 15, 1969.
