

HORNETS OPEN FOOTBALL SEASON WITH ROBINSON

Tonight, opens another season of football at McKamie Stadium for the Gatesville Hornets. Each year the district race, win-loss records and beating old foes hold the center of attention.

Looking down the schedule there are several opponents who left the old Hornet with broken wings last season. The curtain rises at 8:00 p.m. in McKamie Stadium against a good team from Robinson. The Hornets pose a real challenge for the untested Hornets. Of-

fensively the Rockets will operate out of a "Wing T" much like last year.

Hornet Head Coach, Jack Moss, anticipates power sweeps toward the strong side and probably a neat counter play with 180 pound, Fullback, Greg Hobbs, carrying the ball.

Moss noted that the Rocket passing attack will come off a "play action type play". Running plays will be faked into the line and passes will be disguised.

The Rockets will have Larry Groth, senior, at Quarterback and Donnie Snider, a sophomore as Backup Man. Both boys are fine passers and Coach Moss expects his defensive backfield to be tested.

Running pass patterns for the Rockets will be Ronnie Schwartzinsky, Gay Elliston and Larry Nickerson. All three boys have experience and will provide Robinson with a dangerous weapon against the Hornets.

Generally speaking, the Rockets will have a weightage from tackle to tackle and Hornet yardage up the middle will depend on a crisp blocking front line. George Thompson, Terry King, Bob Harrington, Keith Bell and Lyn Mohundro will have the job of opening the middle.

Coach Moss hopes to open up the Rocket defense with a well balanced attack, featuring a

triple threat--good straight-ahead running, good out side speed, and an effective passing game.

The entire triple threat depends on good up-front blocking of course. It also requires alert instantaneous decisions by Quarterback Mike Barr and Larry Moore. These two boys help provide the aerial attack as passers. Tuesday afternoon, both Barr and Moore looked good in passing drills with well timed, accurate passes.

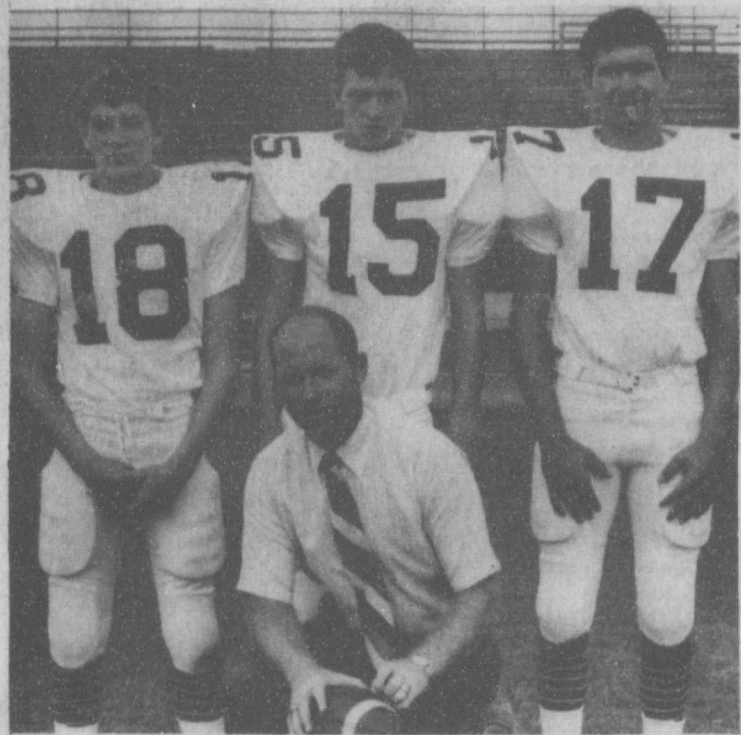

The Hornet Triple Option play will be tested and should provide thrills either way.

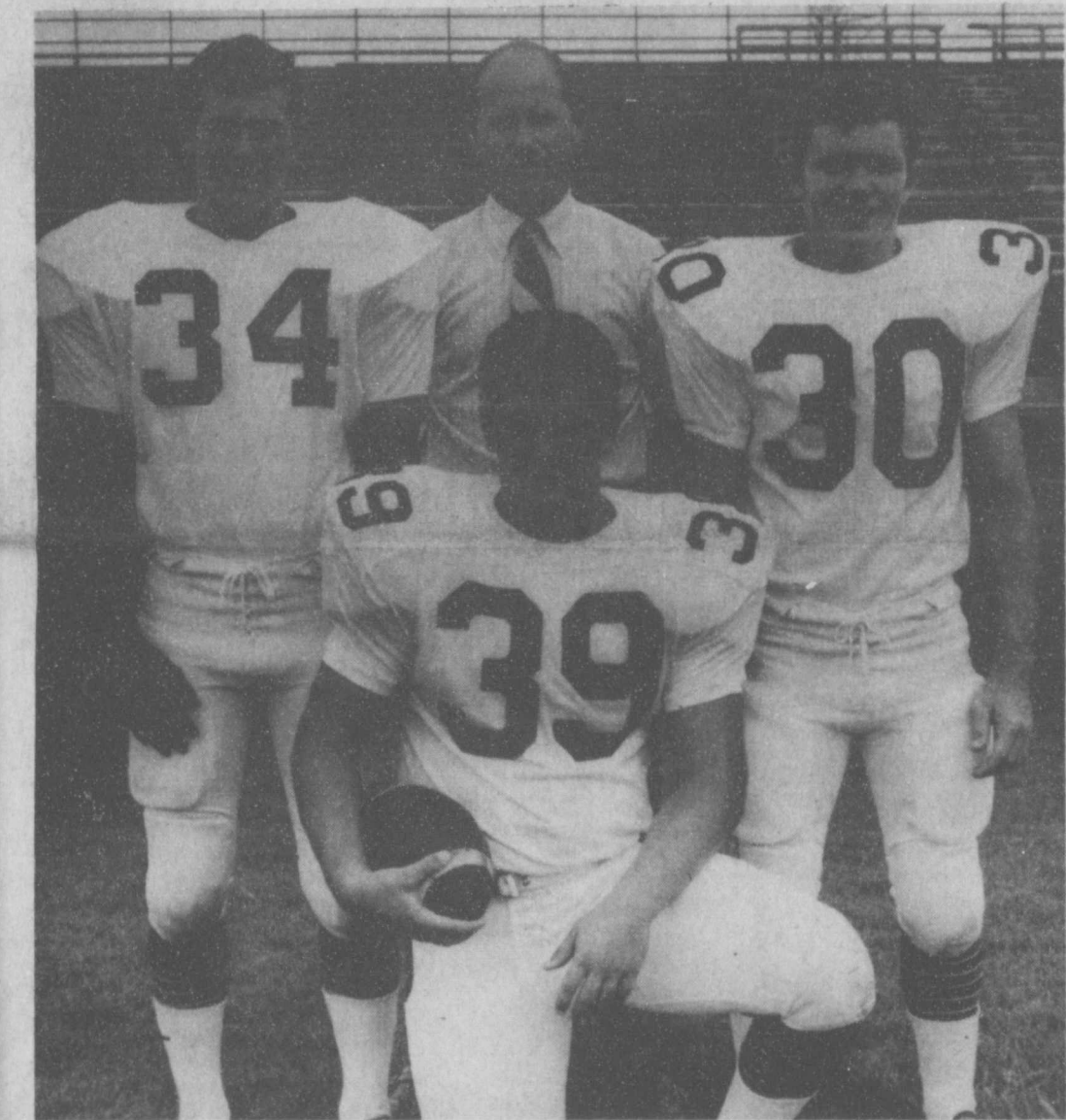

CITY BUDGET DISCUSSIONS CONTINUE MANY IMPROVEMENTS PLANNED

A budget loaded with equipment purchases, street improvements and building pro-

grams was discussed by City Council, Tuesday night. The \$431,000 budget is the

largest budget ever proposed by the City Fathers. Mayor Bob Miller explained that the budget contains several programs that were funded last year but will actually be financed under the 1970 fiscal year.

Miller said we have about \$100,000 of carry-over programs which will be handled this year. He named the library building, street repairs, and fire truck expense as carry-over programs with funds already allotted.

In 1970 the municipal programs seem to be nearing reality after several years of planning, looking for money, and replanning.

Mayor Miller scanned the budget for major improvements Wednesday, and pointed to a new fire truck to cost approximately \$22,000. He noted, "our newest truck was purchased in 1953."

Funds totaling nearly \$10,000 have been set up in the new budget for a new garbage truck. Miller noted, "Our newest garbage truck is a 1957 model."

Plans for a new maintainer and dump truck are included in the new budget. With new tax money (city sales tax) being allocated to street repairs, the Council is planning on handling much of the earth moving instead of contracting out the work.

The increased activity in the street repairs will demand a larger part of the work be done by city workers.

Miller, estimated the street

She then previewed the programs for the coming months. The topic for the October meeting will be "Education: Whose Responsibility?" The program continued with the introduction of each school principal, who in turn introduced his staff. Mr. Don Edwards, new Elementary Principal, introduced his staff, including five new members and two student teachers. Mr. Glenn Whittenberg's staff at Junior High included two new members. Mr. C. D. Boyer filled in for Mr. Sid Pruitt, who was unable to be present, and introduced eight new staff members in addition to those returning from last year. Mrs. White then asked that everyone present who was not a teacher to stand and be recognized. The new officers were indeed proud of the excellent turn-out for the meeting.

The room count was won by Mrs. Rose Place's sixth grade room. They will receive the customary \$5 award and attendance banner. The meeting adjourned for refreshments in the cafeteria.

MV YOUTH STABBED

Monday afternoon, Morris Wallis, 18, of Austin was critically injured when he was stabbed several times by a fellow inmate at the Mountain View School For Boys. This report published in the area daily papers was probably the first report to many local law enforcement officers.

Sheriff Winfred Cummings reported Thursday that he was notified of the incident Monday. Cummings received unofficial word of the incident while returning to Gatesville from Flint, Michigan.

Wallis was given emergency treatment at Coryell Memorial Hospital and then transferred to Hillcrest Baptist Hospital in Waco.

A check of Sheriff's office daily log showed only one report from the State Schools on Monday that being a report that five youths had escaped from Live Oak School. The daily log has no report of stabbing reported by either the state school or the local hospital.

Justice of Peace, Stony Hammock, reported that Tuesday Texas Rangers brought an inmate accused of the stabbing, before him to have the inmate, informed of his rights.

The accused inmate was placed in maximum security

Swimming Pool Still On Drawing Board

Swimming pool plans are still being worked out by Parks and Recreation Department. The City Council reviewed plans for the new pool Tuesday night. The October contract signing goal is still hoped for by City Fathers.

The pool is proposed to be located in the northeast corner of the old football stadium in Raby Park.

Parks and Recreation representatives are meeting with Bob Hollingsworth, formerly of Gatesville, of Waco Pools Inc., in efforts to arrive a workable plan and design for the pool.

The pool will be part of a complex of recreation facilities which will someday include playground equipment, lighted tennis courts and open play area.

Councilman, Gene Cliffwood, head of the Parks and Recreation Department, described the pool as in the shape of a "plus sign". In one direction the pool is 82' long and laned off for swimming races. In the other direction the pool would be 115' long with "a diving well in one end.

County Court Completes Three

County Court was still in session Thursday with part of the case load completed and part of the cases postponed until the November session of the court.

Tuesday, County Judge, Norman Storm, postponed the Joe Ed Tatum negligent homicide case until November 3, due to the missing key witness in the case. Storm said, "the case will be continued at our November session of court."

In the appealed case from Justice of Peace Court involving a traffic violation, the court found the defendant guilty and fine was set at one dollar. Court costs of approximately \$45 will also be paid by the defendant.

Wednesday, in the courts second day of work, Charles M. Trewitt vs. Loyd Ford was tried with the court ruling in favor of Trewitt on suit for amount of a check stopped payment on by Ford.

Thursday the court dismissed the case concerning the alleged violation of the compulsory school law. Judge Storm noted that the law says children age 7 to 17 are required to attend school unless they have graduated from high school. The child in question in the case is only six years old. For this reason the case was dismissed.

Traffic Patterns At McKamie Stadium Announced

The traffic problem at McKamie Stadium each year is not unbearable compared to many other stadiums, but there are a few things that each football fan should take note of.

First, the road, (we will call Stadium Road), running south of the stadium in front of the south gate, is one way east. This means you can enter the street from Lovers Lane only.

Second, 26th Street which runs north and south on the east side of the stadium, is one way north. This means that you can enter 26th Street only from Highway 36 and traffic on Stadium Road must turn left on

DALE WHITE APPOINTED TO FILL CITY COUNCIL VACANCY

Dale White, 35 year old businessman, has been appointed by the City Council to serve the unexpired term of former alderman, Creston Brazzil.

White is the first person to be appointed to a Gatesville City Council under the home rule charter passed in 1966. City Manager, Eiland Lovejoy

said he recalled only one other situation before home rule and that was settled by special election.

White and his family, wife, Laura, Michele, 12, and Suzanne 8, moved to Gatesville in 1964. White was employed as a pharmacist at the City Drug Store. In 1967 White became a partner in the drug store.

White is originally from Keller, Texas just north of Fort Worth. He attended Abilene Christian College for two years and then transferred to the University of Texas where he received a degree in pharmac science in 1956.

He has worked in Graham, Weatherford, and Cleburne before moving to Gatesville.

White is a member of the Gatesville Lions Club, Treasurer of the Coryell County Cancer Society and a member of the East Main Church of Christ.

White was sworn in to office by Mayor Bob Miller, Tuesday night. His first session of the council included budget hearings, construction talk, and it lasted until 12:00 midnight.

Asked what he thought of the late night work, White said, "we will do it if it takes it."

Revenue for the 1970 will come from several sources, ad valorem, water sales, garbage collection, city sales tax and other minor areas.

The ad valorem rate set recently at \$1.35 is the same as last year and should return approximately \$105,000.

Water sales each year bring in an estimated \$130,000 in revenue. Estimates of the city sales tax range from \$40,000 to \$50,000, however, accurate estimates will have to wait until the big fourth quarter figures are tabulated.

Garbage collections are up since one year ago, due to rate increases to cover requirements of a sanitary fill. The council plans to have garbage collections a self supporting department.

Mayor Miller said, Wednesday that some items might be postponed to balance the budget.

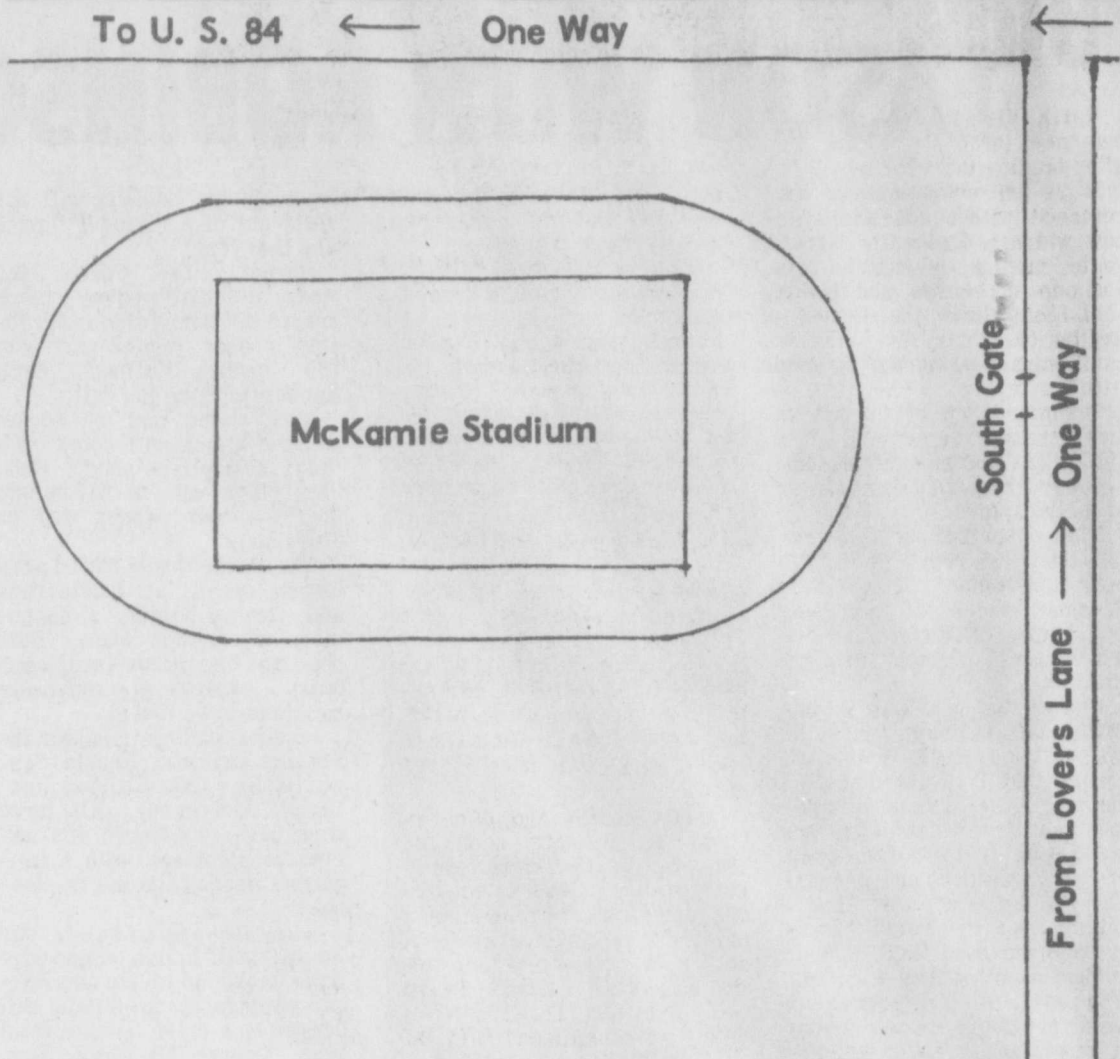

Vietnam War Prisoners Blow Whistle On V.C.

North Vietnam has recently returned three American GIs after holding them for long periods as prisoners of war. One returned with a shattered elbow which had received inadequate medical attention. He and one of the two others are still hospitalized. Last Tuesday the two hospitalized Americans were well enough to talk with reporters. They told a gruesome story of the brutal and inhumane treatment they and others who are still prisoners have received at the hands of their captors.

They described the stark detail the harsh realities of solitary confinement, of men kept in small cages, of men hung in straps, of fingernails removed and of poor medical treatment.

One of the men said he was willing to, as he said, "blow the whistle" on North Vietnam's claims that it treats prisoners humanly. He said he was doing so with the knowledge and consent of other Americans who are still prisoners and who are likely to suffer additional hardships when the North Vietnamese make good their threats to "get even" if they are "embarrassed." The courage of these prisoners can not go unacknowledged. Their heroism is outstanding and in the finest traditions of our nation's heritage.

Another form of heroism is being carried on gallantly here at home by the mothers, fathers, wives and children, sisters and brothers of GIs who have been listed as "missing" in action for many months. These loved ones do not even know whether their husband, father, son or brother is alive or dead. Some of them could be Texans and may be your neighbors. They do not know this, because Hanoi has not seen fit to grant even the human decency of identifying the men they are holding as prisoners of war.

The three recently allowed to return home brought the number of American prisoners released by Hanoi to a grand total of nine.

More than 1,400 American servicemen have been reported as "missing in action" in connection with the Vietnam War. The Defense Department, through all its various means of obtaining information, has been able to confirm as dead only about 300 of these 1,400 GIs. Of course we must assume that some of the missing 1,100 are also dead, but we can reasonably hope that a large number of them are alive and being held captive by the enemy.

The Geneva Accords of 1949 were designed to prevent the inhumane treatment now being suffered by our men in enemy prison camps. The Accords require countries holding prisoners of war to identify those prisoners, to release those who are seriously sick or injured, to allow impartial inspection of all prisoner-of-war facilities to insure that minimum health standards are met, and to allow free exchange of mail between prisoners and their families.

Hanoi signed those Accords in 1957 but the North Vietnamese have not honored them. They have not complied with even the most fundamental standards of human decency. They have not even identified the Americans which they are holding captive.

In this way, the North Vietnamese have been able to inflict not only physical punishment on their prisoners, but also continuing and severe mental anguish in this country on the loved ones of those prisoners.

By not even allowing the families to know whether the loved one is alive or dead, the North Vietnamese needlessly extend the anguish suffered by relatives at home. And I am forced to believe, although I sincerely hope that I am mistaken, that Hanoi inflicts that anguish on American's at home by design.

Three months ago, our government formally requested that the North Vietnamese abide by the Geneva Accords regarding humane treatment of prisoners and cease its illegal acts. We made it clear that we knew what was going on and we asked that Hanoi begin a policy of compliance with the

Accords.

A favorable response from the North Vietnamese would have indicated a willingness to make a small but significant step towards peace. A favorable response would have been a reasonable and simple act. It would have been the kind of indication of peaceful intent which we are seeking so eagerly at the Paris Peace Talks.

Our request for at least a list of names of Americans in North Vietnamese prisoner-of-war camps was greeted by a statement from Hanoi's chief negotiator in Paris that his country would not immediately comply.

Now it's been three months and no favorable word on the issue has come from North Vietnam. Instead, three Americans have been released. And they have told of torture and brutality and the prospect of more torture and brutality as a "reprisal" for their speaking the truth.

The release of the three prisoners, compared with the continued detention of so many more Americans without even a mention of their identities, seems more like a slap in the face than a gesture toward peace.

It should be patently clear to all Americans that North Vietnam simply does not want peace. I face this news with deep and profound sympathy for our men who are prisoners and their families but there seems no other recourse than to recognize reality.

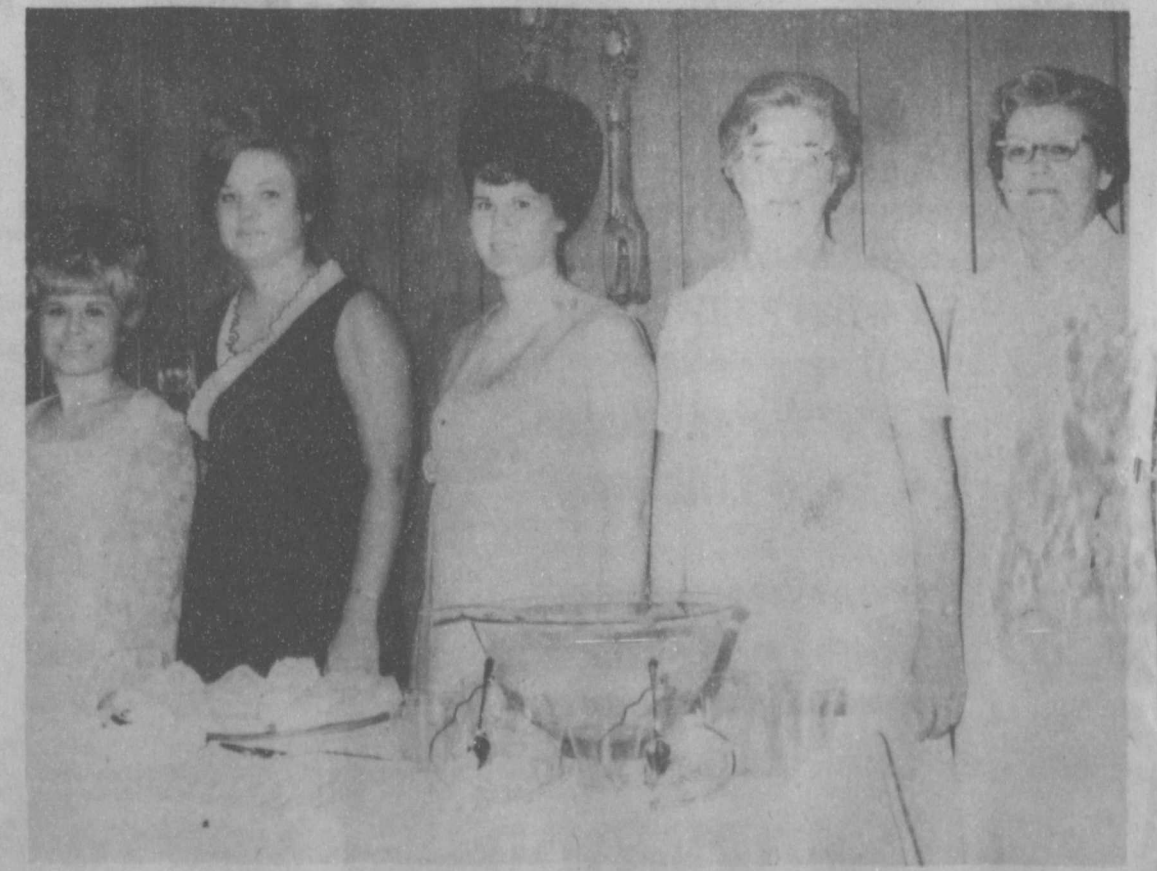

Don McKelvain and Joe Guerrero will handle the passing chores for the Tigers with Manuel Marquez, Willie Leos and

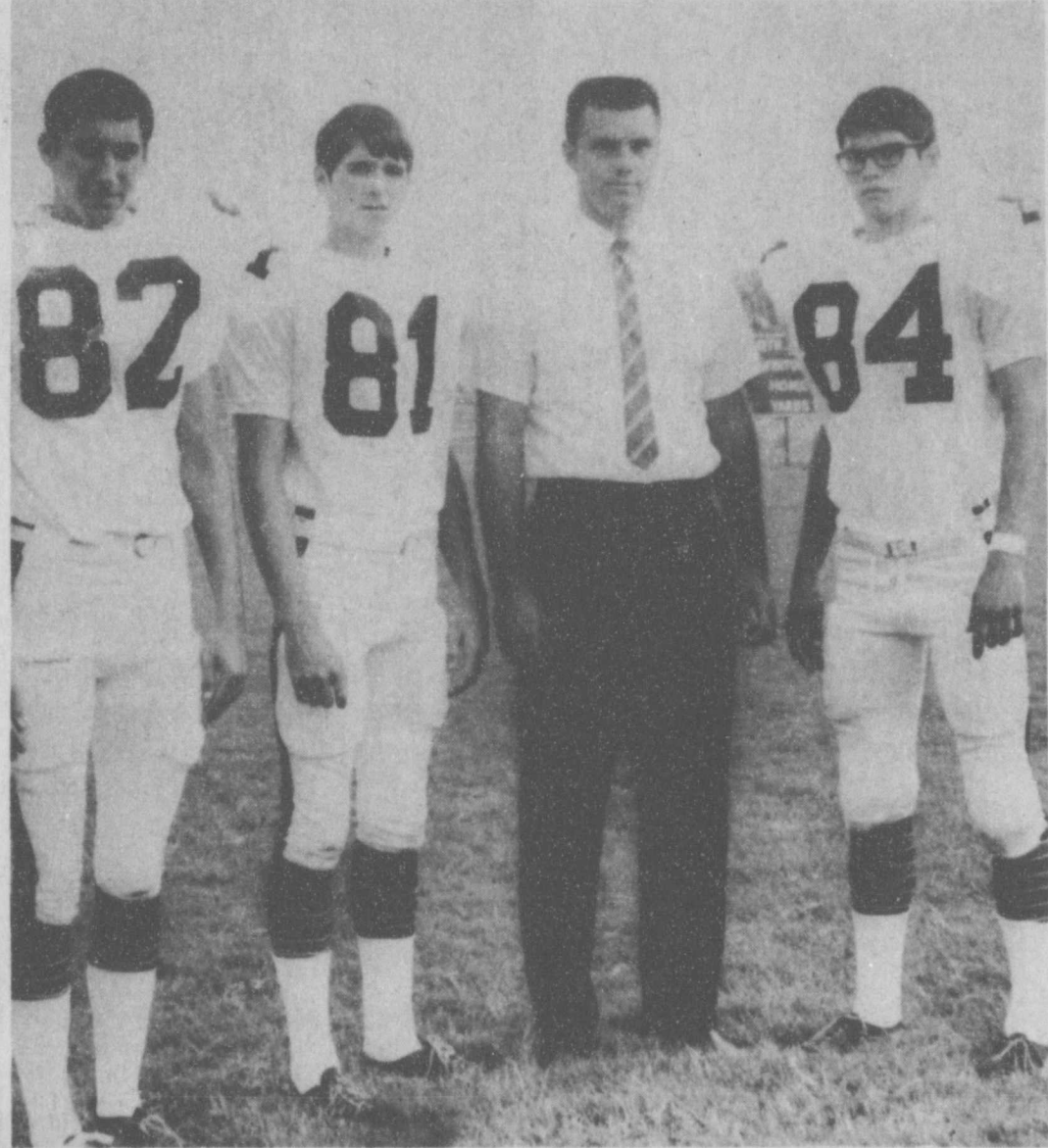

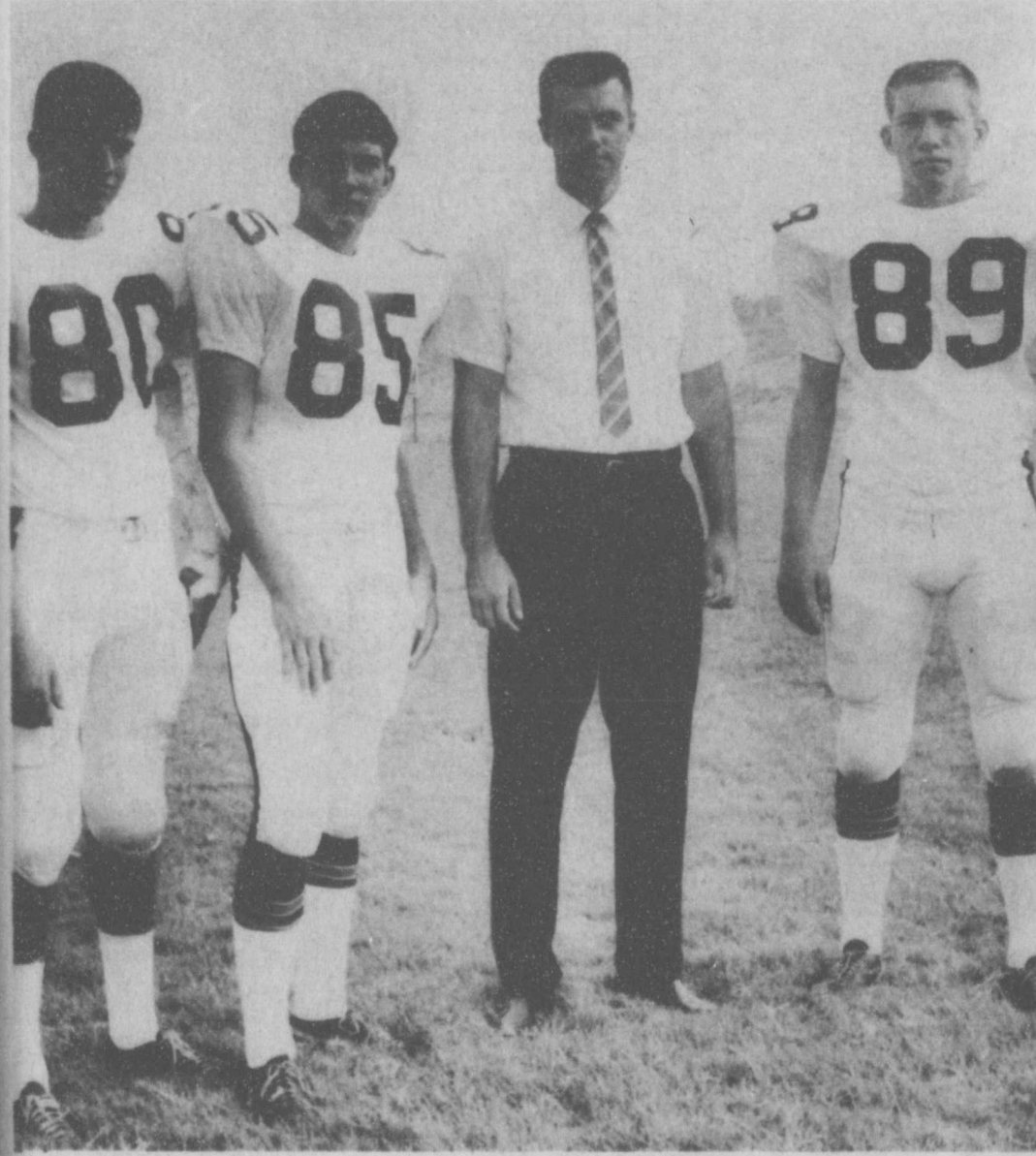

Highlights and Sidelights Vern Sanford

Legislators battled wearily toward a conclusion of the second special session, with some indications of a conclusion developing.

A Senate-written version of the tax bill came within six votes of adoption in the House. But Representatives balked at the Senate's compromise \$357.6 million tax bill which included a new "destination allocation formula" designed to collect a corporation franchise tax on out-of-state industries selling products in Texas.

Senate first turned a deaf ear to the House request for a new conference committee.

Gov. Preston Smith and Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes pressed hard for House adoption of the Senate amendments to HB 4, but Speaker Gus Mutscher said the measure remained a "bad bill."

Only really-new idea in the compromise was the destination allocation formula.

Otherwise it called for a quarter percent increase (to 3.5) in the state sales tax and inclusion of beer and liquor under its base; five cents a pack raise on cigarettes; 50-cent (to \$3.25 per \$1,000) raise in corporation franchise tax rate; one half percent (to 7.5 percent of value) hike in natural gas tax; and 10 cents a drink tax on alcoholic beverages sold in private clubs and on airlines.

Rep. John Allen of Longview denounced the big-city members for failure to support the tax bill. He pointed out that of 19 members from Harris County, only one voted for the tax bill. And this is the county that gets 20 percent of the state spending, Allen said.

Allen noted that other big-city delegations voted against the bill, except for the Dallas delegation, and that 54 of the 68 votes cast for the bill, were from members from rural or small-city areas.

He pointed to the coming reapportionment after the 1970 census and asked: "How will we ever pass a tax bill when Houston gets 24 members and only one of them will vote for a tax bill?"

This rural-urban split in the House was just one of many developments as the weary legislators fought to put a majority of each house together on a tax package to sustain state government during the next two years.

Senate first enacted, then backed down on its unusual proposal to levy a \$1 per ticket tax on admissions to "dirty movies." Original bill would have designated the Commissioner of Bureau of Labor Statistics (who supervises boxing and wrestling) to review all movies coming into the state and determine those which should be rated "X" for adult audiences only. The latter were targeted for the tax. After thinking it over a couple of days, Senate bowed to the advice of members who argued that the regulation of sexy movies should be left to a separate bill, not a tax measure.

Increases in teachers' and state worker's pay, expansion of the college and university system, and improvements in the care of the mentally ill account for most of the increase

in state spending. But how to put together a tax package to provide the money was the question which troubled the legislators in the second week of the second special session.

GUEST RULE DELAYED

Tough new rules of the Liquor Control Board to curb temporary guest card abuses at private bottle clubs cannot be enforced pending appeal of a court test case here.

District Judge James Meyers concluded that LCB rules are valid, but they should not be put into full effect until final disposition of the case on appeal.

In the lawsuit, Dallas clubs claimed the rule would close 75 percent of Texas private clubs, many of which aren't so private. Rule would require guests to be personally introduced or physically accompanied by a club member. Bills would have to be paid by members on monthly statements, not in cash by guests. LCB said applications for late hours (2 a.m.) drinking permits for clubs and taverns are being screened carefully. Only 18 were approved in the week before the new curfew-stretching law went into effect September 1.
