In 1969 dreams of previous years came to completion as many of Gatesville and Coryell County projects and new businesses.

"And more" the year ending December 31, held individual accomplishments and tragedies for Coryell County and Gatesville citizens.

To say one or even several events headed the list of 1969 happenings would indicate that all events effected the entire community and that each individual was effected the same

In January of 1969 probably one of the widest publicized stories broke open when a State legislative investigation team made a surprise visit to the Mountain View School for Boys to investigate charges of bru-

tality on Jan. 4.

The team of investigators was lead by Rep. Vernon Stewart of Witchita Falls.

The next few weeks featured statewide news, coverage, polygraph tests and more investigations. Polygraph tests taken by the Texas Department of Public Safety from M.V. guards supported the guards and seemvindicate the Mountain View School of all brutality

However, the attack by outside political forces continued through the spring and summer

In May of '69 a Senate report was interpeted by support-ers of the school administration position as complete vindication on the brutality charges. Judge Truman Roberts, a citizens group, and Rep. Bob Salter stood behind the schools ad-ministration in the long fight

against the brutality charges. Rep. Salter went to bat for the employees of the school countless times all through the


conflict, (fact) In early July this story seemed to end with a legislative resolution praising Dr. Turman and the Youth Council.

Eleven days after the legislative praise Sen. Cutis Graves of Houston renewed his attack of the schools in a U.S. Senate subcommittee investiga-

In late August 52nd District Court defaulted on one of the teachers and charges were dropped on the other teacher. The end is not in site for the State School Administra-

SHOULD BE EASY IN 1970

Austin--When the owners of Texas' seven million motor vehicles get their 1970 license they will find that the Texas Highway Department has taken a lot of frustration out of registration.

Owners will receive motor vehicle registration applications by mail early in January. This three-part form is the

key to convenience, In previous years, the vehicle owner had to hunt up his certificate of title and last year's license receipt and take tem to the tax office or a substation. Often, he found himself at the end of a long, slow-

moving line. The lines should be much shorter this year. And there are provisions for license plates by mail.

County Tax Assessor Collector Jack Whigham, indicated this week that should a person not receive a motor vehicle registration application his office will require a car title and last years registration just like in years past.

Whigham noted that this year Highway Department procedures have ruled out the reservation of numbers for persons. He explained that the State requires the local office to procede numerically through the all plate registration for easier handling on the state level. Whigham said no numbers could be reserved under the new method.

Here's how easy the new method is:

If a motorist goes to the county tax office or a substation, all he needs to take is the three part form -- the motor vehicle registration application -- that came in the mail. And the registration fee,

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

Should the vehicle owner decide to register his vehicle by mail, he sends the entire renewal application, the fee and an additional \$1 to his county tax office. The \$1 additional charge is provided by statute to cover the cost of handling and post-

age. The registration "season" begins at county tax offices and substations on Feb. 1. The vehicle owner can register his vehicle in person until April 1. If he wants his plates mailed to him, he must send in his application, the fee and the \$1 postage and handling charge to his couty tax officer by March

This allows 30 days for de-livery before 1970 license plates must be displayed after midnight, April 1.

Easy to follow instructions are printed on the three-part The Highway Dept. asks that the owner leave the form intack and that he not separate the three parts.



Associated Press Food Editor A holiday fruit bread called Hutzelbrot, made with yeast, comes from German cuisine. Of late it has been awakening interest in this country.

So here's an American version of the bread. In this re-cipe the yeast is mixed with the flour and other ingredients. It's not necessary to dissolve the yeast first and this saves a step in the making.

American Hutzelbrot

6 to 7 cups unsifted flour 1/2 cup sugar teaspoon salt tablespoon anise seeds 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon 1/4 teaspoon ground cardamon 1/8 teaspoon ground cloves 2 packages active dry yeast 1/4 pound (1 stick) butter or margarine, at room tempera-

3/4 cups very hot tap water cup chopped toasted blanched 1 cup chopped walnuts 2/3 cup finely diced dried pears 2/3 cup finely diced dried table-

1/2 cup finely diced candied honey. Makes two large loaves.

2/3 cup diced prunes

soft figs

orange peel

In a large bowl throughly mix together 2 cups flour, the sugar, salt, anise seeds, cinna-mon, cardamon, cloves and un-dissolved yeast. Add butter. Gradually add water and at medium speed of electric mixer, scraping bowl occasionally, beat for 2 minutes. Add 1 cup flour, or enough flour to make a thick batter. Beat at high speed for 2 minutes, scraping bowl occasionally. Stir in enough additional flour to make a soft dough.

Turn out onto lightly floured board; knead until smooth and elastic-about 8 to 10 minutes. Place in greased bowl; turn to grease top. Cover; let rise in warm, draft-free place until doubled-about I hour.

Punch down dough; turn out onto lightly floured board.
Knead in almonds, walnuts, pears, figs prunes, and candied orange peel. Divide dough in half; form into round balls. Place on greased cookie sheets. Cover; let rise as previously until doubled-about I hour.

Bake in preheated 375 F. oven for 40 minutes. Remove from cookie sheets and place on wire racks to cool. While loaves are still warm, brush with

in January as a dispatcher. Buddy Biffle was also named in 1969 as a dispatcher.




