

Apples

For years the school board has made a study of the build-ing needs for our school system. The first incentive for such study was brought about by a proposed vocational building for which 50% will be financed by the federal government. The district cannot obtain the federal money unless funds are on hand to match federal funds. The school board be-lieves that a new elementary building and the vocational building can be constructed out of this bond issue. Some remodeling can also be done at the same time remodeling can also be done at the same time.

Why Now?

1. The schools are overcrowded.

- 2. The district will be made eligible for federal funds, the amount of which is approximately \$150,000.00.
- 3. Under a new state law, the district must establish a kindergarten within a few years. Eventually there will be 150 students under six years of age. There is no room for these students.
- 4. New vocational courses such as auto mechanics, general mechanics, general homemaking, distributive education, and vocational office education along with cooperative agriculture and one in trades and industries demand more room.
- Note: Students are being transported each day to the old junior high building. This practice is not sound from a school standpoint, and the building there was condemned years ago.

How Sound Is The Program

The valuations of the district will approach \$16,000,000.00 for the 1970-71 school year. Since the high school bonds were voted in 1959, valuations have increased over \$5,000,000.00. The junior high bonds are being paid mainly from state aid for such. Some federal money was used at the junior high for sciences and equipment.

The district has a surplus of \$100,000.00 in the interest and sinking fund. The district also has a surplus of \$60,-000.00 in the incentive aid fund. Incentive aid due the next eight years is \$196,152.00. Total liquid assests are \$356,152.00. The surplus in the interest and sinking fund cannot be used

except to pay bonds. The reason the district has not called in the bonds for payment is that the bonds average 3% interest and the district invests the surplus, receiving 5% to 7% in-terest. These investments create a profit for the bond account. If the new issue is approved, the district will probably call in some bonds or purchase its own bonds from the new issue,

in some bonds or purchase its own bonds from the new issue. After August 1st this year, the district will owe approxi-mately \$900,000,00 in bonds (all old issues). If \$356,152,00 is deducted in liquid assets, approximately \$544,000.00 for the present bonded indebtness will be left IF the district takes the surpluses, pays off bonds, and uses credit on incentive aid due the next eight years. By law the district can incur 10% of valuation which would be \$1,600,000.00. Therefore, if the issue is voted, there will be still a good margin of safety. The present bonded indebtness plus the new issue, less as-sets, will incur a net obligation of approximately \$1,050,000,00 If one looks at the bond finances from another viewpoint, the new issue will provide \$500,000,00. Less the present surplus of \$160,000.00 net new obligations will be \$340,000.00. If one considers incentive aid due, new obligations can be reduced further. New obligations will then figure \$143,848.00. If the district has money on hand to match federal funds, new money will amount to approximately \$150,000.00 Money on hand will increase the chance of the district to receive fed-eral funds.

What Will The Bond **Issue Cost The Taxpayer?**

Fifty cents (50¢) will, in all probability, finance the bonds.

Special Notice

There are in effect two taxes; one for bonds and one for oper tions. The bond tax of 50¢ will be assessed. A 75¢ operating tax will not operate the schools regardless of the new issue. The district has never promised that the operating tax will remain the same. The district has had the same total tax

rate of \$1.25 since 1949. Under our present economic structure, the 75¢ will not meet today's costs. The district valuations are less than one-third of actual values.



Thirty to 40% of the new high school building and equipment was paid for out of federal funds.

Approximately 80% of the new junior high school building and equipment is being paid for mainly with state and federal funds

The stadium, with over \$100,000.00 in costs, was financed locally.

Purchases of land during the past twenty years were paid locally because of acquisition of federal funds. Land and land preparations cost over \$100,000,00.

At the present time, the district has no indebtness that it cannot pay except the bonds.

Other than providing for construction of an elementary building and a vocational building the money on hand will in-crease eligibility of the district for approximately \$150,000.00 in federal funds to be applied on the vocational building. In addition to these two projects, some extensions and remodeling can be done,


