## Ten Days Added To Gatesville School Year-Class Begins Aug. 24

The 1970-71 school year will begin on August 24, with ten extra school days added to the calendar this year. The school calendar was

released by the superintendent's office this week noting the first day of classes for an estimated 1820 students one week earlier than in years

past. Teachers will return to work on August 17 for a week of in-service training. Superintendent L. C. McKemie noted that all teaching positions have been filled at the schools. Mrs. Carmen Cabas of Puerto Rico has been hired to teach Spanish I and II. She taught three years at the University of Tennessee before moving to Gatesville. Her husband is stationed at Fort Hood. Other teachers and coaches hired this year include Miss Marsha Whitlow, freshman English; Charles Anderson, Charles Feris and Ronald Ray, all coaches. The school's first holiday will be September 7, Labor Day. Other scheduled holidays are Christmas and New Years, December 22 to January 5; Mid-Term, January 15; Easter, April 9, 10, 11, 12; and school is out May 25.

## Jonesboro Schools Receive Impact Aid

Congressman W.R. Poage's Washington office announced this week the names of three area schools that have received Impact Aid grants from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare. One Coryell County school was included in the trio. The Jonesboro schools received a grant of \$1,609. ## Relocating Utilities On 190

County relocation of fencing and utilities along Highway 190 in preparation for widening the roadway to four lanes is already underway. Approximately 26,546 feet of fence has been relocated at a cost of \$9,597.76 noted Judge Norman Storm. A total of \$163,597.76 is the total expected cost to the county and state on clearing the right-of-way. Storm noted Tuesday that 50% of the funds would come from State Highway Department Fund and 50% from county sources. Major projects still to be completed in the relocation include a \$54,000 relocation of Lone Star Gas lines, \$84,000 relocation of water lines, and a \$16,000 relocation of Fort Hood utilities. Coryell County's part of the highway widening will amount to approximately \$81,700.

## Eight Receive Diplomas Sunday At Mountain View Graduation

Graduation exercises were held Sunday in the chapel of the Mountain View School for Boys. There were eight members of the class who received high school diplomas. Commencement began at 2:30 p.m. with the "Pomp and Circumstance" processionary played by the school's music director, Miss Dorothy Haines. Reverend Bob Richmond delivered the invocation followed by all singing "God of Our Fathers". The Mountain View principal, Robert S. Ballard, made award presentations to class valedictorian and salutatorian. Jesse Castilla, valedictorian was awarded a scholarship to be used at any church related school. Robert Stanley Holmes, salutatorian, was also recognized by Ballard. Following award presentations, Robert W. ## CTCOG Joins State School To Collect Toys

A project has recently been initiated in Central Texas to benefit the needy children in the region. This project is a unique venture involving the youth in the Texas Youth Council facilities at Gatesville, Texas. Available technical-vocational equipment at the schools and available manpower will be used to repair and restore toys obtained from donations by local persons in the region. Upon completion of the toy repair project, newly re-conditioned toys will be distributed or returned to charitable organizations in Central Texas to be given to needy persons. The Texas Youth Council (TYC) facilities at Gatesville have been designated as re-

pair agencies of used toys for needy children throughout Central Texas. To provide this worthwhile service for surrounding communities in collection and repair of the toys in their possession prior to August 1, 1970, in order to repair and distribute to charitable organizations throughout Central Texas prior to Christmas, 1970. In order to expedite the process since a short time remains, the Central Texas Council of Governments (CTCOG) has contacted fire and law enforcement departments and city hall personnel for assistance in Bell, Coryell, Hamilton, Lampasas, Milam, and Mills Counties. The collection center in Gatesville will be in the City Hall.

## ONE ARRESTED AT ROCK FESTIVAL

Sunday afternoon Police Chief Gene Goins arrested one Copperas Cove youth at the Faut Le Roy Rock Festival. The youth was jailed and Monday, County Judge Norman Storm fined the youth \$100 plus \$42 court cost for carrying a hand chain. The youth, a member of a Copperas Cove rock band, had a 10" stick with a 14" chain connected to it. The loose end of the chain had a lead "tear drop" weight with nails sticking out of the weight, Goins noted.

## Oglesby To Air-Condition All Classrooms Soon

"Oglesby Schools will be air conditioned before August 17," announced School Superintendent, Morris Owens. The school board voted to undertake the air-conditioning project at the July meeting. Owens noted that cost of the project has not been detailed but estimates run between \$4,000 and \$7,000 to install window units in twelve classrooms. Owens is expecting a slight

increase in enrollment over the 150 students last year with registration scheduled for Friday August 21 and classes to start August 24. Teachers will begin in-service training on August 17. ## Area Bands Meet At Faut Le Roy's Sunday

Faut Le Roy's Park was transformed into a convention center Sunday as youth from over the area met for a "rock festival." Bands from Central Texas were there in full force and an estimated crowd of 250 attended from 1 p.m. to 6 p.m. Police Chief Gene Goins estimated the continuous crowd at near 200 with as many as 500 persons in the park at one time. He estimated that over 1,500 persons attended the festival during the day. Goins said "I thought it (Rock Festival) turned out real good. It was real good, clean entertainment for the kids." He noted that only one minor incident occurred during the day and considering the crowd size, he felt it was a real testimony to the kid's good behavior. Mayor Bob Miller visited the Festival late Sunday and noted that the kids had cleaned up the park following the Festival as good as any group ever to use the park. A \$55,000 Farmers Home Administration loan for the Evant Development Corp. was closed Tuesday morning at the County FHA office. The loan will enable the Development Corp. to build a five unit housing project two blocks east of the Evant square on a ten lot site in the Sawyer Addition. The Development Co. has contracted with Community Lumber Co. of Evant to build the five low rent houses at a cost of \$49,000. The homes will all be three bedroom brick homes. FHA supervisor, Vance Stephens noted that construction began on Tuesday with October 31 set as a completion date. The Evant Development Corp. ### Highlights and Sidelights Vern Sanford

**COURTS SPEAK** Federal court suit has been filed against the City of Tyler by the U. S. government seeking to end school segregation by this fall.

Court of Criminal Appeals held that a driving while intoxicated conviction is invalid if the defendant was on private property at the time of arrest.

State Supreme Court refused to upset a lower court denial of damages to the widow of a man killed in an auto-train crash near Edna. Jury found negligence on the part of both the man and Southern Pacific Railroad employees.

High Court also held that a Potter County couple was not entitled to damages from a doctor because the woman could no longer have children after an operation.

Harris County district court granted an injunction against Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company, prohibiting it from discharging industrial wastes into Sims Bayou in greater amounts than that permitted by the Water Quality Board. Court ordered a \$20,000 fine, the largest civil penalty in Texas pollution case history.

**ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES** Wichita Falls school board is without authority to adopt a resolution or policy providing for recall elections of its members, says Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin.

Martin ruled in other recent opinions that:

\* A county treasurer is the proper official to make delivery of county warrants to payees.

\* County attorney who resigns as of a future date may not withdraw his resignation after it is duly accepted by the commissioners court even though the effective date has not arrived. However, until a successor is appointed, it is his duty to serve.

Martin said a Spring Branch real estate developer (Cypress Lake Gardens) gave assurance of voluntary compliance with directives to discontinue misleading advertising and sales practices.

Texas Industrial Commission. **BUDGET REQUESTS SOARING**—Major state agency budget requests continued to prompt speculation of a huge tax need next year—perhaps as high as \$700 million.

Board of Public Welfare finally officially approved a \$2.1 billion biennial spending plan which is \$347.6 million above present spending levels. Mental Health-Mental Retardation request of \$314 million is \$139.7 million above the current level, and colleges and universities want an increase of \$258.9 million. Combined with public schools biennial operating proposals of \$377.1 million, major agencies of education, mental hospitals-retardation schools and welfare want more than \$1 billion more than they now are getting.

**SHORT SNORTS**—State Banking Board approved charters for Bank of Commerce at Point Comfort, Seaport Bank at Seadrift, Colonial Bank of Greenville and Hillside Bank and Trust Company of Dallas; declined charters for American Bank of Loveland and Citizens Bank and Trust of Iowa Park.

Veteran newspaperman and state capital correspondent Harry Benge Crozier died here June 14, at age 78.

### Texas Draft Quota For August Drops

**DRAFT QUOTA DROPS**—August draft call for Texas is 560. That's 257 less than the 817 in July. No man will be inducted with random sequence number higher than 195.

State quota for pre-induction physical and mental examinations in August is 1,490, down from 1,601 in July. Those called for these examinations will have random sequence numbers one to 215.

Deferred or exempt men may be forwarded for examinations if they are likely to lose deferred or exempt status within the next six months. No men with random sequences higher than 215 will be forwarded for examination until further notice. All volunteers at draft boards must be inducted ahead of the non-volunteers selected and ordered to report for draft by r.s.n. National call is for 10,000 men, all for the army.

## Spurt in Gas Powered 4-H Engine Projects

Latest nationwide enrollment in the 4-H petroleum power program shows an increase of nearly 37 percent in one year. Figures for 1969 from 49 states compiled by the Cooperative Extension Service totaled 97,000. This is an increase of 26,000 members over the previous year.

The growing use of gasoline powered lawn and garden tractors, and certification for 14 and 15-year olds for on-farm tractor driving were given as the main reasons for mounting interest in the program. Small engine projects nearly doubled.

Certification for farm youths 14-15 years of age for operating a tractor or to operating a tractor or other machinery off the home farm is a requirement prescribed by law.

Such a training program for 4-H'ers has been set up by the Cooperative Extension Service. A written examination on safety and a practical demonstration of tractor operation are among the tests given.

Incentive awards are provided for knowledge and ability. County medals of honor, a trip to the National 4-H Congress for the state champion, and six \$600 national scholarships are offered by the sponsor.

Youths interested in the certification training courses or in learning more about operating and maintaining lawn mowers and other small engine equipment can contact the County Extension Service Office, Don Callahan, Extension Agent.

## BOW HUNTERS TO HUNT AGAIN AT ARANSAS

ALBUQUERQUE...Bow hunters will again hunt deer on the Aransas National Wildlife Refuge in Texas, it was announced today by Acting Regional Director W. O. Nelson, Jr., of the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife. The season for archers will begin at noon on September 10 and will continue through September 30, said Nelson, with a bag limit of three deer, one of which must be antlerless. Hunters will again be allowed to take all the feral hogs they are able to and will be allowed one javelina.

Aransas Refuge Manager Gordon Hansen expects 12,000 to 13,000 bow hunters will converge on the 47,000 acre Texas Gulf Coast wildlife refuge, based on past experience with this very popular form of recreation.

No special permit is required to hunt on the Department of the Interior installation, Nelson said, but stressed the fact that all hunters must possess a valid Texas hunting license.
