ing the roadway to four lanes is already underway. Approximately 26,546 feet of fence has been relocated at

a cost of \$9,597.76 noted Judge Norman Storm, A total of \$163,597.76 is

the total expected cost to the county and state on clearing the right-of-way. Storm noted Tuesday that 50% of the funds would come from State Highway Department Fund and 50% from county sources.

Major projects still to be completed in the relocation include a \$54,000 relocation of Lone Star Gas lines, \$84,000 relocation of water lines, and a \$16,000 relocation of Fort Hood utilities.

Coryell County's part of the highway widening will amount to approximately \$81,700.


BOW HUNTERS TO HUNT AGAIN AT ARANSAS ALBUQUERQUE ... Bow hunt-

ers will again hunt deer on the Aransas National Wildlife Refuge in Texas, it was an-nounced today by Acting Re-gional Director W. O. Nel-son, Jr., of the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife.

The season for archers will begin at noon on Sep-tember 10 and will continue through September 30, said Nelson, with a bag limit of three deer, one of which must be anterless. Hunters will again be allowed to take all the feral hogs they are able to and will be allowed one javelina.

Aransas Refuge Manager Gordon Hansen expects 12,000 to 13,000 bow hunters will converge on the 47,000 acre Texas Gulf Coast wildlife refuge, based on past experience with thes very popular form of recreation.

No special permit is re-quired to hunt on the Department of the Interior installation, Nelson said, but stressed the fact that all hunters must possess a valid Texas hunting license.
