



## New City Library Dedicated Sunday

Almost a half century of dreams, plans, fund raising and work climaxed local library supporters Sunday afternoon with the dedication of the new Gatesville Public Library building at 811 Main Street. The ceremonies and unveiling of a Texas historical marker for Gatesville which followed the dedication initiated Gatesville's week-long centennial observances.

Approximately 300 persons jammed the distinctive library facility for the formal opening ceremonies at 2 p.m.

In the library, a man can find his place in history and from that place, he can proceed to a more productive future, said Dayton Kelley, curator of the Texas Collection at Baylor University and guest speaker at the dedication services. Kelley, a leader in Central Texas historical and library organizations, headed the journalism department at Mary Hardin-Baylor College in Baylor for 12 years before his Baylor position.

Allen Bennett, library trustee, was master of ceremonies at the opening. The invocation was delivered by Joe F. Kopec of the Fellowship of Christian Atheletes. Dr. Joe Kenworthy, vice president of the Chamber of Commerce, welcomed the visitors.

Preceding Kelley's address, Mayor Bob Miller paid tribute to former mayor O. W. Lowrey and the late Oran D. Bates who were dedicated to the Gatesville library and instrumental in the planning of the new reading center. Mayor Miller called attention to a decoupage wall hanging of one of Bates' poems. The verse, entitled "Hands," told of children's hands and what they can do. Bates was principal of the Gatesville Elementary School for more than two decades. The memorial hangs in the children's reading area.

The benediction was given by John L. Anderson, lay speaker of the First United Methodist Church.

Members of the library board of trustees are Allen Bennett, Mrs. Andrew Kendrick, Mrs. Charles A. Reeve and Mrs. Edward B. Powell.

The air conditioned reading center was completed in April at a cost of \$76,843. Part of the funds were secured under the Library Service and Construction Act. Furnishings valued at \$9,306 arrived in early May and the library doors opened shortly after with a total of 17,000 books on the shelves and the capacity for 30,000 volumes.

Formerly a vacant garage and storage building for city equipment, the modern new facility includes 5,000 square

feet of floor space. The handsome limestone walls which were part of the original Chamlee building were innovated to give the interior a distinctive rugged look. Wall to wall carpet in a brownish gold shade further enhances the decor. The librarian's desk and check-out counter are located at the rear of the reading room near the night book depository.

Located in the rear of the library is the fashionable meeting room in which any club may hold their meetings. The auditorium area can be isolated from the library by locked doors. This enables clubs to meet after library hours without library doors unlocked to the rear entrance hallway, restrooms, a small kitchen and a water fountain is located off of the rear hallway. The Gatesville Garden Club will furnish the auditorium and use it for their regular club meetings.

At the rear entrance of the new facility, a cement walkway forms an amphitheater for children's story hour seating. The local garden club landscaped the grounds.

About 40 years ago, Coryell County began the steps to having a first-class public library such as the modern facility completed this spring.

This near half-century history began in the early 1930's when Gatesville's city council made possible for space in the present city hall to be set aside as a public library. The WPA also aided the local fathers and March of 1937 saw the actual opening.

## Masonic Rites Held For H.K. Jackson Sr.

Horace K. Jackson Sr., long-time Gatesville business and civic leader, died at his home at 2:30 p.m. Sunday of an apparent heart attack.

Funeral services were held Tuesday at 4 p.m. at the First Baptist Church, with Reverend Kenneth Patrick officiating. Burial was in the Masonic Cemetery.

Mr. Jackson was born September 2, 1899, at Sunset. He graduated from high school at Burkburnett, near Wichita Falls and also graduated from Baylor University. He served in the U. S. Army Infantry during World War I. He was married to Miss Bessie Earle Glider. They had lived in Seymour until moving to Gatesville in 1936.

Mr. Jackson had served 18 years as a trustee of Baylor University and was past president of the Baylor Extension Association. He was a former trustee of New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary. Jackson also served as a member of the State Board of Education.

A 33rd Degree Scottish Rite Mason, Jackson served as Grand Master of Texas Masons in 1947-48. He was director of the Scottish Rite Foundation at the time of his death.

Mr. Jackson was mayor of Gatesville from 1944-46. He served as president of the Gatesville Chamber of Commerce, and chairman of Gatesville Savings and Loan. Jackson also was a director of the Guaranty Bank and Trust Company. He served as past chairman of the board of deacons at the First Baptist Church.

Mr. Jackson was a partner in the Horace Jackson Insurance Agency.

Surviving are his wife; one son, Horace K. Jackson Jr., of Gatesville; one daughter, Mrs. John W. Reising of Houston; four grandchildren; two sisters, Mrs. Francis Hewitt of Seymour and Mrs. Haskell Stapleton of Petersburg; and one brother, Walter Jackson of Amarillo.

## One Man Sentenced To 8 Year Term

Judge Truman Roberts' 52nd District Court has been busy this week with criminal cases returned during the June term of the grand jury.

The court completed work on five criminal cases by press deadline Wednesday. James Bryer was convicted and sentenced to eight years in the Texas Department of Correction (TDC). Bryer was charged with assault with intent to murder in a recent incident at the State School.

Richard Willoughby received judgement of two years in TDC on charges of burglary but Judge Roberts has held up sentencing until a presentence investigation can be completed. Roberts could probate the sentence following the investigation.

Gregory D. Mitchell received a two year probated sentence on burglary charges from the court. In connection with the same burglary, Robert Alby was also given a 2 year probated sentence.

Gordan Neal Gieg was given probation for two years on a charge of possession of marijuana.

## Tuesday Night Burglary Nets \$144 At McCallister's 66

Tuesday night burglars entered McCallister's Phillips 66 Station on East Main Street and made off with an estimated \$144.30.

Sheriff's Officers noted that entry was made through a window at the west end of the building.

## VOTERS WILL DECIDE SEVEN AMMENDMENTS IN NOV.

Texas voters will again have the opportunity to apply more patches to the often-patched Texas constitution come General Election time in November.

Seven proposed amendments of the constitution will appear on the general ballots for consideration by the voters.

Five of the amendments appear in full form in today's Dispatch.

Probably the most controversial of the seven amendments will be No. 2 which would enable the legislature to pass a local option mixed beverage law.

The seven proposed amendments include -

No. 1 - Amending Article V, Section 1 - a, of the Texas Constitution, relating to removal, retirement, or censure of justices, judges, and justices of the peace under prescribed circumstances.

No. 2 - Amending Article XVI, Section 20, Subsection (a), to authorize the legislature to enact a mixed beverage law regulating the sale of mixed alcoholic beverages on a local option basis.

No. 3 - Authorizing the legislature to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm, and forest lands based upon the capability of the lands to support the raising of livestock or to produce farm and forest crops.

No. 4 - Amending Article III, Section 51 - b, Subsection (a), to reconstitute the State Building Commission as a three member appointed commission.

No. 5 - Authorizing any county to issue road bonds in an amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property in the county under certain conditions.

No. 6 - Amending Article XVI, Section 51, to increase the value of the homestead exempt from forced sale from \$5,000 to \$10,000.

No. 7 - Authorizing the legislature to provide for consolidating offices and functions of government and for performance of governmental functions by contract between political subdivisions in any county.

AUSTIN, Tex. -- Campaigns are shaping up on some of the seven proposed constitutional amendments to be voted on by Texans at the General Election on November 3.

While public interest centers on the liquor-by-the-drink amendment, there are other major alterations in the state's laws to be considered by the voters.

In their order on the ballot, these are:

1. Enlarge the powers of the Judicial Qualifications Commission to censure or remove lower court judges and justices of the peace as well as districts and appellate judges.
  2. Authorize the legislature to enact a law on the sale of mixed drinks.
  3. Provide for legislative establishment of a uniform method of tax assessment on ranch, farm and forest lands based on the capability of the lands to support the raising of livestock or production of farm and forest crops.
  4. Make the State Building Commission a three-member appointive agency.
  5. Permit counties to issue road bonds up to one-fourth of their assessed real property valuation on a majority vote.
  6. Make town or city homesteads of \$10,000 and less exempt from forced sale (presently set at \$5,000).
  7. Allow the legislature to provide for consolidating offices and functions of government and for performance of governmental functions by contract between the political subdivisions in any county.
- Texas voters have adopted 195 amendments to the 1876 constitution, over the years, and rejected 125.

DESEGREGATION SUITS THREATEN--Federal negotiators report that only a few of the 38 Texas school districts, called on the carpet concerning segregation, had satisfactory plans for complying with U. S. guidelines. They conducted a two-day conference with school officials here and gave most of them another week to try and work out something or face a lawsuit by the U. S. Justice Department.

Negotiators suggested "pairing" of adjoining neighborhood school districts to get better racial balance.

Lufkin, Marshall, Midland and Katy found no ground for agreement with the U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare and Justice Department negotiators. Some complained that federal officials raised a new issue.... that of intergrading Mexican-Americans, as well as blacks. Most want to continue their efforts to find a way to comply with suggested plans.

Palestine reached a tentative agreement on pairing plans involving two grades in each school and requiring limited busing.

COURTS SPEAK -- Alcoholic Beverage Commission's ruling governing private clubs are headed for a U. S. Supreme Court test after the highest state court finally upheld the agency's regulation. Club operators claim "king's -x" against the rules while their appeal is "diligently pursued."

Texas will be among the first states to challenge constitutionality of the new federal act extending voting rights to 16-year-olds.

State Supreme Court splitting 5-4, held that a business man could not collect a \$10,000 libel judgement against a Denton newspaper for a story, based on an accurate account of a statement made at a city council meeting where it was erroneously reported that the man had declared bankruptcy.

La Raza Unida Party brought a mandamus suit in the Supreme Court to require its candidates' names to be placed on the general election ballots in three South Texas counties (Dimit, LaSalle and Zavala). Supreme Court agreed with

In November of 1967, plans were submitted to the Texas State Library for a new facility. Financing of the library resulted with the matching of local funds and funds from the Library Service and Construction Act.

In the spring of 1970, all the efforts and planning over the years resulted in the opening of a new and modern Gatesville Public Library.

Perhaps, strongest support for the library program began with the organization of the Friends of the Library in 1961.

This local group is headed by Mrs. R. M. Arnold Jr. Other leaders include Mrs. Thomas G. Stewart, vice-president; Mrs. H. K. Jackson Jr., secretary; Mrs. Erle Powell, treasurer; Mrs. James McLean, children's story hour chairman; and Mrs. L. C. McKemie, membership chairman.

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (HJR28) General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 52, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 52. (a) Except as otherwise provided by this section, the Legislature shall have no power to authorize any county, city, town or other political corporation or subdivision of the State to lend its credit or to grant public money or thing of value in aid of, or to any individual, association or corporation whatsoever, or to become a stockholder in such corporation, association or company.

"(b) Under Legislative provision, any county, any political subdivision of a county, any number of adjoining counties, or any political subdivision of the State, or any defined district now or hereafter to be described and defined within the State of Texas, and which may or may not include, towns, villages or municipal corporations, upon a vote of two-thirds majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of such dis-

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"(b) Under Legislative provision, any county, any political subdivision of a county, any number of adjoining counties, or any political subdivision of the State, or any defined district now or hereafter to be described and defined within the State of Texas, and which may or may not include, towns, villages or municipal corporations, upon a vote of two-thirds majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of such dis-

roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof.

"(c) Notwithstanding the provisions of Subsection (b) of this Section, bonds may be issued by any county in an amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property in the county, for the construction, maintenance, and operation of macadamized, graveled, or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of the county, and without the necessity of further or amendatory legislation. The county may levy and collect taxes to pay the interest on the bonds as it becomes due and to provide a sinking fund for redemption of the bonds."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment authorizing any county, and without the necessity of further or amendatory legislation, to issue road bonds in an amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property in the county."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJR10) General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Subsection (a), Section 20, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"(a) The Legislature shall have the power to enact a Mixed Beverage Law regulating the sale of mixed alcoholic beverages on a local option election basis. The Legislature shall also have the power to regulate the manufacture, sale, possession and transportation of intoxicating liquors, including the power to establish a State Monopoly on the sale of distilled liquors.

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature." Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 3, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "Repeal of the prohibition against open saloons found in Section 20, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR 22) General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Subsection (a), Section 64, Article III, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 64. (a) The Legislature may by special statute provide for consolidation of governmental offices and functions of government of any one or more political subdivisions comprising or located within any county. Any such statute shall require an election to be held within the political subdivisions affected thereby with approval by a majority of the voters in each of these subdivisions, under such terms and conditions as the Legislature may require."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for consolidating governmental offices and functions and allowing political subdivisions to contract for performance of governmental functions in any county."

# Back Nine Is Challenge To Centex Golfers

The new nine holes adjacent to Gatesville County Club will offer the golfer a test of his skills not found in Central Texas.

Coupled with the CC course the complete 18 holes has extreme situations for the golfer to encounter.

Looking at the LTC nine holes, the golfer starts on a five par four. The tee shot will land in an up-slope and normally leave the golfer 150 to 170 yards for the second shot. The approach shot will be to a elevated green with a lake behind the green. Trees flank the green with no trouble in front of the green.

Next comes a wide open par 3 hole with the green completely visible from the tee. A prevailing wind will help the golfer reach the green but stopping the ball on the green can be a problem.

The second hole is a medium length par four with a dog leg left at about 100 yards from the green. The tee shot has an out of bounds to the right and the approach shot has water to the left of the green and a steep embankment at the rear of the green.

Next is a beautiful par 4 teeing from high on top a lake dam. The elevated tee still does not give the golfer a view of the green or the fairway. The wind will have the golfer playing to the left side but hidden from view, the fairway slopes to the left in the driving area. The approach shot will be with a short to medium iron with a big green ready to "take the

shot." Don't miss the green to the right or rear or you will be out of bounds.

The challenger is next and it measures 450 yards par 4 with a prevailing wind from right to left and slightly in the face of the golfer off the tee. The "garden spot" is small and hard to hit right at the corner of a dogleg left at the crest of a hill. The fairway slopes to the right and the golfer is trying to hit to the left. Good luck! Second shots will range from a five iron to a 3 wood with a long carry over a deep ravine the primary obstacle. A "snap hook" and you could be in the water to the left of the green. Use enough club to get to the green on the second shot.

The grand canyon hole is next and measures about 160 yards. On one side you have a tee box on the other side a green (with trees) and in between no mountain goats could live. Seriously, the 160 yard shot is into the wind and a tree on each side of the front of the green protects the pin. Golfers will hit the ball straight here or have the ball bouncing around in a tree. Pin placements to the right or left will force the golfer to hit a high shot.

The next hole appears to be an Indianapolis Corner for 500 yards on the fairway banks to the left into a deep ravine. The hole players down wind and the drive should be played out to the right to allow for the slope of the fairway. A good second shot will set up an easy birdie four and a possible eagle three.

From the top of LTC dam the next hole lays below the golfer with all its dangers exposed. Again the fairway slopes left into the ravine and a slight dog leg right makes the fairway seem impossible to hit. Approach shots must be guarded away from the steep slope at the left of the green, but to hit the ball to the right means the golfer must carry a sandtrap.

Another down wind five par should be easy here but LTC Lake flanks the right side of the hole for the last 200 yards. The drive must be placed away from a tree dead center of the fairway about 210 yards from the tee here. The second shot is blind for the golfer but hitting the ball a little left is the best placement.

If you follow these directions and still have trouble take a lesson, practice and

play the course every day for a year, without keeping score.

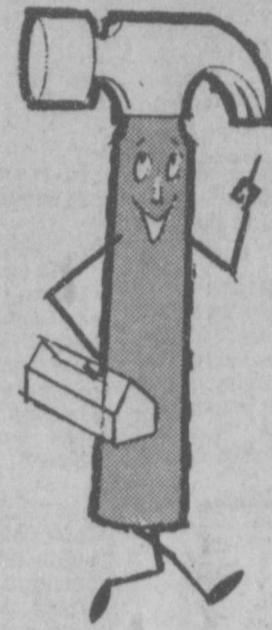

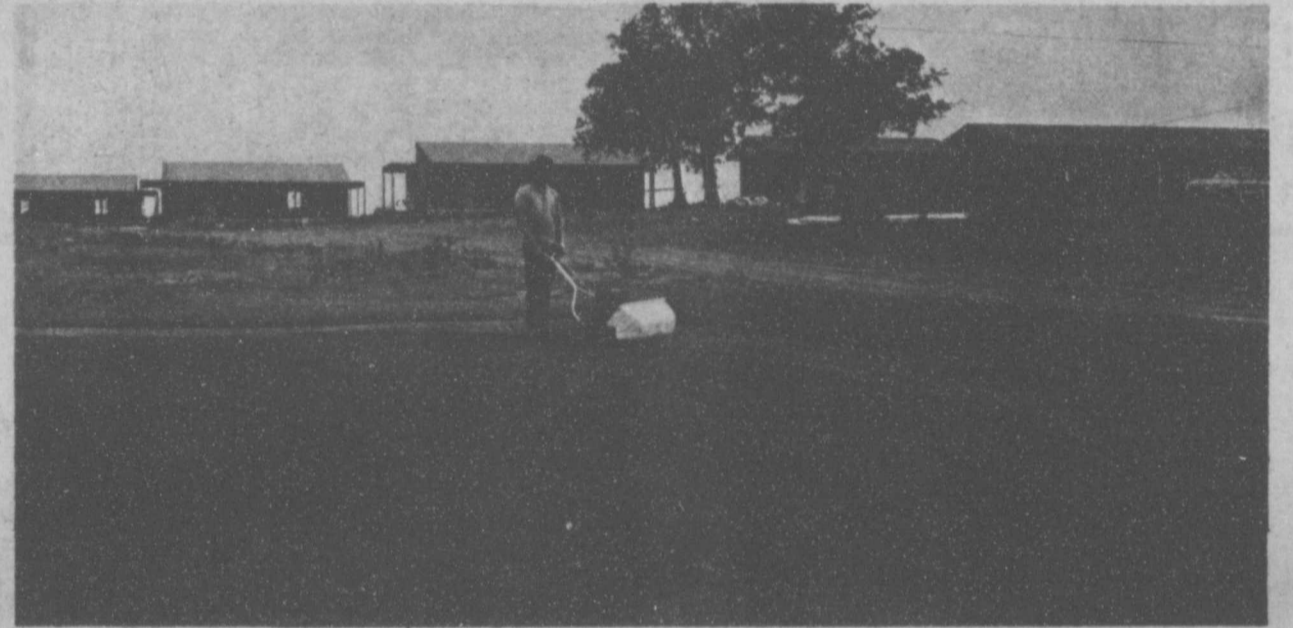

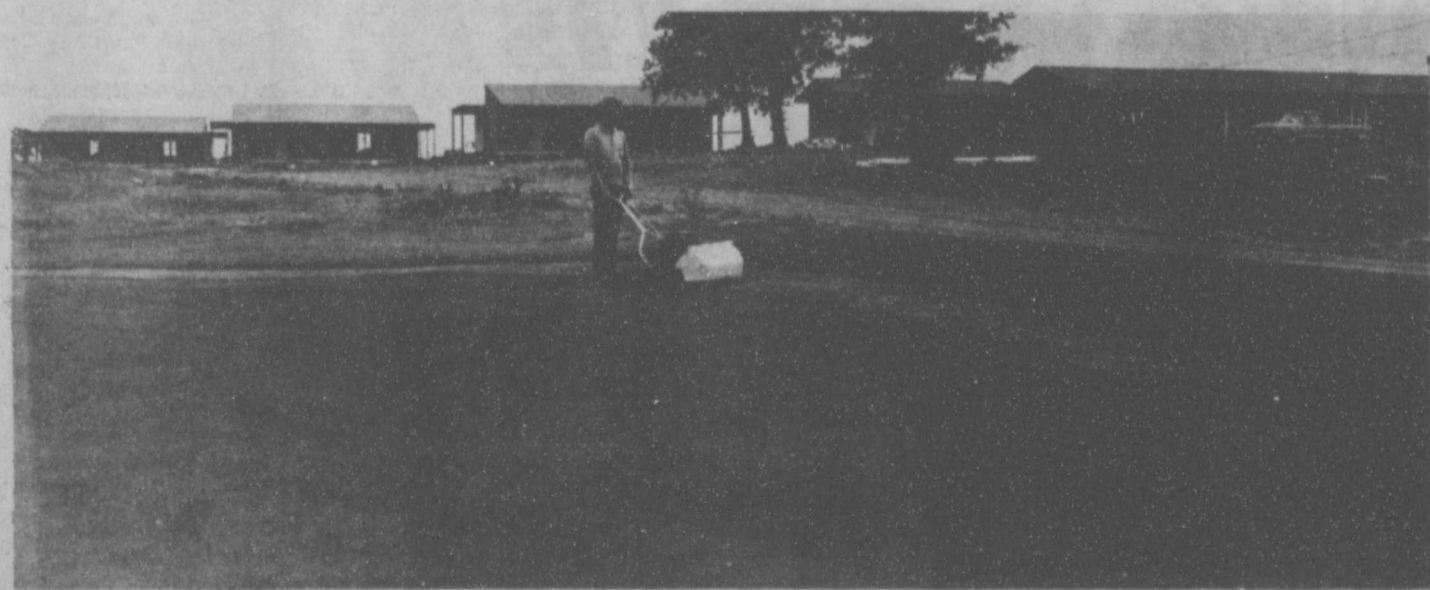

### LEMON TEA CAKES 1970 STYLE

| 1/4 lb. oleo--melted    | 2 lemon rinds           |
| 2 cups sugar            | juice of 1 lemon        |
| 1 egg                   | 2 1/2 cups sifted flour |
| 1/2 cup pale dry sherry |                         |

Blend oleo, sugar and eggs; beat well. In a blender, trappi one whole pitted lemon. Add sherry. Alternately add flour and lemon mixture to egg, sugar and oleo mixture. Mix well and beat until smooth.

Drop by spoonful on a teflon cookie sheet and bake for about 15 minutes (or until done) at 400 degrees.

| 1 tsp. salt     | 2 cups finely grated carrots |

Sift dry ingredients. Mix eggs, cooking oil and carrots together and add dry ingredients. Beat well and bake in 2 layers at 350 degrees for 45 minutes.

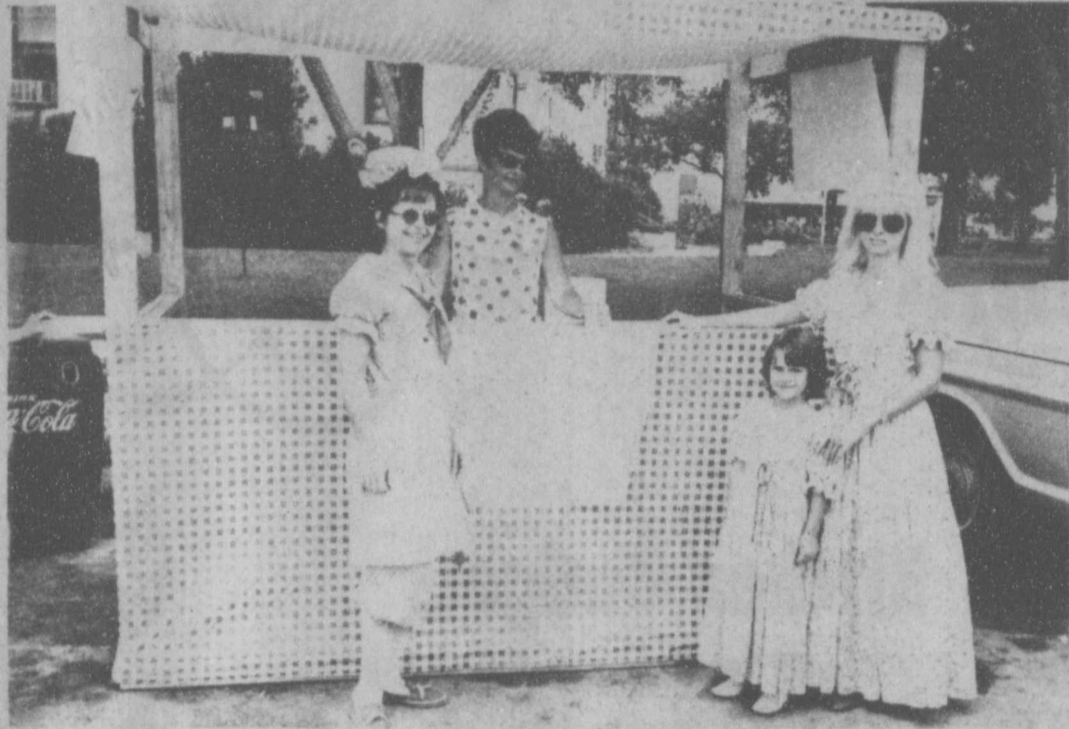

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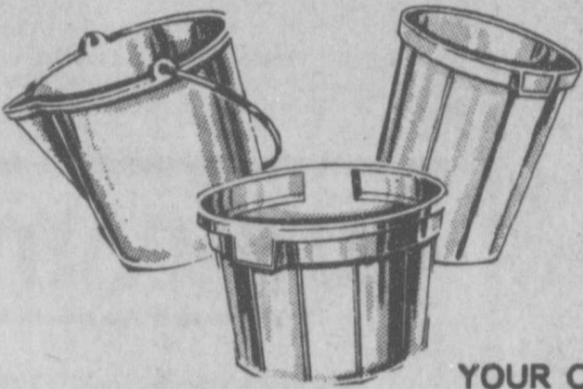

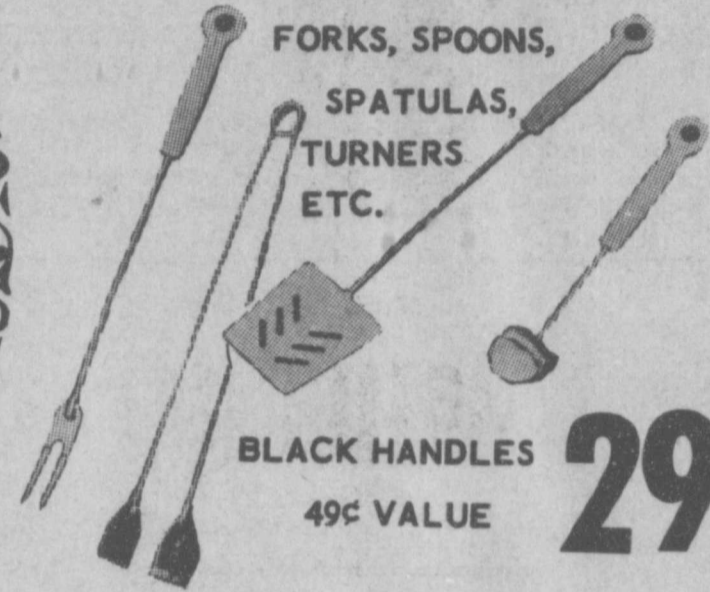
