A. A. A. NEWS

It is apparent that there is quite a lot of confusion among many farmers of the county regarding measurements of 1939 crops under the farm program. It is believed that a restatement of certain important facts regarding compliance will clear the situation for most of these men.

There are reporters in each community measuring crops now. One of these reporters will be at your farm as soon as possible to measure the farm. When the reporter checks the farm, the farmer or a representative of the farmer must be present. The reporter is making every effort to contact the farmer several days ahead of time in order that the farmer may know when to expect the reporter. However, all farmers should realize that the reporter may be later or earlier at that farm according to the speed which the reporter measured the preceding farm. When a reporter once visits a farm and finds that the farmer is not ready for measurement or does not find the farmer at home it is likely that the reporter will not be able to be back for several days or weeks for the reason that a schedule is used by reporters and cannot be easily changed.

Just as quickly as the map is returned to the office, acreage will be calculated and a report mailed to the farmer. If a report has not been mailed the acreage has not been calculated and it will not be possible for the farmer to be given a report until such calculations are made, therefore, we are requesting that the farmer not inquire about measurements at County office until he has received a report from the office.

When a report has been received by the farmer he should check over the report carefully. If any allotment is overplanted and the farmer wishes to destroy the excess acreage of crops he should call at the office and request a recheck to show the destroyed crops. If a farmer is dissatisfied with the measurements he may request that the whole farm be measured. When the farm is measured a deposit must be made by the farmer. This deposit will be returned if it is found that the original measurements are in error. No deposit is required only for showing destroyed excess cotton or additional layout.

REA APPROVED FOR COUNTY

The Rural Electrification Administration in Washington on Tuesday accepted the contract of J. E. Morgan & Son for the construction of 220 miles of high tension electric lines in Parmer County, according to H. V. Hennen of Hereford, manager of the Deaf Smith REA.

Mr. Hennen telephone The Tribune immediately after receiving a wire from Washington announcing that the contract had been approved by the Rural Electrification Administration. He said a work order had been issued to the contractors and that "work must begin within the next ten days."

The successful bidder on the contract, J. E. Morgan & Son, are now engaged in Bailey county and Mr. Hennen expressed the opinion that construction work on the Parmer county project would get under way early next week.

Important Meetings Called

In the conversation, Mr. Hennen announced two meetings to be held in Parmer county during this week and he urged every property owner who is to be served by the new project to arrange to attend one of these meetings.

The first will be held at Friona at 7:30 on Friday evening of this week at the school building, and the other will be at the courthouse in Farwell on Saturday afternoon at 2:30.

"Getting the house wiring done, and getting it done now, is the most important thing we are facing," Mr. Hennen said, and stressed the importance of every man in the county who has contracted to receive service through the REA to be on hand at one of these meetings.

"We will have our engineers at these meetings, ready to answer any and all questions, and from now on we must work fast," Mr. Hennen insisted.

Mr. Hennen called attention to a provision in the contract which provides that the lines will not be energized until at least eighty percent of those contracting for service have completed their wiring and are actually "tied in" to the lines.

He estimated that only sixty days would be required to build the high tension lines over the county.

The Parmer County project has been obtained as an extension to the Deaf Smith County project, and will serve approximately 400 rural homes in Parmer and Castro counties.

scraper structures stand empty while their owners use the trench silo. It is so cheap that anyone can have it. It is less laborious and expensive to fill, and the ensilage can be fed out with less labor and time.

If an ensilage cutter is available use it, and pack the cut ensilage thoroughly. Cut ensilage costs a little more to store, but is less wasteful, and takes less time and trouble to feed out. If no ensilage cutter is available, store whole stalks, lengthwise of the trench, lapping them shingle-fashion, and reversing the heads and butts with each layer to level. If well watered and packed it will be just as good ensilage as if the stalks were cut, but it will have to be "cut out" from day to day with an axe or a special heavy tool made for the purpose.

Ensilage is the best substitute for green pasture, but of course is not a complete feed.

To get the most from it some dry hay and cottonseed meal should be used.

Don't build a trench silo with perpendicular walls. Sloped walls prevent the ensilage from shrinking away from the sides and causing spoilage.

HEALTH NOTES

AUSTIN—In spite of increased popular education on the cancer problem during the last decade, many false ideas regarding this disease still persist. Too often such conceptions are the basis of delay in diagnosis and treatment. Obviously, figures cannot be compiled, but it can be stated safely that a fair proportion of the thirty thousand preventable cancer deaths now occurring annually in the United States could be avoided if these mistaken notions were corrected," the State Health Department believes.

"The following facts are pertinent. (1) Cancer is not contagious; the victim cannot give it to any other person. (2) Cancer is not a blood disease. (3) Diet is not a cause of preventive of cancer; vegetarians and meat-eaters are equally susceptible. (4) Aluminum cooking utensils do not cause cancer. (5) Constipation does not cause cancer. (6) Mental worry will not influence the development of cancer. (7) No age is free from cancer; babies are born with it, and the oldest persons can be its victims. However, it is largely a disease of adult life, occurring chiefly between the ages of forty and seventy. (8) Self-medication is a waste of time and frequently fatal because of the delay involved. (9) Serums, vaccines, colored lights, patent medicines, pastes, salves, and diets are valueless. (10) Quacks and their super-claims, through false hopes and delayed diagnosis, cause many avoidable cancer deaths but do not effect cures. (11) No warning comes from pain. In the early stages and in the pre-cancerous condition, there is no pain or conscious health impairment. The one exception is bone cancer.

"With a full appreciation of the above facts and the prompt seeking of medical advice when there are signs of cancer, it is conceivable that many thousands of deaths from this cause could be prevented.

"The danger signals are any lump in the breast or other part of the body; any persistent sore, particularly on the face or mouth; any unusual discharge or bleeding from any part of the body, such as vomiting of blood, passage of blood from the bowels, or unusual bleeding of any bodily passage, especially after middle age; and chronic indigestion. Procrastination in the face of any of these signs is dangerous and may even be fatal.

"It is true that any one of these symptoms may be caused by a condition other than cancer; however, this fact is no excuse for delay in diagnosis, so that prompt treatment procedures may be instituted, for if cancer is diagnosed sufficiently early, the results of treatment are usually good.

Friona Weather

The weather for the past week has done very little worthy of comment so far as Friona and the immediate vicinity are concerned, but a few good showers, some that might almost be called rains, have fallen many miles out in different directions.

We had one or two very warm days—last Friday, for instance—but the high temperature of those days was overcome by a cool norther, that drifted in upon us Monday night, accompanied by a sprinkle of rain at Friona, and a fairly good rain in the Rhea and Lazbuddy communities.

Saturday and Sunday were both comfortably cool as was also Tuesday and Wednesday, but not enough rain has yet been received to satisfy the present needs for moisture in any locality. Wednesday morning is fair and still with not a cloud in sight.

OFF ON VACATION TRIP

Mr. and Mrs. R. H. Kinsley departed one day last week for their summer vacation trip, which, it is reported, will take them into the States of New Mexico, Colorado and probably Utah and Wyoming.

Just how long the Kinsleys will be away from home is not definitely known, but will probably be two or three weeks.

ZEKE SEZ

AUSTIN (Special)—Wild and weird are the assertions of some of our prominent officials and newspaper writers in connection with crude oil price reductions announced by certain companies buying oil in the Southwest. Self-contradictory statements and editorials have puzzled the average citizen. As a local man says, "Nobody will know anything about it when the politicians get through talking". Colonel Ernest O. Thompson, one-time candidate for governor and now chairman of the inter-states oil commission, referred to the price cut as a "100 million dollar steal," then admitted, in the same speech, that many buyers are maintaining the old price. He asked Governor O'Daniel to call a special session to study the problem, to which the Governor aptly replied: "That is your job. Take care of it." Since the State receives between 11 and 12 millions in oil production taxes, the 15-day shutdown will cost the state four or five times as much as an entire year of the price cut which the shutdown is designed to cure. Just now a 5-cent tax, advocated by Thomson, will help the producers and the million Texans who depend on the industry for a living is hard to figure as they would be losers that much more. While the Humble Company is now being accused of everything bringing about the crisis, it is interesting to read a statement issued by President H. C. Weiss of that company in which he reveals the company had kept its posted price up for more than a year after lower prices were paid for Illinois crude, which is now producing 300,000 barrels daily. "On August 11, the total volume of oil moving at prices below those of the Humble, was approximately 668,000 barrels," says President Weiss. "The price of oil, like that of other commodities, is subject to change with market conditions. To continue in business, we cannot over a long period of time pay higher prices than competitors." It will have to be admitted, in fairness to all, that the Humble Company has far too much at stake in its investments in Texas to wish to maintain the low price any longer than is absolutely necessary.

One of the biggest pieces of news coming from the investigation of fire insurance rates is that over 300 towns in Texas those with total premiums less than \$20,000 annually will benefit from 10 percent in sev-
