My first gripe with commercials (I do watch them) is that most are too long. My second gripe: too many programs, instead of giving a preview of next week's show, are now slipping in a preview of next week's commercial.







The USDA market news office at Fort Worth reported late last ent is far above average prices now being received by farmers.

Beef cattle are now averaging \$16.30, while parity is \$21.30. Prices are 77 per cent of parity. Calves are selling at 74 per cent of parity. Farmers currently get an average of \$17.20 with parity figured at \$23.30. Hogs at 77 per cent of parity show a current return of \$16.40 against parity of \$21.30. Lambs at 78 per cent of parity show a return of \$18.20 against parity of \$23.30. Wool shows 79 per cent return, with prices averaged at 46.9 cents against effective parity of 59.2 ents per pound.

Open Strongly. Trade was active and prices fuly steady to strong in the sheep barns at Fort Worth Monday. Shipper and order buyer demand was strong, and feeder classes were getting more active attention. Breeding age ewes were again in good demand.

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
