## Congressman Reminds Farmers of Exemption On Gasoline Tax

Congressman Omar Burleson reminds all farmers of their exemption from the Federal excise tax on gasoline used for farm purposes. This is provided under Public Law 466, recently passed in this session of the Congress.

The law provides that the effective date of such exemption shall be January 1, 1956. Refunds for excise taxes paid from that date through June 30, 1956 will be made as quickly as possible. Thereafter, refunds will be made on an annual basis covering a one-year period from July 1 to the following June 30. The Internal Revenue Service states that accurate records must be kept by individual farmers for claiming these refunds, and gives the following instructions:

"To get his refund, a farmer will have to file his claim after June 30 and before October 1. Claims are to be made on Form 2240 and are to be filed with the U. S. District Director of Internal Revenue for the farmer's district. The form will be available after June 1 at Internal Revenue offices, County Agricultural Agents offices, and at many banks and post offices. Refunds will be limited to the Federal tax on gasoline which is used by a farmer for farming purposes."

The Congressman further explains that a farmer may also request a refund of the tax on gasoline used on his farm by a custom operator, or by a neighbor in connection with cultivating, raising or harvesting any agricultural crop. No refunds are collectible on highway transportation. Farmers are also given special relief from the Federal excise tax on diesel fuel and special motor fuels used on a farm for farming purposes.

## SOCIAL SECURITY OFFICER TO VISIT MERIDIAN MAY 22

Farmers who are age 65 or older and who paid social security taxes for the year 1955 should apply for social security benefits of they expect to pay social security taxes for the year 1956, according to Ed Winslow, field representative of the Waco Social Security office.

They should bring with them the following: (1) A copy of their 1955 Income Tax Return; (2) Their cancelled check, money order receipt or other evidence showing the tax was paid; (3) Records and receipts for gross income thus far in 1956; (4) Some old record to establish their age. They should not bother to get a delayed birth certificate.

Mr. Winslow will be in Meridian at the County Treasurer's Office between the hours of 10 a.m. and noon on May 22.

Tommie did not like something about Texas, and so started back to her native heath. 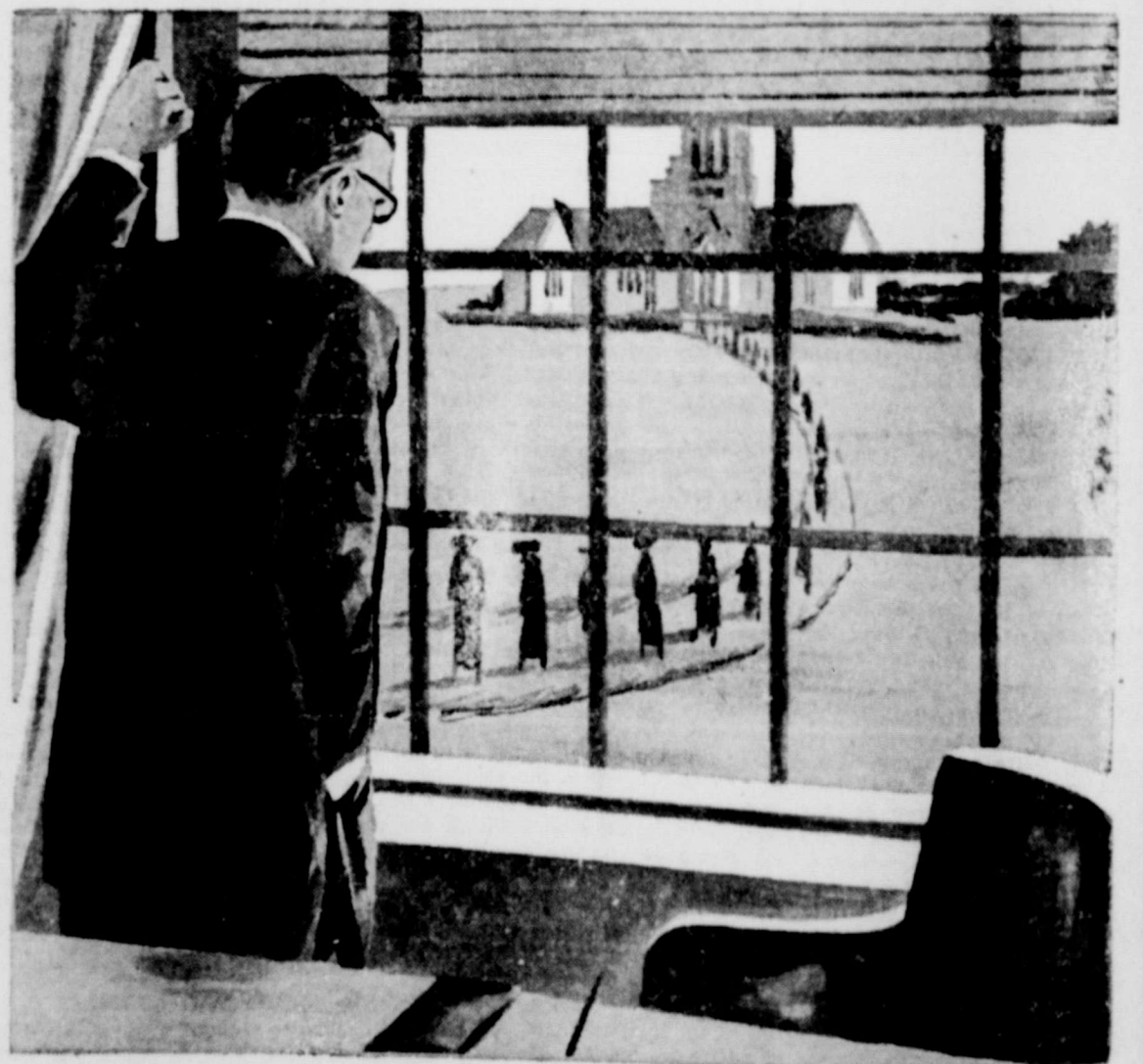

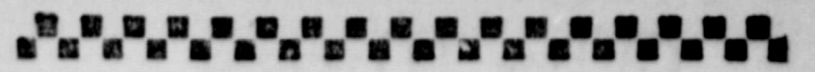
Jerry Lackey, a 1955 graduate of Hamilton High School, was honored by the agricultural students of Abilene Christian College recently.

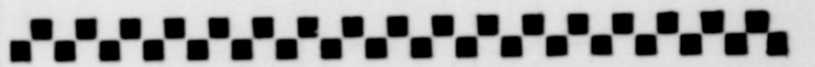

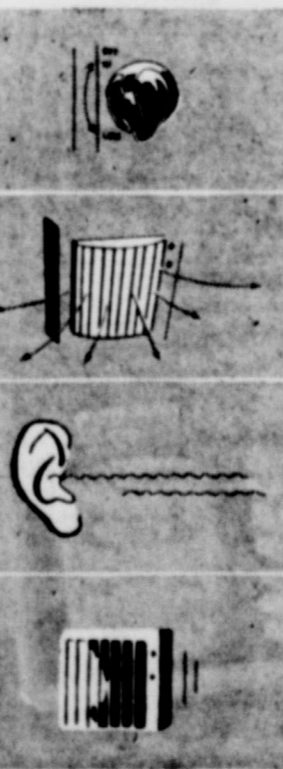

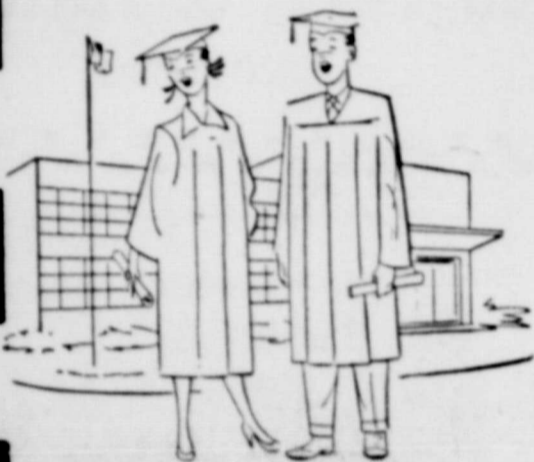

### HOUSEHOLD HINTS—

"DUSTLESS" DUST CLOTH... Ever push dust from one spot to another with a cloth that refuses to pick it up? Solve the problem by making your own "dustless" dust cloth. You will need a square of jersey cloth (about 16 inches is best), a clean coffee can, with tight fitting lid, pastewax or furniture polish. Apply paste wax or furniture polish to the sides and bottom of the can. Place clean cloth inside close lid tightly and allow to stand for 24 hours. The cloth will absorb the oil evenly and be ready to use.

Depressions left in rugs by heavy furniture can be raised by steaming with a hot iron pressed on a damp cloth and then brushing with a stiff brush.

Does your shower and bathroom tile have a grimy look after so much hard wear? That dirty grey color may come from soap scum. You can remove the scum by rubbing a paste of baking soda and water over the dirty areas. Some types of water softeners work well, too. After cleaning, rinse the walls thoroughly and wipe dry. Never use harsh abrasives or strong acid solutions on bathroom tiles, for you may scratch the surface.

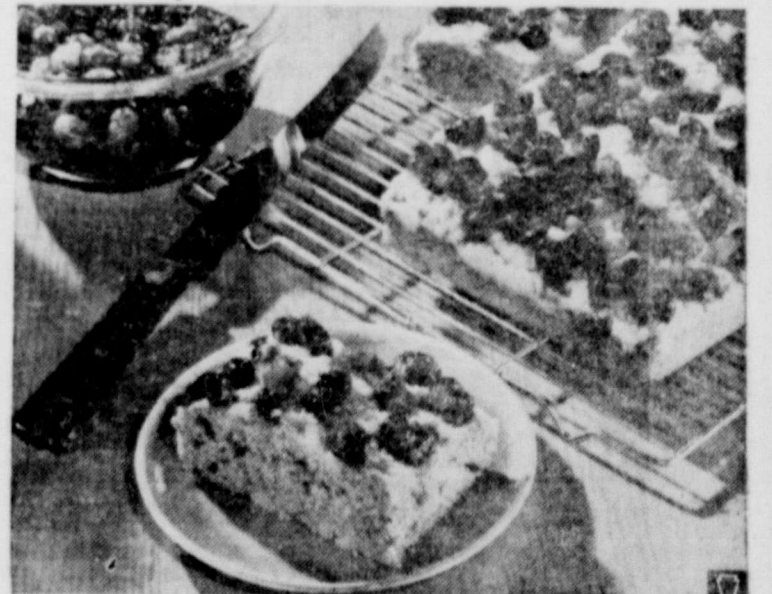

**COUNTY AGENT REPORTS**  
By E. B. LAWRENCE

J. H. Oakley, about three miles south of Hico on 281, set out about an acre of coastal bermuda grass sprigs some three years ago. The grass was put on a sandy field and although it has been dry, the grass has made a good start. In fact, it has done so good Oakley is ready to start digging and selling some this spring.

This is the only source of supply we have in the county at this time. Don't know what he will ask for it but I'm sure it will be in line with prices elsewhere. Oakley worked for the Wolfe nursery for many years and has been back on his farm only a few months. He tells me he is willing to do some pecan budding and grafting for those who have small jobs to be done, but he doesn't want to undertake large groves. So if you've got a tree or two you'd like to get budded, get in touch with J. H. Oakley, Route 6, Hico.

Avil Reich, Carlton, has made a good start with the coastal bermuda sprigs he put out on his place this spring. Avil has one of those small bottom places on his farm like so many others, one that is pretty wet (at times) and hard to have a profitable crop. It is fine soil and capable of growing an abundant supply of grass.

He set out about two bushels of the sprigs and I believe he got about 58 per cent take. He plans to sprig about six acres and that he has out now will be his source of sprigs from now on. In doing this work, Avil dug about 30 or 40 holes with a grubbing hoe, three to four feet apart and about 8 inches deep. He then filled each hole with water and after the holes had been watered he came back and placed a sprig of grass in each

hole, covering it well and packing it down firmly. He was careful to leave a part of each sprig above the ground. As a result of his careful work he got an excellent survival of sprigs.

Many times one is hungry when they think they are tired, so take a few minutes off each morning and about mid-afternoon for a light lunch. This will make lots of difference in your efficiency.

Excessive speed is the number one cause of tractor accidents. The improper use of wheel brakes, rough roads or a quick turn can bring tragedy if the speed is too high. Far too many teen-age tractor operators are involved in accidents. Work with those youngsters and give them instructions and supervision until they are fully qualified. A tractor cannot carry extra passengers safely and ranking high as a cause of accidents is the extra rider. Children, in parti-

cular, often meet with serious injury or death as extra riders. About a third of tractor fatalities occur on public roads while many more happen on private lanes or drives. The heavier the traffic on a public road, the greater the hazard.

Plan farm work so as to reduce the exposure of slow moving tractors and farm machinery to traffic hazards. If machinery must be on the road after dark, be sure it is properly lighted. White lights in front and red lights on the rear. Reflective material applied to tractors and machinery is an added safeguard. Above all, think before doing any job with the tractor. It can be a killer.

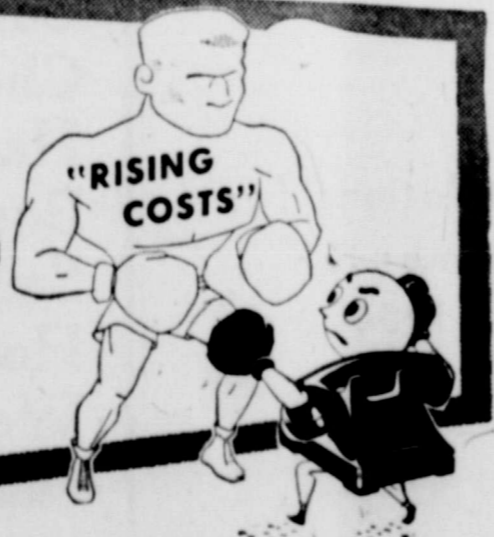
