> Tahoka, Texas July 9, 1956.

I should have written you before now and you may print this in your paper as so many folks I know are wondering about me since my accident.

I stayed 11 days in the hospital and I have been here in Tahoka since the 28th of June.

I am making my home at present with Paul and Opal Pittman. They wanted me to stay in their home until I am strong enough to go to my home, here in town. I have not been to my home yet, as I need to get stronger first. The strain would be too much for me now and would hurt me more than it would help. I will wait awhile before I go

The Pittmans are certainly nice to me and they see that I get plenty of rest. I hardly ever dress before mid-afternoon then I go to the station and check up. I do not know just when I can resume my duties at the station, as my legs are pretty weak. I have not used my cane to walk in 5 or 6 days.

My knees were hurt on the dash, the steering wheel hurt my chest. Something hit me in the mouth that caused a cut in my lower lip that required 9 stitches. My lower plates were crushed and the top one broken, but can be repaired. I will have a new lower plate made. I had a cerebral concussion that was al most fatal. I did not know when I was taken to the hospital.. I have done real well so far.

I wish to thank each and everyone in Hico for the many things they did during my time of sorrow and was told of the large crowd attending Letha's funeral.

I will continue my business here in Tahoka. My business in very good hands during my time off recovering, and is going mighty good.

I realize I will be very lonely but I have James Lee and his family to live for, and I am only 107 miles from them. It has never crossed my

mind to give up. My faith in our Lord and the desire to do good is much comfort to me. Buck, I could write and write, but I must close.





Here the surviving spouse gets full ownership of one-third, and the children and their descendants inherit the balance.

Now suppose your husband or wife survives, but there are no surviving children or their descendants. In this case the surviving spouse inherits all of the personal property involved.

With regard to real estate, the Friday & Saturday, urvivor obtains full title to onehalf, and the other half is divided between your mother and father, if both survive you. If only one of them survives, he or she receives only half of this portion, and the other half (or one-fourth or the entire real estate) will be divided among your brothers and sisters; (and their descendants) who survive. If there are no surviving brothers and sisters and their descendants, then the one surviving parent inherits the full one-half.
