HERE IN HICO

So many people have been so concerned about the condition of D. R. (Ras) Proffitt of Tahoka, who was seriously injured in a car accident several weeks ago, that we thought perhaps the following letter would answer the many inquiries. We received the letter too late for last week's issue and are publishing it herewith, with his permission:

Tahoka, Texas
July 9, 1936.

Dear Buck:

I should have written you before now and you may print this in your paper as so many folks I know are wondering about me since my accident.

I stayed 11 days in the hospital and I have been here in Tahoka since the 28th of June.

I am making my home at present with Paul and Opal Pittman. They wanted me to stay in their home until I am strong enough to go to my home, here in town. I have not been to my home yet, as I need to get stronger first. The strain would be too much for me now and would hurt me more than it would help. I will wait awhile before I go home.

The Pittmans are certainly nice to me and they see that I get plenty of rest. I hardly ever dress before mid-afternoon then I go to the station and check up. I do not know just when I can resume my duties at the station, as my legs are pretty weak. I have not used my cane to walk in 5 or 6 days.

My knees were hurt on the dash, the steering wheel hurt my chest. Something hit me in the mouth that caused a cut in my lower lip that required 9 stitches. My lower plates were crushed and the top one broken, but can be repaired. I will have a new lower plate made. I had a cerebral concussion that was almost fatal. I did not know when I was taken to the hospital. I have done real well so far.

I wish to thank each and everyone in Hico for the many things they did during my time of sorrow and was told of the large crowd attending Letha's funeral.

I will continue my business here in Tahoka. My business in very good hands during my time off recovering, and is going mighty good.

I realize I will be very lonely but I have James Lee and his family to live for, and I am only 107 miles from them.

It has never crossed my mind to give up. My faith in our Lord and the desire to do good is much comfort to me.

Buck, I could write and write, but I must close.

Hico Youth Center to Open Officially Tuesday Evening

The Hico Youth Center will open Tuesday, July 24, and will be opened each Saturday and Tuesday nights as long as interest justifies.

BECOMES COOPERATOR IN BOSQUE SCS

Arthur Guinn, nine miles north of Iredell, became a cooperater with the Soil Conservation District with the past week. He plans three waterways this year which will be seeded in the spring of 1937 to KR Bluestem. Guinn will construct about two miles of terraces which will have a permanent pasture outlet. His crop residue will be left within about four inches of the soil. He plans to use legumes in rotation with his crops.

Oil Interest Displayed By Drilling and Leasing Activity

Increased oil interest in the Hico vicinity has been shown the past two weeks with two locations staked.

H. Curtis Plumly Jr. of Beaumont staked No. 1 W. P. Lynch, 330 feet from west and 1,100 feet from north lines of a 106-acre lease in the William Riddle sur-

vey, six miles southeast of Hico in Bosque County.

Contract on the well calls for 5,500 feet.

Drilling had passed the 3,500 foot mark late Wednesday afternoon.

Another wildcat, Humble Oil & Refining Company's No. 1 Jim D. Wright, et ux, was started Saturday. Permit depth applied for is 2,500 feet with rotary.

Location is two miles north of Hico. It is 330 feet from the north

and 1,980 feet from the east line of Wm. Kelly Survey.

Drilling operations were reported at 1,500 feet Wednesday noon, with difficulties being encountered in drilling.

Other Leasing Activities.

Humble Oil & Refining Company has taken assignments on a block of oil and gas leases totaling 4,639 acres in Hamilton County.

The block on which the assignments were bought is north of Hamilton in the Olin, Fairy and Hico areas.

The latest assignments makes a total of more than 45,000 acres of leases taken by major oil companies in Hamilton County during the past six months.

It Happened Here or Near

A new Billy the Kid story has appeared, entitled "The Tragic Days of Billy the Kid." The author is Frazier Hunt, and if you have an extra five dollar bill that is burning your pocket you can buy the volume, no doubt in Fort Worth or Dallas book stores. This is just one of numerous stories of Billy the Kid.

Billy the Kid has become interesting especially to Hico people because Brushy Bill Roberts in the last year of his life laid claim to the title of Billy the Kid and said he was the Kid. A Texas attorney wrote a book to verify the claim of Brushy Bill, and prepared all the necessary papers in the presentation of an appeal to the Governor of New Mexico to grant a full pardon to Brushy Bill as the real Billy the Kid. The Governor was not convinced of the identity of Brushy Bill as Billy the Kid and the pardon was denied. Soon thereafter Brushy Bill died on the streets here.

This book of Frazier Hunt's tells of the origin of Billy the Kid in Arizona, where at the age of seventeen he killed "Windy" Cahill, a blacksmith, and then fled to the wilds of the Rio Grande in New Mexico. His real name was Henry McCarty, but he was also called Henry (and also Austin) Antrim, because his mother, who had been widowed, in 1873 married W. H. Antrim at Santa Fe, N.M., in 1874, when Billy was fourteen years old. A year later he was in trouble with the law, being accused of being a petty thief and as a "no good loafer."

Following that first brush with the law, Billy managed to obtain a living by hanging around cow outfits, mining camps, and Army posts. The next heard of him he was a member of a party of horse thieves and was hunted in the vicinity of Mesilla Park, a town near Las Cruces, up the Rio Grande from El Paso.

Soon after that he changed his name, for security reasons, to William H. Bonney, and again soon after that became known as Billy the Kid, a nickname bestowed on him by his associates and

peace officers that sought him.

Then follows the part of his story best known as "The Lincoln County War." During that hectic period he killed a man named Chapman, and after strenuous efforts on the part of Lincoln county officers he was caught and jailed at the county seat, the town of Lincoln. I have been in that town and I pointed out to me the jail from which he escaped wearing irons and rode into the rough country around El Capitan mountains and off him by a country blacksmith. An old-timer of the region pointed out some of the Kid's hiding places while he was there, and then as we went on to Tularosa he pointed out where Bill was later retaken a prisoner.

On that same vacation trip I was taken to Billy the Kid Spring, which is on, or in, a draw that runs into the Pecos River from the east, some forty miles west of Elida, where Pat Garrett, the sheriff of Lincoln County, slipped up on the Kid and his pal and captured them. How many times that wily outlaw was captured and escaped is hard to remember, but it was a number of times.

Perhaps you remember enough of the story to recall that Pat Garrett, a determined officer, trailed Billy the Kid to Fort Sumner and killed him in the room where he was visiting his girl friend.

His grave is to be seen there at Fort Sumner now.

Brushy Bill Roberts could not have been Billy the Kid, for the facts do not jibe. Doc Kerley used to see him come into Carlton from his home in that community, riding on the wagon of his father. And Dude Fisher, now deceased, verified the statement of Doc Kerley. It begins to look as if Brushy Bill had told so often that he was Billy the Kid that he got to believing that he was really that bad man. You know that such things do occur. Why, once in my teens, I had a sweetie that told me how good looking and noble I appeared and for short periods I would believe her. Of course when I looked in the mirror I knew she was mistaken—and I still know she was.

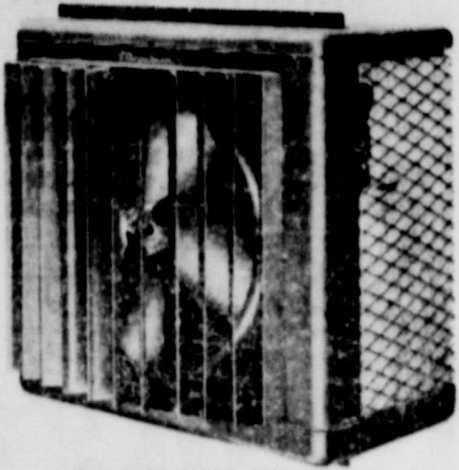

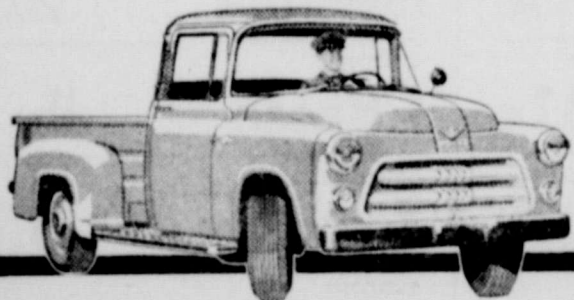

As a result of this opinion and attendant publicity, more than 100 changes were made in the state's insurance laws. Other improvements were made as well in the supervision of the insurance business.

Judge Hughes was reared in Hico, where his father was a Presbyterian minister. After completing his public school education here and after two years in the Navy in World War I, he attended the University of Texas, receiving a law degree in 1926.

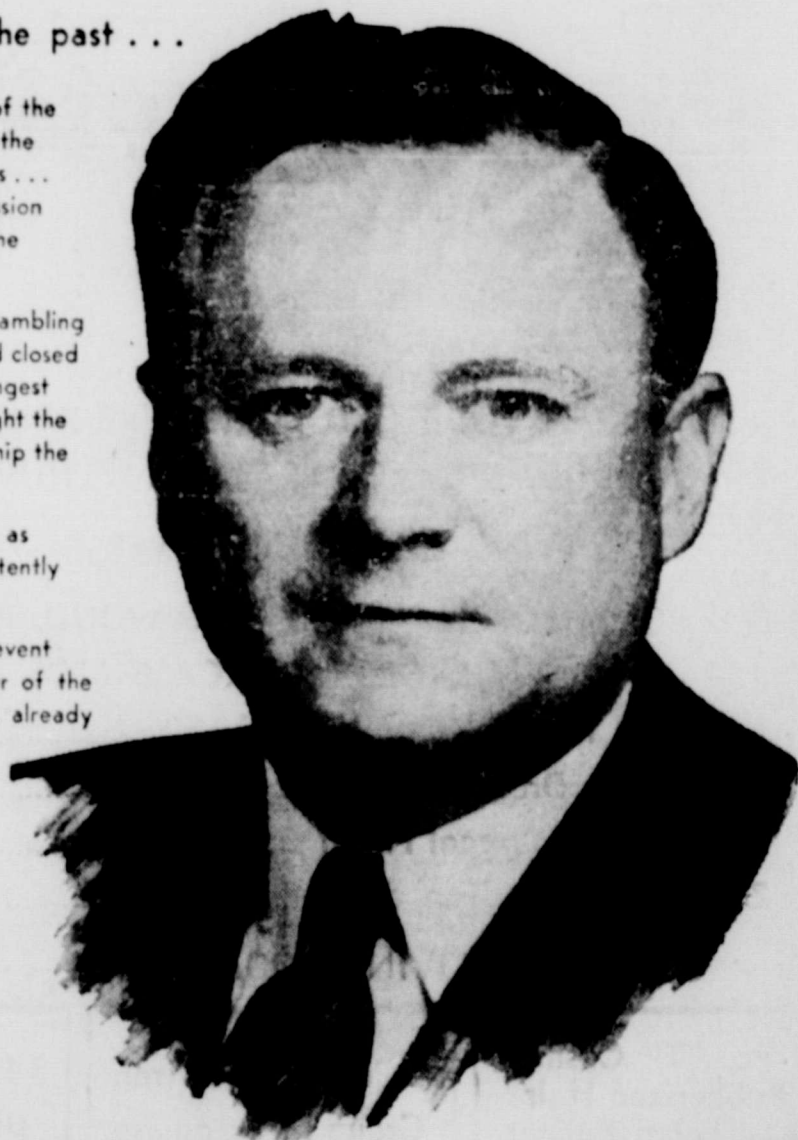

And it is the Tailwalkers job to try to keep that kind of thing going.

This dry summer is pretty hard on shrubs and young trees around the home and some of you might like to try to save them by watering. The place to apply water to a tree or shrub is out under the tips of the branches of the tree or shrub. It doesn't do too much good to build a small circular dike around a tree or shrub close up to the trunk. The feeder roots are not there so the plant will not get the water. If you would like to build a dike around the plant, it is a very good thing to do, one that will hold lots of water, provided the water retaining area is out under the tips of the plant. Apply a heavy rate of water and let the plant show signs of needing water before it is watered again. Light watering of most any kind of a plant, tree or shrub,

develops roots near the surface then when it turns dry the plant suffers badly. If the plant is watered heavily and not so often, roots will go deep and it will withstand more severe dry weather.

STATUTORY DIVISION OF SEPARATE ESTATES EXPLAINED

The death of an intestate person (one who has made no will) may give rise to many problems regarding distribution of his separate estate. In the preceding column we investigated the manner of dividing the community estate upon the death of a husband or wife. Now we shall see that, where separate property is involved, a completely different set of rules applies in determining heirship and apportioning the estate among the rightful claimants.

It may be well to recall that the separate estate of a husband or wife includes property owned by either before marriage, and that which is acquired after marriage by gift or inheritance. Any other property acquired after marriage is presumed by law to be community property until the contrary is clearly proved.

Now, here is a general idea as to how your separate property will be divided if you do not make a will with contrary provisions prior to your death.

If your husband or wife sur-

vives and if, in addition, there are surviving children or descendants of previously deceased children, the children and their descendants immediately obtain a full (fee) title in two-thirds of the real estate involved. The surviving spouse receives a life interest in the remaining one-third of the real property, which passes on to the children and their descendants upon the death of the spouse.

The rule for distributing personal property—cash, stocks, bonds, furniture or any other items not constituting real estate—is different. Here the surviving spouse gets full ownership of one-third, and the children and their descendants inherit the balance.

Now suppose your husband or wife survives, but there are no surviving children or their descendants. In this case the surviving spouse inherits all of the personal property involved.

With regard to real estate, the survivor obtains full title to one-half, and the other half is divided between your mother and father, if both survive you. If only one of them survives, he or she receives only half of this portion, and the other half (or one-fourth or the entire real estate) will be divided among your brothers and sisters (and their descendants) who survive. If there are no surviving brothers and sisters and their descendants, then the one surviving parent inherits the full one-half.

Where no parent survives, but there are brothers and sisters and

descendants, the full one-half is divided among these survivors.

And, if there are no parents or brothers and sisters (and their descendants) surviving, then the surviving husband or wife inherits all of the real estate.

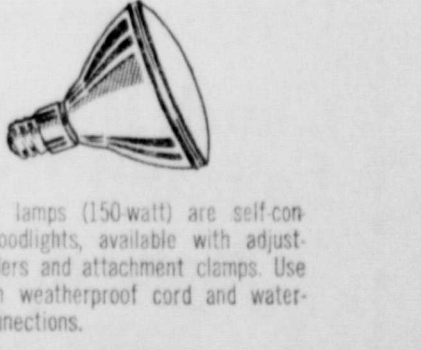

Mrs. Lora Denman, Former Hico Pioneer, Buried Here Saturday

Mrs. Lora Hall Denman, member of a well known pioneer family of Hico, died Friday afternoon, July 13, at 1:15 at her residence in Dublin, following an illness of several weeks. Burial was Saturday afternoon in the family plot at Hico Cemetery, following funeral services at Harrel Chapel in Dublin, by the Rev. D. R. Barnes, pastor of Dublin First Methodist Church.

Mrs. Denman was born at Old Hico June 29, 1880, the daughter of George W. and Ella Stinnett Hall. The family moved to New Hico soon after the Texas Central Railroad reached the newly platted town on the Bosque River. She was a graduate of Hico High School with the class of 1901. The family established residence in Dublin in 1913 and that community continued to be her home, with the exception of a few years spent in Roby, and Marlow, Okla., until her death.

She was married to the late William Denman of Dublin in 1915. He passed away in 1945. There were no children born to this union.

Mrs. Denman was a granddaughter of Captain Rufus Stinnett, pioneer settler in the Hico section. In the early 1870's Captain Stinnett built the pretentious three-story rock home that for many years stood on a bluff overlooking the Bosque River a few miles southeast of Hico.

Her father, George W. Hall, and her grandfather, Captain Stinnett, were owners and managers of a general store at Old Hico at the time the railroad came through the present site of Hico and moved the business to the new town. George W. Hall was in business in Hico a number of years, operating a general hardware, implement, wagon and buggy store. It is said that it was Mr. Hall who introduced the rubber tire buggy to this trade territory.

Mrs. Denman is survived by 3 sisters and three brothers. The sisters are Mrs. Carl Sowell of Denton, Mrs. Lucy Christopher of De Leon and Mrs. Maud Cooper of Dublin. The surviving brothers are D. H. Hall of Las Vegas, Nev., George W. Hall of Odessa, and Byron Hall of Midland. All of these, with exception of Byron Hall, were present for the funeral services.
