## Taxpayers To Receive Notices


Parmer County residents will be receiving an additional copy of their 1991 tax statement.

## Expansion Project Underway At Excel

Construction is well underway on the \$11,000,000 expansion project at Friona's Excel Corporation plant.

The expansion will double the company's present cooler capacity from 4,000-8,000 head, with the addition of the new chill coolers. Presently, the operation is on a 24-hour chill, according to Curt Jones, and the new cooler will allow a 48-hour chill process, therefore, enabling Excel to handle more cattle.

A new freezer is being built for the purpose of handling the ofal needs and storage. Also, a new rail system will be installed, allowing cattle travel to be accomplished by means of a fully automatic walking beam. This will eliminate the need for man power to push cattle and speed up that procedure.

An engine room, designated as number three, will house the compressors and necessary equipment needed to supply power to the new chilling process.

Construction officials estimate completion to be sometime in January.

## Red Ribbon Week Set October 20-26

Friona Independent School District, Friona Chamber of Commerce, local businesses, community organizations and community members will be integrating efforts to promote a Red Ribbon Campaign, October 20-26.

The Red Ribbon Campaign originated when Federal Agent Enrique Camerena was murdered by drug traffickers in 1985. The red ribbon became the symbol to reduce the demand for drugs.

The theme for this year's campaign is "Join-Me....I'm Drug-Free." The symbol is the red ribbon, a sign of commitment to a drug-free, healthy lifestyle. Texas Medical Association and Auxiliary provided ribbons for the students and staff at Friona I.S.D. The Chamber of Commerce will provide ribbons for their members and many businesses will distribute ribbons to their customers.

Events planned for the 1991 Red Ribbon campaign will include the following:

October 21--presentation of the American flags by the Lion's Club.

October 22--assembly program, "McGruff," primary and elementary.

October 25--high school assembly program, presented by Major Winters and Major Frimpton from Cannon Air Force Base, Clovis, N.M.; "Chillin' Time," presented by West Texas State University students at the junior high; drug-free/red ribbon elementary classroom parties; third grade balloon launch for primary and elementary students.

Friona students will be participating in many unique drug-free activities throughout the week. The Friona Junior High Student Council will sponsor dress-up week with drug-free themes:

Monday--"Don't tie yourself to drugs."

Tuesday--"It's no sweat to live drug-free."

Wednesday--"Drugs and life don't mix."

Thursday--"Put a cap on drugs."

Friday--"Boot out drugs."

"We ask the community to join the effort. Wear a red ribbon. Participate in displaying a visible and unified commitment toward the creation of a drug-free community," said a spokesperson for the activities.

## Dates Set For Early Voting

Bonnie Clayton, County Judge, announced this week that dates have been set for early voting.

Anyone wishing to vote on the upcoming 13 constitutional amendments, including the state lottery issue, may cast their votes at the County Clerk's Office in Farwell, beginning October 16 through November 1.

Ballots may also be cast at Friona Texas Federal Credit Union on Wednesday, October 23 and October 30.

Bovina City Hall will be a designated polling place on Thursday, October 24 and October 30.

All voters are eligible to take advantage of the early voting procedure.

## K. Welch Re-Elected To Board

Kevin Welch of Friona was recently re-elected to the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District board of directors. Welch represents Zone 3 of the district.

The purpose of the Parmer County S.W.C.D., with headquarters in Friona, is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on agricultural lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers, ranchers and local community entities on conservation matters.

The board of directors coordinates the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations and has authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purposes.

As one of five individuals serving on the district board of directors, Welch will be responsible for district policies and procedures for carrying out the district program within the framework of the Texas Soil Conservation District Law.

Welch is active on the Farm Bureau County Board, Gas Coop and is a department director at the First Baptist Church in Friona.

In Texas, there are 211 Soil and Water Conservation Districts. Each is a legal subdivision of state government organized by local agricultural landowners with the assistance of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board. Unlike most other legal subdivisions of state government, SWCDs do not have the powers of taxation or eminent domain. All conservation programs managed by the districts are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator or other potential users of the SWCD's programs.

The Parmer County SWCD was organized in April, 1948.

# Friona Flashbacks

....from the files of The Friona Star

**60 Yrs. Ago--Sept. 28, 1931**  
In spite of the fact that a heavy rain fell over the Friona territory and much adjacent country on the night before the Wheat Growers' picnic, there was an immense crowd here, variously estimated at two to three thousand people.

J.W. Parr, one of Friona's most extensive wheat growers, has at this time, about 400 acres of his 1932 wheat crop sowed, with much of it up and growing.

**55 Yrs. Ago--Sept. 25, 1936**  
Logan Sympton and Dan Ethridge have rented the room adjoining the north side of the Post Office in the T.J. Crawford Building, and have had it nicely fitted up and re-decorated with fresh paint and are now occupying it as their respective offices. Mrs. Sympton represents West Texas Gas Company and has charge of the city's water department. Mr. Ethridge is now conducting the only insurance agency in Friona.

**50 Yrs. Ago--Sept. 26, 1941**  
During the latter part of last week, several units of heavy dirt-moving machinery for various purposes, belonging to Cook & Ransom, of Ottawa, Kansas, have been unloaded at the Santa Fe yards here for the purpose of building the large levy that is being built by the railroad company, for the prevention of future flood damage to its tracks and other property at Friona when the Frio Draw overflows.

**40 Yrs. Ago--Sept. 20, 1951**  
A barbecue feeding 2300 visitors, increased number of exhibits, final parade, kiddie rides and lots of neighboring marked the Parmer County Fair in Friona last weekend, setting a goal for even the larger fairs of the state to reach. A well-coordinated team, spark-plugged by Frank Reed, Darrell Robbins and Jay Cobb, last Friday, took the field for Friona to smother the invading Vega eleven in a 39-0 shutout.

**35 Yrs. Ago--Sept. 27, 1956**  
Friona celebrated her 50th anniversary last weekend, and had plenty of help doing it. From every standpoint, the anniversary event was a success, reports Wright Williams, president of the Friona Chamber of Commerce, which sponsored the promotion. Only thing which didn't exactly go to suit the celebration was the weather--which turned out to be

windy all three days, but it didn't completely mar the celebration.

**30 Yrs. Ago--Sept. 28, 1961**  
Stolen farm equipment valued at over \$6,000 was recovered by Parmer County Sheriff Charles Lovelace last week. Dennis Richards, 28, of Muleshoe, was apprehended early last Thursday in connection with numerous thefts in Parmer and surrounding counties.

Deryl L. Coker assumed his duties as Parmer County agricultural agent on September 25, succeeding Joe W. Jones. Coker has served as assistant county agent at Hockley County for the past four years.

**25 Yrs. Ago--Sept. 29, 1966**  
Johnny Mars, who farms five miles northeast of Black, marketed the first bale of cotton for the Friona area this week, when the first bale was ginned at Chester Gin on Monday.

Cindy Ingram, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W.S. Ingram, was crowned Homecoming Queen in pre-game ceremonies prior to the Friona-Bovina football game last week.

**20 Yrs. Ago--Sept. 23, 1971**



## Heart Association Has Local Chapter

By November 1999, the American Heart Association, Texas Affiliate, Inc., will have completed their effort to provide educational materials to all accredited public and private statewide schools, grades K-12.

The American Heart Association is continuing its emphasis on educating children about heart health and cardiovascular disease risk factor reduction with the implementation of its educational programs.

The importance of making healthy decisions early in life plays a tremendous role on the health of students as they get older.

"Reaching students with health messages is important so they can establish healthy lifestyle habits to follow throughout their lives," said Homer Lindeman, president of the American Heart Association, Parmer County division. "The programs are perfect for teaching the importance of good nutrition and exercise in maintaining a healthy heart."

The American Heart Association believes also reaching pre-school children with heart-health messages is important so they, too, can begin to establish healthy lifestyle habits.

The American Heart Association began distribution of their school-site programs in 1986. The programs include: in 1986, Heart Treasure Chest for pre-school and kindergarten; Heart Explorers-Lower Elementary, for grades 1-3, spring of 1988; Getting to Know Your Heart-Upper Elementary, for grades 4-6, 1989-90; Heart Decisions-Middle School, for grades 7-9, 1990-91; and Heart Challenges for students in grades 10-12, 1991-92.

Through the existence of these AHA school-site programs, small communities are provided a tangible result of AHA research.

"Cardiovascular diseases caused over 50,000 Texas deaths in the last year. Nationally, the disease will

cost our country more than \$101.3 billion in 1991 for physician and nursing care, hospital and nursing home services, and medications," Lindeman said. "If we don't teach the children of today the importance of good health and nutrition, the numbers forty years from now will be enormous."

The funds for the production and distribution of AHA school-site materials in Texas were made available through the Houston Endowment, a philanthropy endowed by Mr. and Mrs. Jesse H. Jones.



The family will be at the residence of Mrs. Emert Rose, 317 East 22nd St., Littlefield, Texas.



Therefore, pursuant to the mandatory duty imposed upon the Commissioners Court, pursuant to the Texas Election Code, Section 42.035, notice is hereby given to the public of these necessary changes in the Election Precinct Boundaries, to-wit:

(1) In the future elections, there will be nine (9) Election Precincts. Plus the early voting polling place.

(2) Commissioner Precinct 1 contains 101; Commissioner Precinct 2 contains 201, 202 and 203; Commissioner Precinct 3 contains

301, 302, and 303; Commissioner Precinct 4 contains 401, and 402.

(3) These Election Precincts and the polling places in each precinct will be defined as follows:

### COMMISSIONER PRECINCT 1

#### Polling Place 101

Polling Place 101 is the consolidation of old Election Precinct Numbers 2-1, 1 and 8. It has been designated 101 to coincide with Commissioner Precinct 1, Polling Place Number 1. Polling Place 1 which was located at the Black Elevator in Black, Texas, and Polling Place 8, located at the Dee Willard residence in Lakeview, Texas, have been eliminated to provide secrecy of balloting and for voter convenience. The polling place is in the Calvary Baptist Church, Cleveland Ave., Friona, Texas.

### COMMISSIONER PRECINCT 2

#### Polling Place 201

Polling Place 201 was previously known as Polling Place Number 3 and has been designated as 201 to coincide with Commissioner

Precinct 2, Polling Place Number 1. This polling place remains in the EMS Building, formerly called the American Legion Hall, 3rd Street, Bovina, Texas.

#### Polling Place 202

Polling Place 302 was previously known as Polling Place Number 6 and has been designated Polling Place Number 302 to coincide with Commissioner Precinct 3, Polling Place Number 2. The old polling place at the Community Center on Highway 105 has been eliminated. The polling place will be in the Methodist Church on Highway 1731, Oklahoma Lane, Texas.

#### Polling Place 303

# New Environmental Ethic Needed To Sustain Society

By James F. Veninga

We have learned much in the last few years about the grave environmental crises that span the globe and threaten all societies: the erosion of topsoil, the undermining of

biological systems, the pollution of air, the depletion of energy systems. And we have learned that Texas--like the United States as a whole--has contributed to these global crises.

Much of the Texas myth is based on the taming and exploitation of nature. Of course, much of the human touch on the natural environment has turned nature into something better than it was before, but all too often it has blighted the earthscape, exhausted resources, and stunted the ability of nature to repair and regenerate itself.

Yet, as Glen Lich points out in the third volume of *Preparing for Texas in the 21st Century*, we hope and believe that nature's munificence will sustain and bless us, that we shall prosper, that we will be refreshed by the beauty of nature. For this hope to be realized, we


must see ourselves as part of nature, eager to participate in the stewardship of the environment at home and abroad.

"It is a mistake," explains Isaac Asimov, "to think of mankind as a thing in itself. It isn't. It is a part of an intricate web of life."

Public participation--the incorporation of a new environmental ethic--is the key to a sustainable society. Education, leading to changes in attitudes, values, and lifestyles, secures this participation.

But these changes won't come easily. Rice University president George Rupp writes that "co-operative activity in pursuit of shared values is all too rare in our society."

One of the primary responsibilities of government will be to ensure public education in which environmental studies hold a central



place in the curriculum. But legislative bodies and governmental entities must exercise leadership in making critical decisions that demonstrate a new and deep commitment to reshaping our relationship to nature.

One thing is clear. If we do not preserve and nourish the environment, it will not preserve and nourish us. How we respond in the 1990s to the growing environmental crises will greatly determine the quality of life for citizens of the 21st century.

# Pumpkins Provide Resource To Area

FLOYDADA--Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry visited Floydada this week to promote the state's pumpkin industry and encourage people to buy Texas-grown pumpkins.

The Floydada area, which bills itself as the pumpkin capital of the world, has about 800 acres of pumpkins in Floyd County. Nearby, another 500 acres are planted in Hale County and some 200 acres are in Bailey County.

The three counties are the top pumpkin-producing counties in the Plains.

Along with visiting the Heptad Vegetable and Specialty Co. packing shed, Perry addressed local school children about pumpkins and where other food they eat comes from.

Agriculture literacy is a major focus of Perry's administration.

"There are lots of school children in the state who are preparing for

Halloween and carving their pumpkins," Perry said. "But they have no idea that their pumpkin could have come from Floydada, Texas."

Perry told the group that he and his two children recently bought pumpkins in Austin which were shipped from Floyd County.

"When most Texans think of Halloween, they think of ghosts, goblins and trick-or-treating," Perry said.

"But those of us who know about Plains pumpkins, we think of dollars and what pumpkins mean to the economy in Floydada, or in Muleshoe, or in Plainview," he said.

Pumpkins bring in almost a half million dollars each year into Floyd, Hale and Bailey counties.

"Pumpkins will not rival corn or cotton as far as the top-dollar generator in the area, but they are providing a significant income in the area," Perry added.

The first concert of the season for the Hereford Community Concert Assn. will be held Thursday, October 24 at 8 p.m. at the Hereford High School Auditorium.

Members of the association are urged to attend this concert, which features the Saturday Brass Quintet.

Since its New York debut in 1984, the Saturday Brass Quintet has rapidly established a reputation as a major proponent of the brass quintet as a serious chamber music ensemble. Called the "Class of the Brass" by *The Washington Post*, the SBQ has been awarded the coveted 1990 Walter W. Naumburg Award for Excellence in Chamber Music.

The Saturday Brass Quintet has also won prizes at the Fischhoff, Mendez and Artist International Competition. The quintet has also received three awards from Chamber Music America: the 1987 and 1989 Ensemble Commissioning Awards, and the 1989 Residency Grant.

The Saturday Brass Quintet has given over 600 performances in North America, to enthusiastic reviews: *The New York Times* acclaimed: "This is an unusually brilliant ensemble. Fortes are big, bright and blaring, pianissimos are hushed and mellow; contrasts are imbued with dramatic intensity."

Recent concert appearances include Houston Friends of Music, UCLA, Merkin Concert Hall, St. Paul's Music in the Park series,

Weill Recital Hall, and ten 40-concert coast-to-coast tours of the U.S. and Canada. The SBQ is a regular performer on radio programs nationwide, such as St. Paul Sunday Morning, the WQXR/Marine Midland Chamber Music Festival, the WQXR Summerpier Concerts, and the KUSC (LA) Dame Myra Hess Memorial Radio Concert Series.

Active in Arts-in-Education, the Saturday Brass Quintet is the Quintet-in-Residence at the Manhattan School of Music. The SBQ has also given master classes at The Juilliard School, the San Francisco Conservatory, and the Shepherd School of Music at Rice University. The quintet is currently on the artist roster of Lincoln Center's Meet-the-Artist, Carnegie Hall's Neighborhood Concert Program, New York Young Audiences, New Jersey Young Audiences, and the New York Philharmonic/New York Young Audiences Musical Arts Experience (MAX) Program.

Champions of the contemporary brass repertoire, the SBQ is at the forefront of the commissioning and performing of new music for brass quintet. The Saturday Brass Quintet has commissioned and/or premiered new compositions by such leading composers as John Harbison, Anthony Davis, Ned Rorem, Richard Danielpour, Elliot Goldenthal, Brian Fennelly, Linda Bouchard, Richard Wernick and Kurt Schwertsik.


The reception hall was decorated with gold balloons, a five-foot double lighted heart made with gold balloons and baby's breath gathered by gold ribbon on each table.

A program, presented by the children, followed the meal. The program consisted of a video of past and present photographs and a theme song chosen by the children, honoring each parent individually.



## YOUR EYES

### BABY LEARNS TO SEE



Babies can see almost at birth, but it takes a while for them to learn how to do it right. At first, a baby may use one eye at a time -- or both, each looking at a different object. It may be a month before the infant is able to direct both eyes at the same object. At first they focus on objects that are close, actually moving the head to follow movement. Eventually, the child learns to move the eyes as a team instead of moving the head. By a year, binocular vision should be pretty well established; neither eye should be wandering in, out, up or down by itself. To "exercise" those new eye muscles, many parents provide a mobile above a crib, or soft toys that baby can reach for. Every time you bring the baby to another room, or outdoors, you provide it with more to look at. If either eye seems to wander after a year, see your eye professional promptly. Early treatment is most effective.

### Long-term Care Insurance Is A Consideration In Any Financial Plan

The greatest risk facing individuals aged 50 and over today is the high cost of long-term care. In fact, Americans over age 65 stand a 50 percent chance of requiring nursing home care. Add to that the fact that we are an aging population, and the threat becomes almost critical.

According to the U.S. Senate Special Committee on Aging, the number of Americans aged 65 and over (32 million in 1988) is projected to double over the next 50 years. Already, Americans over age 65 outnumber the total population of Canada.

During this century, life expectancy has increased by more than 27 years. A baby born in 1900 could expect to live 47.3 years. A baby born in 1990 can expect to live nearly 75 years. More than 75 percent of all Americans will reach 65, and those who do will, on average, live to see age 82.

This is good news for millions of Americans, but it can be devastating for millions more. As we live longer, we become more vulnerable to chronic diseases such as arthritis, hypertension, Alzheimer's and Parkinson's diseases, all of

which often require long-term care. Unfortunately, only about 3 percent of people aged 65 and over are protected by long-term care insurance, according to the Health Insurance Association of America. Most people are unprepared to face the costs of long-term care coverage.

What are the options? Those with sufficient assets and reasonably good health may assume the potential risk of long-term care costs, but they can be staggering.

The average cost of nursing home care in the United States is \$25,000 per year, and people who enter a nursing home typically stay an average of 2.5 years. That means they can plan to pay roughly \$63,000 for long-term care alone. This does not include other medical and personal needs.

Another option is to buy adequate and affordable insurance protection. A limited number of reputable insurance companies now offer this protection. No doubt others will soon follow, but the challenge is to select a company with a proven record of paying claims and offering protection options that meet your needs.
