look as though much corn or other good idea to put potaons on a high Dead, crippled or Worthless Stock row crops will be planted in the shelf, or in a locked cabinet. county for a few more days. Some corn was planted over the week end but very little.

The experiment station down at McGregor and the one at Temple have been getting good results the last few years with the use of commercial fertilizers on corn and grain sorghums, Their tests show that by making an application of fertilizer at planting time has been making them money on these crops. They are using from 100 to 200 pounds of 16-20-0 fertilizer.

Their tests show that the 100 pounds at planting time has done good through the drier years and that with better moisture an application of 20 0pounds has done weil. At this time here in the county, I believe we could use the 200 pound rate and receive benefits from it. Recommendations have been to apply fertilizer at planting time and when corn or maize is between 25 and 30 days old to add another application as a side dressing. According to the stations, some times the side dressing application will injure the small feeder roots and full benefits will not be received from

If you have a fertilizer attachment for your planter, you might like to try some fertilizer. It will get your crop off to a faster start, develop more roots and should carry the crop into the drier part of the season in better condition.

Each year we see corn and maize begin to fire up down on the bottom leaves. Some of these leaves dry and drop off.

When this happens we also near some say that these crops are burning up and need moisture. This is an indication given by the plant that it does not have eough nitrogen and is suffering from the lack of it. When a plant needs moisture it shows signs of drying up, or curling all over.

Ted Trew, extension pasture specialist, says that summer temporary pastures are a cash crop and should be treated as such. He says that these pastures should get these treatments: 1. Plant in rows or grazing; 2. Stagger plantings. You can extend the grazing period in this manner; 3. Mow as necessary to keep pastures growing and to supply dry feed; 4. Fertilize properly. Mowing is something that very few

practice but by doing this it prevents the plants from going to stem and also causes them to sucker out more and produce more tender and palatable grazing. Planting in rows allows livestock to graze up and down the rows and makes for more production of grazing material. Fertilize with 100 to 200 pounds of 16-20-0 at planting time.
