### MILLERVILLE CEMETERY WORKING SET APRIL 29

Announcement has been made of the Annual Millerville Cemetery working, which will be held Wednesday morning, April 29.

Everyone who is interested, or has loved ones buried at Millerville, are urged to attend and help out with this needed work.

Today, Friday, is the last day for residents to take advantage of the free haul-off of trash and other accumulated debris around premises, in the annual City-Wide Spring Clean-Up Program. The cleaning spree is sponsored each spring by the City of Hico, who offer the free haul-off facilities.

Through Wednesday of this week, employees of the city had hauled more than 20 truck loads of trash.

Local residents are urged to cooperate with the city in the cleaning operation, which is designed to make Hico more sightly and healthful. The official dates for this year's cleaning period were April 20 through 24. Wednesday and Friday were set as haul-off days.

Residents are urged to pick up all old tin cans, clean weeds from premises, and from ditches, and do anything else to make their homes and surroundings more attractive. The cutting of weeds and disposing of old cans and other containers which might catch and hold water is a precautionary measure to discourage mosquito breeding.

City officials suggested that people also punch holes in trash barrels and other metal containers to allow rain water to escape.

Trash placed at curbs in moveable containers will be hauled off by city employees Friday, the last day of the official clean-up period.

### Graveside Services Held For Dallas Resident, Earl F. Duckworth

Graveside services were held here last Friday afternoon, April 17, at 2:30 p.m. for Earl F. Duckworth, 68, with Rev. E. E. Dawson officiating. Burial was made in Hico Cemetery.

Mr. Duckworth was the son of R. F. and Scott Hubbard Duckworth, and was born at Turnersville, Texas, June 30, 1891. He passed away Wednesday morning, April 15, in Dallas. He was the youngest of six brothers, all of whom preceded him in death. His mother died when he was an infant and his father died in 1938.

He was converted and joined the Baptist Church when a young man. After serving in the Army during World War I he became a carpenter and painter by trade, and spent the majority of his life in and near Dallas. He was a resident of Hico many years ago.

Surviving are two nephews and four nieces.

Being entirely human I once in awhile fall for a bit of reprint that appeals to me as funny. For instance this bit from George Dolan who seems to prowl all West Texas for some story he can pass on to us.

People in West Texas still are talking about that little foreign car that got the worst of it, a month or six weeks ago, when it tangled with a jackrabbit.

It happened away out in West Texas' deep left field.

And the coffee session palaver that still hasn't died down is, as usual, tremendously exaggerated.

If I were a jackrabbit, I don't know whether I would like it or whether I'd be flipping through the yellow pages, looking for a lawyer to start slander action.

To hear these people hash over that accident, you'd think West Texas jackrabbits were as big as lions, as tough as rhinoceroses (or rhinocerosi) and as fierce as women shoppers.

It isn't true, of course. I have seen fully-grown West Texas jackrabbits no larger than armadillos and no more fierce than mastiffs.

Most of these folks who can't stop talking about that collision seem to chastise the rabbit for picking on a smaller opponent.

I've heard a few stick up for the rabbit, though.

One suggested that the midge car's tiny lights were mistaken for two West Texas fireflies.

And another insisted that it wasn't an unfair match at all—that tracks at the scene of the crash indicated the rabbit didn't escape unscathed, either. It limped for 10 or 12 steps.

What it boils down to, contends the latter rabbit-supporter, is that West Texas simply is no place for those little automobilettes.

They have to give away weight,

he explains, in any sort of encounter.

"Why even those sickly little West Texas bugs that don't weigh more than a quarter of a pound and can hardly reach March 1 flying downhill are a menace to those kiddy-cars," he points out.

"Bugs that splatter on big cars' windshields and don't even knock the Detroit models off-stride can turn one of those pee-wees half-way around on the road.

"And if one of the big bugs ever hits one of those little windshields dead-center, it'll bring the thing to a full stop."

This fellow, incidentally, doesn't think folks should speak flippantly of the accident at all.

"Two men, as I recall, were injured," he explains. "The car was badly damaged. And I understand the rabbit had its shins painfully barked."

He says the body of the car was salvaged, though, and put to another use. The windows were covered with tin, the doors were sealed and now it is serving society as a No. 2 can, holding stewed tomatoes.

Humans can deal lightly with the subject but the jackrabbits, apparently, are taking it seriously.

A Fort Stockton hunter, I've been told, bagged a jackrabbit just the other day with this sticker pasted across its back bumper: "Help stamp out foreign cars!"

## Gulf States Drivers Receive TSA Safety Award for 6th Time

Sixty regular drivers of fleet units of the Gulf States Telephone Company during the year 1958 drove telephone cars and trucks a total of 582,488 miles, with only 4 minor accidents resulting in minor property damage and without suffering any injury to the driver or passengers in the vehicles. That record won the Texas Safety Association 1958 Industrial Fleet Safety Contest for the Gulf States Company in Group III, which included communication fleets in local operations.

This is the sixth award for first place received by the company drivers in six consecutive years. Beginning with the year 1953 through 1958, a total of 2,823,855 miles have been driven with only 14 minor accidents, and without any injury to passengers and drivers.

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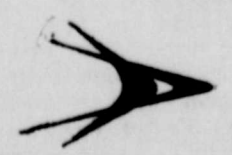

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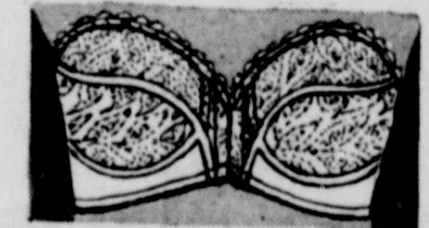

# Busy As a Beaver

The title of this fore-going article has no bearing upon the writer of this column and any connection between the title and the writer is pure coincidental and has nothing to do with how hard he has been working.

The main reason for this article, however, is to get you a little better acquainted with the little animal known as the Beaver. Last week I received a card from Bob Baldrige, editor of the Clifton Record, who states that he has been asked about the beaver which has been reported along the Bosque River.

Beaver were first released on the Rough Creek Ranch back in 1950 by the Texas Game & Fish Commission and they released three. Then again on the Flat Top Ranch the Commission released a total of five at different periods of time.

There have been many articles and books written on the North American beaver, largest rodent in our country. We have beaver in the Panhandle, Rio Grande River, Llano River, Colorado River, Highland Lakes, and in some sections of East Texas.

Beaver frequently reach 60 lbs. in weight, and may weigh more. However, most of our Texas animals will average about 30 pounds. Average total length of beavers is about 40-45 inches. The tail may be 16 inches long and up to 4 to four and a half inches wide, and the hind foot, which is webbed, may be 7 to 8 inches long.

The teeth of the beaver are dark orange in color, hollow ground, and continue to grow throughout the life of the animal. Beavers can close their lips behind the incisors and thus gnaw roots and tree limbs which are submerged without getting water into their mouths or windpipes.

The young will average about four to the litter, are born in April, May, or June, and there is a possibility that two litters per year may be born by some Texas beavers. A beaver will usually consist of an adult pair, young of the year and the yearlings.

Beavers have little to fear from predators in Texas. The coyotes, wolf, bobcat, and wild dog would probably be listed as the most prominent predators in our state.

The most common foods of the Texas beaver may be listed as willows, cottonwood, dogwood, sweet gum, redgum, blue beech, and ash, and numerous aquatic plants—depending upon the locality where the beavers are found. Occasionally pine, juniper and oak may be utilized.

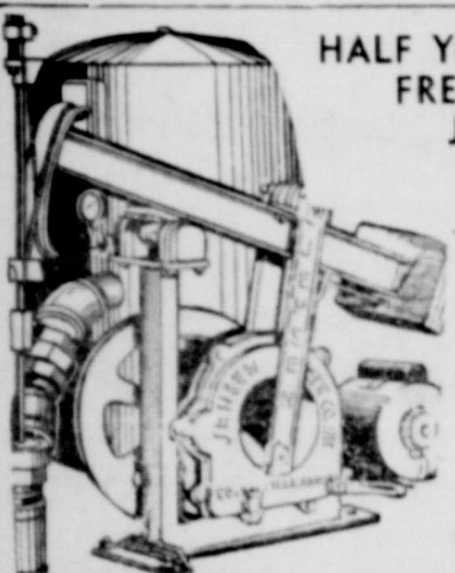
Study has shown that a beaver colony may use from 100 to 200 tons of material in building a main dam. Dams 700 feet long have been recorded, and secondary wings to main dams have been recorded nearly one mile in overall length.

Along the Llano watershed, where numerous man-made and natural rock dams may be found, beavers find dam building unnecessary, so construct lodges only. Beaver dams may be found in East Texas, the Rio Grande Watershed, and in the Panhandle regions. They are constructed out of the available woody materials, shrubs, and mud.

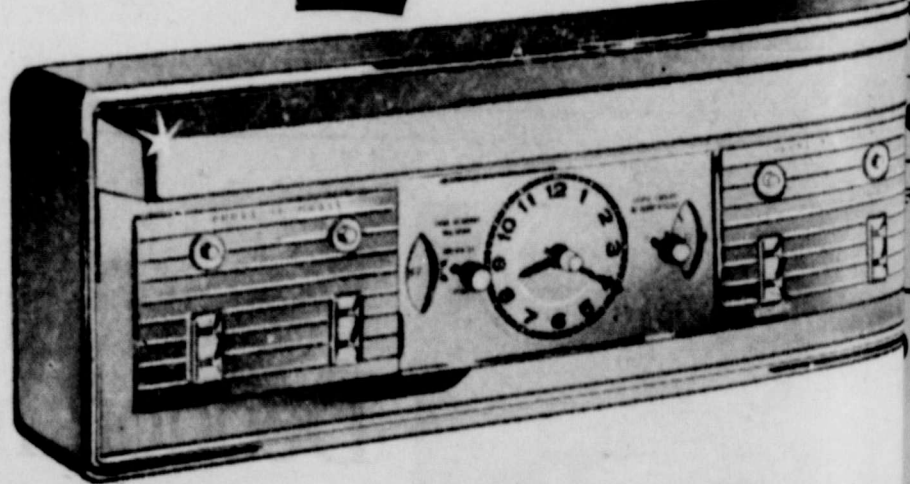
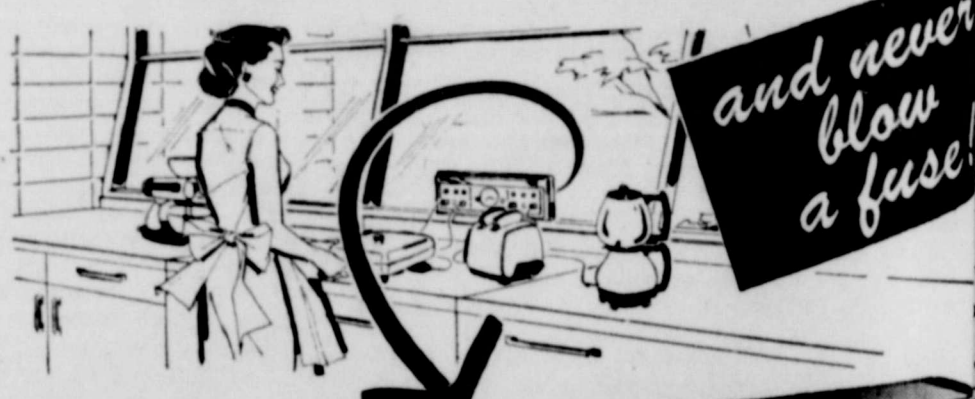

TEXAS—STILL FIRST RATE!

Texas may have been eclipsed in size by Alaska and we don't have the coconut palms and hula dancers of Hawaii...

Despite droughts, boll weevils, pink bollworms, a host of other insects—and not even to mention governmental order plagues—the Lone Lone Star State is unchallenged as the leading producer of cotton...

Neither do Texas farmers hang back in vegetables for the fresh market. In 1958, Texas led the nation in production of beets, winter cabbage, winter carrots, early fall carrots, winter cauliflower, spring honey dew melons, early spring onions, summer onions, spinach and watermelons.

If that isn't enough, we also rank first in production in cattle, rice, sorghum forage, hay and wool.

So the next time some dandy Yankee tries to needle us Texans about "being cut down to size" here are a few figures to confound him with:

You might also mention that Alaskan reindeer and other strange forms of livestock just can't compete when one out of every eight head of cattle makes its home on a Texas range. Just for good measure we've also got more sheep, lambs, horses and mules than any of the other 49 states.

These are just a few more of the things that make Texas what it always has been and always will be—the undisputed champ among states. So if anyone ever asks you what we're going to do about Alaska, the answer is "nothing—it won't be necessary."

bluish cast when first laid—they hatch in 4 or 5 days.

In the later stages of the incubation period the eggs turn first pinkish and then reddish brown. After hatching the small worm moves down below the cluster of pecans and feeds on the buds in the axil of the leaf stems immediately under the cluster. The worm hollows the bud out in the same manner as he does a pecan.

You can see the tell-tale webbing and black frazz around the bud. The worm is increasing in size and appetite at this stage—after feeding for 4 or 5 days on the buds he moves back to the cluster of pecans and bores a hole at the base of a pecan and enters to feed. One casebearer will commonly hollow out 2 or 3 pecans in a cluster and sometimes more.

Use of correct insecticides—D. D.T. can be applied when a number of eggs can be found over the

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By E. R. LAWRENCE

The time is not too far off when some will want to start control measures for the pecan nut casebearer. This is the insect that works on the small pecan shortly after it is set. Results of some who have sprayed for this insect indicate that pecan production can be increased.

There are three essentials in obtaining good control of the pecan nut case bearer and they are:

- 1. Correct timing of spray application.
2. Use of correct insecticides.
3. Proper application of the spray material.

Proper timing—There are many rules of thumb that can be used to obtain the approximate time to spray (for example when the blossom end of the nutlets turn brown) but many times these are not exact enough for good control. The only way to be highly accurate in timing the spray application is to check closely at regular intervals for the appearance of the casebearer eggs. The eggs are usually deposited singly on the tip or blossom end of the small pecan. These eggs are small (about one-third the size of a pin head) but can be found rather easily against the brown background of the pollinated pecan blossom. The eggs are pearly white with a slight

orchard, three pounds of 50 per cent wettable powder mixed in 100 gallons of water should give good control. Three pounds of 25 per cent wettable malathion in 100 gallons of water is another good preparation.

Proper application of spray material—The casebearer does not feed on the foliage of the pecan tree—he feeds only on the cluster stems and on the small pecan nuts. To get control the spray material must be applied in such a manner that the pecan clusters and the stems immediately below are thoroughly wetted.

Many pecan trees over the country suffer from a nutritional disease caused by a lack of zinc. Trees

affected by the disease, called rosette, for several seasons have many dead shoots and small branches from the die-back of each season's growth. Trees become stunted and produce few nuts. Zinc can be added to the casebearer control solution and both applied at one spraying. To the 100 gallons of insect spray add 2 pounds of 36 per cent zinc sulfate. If trees have suffered badly from rosette, make a second and third application of the zinc solution, each 3 to 4 weeks apart.

Some young radishes and turnips in home gardens are being damaged by the Harlequin cabbage bug. This bug is a sucking one

and the plants affected might show to be wilting. The adult bug is brilliant red and black with sucking mouthparts—control by dusting with 20 per cent sabadilla dust.
