Program To Explain Mobile Telephones

Friona and Parmer County residents are invited to attend a program Tuesday on local cellular telephone service now being provided by

members of the Cellular 3 partnership. West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative (WTRT), which has long served rural customers in

Parmer, Deaf Smith, Castro and Bailey counties, is among the partners. "An Introduction to Cellular," sponsored by WTRT, will be presented Tuesday, October 29 at 7 p.m. at the Friona State Bank Community Room. Refreshments will be provided.

Friona now has cellular telephone service available from a provider operating within Parmer County.

Signal antennas were added to a tower at WTRT's central office location at Hub earlier this month. The Hub antennas not only bring cellular telephone service to Friona, but extend signals through most of Parmer and portions of Castro counties. They strengthen cellular capabilities over a broad area of the mid and west Plains.

In addition to WTRT, other partners in the Hub cellular site include Five-Area Telephone Cooperative at Muleshoe and Eastern New Mexico Rural Telephone Cooperative at Clovis. They are members of the Cellular 3 partnership, named for Rural Service Area 3. Cellular 3 also includes several other rural telephone cooperatives from the Panhandle and South Plains, as well as other limited partners. Only WTRT, Five-Area and ENMR are involved with the Hub tower.

Tom Hyer, manager of WTRT, says customers who sign up for service on the Hub tower should be able to remain on their "home" system all the way from Friona to Plains. Parmer County, Dimmitt and western Castro County, including Tam Anne and Flagg, are in the Hub tower coverage area. Coverage extends east of Dimmitt.

WT Services, Inc., a wholly-owned subsidiary of WTRT, is now providing sales of cellular telephones from its office on South Highway 385 at Hereford. Contracts for service on the Hub tower are also being handled by WT Services.

Among contract packages offered is an arrangement making any cellular call within the 806 area code a local call. Customers of Cellular 3 can also take advantage of "roamer" agreements with other cellular providers. Customers can continue to use their cellular phones by "switching over" to other systems when beyond the range of their home system at Hub.

Reciprocating carriers bill the user's home system for air time, and the user's home system then passes the bill along. A large number of carriers have made reciprocal agreements with Cellular 3.

Hyer says that Cellular 3 customers in Friona, Bovina and Lazbuddie should be able to use "roamer" service virtually nationwide--so long as they are traveling in an area where cellular signals are available.

Bentley Family Has Good Contest Week

Bovina City Hall will be a designated polling place on Thursday, October 31.

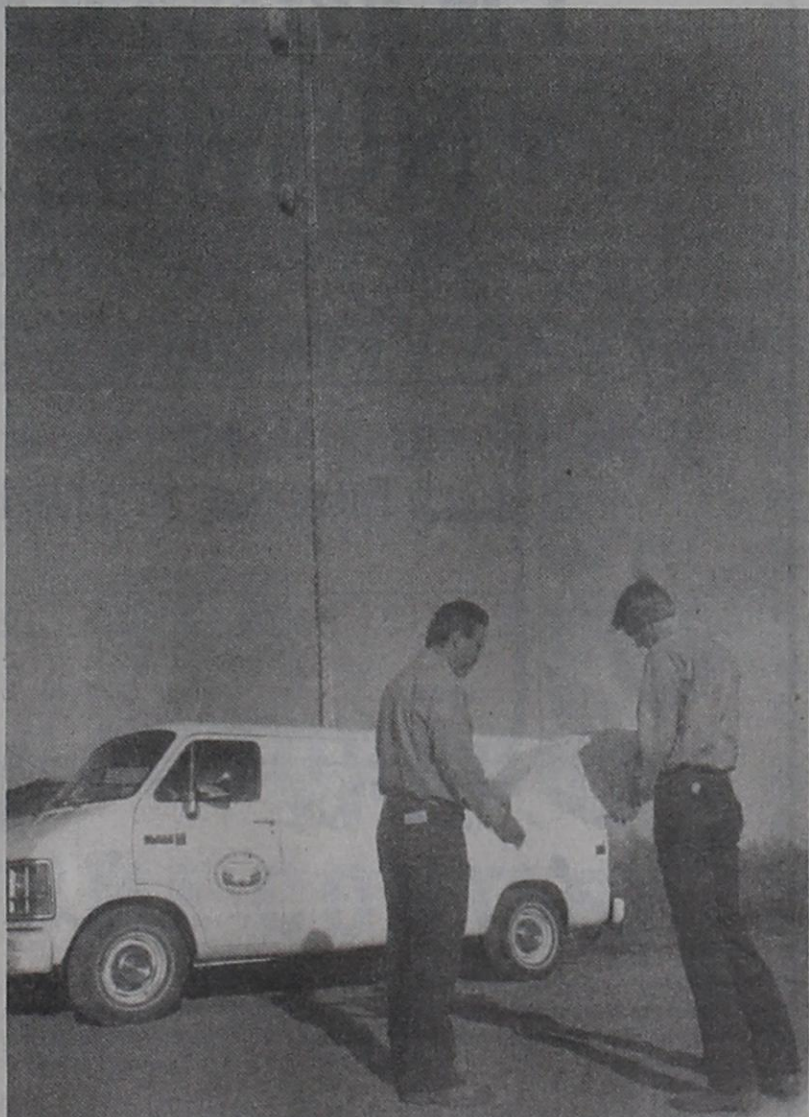
All voters are eligible to take advantage of the early voting procedure.

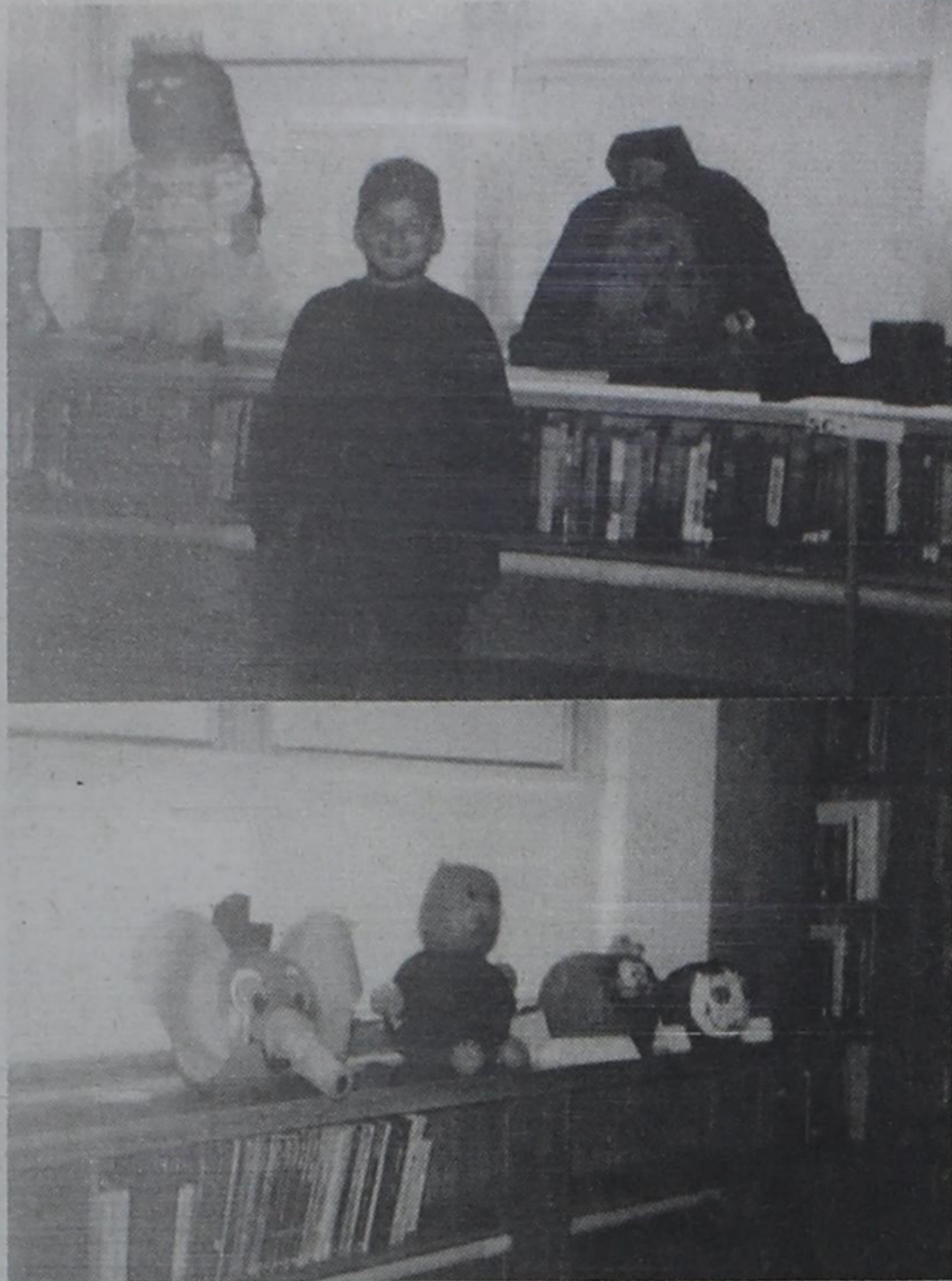
In our final analysis, Ye Editor has gotten his B.P. down to a manageable level, and the girls at both offices are doing all they can to help him keep it that way.

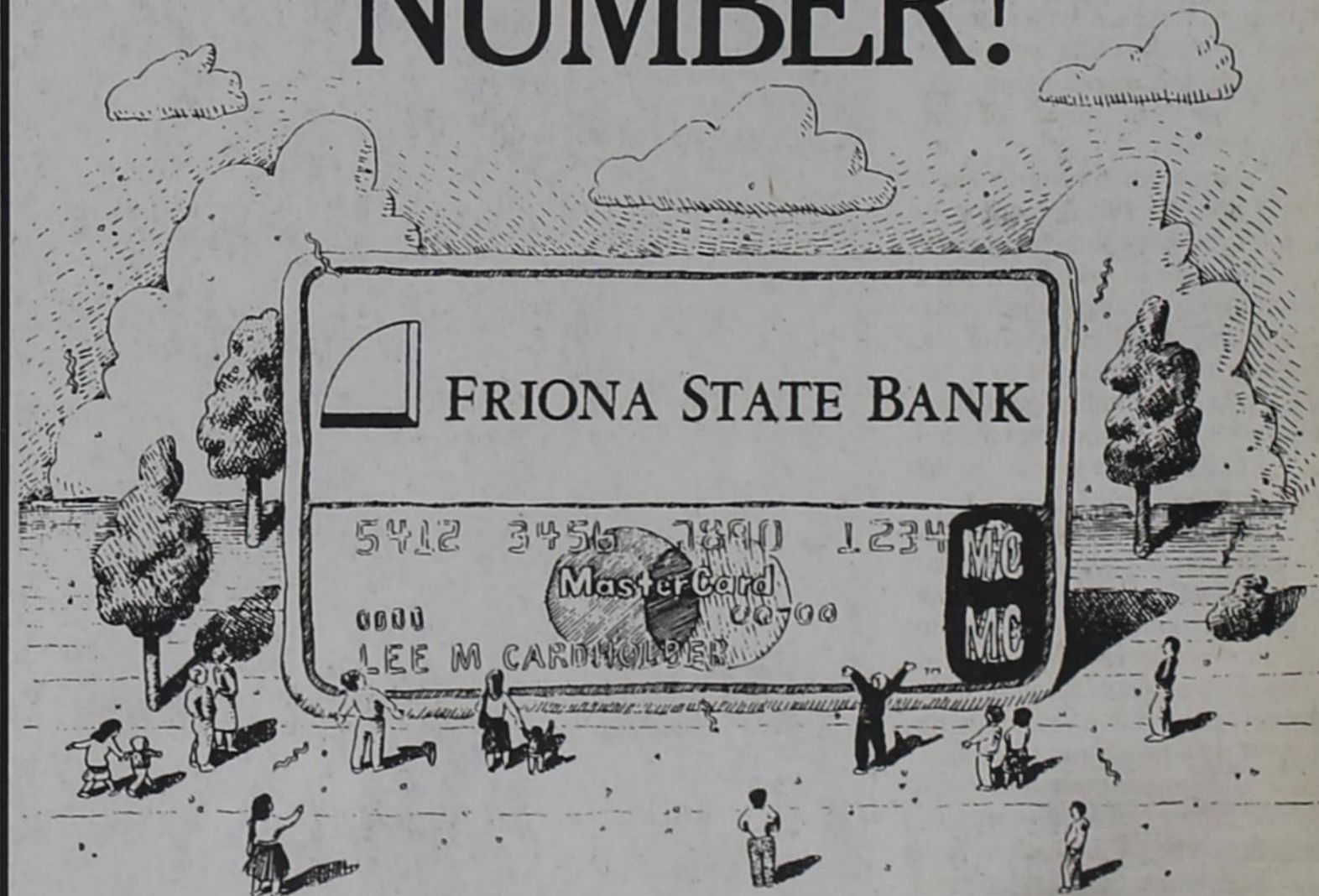

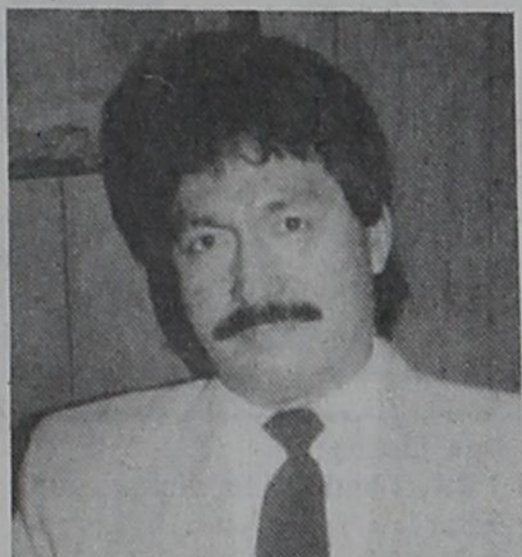

Chiefs Throw Scare Into Wildcats, 7-14

The Friona High School Chieftains almost put it all together in their game against Littlefield here last Friday, but a late score by the Wildcats allowed them to escape from Chieftain Field with a 14-7 win.

The Chiefs hopped onto a Wildcat fumble on Littlefield's second play from scrimmage, with Scott Houston recovering for the Chieftains on the Littlefield 40 yard-line.

Five plays later, quarterback Blair Burney hit Ismael Rocha for a 24-yard catch and run, to get the opportunistic Chieftains on the scoreboard first.

Britt Conklin kicked the PAT, and Friona had grabbed a 7-0 lead with 7:42 left in the opening quarter.

This fired up the Chieftain defense, which held the Wildcats for no gain on three plays and forced a punt.

Friona was driving when Littlefield's Everett Young intercepted a Burney pass with 4:11 left in the first period. The Wildcats took advantage of the turnover, and marched 63 yards for the tying touchdown.

Michael Vaught passed to Pete DeLeon on a 23-yard scoring play. James Bond's extra point tied the score with 0:48 left in the opening quarter.

Littlefield threatened to score in the second quarter, but Houston intercepted a Wildcat pass to end that drive.

Neither team was able to do anything during the third quarter.

Littlefield next drove to the Friona 11 yard-line, but Bond's field goal try was wide left with 7:38 left in the game, as the score remained deadlocked, 7-7.

The 'Cats again advanced to the Friona 11, lost back to the 16, where they disdained the field goal and tried a pass, that fell incomplete. Friona got the ball with 1:47 left on the clock.

The Chiefs pulled out all the stops trying to score, and turned the ball back to Littlefield at the

Friona 44 with 37 seconds left.

Vaught hit Cary Hanlin for 29 yards on first down to the Friona 15.

After two incomplete passes, Goodson ran to the three yard-line with 18 seconds left. On the next play, Vaught connected with DeLeon in the end zone for the

winning Td with just six seconds left to play.

The Chiefs gave it one last fling, as Burney connected with Brian Herring on a 42-yard gainer as Littlefield deployed eight defensive men. But time ran out with the Chieftains on the Wildcat 27 yard-line.

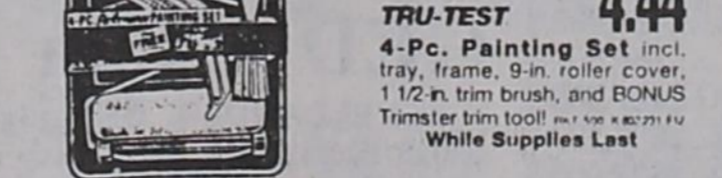

Research, Discussion Needed On Family, Community Issues

By James F. Veninga

The family is often seen as a model for our image of nationhood; indeed, an image of how life should be organized and lived.

Though it is appropriate to build images of wholeness, happiness and health for both family and the nation, clinging to idealized models can be detrimental, distorting our perception of social reality, inhibiting constructive public policy and community action.

We know what is happening, sort of: the continued breakup of the family; high divorce rates--the U.S. leads the world in that category--and growing single parenting; latchkey children; teenage pregnancy--Texas leads the nation--at all-time levels; unrelenting violence and domestic abuse; absent fathers; overwhelmed mothers; confused and sick children; displaced elderly.

The Preparing for Texas in the 21st Century book series, published by the Texas Committee for the Humanities, contends that we cannot know where we are, or

where we are tending, unless we know *who* we are. Issues of the family, issues of who we are, need to be brought fully into the light of day so that we can understand. Funds must be allocated for research and for public discussion of its results.

It will take time. Education is the key. Texas House of Representatives Speaker Pro Tem Wilhelm Delco tells us that "we are learning the hard way in Texas that our only really renewable resource is the minds of our people."

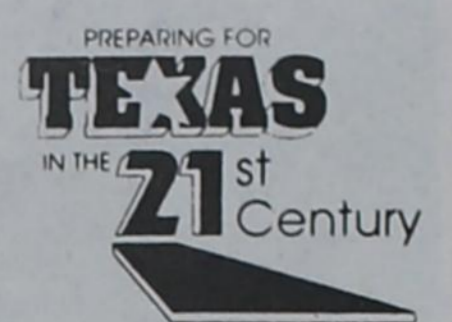
But public policies that intersect with these issues in countless ways--from fair and progressive tax codes to affordable housing to equality of opportunity to parenting leaves--are also very important.

We will need to see ourselves as part of a wider family, the family of Texans, and we will need to show concern and compassion for all members of that family. Anything less threatens the delicate fabric that holds society together.

Family stress often reflects community stress. More and better research needs to be undertaken on those dramatic fissures that seem to be shaking our communities to the ground, as a first step toward greatly improved public policies. Symptoms of powerful problems--inadequate child care, shrinking home ownership, street violence, crumbling down towns, government mismanagement, corporate greed, outdated transportation systems--abound, reinforcing public cynicism.

And we will need public programs--neighborhood gatherings to city-wide conferences--that invite citizens to express concerns, identify problems and share in the proposing of solutions. Civic conversation--the frank exchange of ideas on things that matter--will be crucial to our survival in the 21st century. We must equip citizens with the intellectual tools needed to participate in this conversation.

This is the fifth in a series of eleven articles made available by the Texas Committee for the Hu-



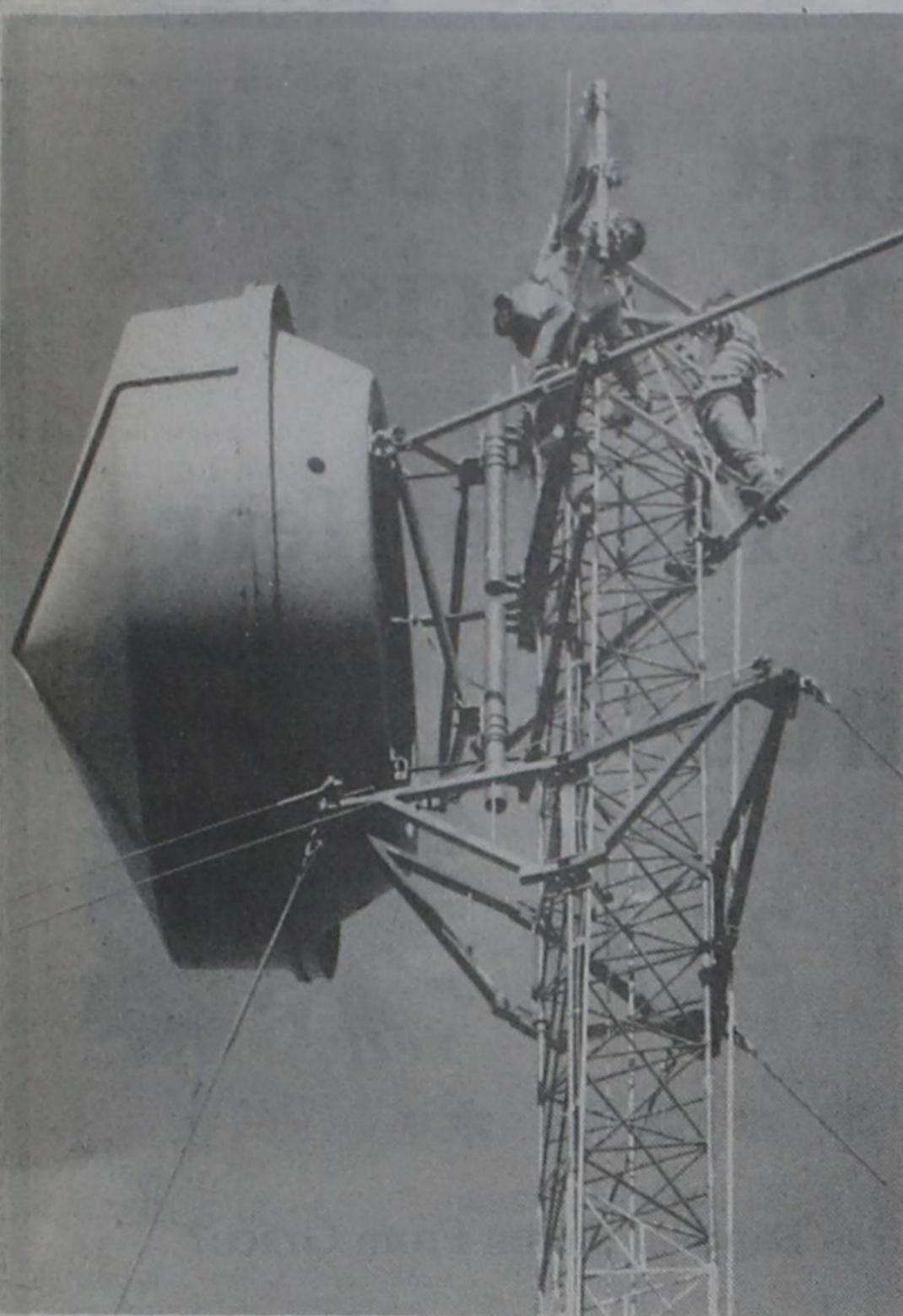

Local Group Sets Hereford Program

Like most major projects, The Salt River Show is the product of many years' work and a long-held dream.

Salt River Productions president Ron Blakley is a member of the famous Blakley musical family of Lubbock, having left high school to join a nationally touring country-western band and playing pedal steel guitar at the Golden Nugget in Las Vegas, Nevada, while still a teenager.

He played in various musical groups in the succeeding years, recently including the Gospel group, Judah, but it has been 12 years since he played his last night club.

That was when Blakley surprised himself one night by speaking to a Lubbock minister for several hours on the telephone and then praying for a new life—a prayer that was answered over the next number of years as he earned his interdenominational minister's license, pastored a Lubbock church and developed his idea for The Salt River Show.

He began organizing the show last year and this past summer took it to its first three appearances in Silverton, Paducah and the Texas Boys Ranch Chili Cookoff at Buffalo Springs Lake near Lubbock.

A 13-minute video was recorded, an album was released on his Mega Records label and now a fall tour is being booked with performances slated in Colorado City, Hereford, Grafado, Texas, near Possum Kingdom Lake, Muleshoe, Portales and Roswell, N.M., Paducah and other towns and cities around West Texas and Eastern New Mexico.

The show comes to Hereford at 7 p.m. Saturday, October 26 at The Country Opry on West Highway 60.

Blakley usually holds a church service on the Sunday morning following the Saturday night show in the same city; however, there is not a "call" to believers during the Saturday night show. The show includes a "Gospel set" of Christian-oriented material along with modern and traditional country music and bluegrass music.

The Salt River Show has been acclaimed everywhere it has been presented, for the quality of music and the family-oriented content of the show. Each of the 22 songs performed during the two-hour show is carefully considered so that people of all ages and sensibilities may be safely invited in. There is no reference to adultery or drinking, for example.

But several contemporary Top 40 country-western songs are in the program, giving the show a decidedly modern flair.

Blakley says the show organization "holds no lesser values" than the music industry leaders "who believe in the fundamentals on which our country was founded.

"We believe in good, wholesome entertainment for the entire family," he said. "We strive toward this goal in every Salt River Show."

Besides playing pedal steel and singing, Blakley plays dobro, acoustic and lead guitar and banjo. He is joined in the show by guitarist, Sonny Grant, bassist-singer, Kim Townsend, percussionist, Mike Huffman, and singers, Holly Dec, Kim Wisdom and Bob Campbell.

The show features several Gospel and country songs that have been composed by band members.

Sound and lighting for The Salt River Show is by Glenn Ballard of Clear Sound Co. of Lubbock, where the group's first album, "Salt River Showcase," was recorded.

Letter To The Editor



Dear Editor:

Very soon you will be hearing much about an election to be held in Friona on January 18, 1992. The purpose of this election will be to determine if the citizens of Friona will allow bingo to be played within the city limits of Friona.

This election is the result of efforts by Parmer County Memorial Post 1413 of Veterans of Foreign Wars. We want the citizens of Friona to know that our intentions are to keep money that is already leaving town here at home, so it can benefit Friona. We aren't trying to solicit or entice anyone to play who isn't already playing.

Laws in the State of Texas strictly mandate how bingo games are to be run. Briefly, 35% of gross receipts have to be given to charity; all the net profit has to be given to charity; gross receipts are

taxed by the state at the rate of 5%. In this case, the City of Friona will have the right to tax gross receipts at the rate of 2%; no one under the age of 18 will be allowed to participate without the presence of parent or guardian; and no alcoholic beverages will be allowed.

The VFW is a charitable organization by charter. All the money made by our Post, other than expenses necessary to maintain the Post, would be given to different charities and worthy causes anyway. Parmer County Memorial Post 1413 of Friona has no intentions of turning our facility into a bar.

It should be evident that VFW Post 1413 strictly intends to use the proceeds derived from bingo for the betterment of Friona and not in anyway to degrade, discredit or dishonor the citizens of the City of Friona.
