



**Carlton 7th Grade Rates High on 1959 State Testing Program**

This is the report of tests administered to Carlton students during the fall of 1959 under the Texas State Testing Program. Although these reports are confidential, Supt. A. J. Barron released certain information of general nature. Individual results are available to teachers, individual students, parents of students, and guidance personnel.

On the California Test of Mental Maturity the Carlton Seventh Grade Students scored higher on the language than the non-language phase. This would seem to indicate that the individual student is developing at a rate near the top of his ability. All of these scores were bunched near the fiftieth percentile which means that this group of children compared favorably with other groups of children taking the test in Texas. For instance a percentile rank of 51 means that this score is better than 51 other children of the same grade taking the test, but that 49 scores were better.

Achievement tests measure specific outcome of instruction. That is the extent to which a student has acquired certain information or mastered certain skills. Because present educational achievement is an important indicator of probable future success in dealing with similar materials, achievement tests are in a sense measures of scholastic aptitude.

Of the Carlton Students taking the test only one was below the 17th percentile and four rated the 99th. The students made the best scores in Reading Comprehension, Arithmetic Fundamentals, and English Grammar.

From the results of the tests given last year, Carlton can be proud that their students were 1.5 grades above average in achievement.
