

Some few years ago a Grain Sorghum Producers Association was organized up in the plains market development, etc. As a result of this, the export and other feed grains have increased remarkably. Since 1958 exports have skyrocketed to unpre-12 billion tons in 1958-1959.

You and I take grain sorghums for granted, and assume that that others are aware of the feeding value of the grain. We know that grain scighums can be substituted, gound for pound, for corn in our poultry rations and livestock rations. This fact is not too well known to some of the nations foreign export trade.

During the past few summers, the producers association, and others, have sent a number of county agents and others, men who know grain sorghums, to Italy, Germany, Greece and other European countries carrying the feed story. Feed grain demonstrations were exhibited at the major fairs in Europe in 1959 so that foreign feed handlers, feeders and others associated with livestock feeding operations might know the value of feed grains in balanced

The demand for more grain sorghum was highly significant and an indicator that European traders and feeders were viewing U.S. grown grains with favor. We are all aware of the effect that foreign trade has on the local price of many farm products, that a good foreign trade helps take care of some of the surpluses that develop. It seems that grain sorghum production will continue to increase and as the increase takes place, there will be a need for an outlet. Let's hope that this foreign trade will continue to increase and that we will not have large surplusses to build up.





"We pray that The National Foundation which, through public contributions to the March of Dimes, financed the development of the Salk polio vaccine, will in time also solve the puzzle of birth de-fects, which are the largest unmet childhood medical problem in our country today.'

Emphasizing the enormity of the problem, Mrs. Breese cited statistics showing that 250,-000 infants in the United States are born annually with significant birth defects. Also, because of these congenital malformations, 34,000 babies a year in the nation are stillborn or die in the first four weeks
