## Coppini Academy Art Exhibit To Be Shown Oct. 28, Nov. 5

A notable art collection will be shown in Hico Saturday, October 28 through Sunday, November 5 at the Community Public Service Building when the Hico Rotary Club and the Hico Art Club jointly sponsor the Coppini Academy of Fine Arts' exhibition from San Antonio.

Oil paintings, water colors, and sculpture by well-known artists will be on display. Also featured will be art work of local school students.

Among the participating artists who will be present for the exhibit is Dr. Waldine Tauch, nationally known sculptor, who was co-founder of this organization and is the present sponsor. In 1956 she was named San Antonio's outstanding woman in Art. In 1960 she was honored by the Beta Sigma Phi for her accomplishments in the field of art. Her sculpture may be found throughout the United States. She recently completed a monument honoring the Texas Ranger of Today which is placed in the Terminal Building, Love Field, Dallas.

Artists to be represented are: Harold R. Roney, a native of Illinois, who has his own studio in San Antonio and is noted for his landscape paintings and creative art.

Joy Harrell Carrington, who in addition to her excellent portraits and landscapes in oil, has won acclaim for her outstanding ability

in designing and executing hand illuminated scrolls and certificates. She designed and executed the beautiful certificate presented to Sir Winston Churchill when he was made an honorary member of the Academy.

John Bob Payne, who came to Texas from Tennessee 50 years ago and has become well-known for his colorful reproductions of the scenery of his adopted state. His Texas scenes prove very popular with the public.

Porfirio Salinas, who is well known for his Texas landscapes and has recently had several of his paintings reproduced on the covers of "The Humble Way" magazine. He is represented by paintings in the White House.

Erwin O. Wesp, art director of the Academy, who has exhibits throughout Texas. He finds early Texas homes and historical spots interesting subject matter for paintings.

Melvan D. Jordan, exhibition director of the Academy, who has

found much paintable material on his trips to Puerto Rico and creates, colorful watercolors and oil paintings.

Ramon Froman, portrait artist living in Dallas, is represented in permanent collections at SMU, Tarleton, and University of Texas libraries. An accomplished watercolorist, he is well known for his excellent ability to reproduce personality on canvas.

The exhibit will be free and the public is invited to attend.

The Art Club will give a tea Sunday afternoon, Oct. 29 from 1 to 5 o'clock, and the Review Club will sponsor a tea Thursday, Nov. 2 at 4 o'clock at the CPS building honoring art patrons from Hico and neighboring towns. A number of out of town visitors will be present at the exhibit and teas.

The Coppini artists reflect a variety of media and subject matter that will appeal to the layman as well as the art connoisseur. They are leaders in the current movement of back to realism in art.

This will be the final home game of the year for the locals, and a large crowd is expected to be on hand for the 7:30 kickoff. Next week the Tigers have an open date, and go to Evant for the season finale on November 10.

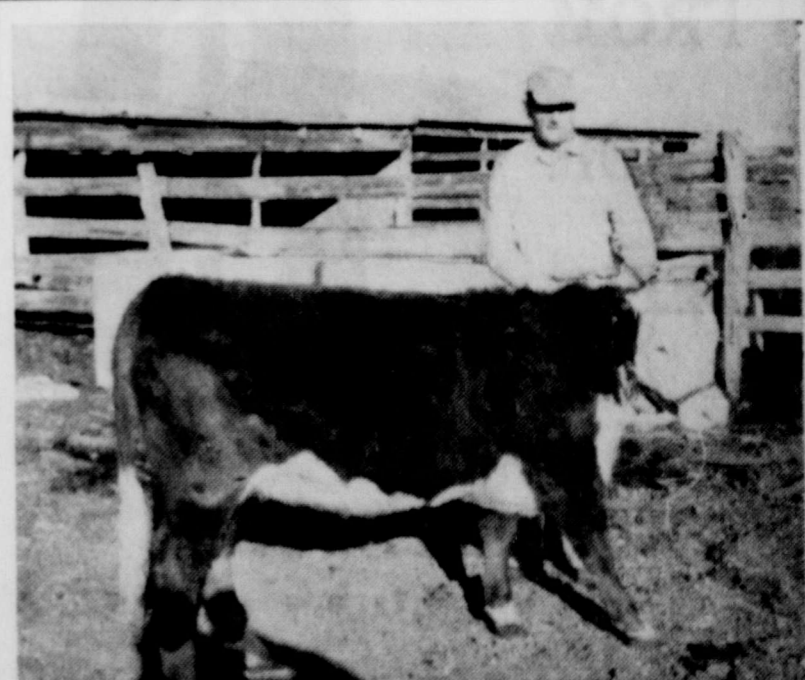
## Co. Baptist Churches Observe Demonstration Day October 29

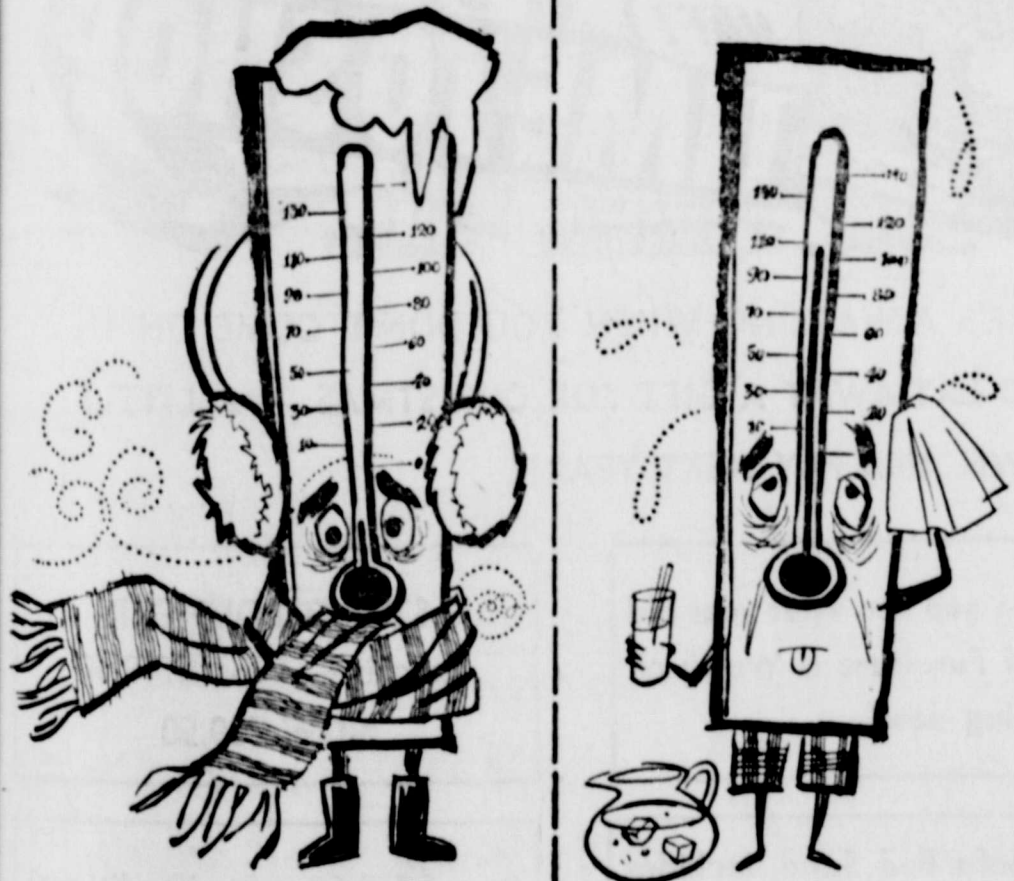

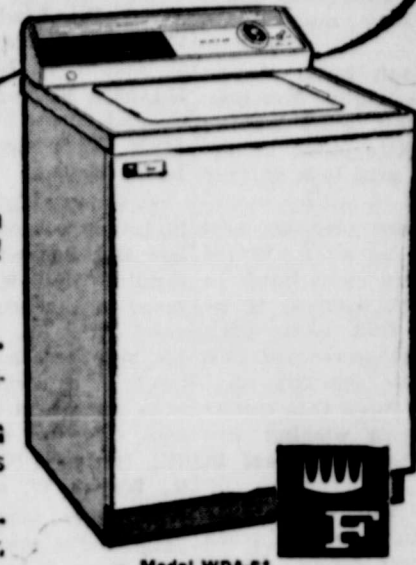

### THIS WEEK IN AUSTIN—

## Highlights and Sidelights

City officials in Texas got a warning from Chief Engineer John Vandertulp of the State Board of Engineers.

He said Texas had better get moving on its water projects.

Vandertulp's staff has just completed a water study outlining ways in which Texas cities and industries could meet their water needs for 1980. Half of the 14 reservoirs now under construction in Texas will be too small to supply their service areas by then.

It is going to take \$1,000,000,000 to build the reservoirs, treatment plants and distribution systems to provide water the Texas of 1980 will need. It will also take planning and working—starting now—to get the 45 new reservoirs proposed by the Board of Water Engineers' plan built and full of water by or before 1980.

Plan is endorsed in most details by the U.S. Study Commission.

Sales Tax Modification  
State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert thinks it time to change the oil tax plan just adopted by the Legislature.

Constitution allocates the new sales tax on motor oil to the State Highway fund for road building. Consequently the corner service station man must keep books on this tax separately from sales taxes he collects for the State's General Fund.

Calvert plans to suggest to the Legislature that this oil tax be levied at the jobber level, same as gasoline sales tax. This will simplify bookkeeping and collecting.

Speaker James A. Turman agreed that there are inequities in the new sales tax which the Legislature should correct. First to talk openly about paying the tax under protest were the vending machine people. They can't collect sales tax on items selling for less than 25 cents, but they must pay sales tax on their gross sales.

Texas Merchandise Vending Association plans to ask for a court ruling.

Last Go-Round.  
Sale of \$25,000,000 in bonds for the Veterans Land Board completes the borrowing by the State government for that program. Voters authorized \$200,000,000 to finance purchases of farms and ranches for veterans.

In the last year about \$37,500,000 has been invested in land since the program was revived after an increase in the authorized interest rate.

L. H. Page of Carthage, member of the Veterans Land Board, estimated that veterans will pay enough extra interest that the state will have made \$100,000,000 profit on this program by 2005. That is when the last loan is supposed to be paid off.

More Study  
Governor Price Daniel asked the Legislative Council to bring its 1958 study on loans and interest rates up to date.

Governor Daniel now seems likely to call the Legislature back in session in January. He wants up to date facts on the subject of regulation of interest rates and lenders. Regular session just could not reach agreement.

He will ask also for passage of a bill extending the new escheat enforcement procedures to unclaimed bank accounts in banks and savings institutions.

First Runner  
Sen. Preston Smith of Lubbock became the first candidate for Lieutenant Governor in the Democratic primary next May 5.

Smith, who served three terms in the House of Representatives and five years in the Senate, ran third in the 1950 lieutenant governor's race. That was the year Ben Ramsey won the runoff and started the first of his six terms in office.

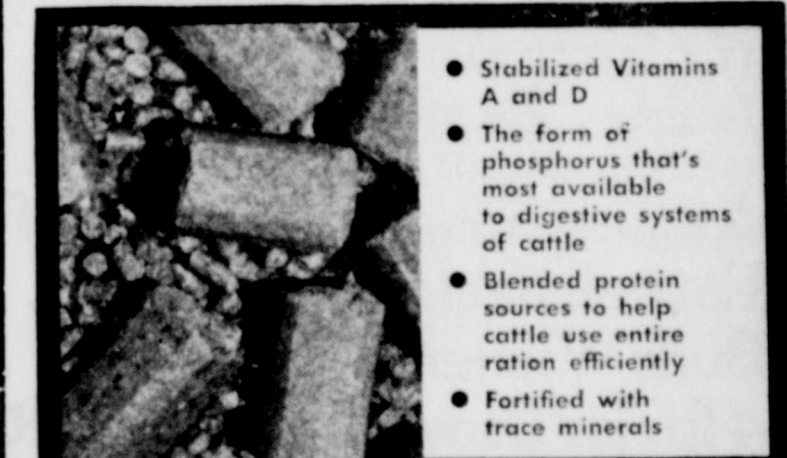

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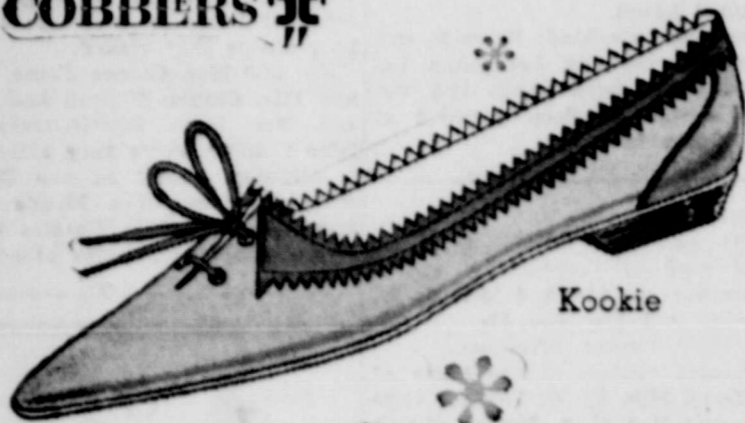

## Eagles Continue High-Flying Ways Against Local Tigers

The Hico Tigers, playing one of their best games of the year, threw a scare into the touted Valley Mills Eagles last Friday night before bowing 26-12 at Tiger Stadium.

One of the best spectator games of the year, fans saw a wide open game which featured hard hitting, a lot of offense, and some fine defensive plays.

The Eagles jumped into a quick 6-0 lead, and increased that margin to 12-0 shortly before the end of the first quarter.

Not to be denied, the locals bounced right back and scored twice themselves, going out at intermission with the scoreboard reading 12-12.

The TD was delayed momentarily by Harold Hathcock who made a great save on the opening kickoff at the Tiger 39. From the 39 the Eagles used six plays to cover the distance with the payoff being a 19 yard pass from Jerry Hinton to Darrell Hinton.

The Eagles had to work a little harder for their second touchdown going 83 yards in 11 plays with Lonnie Bland pushing the final yard for the score.

The first period ended after the kickoff, with Hico in possession at their own 32. From there 12 plays were used to march the 68 yards, with a 22 yard pass, Don Jernigan to Larry Erick lighting the scoreboard. On the play Erick hustled down the right sideline, cut back over the middle and took the pass between two defenders for the score. Try for two points failed by Mike Lowe, and the Tigers were still behind 12-6.

The Tigers struck quick for the tying counter, recovering a Valley Mills fumble at the 31 on the

first play after the kickoff. The payoff came on an 18-yard pitch from Jernigan to Robert Reed. An attempted pass for the two point conversion was no good, leaving the score 12-12. Alan Solsbery, used sparingly during the night due to an injury, recovered the fumble that set up the score.

One of the biggest plays of the night came in the closing seconds of the first half when Casey swooped under an Eagle pass on the goal line and ran the ball out to the 29. The play saved a sure touchdown. The locals managed to get off three plays before the half ended.

Valley Mills repaid the locals by intercepting a Tiger pass to set up their go-ahead score. Sanderson intercepted at the 35 and rushed down to the Tiger 7 before being hauled in. Kimbrough got the marker on a five yard blast, making the score 18-12.

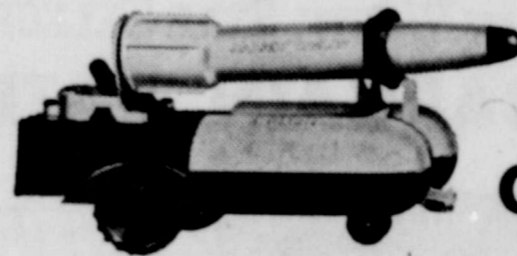
