Hico at Whitney Tonight; Mumps Bench 2 Cagers

The amazing roundballers hit road tonight, Friday, journeying to Whitney for a clash with Wildcats in a pair of games to begin at 7 o'clock.

The Hico boy's team, undefeated in district play, will attempt to keep their record intact for showdown series next week their foremost challenger for district honors, the Valley Mills.

Coach Jack Barnett reports Wednesday that two of the cagers, Larry Erick and Al Rutledge, were down with mumps, and both were finally out of the game with Whitney Friday night.

Jack led scorers in Tuesday night's game with Cranfills, and his loss to the team could affect the final outcome of the district chase.

The girls will go against the team they defeated in first district play, and the local lassies in the game with an outside chance of getting in a play-off for league championship. They defeated the first half winners, Cranfills Gap, Tuesday night of the week to gain the chance. The girls have one blotch on their record for second half play, dropping a decision to Meridian last Friday night. However, like the team, they have not met Valley Mills, who could be the deciding factor in the final outcome in the district chase.

The games Friday night with Valley Mills are "must win" affairs, should the boys come through expected, the stage will be set for the showdown with pre-season rivals Valley Mills next Friday, February 9, and Tuesday, Feb. 13. The dates were changed again last week after a technicality over the original Thursday Saturday dates first set.

The Tigers will travel to Valley Mills for the first game, which will complete the first half of the round-robin schedule. Then following Tuesday night the girls will return the favor by going to the Hico gym for the first games in district play.

Last Friday night the locals met Meridian in a pair of house games, with the boys winning handily and the girls flipping their second decision of the season to Meridian.

Tuesday night's games with Cranfills Gap at the Hico gym, local girls came from behind in the final period to upset the red Gap sextet.

Field goal by Margaret Warren with 3 minutes 20 seconds left the clock, put the locals ahead the first time in the game. Warren never relinquished. Warren had tied the game a few seconds earlier with a two pointer.

Cranfills Gap led at the end of first quarter 10-5, at the half 16-11 at the three-quarter mark. The locals won the game 24-16.

The final stanza by out-scoring visitors 11 points to two, with final score being 34-29.

athy Higginbotham ripped the net for 16 points for honors, followed by Warren with 11. Jane scored 4 and Martha Padk pushed in three more for locals.

The locals jumped to a 13.5 first quarter lead, increased the margin to 25-11 at the half, and pumped in 14 more points in the third

for a 39.16 lead starting the final period.

Most of Gap's points came late in the final period when they scored five consecutive buckets for 10 points to cut the final score down to 51-31.

Everything points to next Friday and Tuesday nights, when either Hico or Valley Mills will be crowned district champ. (If they both get by Whitney between now and then.)

Important Cotton Meeting to Be Held Wednesday, Feb. 7

"Cotton remains the major cash field crop of the county," says Ralph Lawrence, county agent. "In 1959 the income from all field crops amounted to \$1,992,821 and of this amount approximately one-third came from cotton. It is believed that this income might be raised should more growers strive to improve their production practices," the agent continued.

To assist them in this a cotton meeting has been scheduled Wednesday night, February 7 in the district court room, starting at 7:30.

Lawrence said that Fred Elliott, Cotton Specialist, R. L. Ridgway, Extension Entomologist, and E. G. Reeves, Cotton Ginning and Mechanization Specialist all of A&M College, will have parts on the program for the night.

These specialists will present latest cotton information in their lines of work.

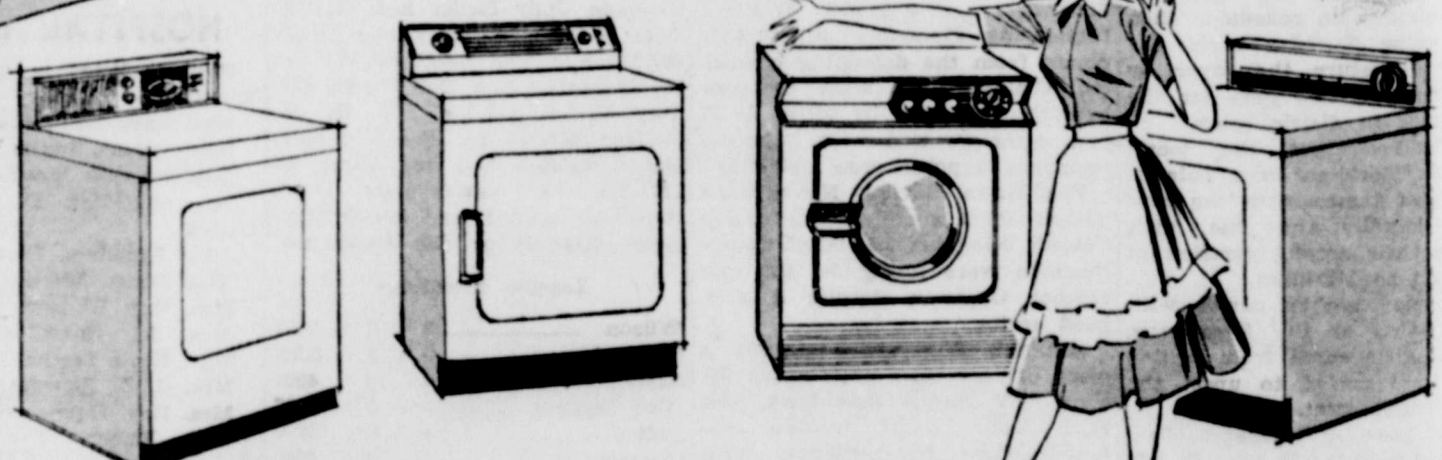

WASHINGTON—

As It Looks From Here

By OMAR BURLESON, M.C. 17th District, Texas



In a recent address here in Washington, the noted Columnist Walter Lippmann referred to the "Frustrations of our Time."

He mentioned a Christmas message from a friend who said of 1961 "Another year of frustration, confusion and compromise is about over."

There are, of course, millions who are experiencing a frustration and confusion, the exact quality of which has never been known before.

There was a time when war was an ultimate and a last solution to changes because of religion, social, economic, political and legal conditions. This is no longer the case in a situation where opposing forces have weapons of such destructive force that neither side could win. Unlike 16 or 17 years ago, war is no longer a useable instrument for national purposes. It is as Mr. Eisenhower said, "There is no alternative to peace."

On the other hand, considering the kind of world in which we live, there are conditions demanded by our adversaries, worse than war.

But is there an alternative to both these propositions? I think there is.

On September 22, 1961, I introduced a Resolution which I think is, and should be, an immediate

first step to achieve the alternative.

It is as follows: Whereas it is recognized throughout the world that a cold war exists between the free nations and the Communist bloc nations; and

Whereas foreign aid in various forms has been a principal instrument of United States foreign policy in combating its adversaries in the cold war; and

Whereas the United States has depended upon an appreciation by assisted nations for a quid pro quo; and

Whereas there is evidenced a lack of response on the part of many nations to cooperate in opposing international communism; and

Whereas recognizing such failure and recognizing the inevitability of the cold war continuing through decades to come; and

Whereas the Communist bloc nations are a disciplined bloc to trade only to their advantage with the free nations of the world; and

Whereas many free and uncommitted nations, by reason of their failure or unwillingness to recognize Communist menace both in ideology and in physical aggression, maintain trade relations with, and thereby contribute to the strength of, the Communist

bloc: Now, therefore, be it Resolved by the House of Representatives (the Senate concurring) that it is the sense of the Congress that it is urgent that the present foreign policy of the United States of America be altered to definitely define the cold war and to identify those nations willing to assume responsibility in winning it by (1) agreeing to strict economic sanctions against all nations dominated by international communism, and (2) by agreeing to the cessation of all trade intercourse with the Communist bloc nations.

Sec. 2. It is further the sense of the Congress that the United States of America should (1) call for a convention of all nations willing to cooperate for the purpose of ending all trade with the Communist bloc nations, and (2) should apply sanctions to those nations dominated by a Communist regime, and all other nations who furnish goods or materials of whatever nature to said Communist bloc, including reshipment of transshipment, received from nations agreeing to apply economic sanctions to Communist bloc nations.

This sort of action may supercede the United Nations and all other international organizations. It would cause all to stand up and be counted. It would identify those who are serious about the life and death struggle of the cold war. It would put us and nations of a like mind on the offensive and get us out of the timid defensive position which has been our practice since World War II. It could be the immediate first major action to bring us out of frustration, confusion, compromise, and indecision.

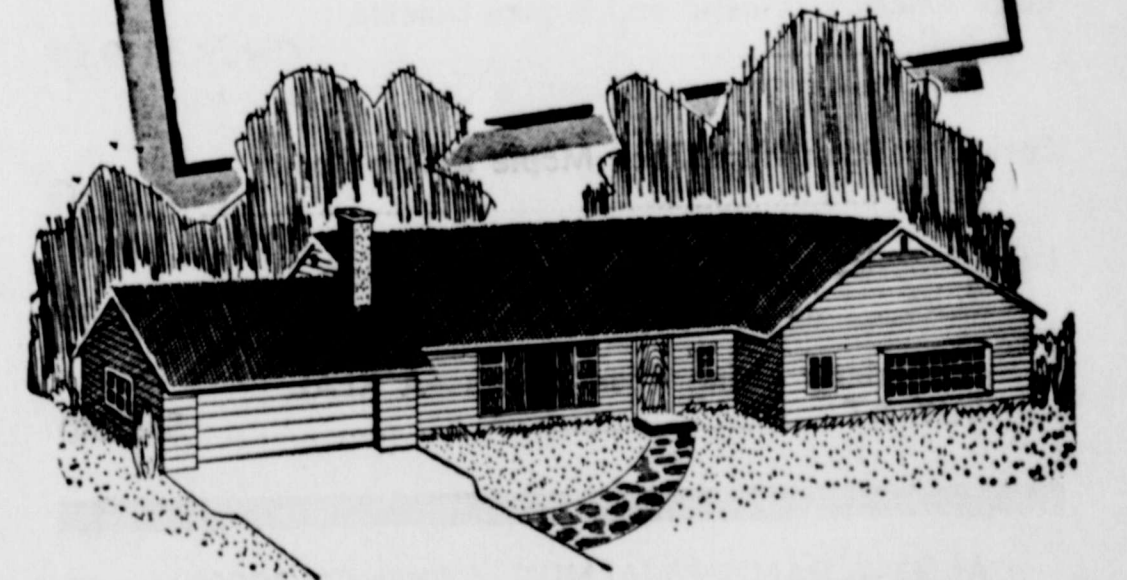
In my opinion, it is the alternative.

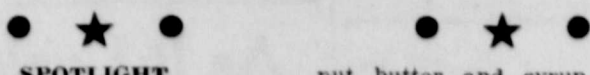

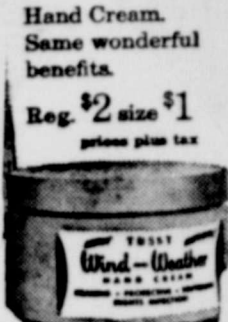

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By E. R. LAWRENCE

The night of Wednesday, February 7, there will be an important cotton meeting in the district court room starting at 7:30. Cotton producers of the county are all invited.

Fred Elliott, Cotton Specialist, B. G. Reeves, Cotton Ginning and Mechanization Specialist, and R. L. Ridgway, Extension Entomologist, all of College Station will be on the program. Some of the things to be discussed are mechanical harvesting, production practices, fertilizers, varieties, cotton defoliants and cotton insect control.

Garlon Streater announces that there will be a meeting of the Wolf Club in the district court room Thursday night, February 8. This meeting will start at 7:30. Members and others interested are invited.

People who have any livestock are urged to make their contributions to the Screwworm Control Program. Late announcement indicates that if the program can be put into operation this spring, we will not have screwworms to bother with this year.

The hard freeze this winter has pushed the overwintering flies to their most southern limits. By setting up the control area this spring it is expected to block them off from the other parts of the state.

If you have not contributed and would like to cooperate with the program, just make out your check to the Hamilton County Screwworm Control Program and mail it or leave it at any of the banks. Stockmen are being asked to make only one contribution and will not be asked for more in the future.

Indications now are that quite a bit of the small grain crop has not been killed out. However, lots of crops are damaged and lots of them are killed out.

Regardless of what your intentions are with small grains an application of from 20 to 40 pounds of nitrogen per acre should pay off if moisture is adequate. This means grazing the crop later, or harvesting for grain or making hay. The fertilizer should be applied after danger of killing freezes and before the grain joints. Nitrogen applications increase the protein levels of grain.

The McGregor Experiment Station for many years has been putting down 100 pounds of 16-20-0 ahead of grain sorghums, and they say it has paid each year, even through the very dry years of a few years back.

Where's the Money Coming From?

Gov. Price Daniel's proposal that the 57th Legislature approve appropriations of \$300,000 for tourist advertising, \$100,000 expansion in the juvenile parole system and \$150,000 for repair to the San Jacinto Monument seemed to be in danger when Rep. James M. Cotten of Weatherford got the House to endorse appropriation of \$220,000 for special session expenses.

According to the State Comptroller's estimate, this would leave less than \$300,000 for the governor's projects. But Governor Daniel powwowed with Speaker James A. Turman and Senator Charles Herring, as well as State Treasurer Jesse James.

He reported that James' first report on anticipated income from the Eschet Enforcement Act, submitted since the Comptroller made his estimate, lists more than \$2,000,000 in reports tabulated to date.

"I have asked the Comptroller to consider this," Daniel said, "and I believe it will be possible for him to raise his estimate enough to take care of the recommendations before the Legislature."

The Senate Finance Committee came up with a compromise bill authorizing \$200,000 for tourist advertising, \$75,000 for monument repairs, \$65,000 for the juvenile parole system, plus \$79,600 for a marine laboratory at Seabrook.

Short Snorts

The Texas Municipal League reports that nine states, including Alabama, Arizona, California, Louisiana and Mississippi, allow cities to levy sales taxes, in addition to state sales taxes.

Internal Revenue District Director R. L. Phinney reminds farmers and ranchers that they must file self-employment tax forms, even if they owe no income tax for last year.
