## ANNUAL CLEAN-UP SET NEXT WEEK

Saturday, April 21, through Wednesday, April 25, has been proclaimed as Annual Clean-Up time in Hico by Mayor D. E. Bulloch.

Trash placed in containers and set at the curb will be hauled off free of charge by the city, on two separate days during the campaign.

Haul-off days are Tuesday, April 24, and Wednesday, April 25.

The mayor has called upon every citizen to render all the aid and cooperation possible, pledging the support of city officials in maintaining Hico's

record for sightliness and healthful conditions.

Mayor Bulloch pointed out that there is always an accumulation of trash about the premises of residences over town, and that constant effort is required to maintain sanitary conditions and control the mosquito problem here.

City officials are urging every one to cut weeds in ditches, gather up old tin cans, empty trash barrels, and do anything else that will help the appearance of premises during this special period of cleaning.

Officials are especially stress-

ing the need to gather up all old cans, and any type container which might be holding stagnant water. Weeds and other vegetation around premises are growing rapidly and should be cleaned away.

The mayor emphasized the necessity of placing all trash in containers to speed the cleanup program. All containers should be placed as near a curb as possible to be more accessible to the haulers.

Trash barrels, garbage cans, and other metal containers should have poles punched in the bottom to allow excess water to drain.

## Absentee Balloting Underway

Absentee balloting in Hamilton County for the May 5th Democratic Primary began Monday, April 16, according to Mrs. Vada Williams, County Clerk.

Deadline for absentee votes is Tuesday, April 17.

Mrs. Williams stated that her office would remain open all day the next two Saturdays to accommodate those desiring to cast an absentee ballot.

The clerk stressed the fact that those who desire to vote absentees must go to the clerk's office, unless they are disabled. In such case ballots will be mailed those persons unable to vote at the clerk's office upon receipt of a doctor's statement. Mrs. Williams said that application should be made to her office, giving the name of the family physician. The office would then contact the doctor, and a ballot sent the applicant.

Persons residing outside of the county, but who are eligible to vote here, will be mailed an absentee ballot upon receipt of application. Other people who will be away from town on voting day must make application at the clerk's office in person.

## Referendum Set on Turkey Market Order Proposal

College Station, April 18.—Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman on April 5 called for a referendum of turkey growers June 18 through June 22 on the proposed national marketing order for turkeys.

The order can be made effective by the Secretary if it is approved by two-thirds of the growers voting in the referendum, by number or by volume of production.

F. Z. Beamblossom poultry marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, said two significant changes were noted in the proposed order as released on April 5. First, the base period—for determination of allocation bases to be used in one method of supply management—was 1965 and thereafter will be computed by using the average marketings of the preceding 3 years rather than the average of the previous 5 out of 4 years, and secondly, that producers, growers who produced turkeys under contract with contract, producers who assume or share the risk of loss will have their allocation base one half of

the turkeys so marketed, and the contract, producers, regardless of number, will share the remaining half.

Eligible voters, the specialist said, will be producers, including contract producers whose annual volume of production is large enough to be affected by the order, and who engaged in the production of turkeys during 1961. Qualified cooperative associations are eligible to vote for their members.

Turkey growers who produced and marketed less than 3,600 lbs. of turkey (live weight) in 1961, or producer handlers who produced and handled not more than 100,000 pounds of turkeys (live weight) in their own handling facilities and who bought or sold not more than 5,000 pounds from or to other persons are not eligible to vote.

Voting will be for or against the proposed order and will begin on June 18 under the direction of State and County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committees. Ballots may be cast in person or by mail during the June 18-22 voting period.

## Presentation of Awards Made At Tuesday Scout Ceremony

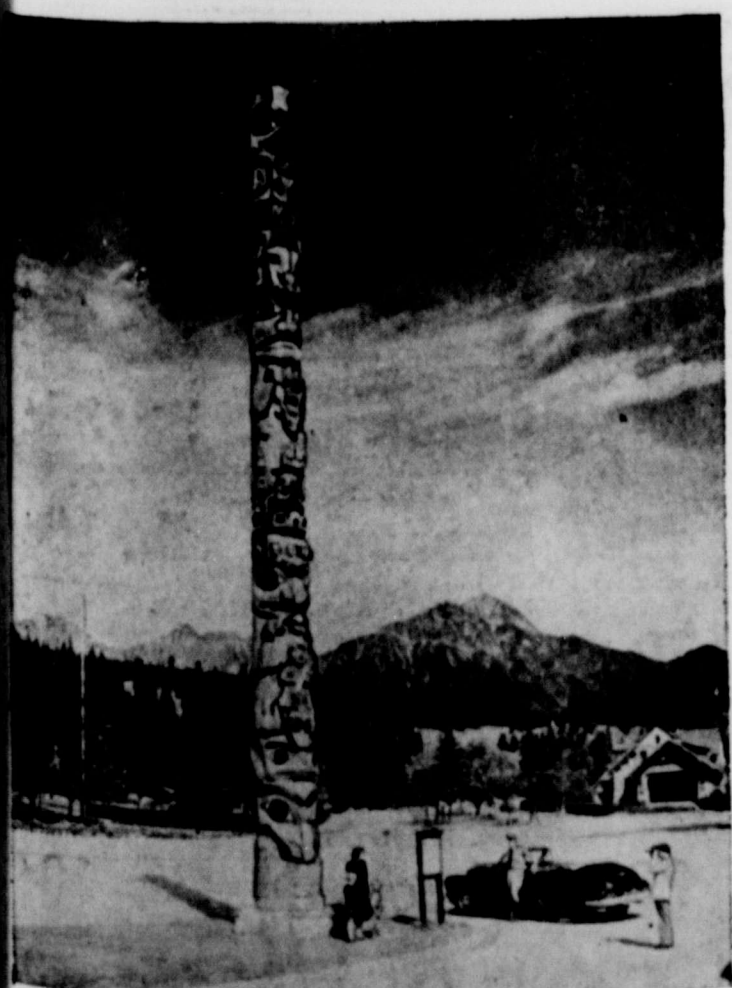

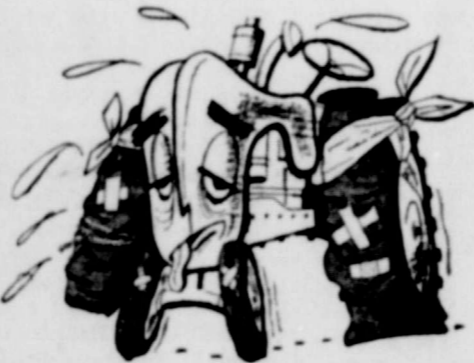

Jesse Chaney's story of his experiences on the Navajo Indian Reservation which appeared in your paper of April 6 interested me very much because I once lived on their reservation in Arizona and other tribes of the U.S. and Mexico. The Navajos interested me more than most other tribes because I considered them to be more social minded by nature than most other tribes. For that reason I thought that if they were given the opportunity that they would be very receptive to our culture. I mean that they are an imitative people. Most of their habits have been imitated from white people.

If my information be correct, their Polygamy was borrowed from a white man's church; also his drunkenness and his dishonesty was white man inspired. Many white persons have dealt dishonestly with the Indian. Do you blame him if he pays us back with interest added? Many white persons would do so at the first opportune time.

The Indian's lot has been a hard one. He was put out there on the desert where a rabbit would die from malnutrition, the whole reservation was his hospital. The Indian woman's maternity ward was a thicket. You say the Indian lacked culture. Yes, but why? Because he has always lacked money and opportunity to get the good things of life. If you were in the Indian's shoes, would you do differently? Maybe not, but we doubt it. I have known Indians that were criminals; also I have known whites that were criminals. No race is perfect by nature. Opportunity is what each and every

As I have told you these people are not inferior by nature—if they are low in the cultural scale it is due to lack of opportunity. We owe this to them.

Quoting from Thomas Collins of Dallas News, re: Mexico, as a land to retire to; after personal investigation Mr. Collins says "Mexicans I like; Mexico is beautiful, but as long as I have all my marbles, I wouldn't retire there."

There are many evils in my opponent's policy. This week and the next I will call your attention to some of the results of his "economy."

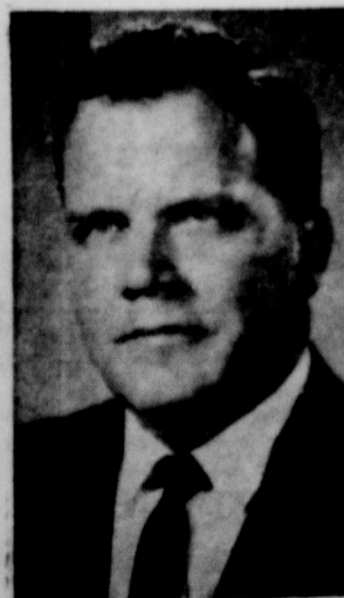
