### Hico High Sophomore Selected For Drama Workshop at U. of T.

Lynn Malone, Hico High School sophomore, has been accepted as one of forty Texas high school students to participate in the annual Drama Workshop to be held at the University of Texas June 10 through 21.

The workshop is limited to 20 boys and 20 girls from Texas high schools, with preference being given to students who were named all-star casts in one-act plays presented by the University Dramatic League this spring. Lynn earned the right to ask for admission to the workshop by his performance as Mr. Flannery in Hico's one-act play, "Mr. Flannery's Ocean" presented in the district meet at Meridian on April 11. At that time he was rated best actor in the meet.

The three weeks spent in the workshop will provide training in acting and the technical aspects of producing plays, with the students participating in plays directed by members of the University drama department, and by high school teachers enrolled in drama courses.

In addition to the courses designed for high school students, workshop participants will be privileged to sit in on certain rehearsals of Kathy Grant Crosby and present George Bernard Shaw's "Pygmalion." Complimentary tickets to the production and several drama plays being presented by drama students will be provided to members of the workshop.

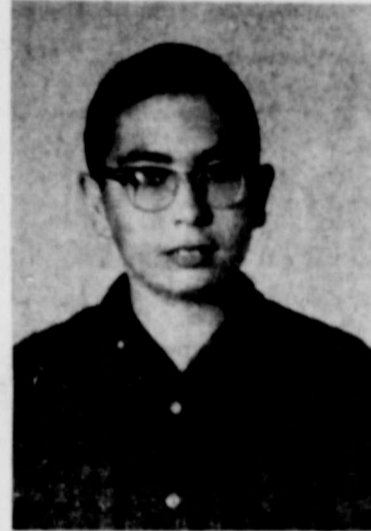
