Tie Develops For Contest Leadership

It's crowded at the top of the Friona Star's football contest. After the tenth week of the event, three contestants were in a deadlock.

Scott Brown of Lazbuddie, Don Gartin of Lariat, and Jackie Morgan were all tied with scores of 147, to lead the overall standings.

Tom Johnson and Mal Manchee of Hereford were tied for second place two points back, with scores of 145.

Next came Ken Stowers, 143, Don Max Vars of Canyon, 142, and Donnie McDonald of Lazbuddie, 141.

Contestants are vying for the grand prize of \$100 cash to be awarded at the conclusion of the 13-week promotion.

In the weekly contest, Brown was the only contestant entering the tenth week to pick 16 of the 20 contest games, and claimed the \$10 cash weekly prize, in addition to moving up a couple of notches into a tie for the overall lead.

Five contestants picked 15 of the 20 games correctly, and two of these captured the other two cash prizes, based on the tie-breaker system.

Tom Johnson claimed second place after missing the Dallas-Houston score by only five points, and Joe Tongate took third place when he missed the score by eight points.

Brown took his win when he only missed Floydada-Littlefield, Canyon/Sanford-Fritch; Notre Dame-Tennessee and UCLA-Stanford.

Johnson missed Tulia-Dimmitt, Lazbuddie-Silverton, Notre Dame-Tennessee, Texas-Houston and the Bronchos-Raiders.

Tongate missed Floydada-Littlefield, Lazbuddie-Silverton, Notre Dame-Tennessee, Texas-Houston and UCLA-Stanford.

Chiefs Snap Streak With 14-6 Victory

Friona High School's Chieftains saved their best until the last half, when they came from behind to defeat the Muleshoe Mules, 14-6 in their season-ender at Chieftain Field last Friday. Both teams entered the game at 0-9.

The Mules drew first blood, on a 51-yard run by Kip McCall on a trap play. Meanwhile, the Chieftain offense, guided by a third quarterback in three games, was sputtering, and the Mules took their 6-0 lead to the dressing room at intermission.

The Chiefs blocked the Mules' attempted PAT kick, and Scott Houston dashed 90 yards for the apparent two-pointer, but for the second time this season, the "reverse conversion" wasn't allowed, due to an early whistle by an official.

(Opinion: UIL officials need to do something about this propensity by officials to ruin this counter-conversion with an early whistle. It's a little disheartening for a kid to run 100 yards for what could be a game-winning two points, only to have an official tell him "Sorry, you can't have your points. I had blown my whistle." And to have it happen twice in one season, it's almost as though everyone on the field, and in the stands, knows the rules except the officials)

A cold wind out of the south was a bother to players and fans alike during the game, and caused Muleshoe to exercise their option for the second half by taking the wind. The Chiefs elected to receive.

It may have been a bad decision by the Mules. It took Friona only a kickoff return, two good plays from scrimmage and a penalty against the visitors to take the lead.

Ismael Rocha returned the kickoff from the Friona 20 to the 40, as the Chiefs had the wind for the third quarter. The hard-running Rocha, taking the pitch from Britt Conklin, gained 25 yards around right end. Local fans held their breath when a flag floated at the end

of the nice run, but the Mules were called for a face-mask violation and that moved the ball to Muleshoe's 20.

Curtis Brady was stopped for no gain, but Tony Ibarra rambled on a reverse play, just cracking the goal-line. Blue Field's kick was perfect, and Friona had gained the lead with only 1:21 elapsed in the second half.

Muleshoe came up with a determined drive, going from their own 32 following the kickoff to a first and goal situation at Friona's eight-yard-line. The Mules racked up five first downs along the way, sparked by the running of McCall.

That set up one of the most impressive goal-line stands by the Chiefs in recent memory. Friona was offside on third down, so the Mules had five tries from the eight-yard-line, and it took a big fourth down play with McCall stopped on the one-foot line as the third quarter drew to a close.

Starting in the shadow of their own goal, Friona got a huge play from Rocha on third and six from their own four. Rocha went around end 21 yards to the 25 for a big first down.

Two more plays failed to gain, and on the first play of the final quarter, Rocha continued his third-down magic with a 12-yard burst for a first down.

At this point, Friona benefitted by consecutive 15-yard penalties against the Muleshoe coach, which moved the ball from the Muleshoe 42 to their 12.

Brady took advantage of the break by bursting through the line for a touchdown. Field's kick was held up for an eternity in the stiff breeze, but managed to just float over the bar and Friona had stretched its lead to 14-6 with 10:43 left in the game.

At this point the Chieftain defense, which had come of age in the goal-line stand, took over. The Chieftains even tried an onside kick following their second TD, but the Mules beat Brady to the ball.

However, the Mules' offense showed -6 yards the rest of the way, forcing the visitors to punt twice.

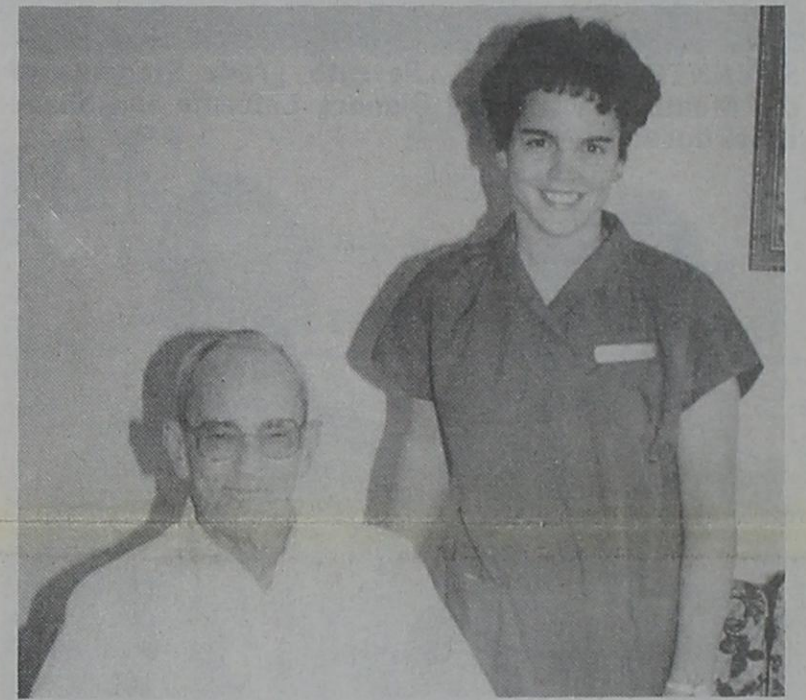

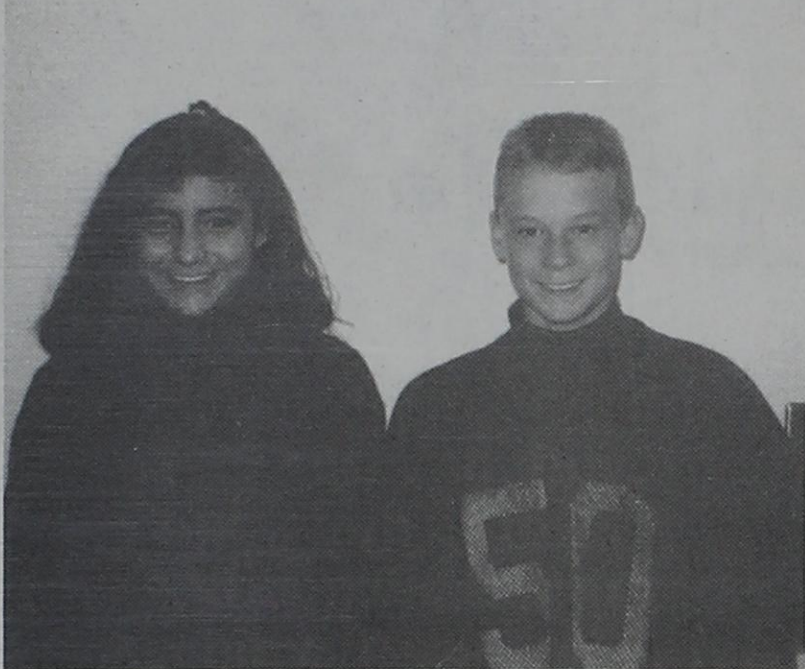

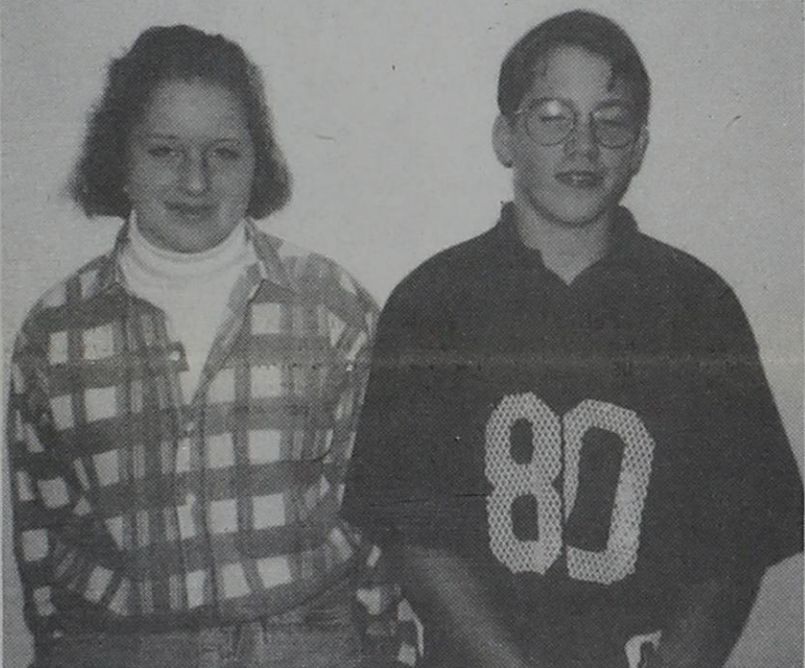

60 Yrs. Ago--Oct. 30, 1931

The two local products are preparing to erect an elevator, which will enable them to handle two or more grades of wheat at one time.

55 Yrs. Ago--Oct. 30, 1936
Mr. and Mrs. E.S. White honored their young son, Ed, Jr., Tuesday afternoon of last week with a birthday party at their home in the east part of town.

We cannot resist the opportunity to tell of that fine six-inch snow which fell here on Thursday of last week. It fell so gently and evenly without the accompaniment of the usual north wind, and thus lay smooth all over the ground. The snow was quite moist, and was not accompanied by any severe freezing.

50 Yrs. Ago--Oct. 31, 1941
Workmen and equipment in the employ of Cook & Ransom, contractors, building the large Santa Fe Railroad dike here, have built the dike as far as a point opposite the depot building. Wet weather during the past two weeks has hindered the work. Friona Wheat Growers are building suitable approaches from the top of the dike to the elevator doors. The dike itself will be a driveway for the trucks when bringing grain to these elevators.

45 Yrs. Ago--Oct. 25, 1946
At least one indication of the return of the good old pre-war conditions was manifest in Friona this week when two men spent Tuesday and Wednesday here quite busily employed at their craft of repairing typewriters and adding machines. They seem to have been quite welcome callers for many of our business concerns.

40 Yrs. Ago--Oct. 25, 1951
The new school building located just north of the grade school has been virtually completed, and occupancy is expected sometime next week. Four classrooms, a study hall and the high school principal's office will be contained in the new building, Superintendent Caffey said.

35 Yrs. Ago--Oct. 25, 1956

30 Yrs. Ago--Oct. 26, 1961

Defensive Driving Can Save Lives

One of the most heavily travelled periods we encounter is during the Thanksgiving holiday. This increased traffic has area and statewide law enforcement officials pondering what can be done to raise traffic safety awareness during this critical driving period.

Major V.J. Cawthon, Regional Commander for the Texas Department of Public Safety, stated, "We know that the potential for injury and loss of life is greater during holiday periods, especially a high volume holiday like Thanksgiving. We are asking people to drive defensively."

Many motorists have heard the term "defensive driving," however, it seems few know what it involves. "Most of the art of defensive driving comes from common sense and your own instinct. Training and knowledge of the proper procedures make these senses more effective," Cawthon explained. Defensive driving can and should

be a way of life for all drivers regardless of age or experience according to safety experts. Don't assume the other driver will make the right move. Be prepared for anything. Defensive drivers are in tune with their minds and bodies as well as the road. They are ready for any situation the road might hand them.

But, some drivers are out of tune. They give in to distractions; daydreams, fatigue, anger, stress, frustration or perhaps alcohol. They are not prepared to react when a dangerous situation arises.

Defensive drivers also make fewer mistakes. Drivers on the average make one error for every two miles they travel. While not every mistake leads to an accident, about 85% of all collisions are the result of driver error. "The most common mistake is speeding. Most people don't match an appropriate speed with driving conditions," Major Cawthon added. Once, again, all available Troop-

ers will be on the highways this holiday as they have in the past to try to make the roads as safe as possible for all of us. This holiday, give safety a second thought.

New Concerns Should Shape Education Policy

During the past decade, education moved from back-page to front-page news. And for good reason. The fast pace of change in the late 20th century means that we can ignore the problems of education only if we are willing to risk our collective future.

In Texas, economic change provided the primary impetus for vitally important education reforms launched in recent years. In the quest to develop a diversified and nationally competitive economy based on high technology and services, priority has been given to producing a technically skilled work force that can meet the needs of that economy.

While all the alarming statistics that have stimulated education reform—a soaring illiteracy rate, for example—point to the potential failure of the state to meet long-range economic goals, something equally important is at stake: our growing inability to ensure knowledgeable and wise citizens who are

able to exercise civic responsibility and who are prepared to deal with complex social, political, economic, and cultural issues.

New concerns should now shape public discussion on the future of education in Texas, concerns that provide the context for identifying changes that should be made in the 1990s in elementary, secondary, and post-secondary education:

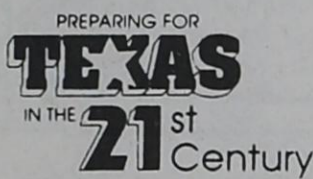
*The need for a standard of literacy that moves beyond basic skills.

*The need to develop a common and shared culture that incorporates the experiences, realities, and traditions of our multiple cultures.

*The need to incorporate into the curriculum global concerns and issues, including issues related to the environment.

*The need to familiarize students with the slow and often painful movement in American history toward an open society that embraces the extension of freedom and the expansion of opportunity.

*The need to develop moral and



civic consciousness on the part of citizens through study in the humanities.

The goal of state support for education must be the development of responsible, thoughtful citizens who will support, defend, and further the values of democratic society.

Former teacher and now governor, Ann Richards, puts it this way: "A sound basic education is about thinking and reasoning and growth and grasping the underlying values in life and society."

McAllen Rites Held For "Red" Crow

Funeral services for Wilmot S. "Red" Crow, 80, were conducted Monday, November 11 at First Baptist Church of McAllen, with Rev. Bill Sutton officiating. Burial was in Valley Memorial Gardens, under the direction of Wilson Funeral Home.

He was active in church and civic activities while in Friona, and was a deacon at the First Baptist Church of McAllen. Relatives said he was still working at his butcher's trade up until the day he died.

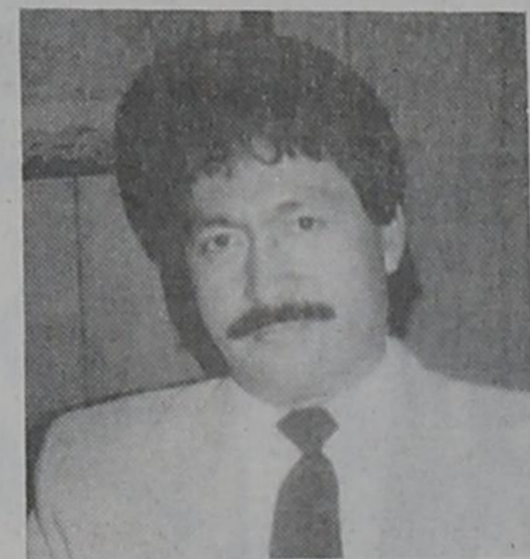

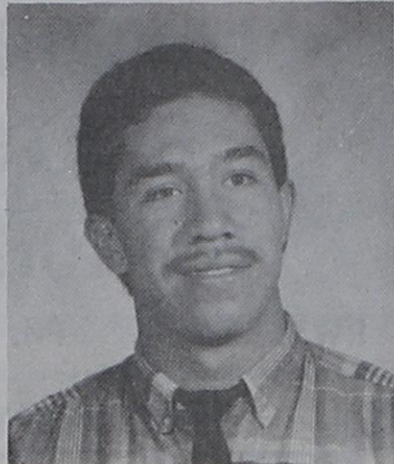
Marketing Education has helped the D.E.C.A. students very much. Working at Friona Motors has been a real experience. The people at Friona Motors are very nice people.

My most sincere appreciation goes to all of you who call or relate events of interest to me. Without your assistance Town Talk would be mostly blank space.

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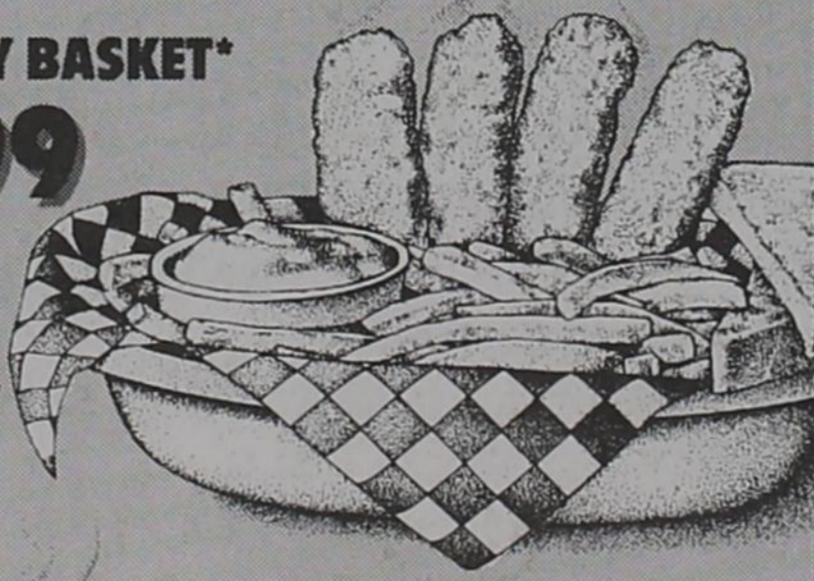
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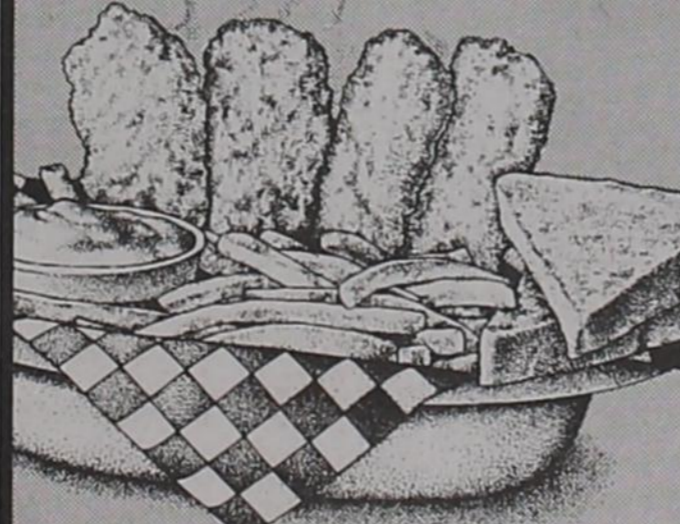
