

GERMANY CONSENTS TO SEEK ARMISTICE ON ALL FRONTS

ALLIED WAR CONFERENCE BEGUN IN PARIS

The general war situation of today is summarized by the Associated Press as follows: Representatives of the allied powers are in Paris for a conference upon which the future course of war activities probably will depend.

Although the Bolsheviks apparently have been unable to extend their power over Russia, excepting the cities of Petrograd and Moscow, they continue their efforts toward an armistice and peace.

Indications are that the opposition to the Bolsheviks rapidly is gaining strength. A conference of anti-Bolshevik leaders at Russian army headquarters for the purpose of forming a coalition government is reported.

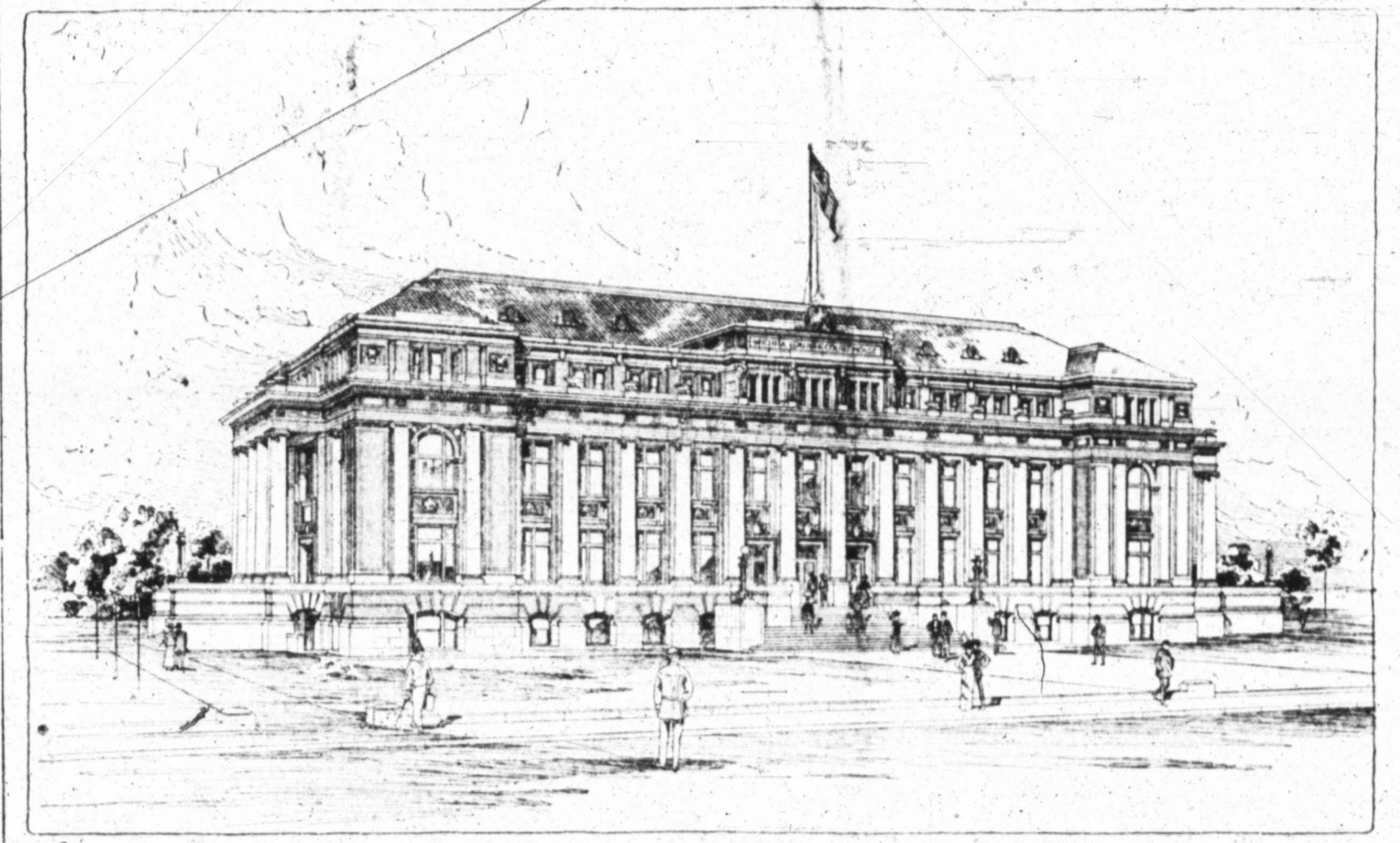

RUSSIAN EMISSARIES PASS INTO TEUTON LINES WHERE CONFERENCE IS ARRANGED

The Associated Press summarizes the Russ-German armistice plan as follows: Germany has consented to negotiate immediately for an armistice "on all the fronts" of the belligerent countries, according to a Petrograd dispatch reporting upon the outcome of a visit by the Bolshevik military delegation to the German lines on the Russian front for negotiations with the German military authorities.

Formula of Proposal. The Bolshevik formula has been a proposal of an armistice to all the belligerents with a view to the conclusion of a general peace. The proposal has fitted in well with the admitted German desire for achievement of peace by agreement.

What the ultimate result of these negotiations, it seems clear that at present the Russian negotiators are representatives of only a fraction of Russia. General Krylenko, nominated commander in chief by Bolsheviks, whose representatives crossed the German lines for the parley, has been unable to take over the actual command of more than the northern Russian armies.

By Associated Press. Petrograd, Nov. 28.—Representatives sent by Ensign Krylenko, the Bolshevik commander in chief of the Russian armies, have been received in the German lines and informed by the German commander that the Germans have officially consented to immediate negotiations for an armistice on all the fronts of the belligerent countries.

The Germans have set December 2nd as the date for a formal conference to consider an armistice. Ensign Krylenko sent three representatives with instructions to request the German commander of the sector in which the crossing was effected, to inquire of the German commander in chief whether it was agreeable to him that representatives be sent for immediate negotiations for an armistice on the front of all belligerent countries and in case his response was satisfactory to ask him to fix a time and place for a conference of representatives of both sides.

The Krylenko emissaries crossed the German lines at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon and were received by the German commander of the sector. A reply was promised at 8 o'clock. At the appointed time the Germans gave official consent to conducting negotiations.

By Associated Press. London, Nov. 28.—In acknowledging the note of the Bolshevik representative in Petrograd, the British government said it would do all in its power to contribute to peace.

By Associated Press. Petrograd, Tuesday, Nov. 27.—The Russian Fifth Army announced today that it purposes choosing parliamentarians to be sent to Germany. This is the second instance of an announcement of definite support of the Bolshevik program by the military.

By Associated Press. Amsterdam, Nov. 28.—A great Socialist demonstration at Budapest on Sunday in favor of an armistice and peace is reported by the Vossische Zeitung of Berlin. Declarations were made that democracy must employ all means to end the war and that it is impossible to bring peace by force of arms.

WILL BOLSHEVIK BE CLASSED SOON AMONG ENEMIES?

Washington, Nov. 28.—The American government and the entente allies as well will determine whether the Bolsheviks are to be classed as enemies and active allies of Germany as soon as official advice can be gathered as to the conferences between Bolshevik leaders and German officers.

Yesterday's news dispatches, saying German staff officers actually were in Petrograd actively engaged as advisors to Lenin, followed by today's news cables that Bolshevik leaders had crossed into the German lines for conferences with the German military authorities, were not wholly unexpected to officials here but they shattered the faint hope that the Bolsheviks might in the end after all help carry on the war against Prussian militarism.

The developments more than confirmed the contention of those who have held from the first that the Bolsheviks were fostered by German propaganda seeking to break Russia from her allies.

One of the first acts of the allied government, when they learn officially the Bolsheviks are actively working with the Germans undoubtedly will be to withdraw their embassies in Petrograd. This, of course, will include the American Embassy.


No official announcement is available at this stage as to whether the United States has actually stopped shipment of supplies to Russia until the situation clears, because in the absence of an official established break, the government would not care to confuse an already complex situation further by something which possibly might be a source of diplomatic embarrassment.

But it is perfectly apparent that none of the immense quantity of supplies contracted for, on the way or actually landed in some parts of Russia will be permitted to fall into the hands of the Bolsheviks if they become the allies of Germany.

Immense quantities of material already piled up at Vladivostok are unavailable to the Russians because of the paralysis of transportation system.

**CAPITAL CITY IS CONFRONTED WITH HOUSING PROBLEM**

Wichita Falls is not the only city in the United States which is confronted with the housing and housing problem. Washington city has the same trouble, owing to the enormous influx of population, made up largely of people who are engaged in government work of some sort, principally in connection with the war. The following letter from the Civil Service Commission will explain how the matter is being handled:

The population of the City of Washington has increased at least 50,000 since the war began. It is natural that the capital city, the center of governmental activities, should show this marked effect of the most intensive preparation for the war ever undertaken by any country. A steady stream of new appointments to the great civilian army pours into the city; the streets hum with activity; everybody is busy and earnest; on every hand are the sure signs of a competent organization with a fixed purpose.

At the request of the United States Civil Service Commission the Washington Chamber of Commerce has undertaken the work of directing to suitable rooming and boarding places the new arrivals who are not acquainted in the city. Hundreds of desirable rooms, with or without board, are listed, and at very moderate rates. Application for accommodations can be made by new appointees through correspondence before leaving home or by calling at the office of the Washington Chamber of Commerce, No. 511 Twelfth street, N. W., upon their arrival in Washington.

Stenographers and typewriters make up a large part of the additions to the force at Washington. Thousands have been appointed and thousands more are needed. Ship draftsmen for the Navy Department, mechanical draftsmen for the service generally, and statisticians and what are known as clerks qualified in business administration, clerks qualified in statistics or accounting, index and catalogue clerks, balance of stores clerks, and schedule clerks for the Ordnance Department of the Army are also in great demand. Representatives of the United States Civil Service Commission are at the post offices in all cities are furnishing detailed information concerning positions at Washington in which workers are needed.

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**THE LITTLE CITY OF CLEBURNE**

For several years the cities of San Antonio, El Paso and Galveston, have registered more than 90 per cent of the deaths that occur in those cities, and have been included in the Registration Area of the Federal Census Bureau. In 1915, Dallas, the largest city in the State, was admitted, and along with her Beaumont, with a population of 28,851 was taken in. Since that time Beaumont has carried the banner as the smallest city in the State in the registration area, and the credit of 28,851 was taken in. In fact, the vital statistics department as well as an up-to-date health department, Beaumont has lost out. Not that her statistics are as complete and accurate as ever (they are better as the time goes by). Cleburne, think of it, Cleburne with an estimated population of 12,500 had the audacity to ask for, and secured, an examination of her death statistics, and was recognized as securing more than 90 per cent of her deaths in the registration area. Quite a compliment to Dr. Moneke, the former, and to Dr. Yarr, the present, City Health Officers.

The little City of Corpus Christi got chesty and asked for and even demanded an investigation of her record. Austin has the highest infant mortality rate of any city covered by the survey in the 25 to 50 thousand class in the U. S. Austin has recently put on the "Petroleum Survey" to find out what her infant mortality and birth rate really is. There is Waco in the same class of cities not in the registration area. When the little city of Cleburne, with only 12,000 population, was admitted a cordial invitation was extended to Brownville, Denison, Laredo, Marshall, Palestine, Paris, San Angelo, Sherman, Temple, and Tyler, to get busy and enforce the birth and death registration law. These cities, according to the 1910 census, had more than 10,000 population, and when they secure an excess of 90 per cent of their death reports may be admitted to this area as was the little city of Cleburne.

mission so long as her death rates and birth rates are such as to be a joke. The burial permit law must be enforced and the certificates must be reasonably complete and some one must look after the vital statistics of the city.

The Bureau of Vital Statistics hopes to be able to publish monthly the birth and death rate for the cities of the state over 10,000 population beginning with the new year. These rates will be based upon the certificates filed with the State Bureau. And if the city health departments do not desire that they be made the laughing stock of those interested in public health matters, the number of certificates had better be increased for the rates of some of the cities are a disgrace to the health department as well as to the medical profession.

It will be possible to publish corrected death rates where the certificates are complete, but where they are not the crude rate will be used.

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**WAR BOARD URGES REDOUBLED EFFORT TO BE EFFICIENT**

**TRANSPORTATION PROBLEM OF WINTER DECLARED OF GREAT-EST MOMENT.**

Special to The Times.—The Railroads War Board has taken vigorous action to spur all lines to redoubled effort to increase their efficiency, in order to meet the extraordinary demands for transportation.

Fourteen specific instructions as to additional methods for increasing the capacity of their equipment were issued to all the railroads of the country by the War Board through its Chairman, Fairfax Harrison. He also made this general statement:

"However heartily the public has already responded to our requests for co-operation, additional and most strenuous endeavor must be made both by us and by the public to overcome the stress of winter weather, overworked plant and depletion of forces through calls to the flag and resignations to accept employment in shipyards and munitions factories. The railroads generally are very short-handed and a large decrease in the efficiency of employees results from the

necessity of filling vacancies with unskilled and inexperienced men."

**Saving Food and Freight Cars.**  
 The railroads and the food administration have just put into effect in Chicago—the greatest railway and food center in the world—a novel plan to conserve food and freight cars.

Every railroad entering Chicago makes a daily report to the food administration of every car of vegetables and other perishable foodstuff, which has been delayed three days or over, either awaiting unloading or reassignment or other disposition.

In every case of undue detention of a car so loaded the food administration will fix the blame and take steps to save the food, release the car and prevent a recurrence of the trouble by whoever was responsible for it.

**Inspection of Food.**  
 All foodstuff damaged by frost, or otherwise, in transit or as being unduly held in the car, will be assembled daily at a certain place by each railroad and be inspected by the food administration and city health department. All that is fit for human use will be given to the various charitable or philanthropic organizations of the city. All that is unfit for food will be hauled away by the railroad and dumped where it will do no harm.

R. L. Evans, of the food administration said: "Through grossly exaggerated statements, published about frozen potatoes which were hauled to railway dumps in this vicinity, a lot of people got the idea there was a gigantic conspiracy to boost prices by the wholesale destruction of food. An investigation by federal officers proved the falsity of such allegations. Neither the railroads, the shippers nor buyers of potatoes were to blame

**ELECTION IN RUSSIA CAUSE LITTLE EXCITEMENT**

 London, Nov. 28.—Little excitement has attended the elections to the constituent assembly now being held in Petrograd says the Petrograd correspondent of the Daily Mail in a dispatch dated Tuesday. He thinks that less than fifty percent of those entitled to vote cast their ballots but perhaps another ten percent would vote before the polls closed Tuesday afternoon.

News from the army fronts, the correspondent says is contradictory but apparently the vast mass of soldiers support the Lenin government. Ensign Krylenko, the commissioner for war, has gone to Pskov where he has dismissed General Tchermisoff and given his command to a commissioner for the northern front.

General chaos, he adds, is spreading steadily and the extremists undoubtedly are gaining ground among the soldiers and masses.

Much has been done to advertise Wichita Falls, and to encourage trade to come to this city; and it is felt that to provide means for the comfort and convenience of the shoppers after they come is a very vital step in holding not only the trade, but the good will of the surrounding communities.

Dallas owns and operates a rest room, which, it is said, has proved of great value. The extension service department at Austin has a very complete room, furnished with every convenience, not only for bodily comfort, but for valuable information. Here there is an automatic slide arrangement containing data on an enormous variety of subjects. For instance, should one desire to know all about malaria, without actually having it, one presses a button, and the malaria personal acquaintance with him. Or one is interested in potatoes; and presses the potato button. Information on this subject is immediately forthcoming.

**Visitors Need Attention.**  
 This, it is felt, might possibly be a later development as far as the Wichita Falls rest room is concerned, and is not the immediate intention. What is needed now, it is felt, is to look after the trade when it comes, and make the shoppers feel that Wichita Falls has a real and personal interest in them above and beyond merely getting their money. This is the first object as stated by the promoters of the scheme. The second is that such a room could be used for demonstration meetings in connection with the extension service, to much better advantage than the country school houses. It is felt that people would very gladly make use of the room for these purposes, and that it would be a source of mutual benefit and profit.

### DESPERATE FIGHT REPORTED WAGED TO GAIN VILLAGE

FONTAINE NOTRE DAME IS WON AND LOST AND ASSAULTED AGAIN BY THE BRITISH

### BOURLON WOOD ATTACKED

Enemy makes Every Effort to Regain Points of Vantage Which Have Recently Been Captured by Allies

By Associated Press. British Headquarters in France, Nov. 27.—(Delayed.)—Desperate and sanguinary fighting has been raging in and about Fontaine Notre Dame since dawn today when the British again attacked the strongly held village. Shortly after nine o'clock it appeared that the assaulting infantry had stormed its way through the village in the face of tremendous machine gun fire from the hamlet and La Polle wood to the southeast. Five hundred German prisoners were taken in the early hours of the fighting.

Hurry Divisions U. S. Late this afternoon the Germans hurried up two new divisions and threw them in for a counter attack along the Fontaine Bourlon Wood line. The fighting which followed was even more bitter, if possible, than that which occurred in the first rush through the ruined hamlet. At latest reports superior numbers of enemy infantry had pushed the British back through the village again to the western and northwestern outskirts but the battle still continued with unabated fury.

In the meantime the British line running around Bourlon Wood in the northwest was sustaining a heavy assault. The enemy appeared to be determined to regain this important position if it were humanly possible. The front from Fontaine to Bourlon Village was the scene of fierce fighting which at many places was at close quarters. The British line about Bourlon Wood still is intact.

known today concerning the famous tunnel trench which the British now hold in its entirety northwest of Bullecourt. Part of this underground fortification was captured in the fighting previous to the Cambrai push, but a large portion was taken last week. The tunnel, which was built by Russian prisoners, was a most amazing piece of work. It was 13 miles long and forty feet deep. Entrances were driven into it every 35 yards and the Germans lighted the place with electricity. The tunnel was mined at intervals through out the length but the British quickly discovered the electric wires leading to the mines and those were rendered useless.

### PRECIPITATION GENERAL

Slight Precipitation is Reported As Far South As Abilene—Lake Here is Expected to Benefit.

The heaviest rain in several months fell over the Wichita Falls territory Tuesday afternoon and night. The precipitation in Wichita Falls amounted to 1.10 inches.

The rainfall extended from Chillicothe north along the Fort Worth and Denver and from Byers to Weirland along the Wichita Valley. South of Weirland light rain fell all the way down to Abilene. The rain was the heaviest that had fallen here in several months. The greater part of the precipitation fell within a half hour between 4 and 6 o'clock Tuesday afternoon. The streets ran with water and in some places the gutters were filled to the level of the sidewalk.

### NEARLY TWO INCHES OF RAIN FALL IN DALLAS SECTION

By Associated Press. Dallas, Tex., Nov. 28.—The drought in a half dozen West Texas counties was at least partially relieved last night by the first rainfall of any consequence since last May. In many sections it was the first precipitation for sixteen months.

Reports received from the western section of the state were that the precipitation ranged from a quarter of an inch to an inch. Eldorado, Eden, Miles and Merzon reported a half inch precipitation.

The northern and eastern section of the state also was visited by a substantial rain during the night. Fort Worth reported a precipitation of 1.50 of an inch.

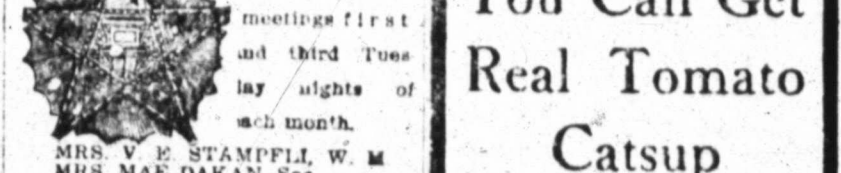

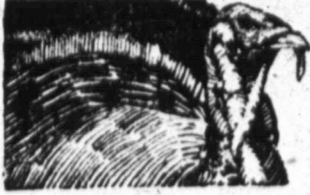

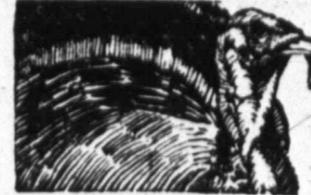
