"MY TURN"

Friona-Bovina Section Of Hwy 60 Widening Now At Contract Stage

ONE HUNDRED passengers climbed out of the sail boat and stepped out onto a large boulder, then finally onto land after sailing rough winter seas for 65 days. They had left England late because of needed repairs to the sister ship which was finally deemed unseaworthy to make the trip.

So passengers from the "Speedwell" were piled onto the "Mayflower" and everyone doubled up for the crowded, historic voyage. They carried along with them a cargo of furniture, cooking utensils, chickens, goats, hogs, dogs, and barrels of food and drink.

It was early in November when the small group of people straggled to shore at the tip of Cape Cod. Only 35 of these were actually Pilgrims, and the majority were city folks, unaccustomed to the hardships of outdoor life.

This was not the first English settlement in the "New World" however. There was, at that time, a thriving Southern settlement in Jamestown, Virginia which had come to these shores 13 years earlier.

The Plymouth Colony suffered a hard winter and when the ship left on its return trip the next Spring, over half the new residents had died. Those who were left, went to work to build a new world out of the wilderness.

In November, 370 years ago, members of the "Plymouth Plantation" who had survived the year-long ordeal, stored food for the coming winter and their small houses were fairly warm. Gov. Bradford then proclaimed a feast of harvest to give thanks to God for their deliverance. They were probably quite excited about the big event and set about planning the meal.

By that time, there were only five women left to prepare the feast, assisted by a handful of older girls. Chief Massasoit was invited to attend and to bring along some of his tribe of Wampanoags as gratitude for their having taught the settlers the art of planting grains and vegetables.

Much of what we know of these early days comes from Governor Bradford's 270-page manuscript which tells the Pilgrims' story in eloquent detail.

The Governor had sent men "a-fowling" so we know that the first Thanksgiving consisted of wild turkey, game birds and roast venison, along with pumpkins, squash, and nuts and berries from the forest. For a long time, the Indians had held their own "feast of the corn" to give thanks for their good crops, so we can be certain the Colonists had corn and stone-ground meal.

All of this had to be stretched pretty far, however, because Chief Massasoit showed up with 90 of his people and the feasting lasted for three days. The settlers and Indians shared their food and joined in foot races, arrow-shooting and wrestling matches. So there have always been sporting events associated with Thanksgiving Day. We may presume that a good time was had by all.

Our area lost a beautiful gem last week with the death of Margaret Harper on Nov. 16 at the age of 80. The longtime Canyon civic leader was the guiding light who gave birth to the outdoor musical drama "TEXAS" which annually draws 100,000 people from all over the world to Palo Duro Canyon.

Mrs. Harper first convinced Pulitzer-Prize winning author Paul Green to write the script for the play using the canyon as a "backdrop", then founded the Texas Panhandle Heritage Foundation in 1961 as the sponsoring body for the production. She sent publicity notices throughout the area to get people interested in the project. The play has since told the story of the Texas Panhandle pioneers to more than two million people in its 26 years.

Margaret Harper truly left her mark on this little corner of the world.

The contract for constructing a four-lane divided roadway for Highway 60 between Friona and Bovina will be awarded by the Texas Department of Highways and Public Transportation on December 5.

The Department has advertised for bids, and will award the contract after about a month's delay due to funding. Contracts were originally scheduled to be awarded on November 1, but the project was delayed when all federal highway contracts were temporarily "frozen."

Rhea Bradley, Resident Engineer for the TDHPT, Littlefield, said he was hoping for a spring start on the Friona-Bovina segment of the 40-mile Parmer County project. Bradley said that he was preparing plans for the third stage of the project, Bovina to Farwell, but could not speculate as to when this segment might go to contract stage, due to the present situation regarding highway funds.

"The national congress has not approved the National Transportation Act, and that has funding for highway projects all across the country in limbo," Bradley told publisher Bill Ellis in an interview this week.

The Highway official said he figured it was only a matter of time before the Transportation Act would be passed, "since they just can't cut off funds completely," but since politics were involved, it was anyone's guess when that would be.

Local and county officials were somewhat worried when the "freeze" was announced on the middle phase of the project in mid-October, just on the eve of when the TDHPT was slated to award the contracts.

All of the right of way and utility work is basically cleared on the Friona to Bovina phase of the project.

The middle phase of the Highway 60 widening has some notable problems, including reconstructing of bridges across the Frio Draw just west of Friona, and the Mustang Draw just east of Bovina.

Special designs will also be necessary at the Excel plant location, to provide turning lanes for that busy facility. One of the problems involved here is the perpetual care cemetery which is located just across the highway north of Excel. That

makes a boundary as to how far north the roadway may be built.

Work on the first stage of the new four-lane facility is progressing, with asphalt having been laid on the westbound lane from Summerfield in Castro County westward past Black.

Wet weather has hampered the contractor, who was originally scheduled to have the new roadway completed by the beginning of fall. The contractor, Gilvin & Terrill, also had another project that has been occupying his time.

When the paving on this new lane from Summerfield into Friona is completed, the contract calls for the construction company to then move to the present roadway, which will eventually be the eastbound half of the four-lane facility. The existing roadway will be demolished and rebuilt.

Complicating the project to some extent may be the fact that in a recent realignment of the TDHPT, Parmer County was moved from the Lubbock District into the Amarillo

Bradley, who has served as Parmer County's resident engineer for over 35 years, says he doesn't know how this realignment will affect the project.

"I am going ahead with the designs (on the third stage), and would think they would allow me to finish the project since I started it," Bradley said.

"I was extremely sorry to have the Department shift Parmer County out of my district into Amarillo's district. Parmer County has always been one of my favorite counties in the district. I have built every mile of roadway in Parmer County, and have a special feeling for the residents there," Bradley continued.

Unless the TDHPT allows him to complete the Highway 60 project, Bradley said his tenure overseeing highway work in Parmer County would end next September 1.

The widening of Highway 60 into a four-lane facility has been a project that has been pursued by Parmer County officials for over 30 years, and has been "on again, off again" due to the ever-changing situation, mainly dealing with federal programs and funding.

At one time it was thought that Highway 60 might be designated as an interstate highway, branching off Interstate 27 at Canyon and continuing through New Mexico to El Paso. A lot of time, research and surveying was expended at that time in regard to the possible interstate road, and during this time, the TDHPT officials were obliged to "back off" the project, until it finally became evident that the proposed interstate would not materialize in the immediate future.

Lois Norwood Says

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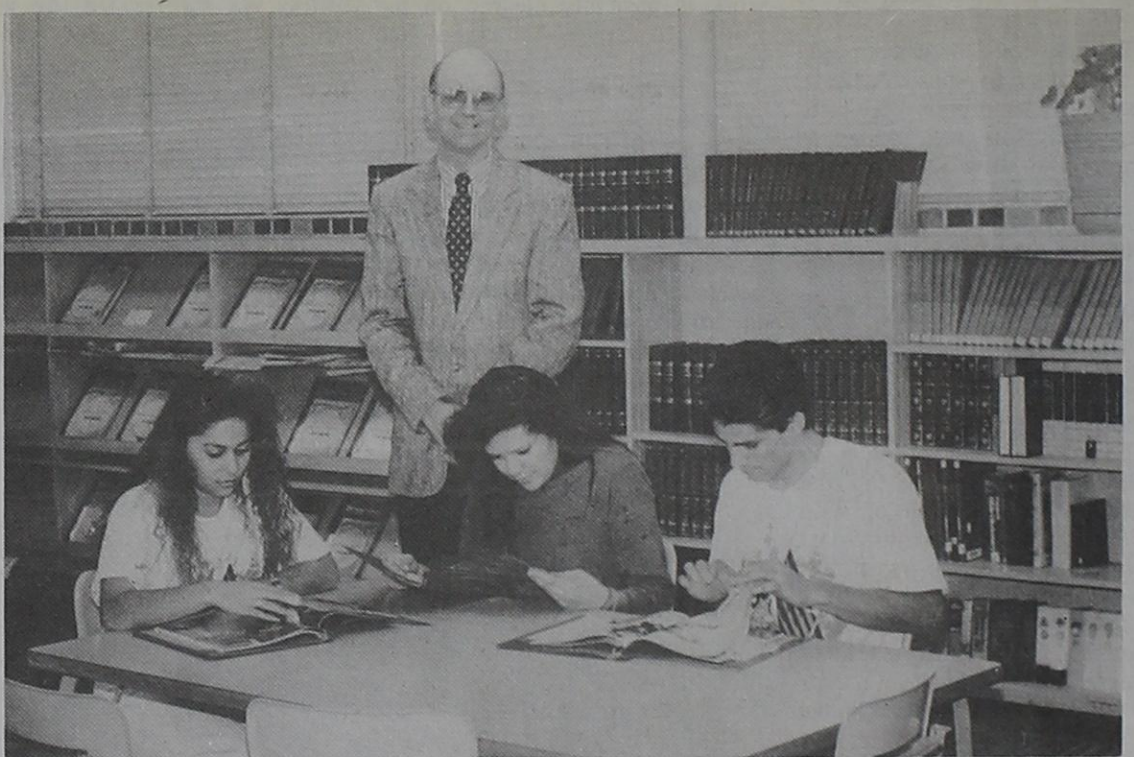

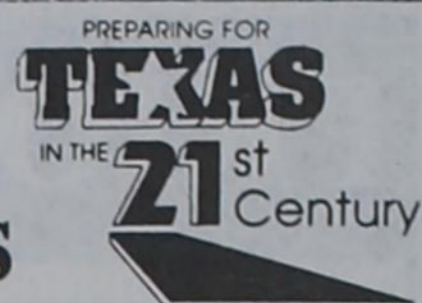

Public Schools: An Agenda For The '90s

Texans must see the reforms launched in the past decade as initial steps toward improved public schooling. The reforms now needed, according to the *Preparing for Texas in the 21st Century* book series, call for innovation and significant financial commitment. For this to happen, we must move beyond immediate issues and rise above ideologies and special interests.

Once funding equality among school districts is achieved, and once we deal successfully with dropout and remediation problems, efforts to improve our schools in the 1990s should focus on:

***Curriculum changes-**Instruction of all students in a second language should be required. Multicultural perspectives should be included in the curriculum. Increased study of other nations and cultures should be required. Environmental issues should be incorporated into the curriculum. New "frameworks" for English language arts and social studies are needed. The teaching of Texas history needs improvement. There needs to be better treatment of the relationship between technology and human values. Increased attention should be given to the ethical literacy. More team teaching is needed.

***Empowerment of teachers-**We must develop new ways to further the freedom, creativity and authority of classroom teachers. Teachers must be given a central role in selecting textbooks and in-

structural materials and in developing the curriculum. Teachers need opportunities to expand their competencies in particular subjects, especially through summer institutes. The career ladder should be modified to emphasize rewards for scholarship, initiative and creativity.

***Textbooks--Standards for textbook content** should be increased. More original literary texts and historical documents should be used. Local districts should be able to use state funds to purchase supplemental instructional materials.

***Innovations and local control--Increased responsibility** for our schools should be given to local communities. Community leaders, teachers and administrators should increase opportunities for

community conversation on goals and plans. Experimental programs should be increased, such as family learning centers, summer programs, interactive video and satellite programming, university-school collaborative projects, speakers' bureaus for the community, use of community resources including libraries and museums, adopt-a-school programs, sister school programs, student internships, and preschool programs.

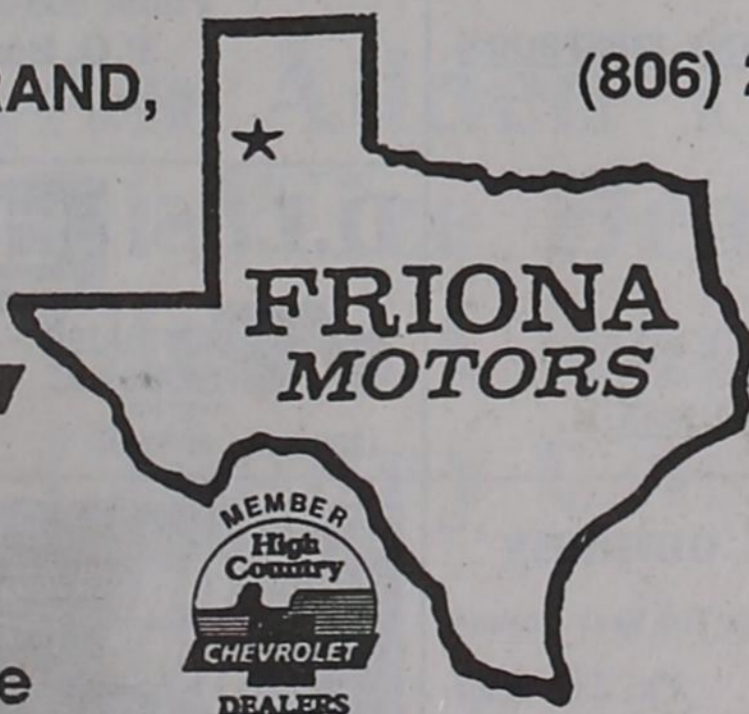

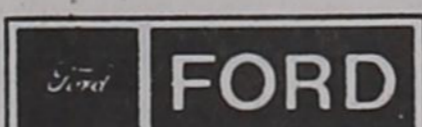
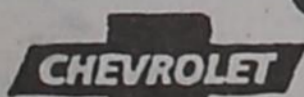

Joan's mother, Mary Jane Clements of Amarillo, was also here.

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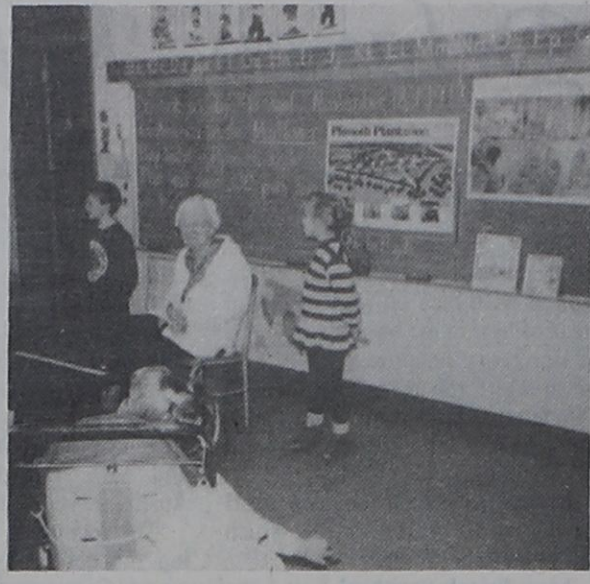
