## TO DISCHARGE SOLDIERS WHO ARE NEEDED HOME

By Associated Press.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3.—General Pershing has been authorized by the war department to send home for immediate discharge from the army any drafted or enlisted men who presents convincing evidence of sickness or other distress in his family.

The department announced today that men may make their own requests for discharge, or the request may be made direct to General Pershing by letter or cable by a member of the soldier's family or other interested and responsible persons, accompanied by sufficient testimony that sickness or other distress exists. General Pershing also has been authorised to discharge in Europe on their own application men who have good reasons for leaving the army and who waive any claim for sea travel allowances from Europe to the United States. Men so discharged will be paid travel allowances from their station in Europe to the port of embarkation and from Hoboken, N. J., to the place of enlistment of induction in the service.

Applications apply to enlisted or drafted men who entered the service after April 1, 1917. Men who entered the service before that date may

drafted men who entered the service after April 1, 1917. Men who entered the service before that date may be furloughed to the United States when sickness or distress in the soldier's family is clearly indicated.

"It must be understood," says the department's announcement, "that discharges or furloughs of this kind will be given only in exceptional cases. Requests for discharge must clearly show that the sickness is of such a critical nature as will require the soldier's immediate presence or that distress in a man's family is such as can not be relieved by allotments of money made under the war risk act."

## MUST REMOVE TEMPTATION SAYS

LONDON, Feb. 3.—Temptations to war must be removed by the prohibition of conscription and the scaling down of armaments, according to former Premier Asquith, who delivered an address at Albert Hall yesterday in support of the league of nations. He added that nationalization or internationalization in the sense of effective control of the men and transport of munitions might be necessary as an additional precaution.

## **DIRECTOR HINES** OPPOSES FEDERAL **OWNERSHIP PLAN**

Says Five Year Extension Is Necessary to Develop Permanent Solution of Question.

WASHINGON, Feb. 3-Director General Hines, testifying today before the Senate interestate commerce committee for the first time since his appointment as railroad head, declared he did not believe in government ownership, but in organization of a few big railway companies subject to close government supervision.

"I do not believe there is anything substantial in the argument that a five year extension of government op-eration would necessarily mean government ownership," Mr. Hines said.
"I do not personally believe in gov-ernment ownership. I believe there ernment ownership. I believe there can be a form of private ownership which such government supervision including government representation on the boards of directors as will give the public and labor all the benefit of government ownership and at the same time wffi preserve the benefits of private and self-interested infitative

Favors a Guarantee. "I believe that all the objects which think must be achieved in order .o btain a permanent solution can be ecomplished through the creation of a comparatively few railroad companies which will capitalize equal only to the real value of the property and which will have a moderate guarautecd return with the right to partici-pate moderately in any additional

Facts Should Determine. "It seems to be unthinkable," he added, "that any suggestion of early relinquishment should be put forward as a leverage for forcing an extension I think the entire subject ought to be determined by the logic of facts. ## RATES ON GRAIN ARE DECLARED TO BE UNREASONABLE

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3.-Rates on grain and grain products moving from Memphis to points in Louisiana were found unreasonable in a tentative 10° port to the interstate commerce commission by an examiner when com-pared with rates on the same com-modities from St. Louis and Cairo to the same destinations. A proposed mileage scale of rates over western railroads for grain and grain products drawn up by the examiner recommends that the order changes of 19 cents per hundred pounds for distances of 200 miles and proportionate charges for increasing distances bring-ing the final charge to 35 cents per hundred pounds for 650 miles.

Bills dealing with taxation and con-servation of oil and gas production formed the chief topics at the confer-ence.

There are several bills dealing with the gross production taxation before the Texas Legislature. One bill propose a two per cent gross production tax. Oil men are opposed to this tax on the ground that Texas oil fields are not yet proven and wild catting is not only necessary but is often very costly. Some of the oil men are favorable to a one per cent tax for the coming year with a possible cut down on ad valtorem taxes in order that the burden will not be too heavy for those who are proving the Texas territory. The two percent gross production tax would net a charge of four cents per harrel against the producer. The present tax is one half of one percent gross production. Most of the oil men, it was said, do not particularly oppose raising this to one percent, provided the law does not impose too drastic regulations on how drilling shall be done.







Otherwise there was very little selling, however, and the market held steady within a few points of the best around mid-day. Cotton closed firm.

## **WANTS TO POOL CLAIMS OF ALLIES AGAIN**ST GERMANY

ITALIAN DELEGATE SUGGESTS ESTABLISHMENT OF SINGLE FINANCIAL FRONT.

Says Allies Should Be Compensated in Proportion to the Amount Ex-pended During War.

PARIS, Feb. 3.—Proposals for the establishment of a single financial front for the Allies have been submitted to the Entente Spinisters here by Signor Crespi, member of the Italian delegation, according to a statement made by him today. After saying that the central powers must compensate the Allies for the damage suffered during the war, Signor Crespinatic:

"On the other hand, all the Allies have suffered immense losses and they must all benefit from the indemnities which the enemy is to pay. Each one should receive in proportion to the effort it has made. Thus smaller states that have spent more than larger case in comparison to their wealth er ones in comparison to their wealth ought to receive larger indemnities in proportion. Absolute fairness ought to be preserved in the division of indemnities.

to be preserved in the division of indemnities.

Suggest Common Pool.

The simplest way to carry out the actual distribution would be to put the entire fund into a common pool, which could be periodically apportioned among the different nations. The fund should be augmented by taxes of a universal character levied on all states, enemy, allied or neutral, the last named having benefitted from the sacrifices made by the Allies. Such taxes might be levied on exports and imports and also on colland raw materials. It seems to me only fair that countries which have benefitted and even grown rich, through the suffering and sacrifices of the Allies should be made to help compensate the Allies. Such a tax would not weigh more heavily on one one state than on another, since it would be universal. It would merchly have the effect of raising prices on some certain particular products in all countries alike.

Should Psy Allies' Debts.

"The money should be forced to pay off as soon as possible the Allies' debts. The international tax would furnish interest on the rest and a sinking fund for paying it off eventually. In my opinion the enemy ought to be allowed to pay, not only in gold, but in raw materials and fin-

in gold, but in raw materials and fin-

ished products. Part of their debt might be covered by bonds which they would take up gradually in exchange for goods delivered to the Allies. "The supply of raw materials is another important question to be con-sidered. If they are furnished to en-emy countries at the same time and at the same prices as to the Allies; the Austrians and Germans whose in-

at the same prices as to the Allies the Austrians and Germans whose industrial plants have not been destroyed and who are ready to return to a peace basis in their production more rapidly than the Allies would reach foreign markets quicker and under better conditions than would be possible for the Ailies. This we must avoid at all costs. I, therefore, propose that distribution of raw materials by internationally controlled in such a way that Allied countries may be served before enemy countries.

Question of Working Day.

"Another important question involved is that of the length of the working day. A day's labor in Germany before the war was ver; long. If it continues so now, they will be able to produce more cheaply than we can. Therefore international laws on this question have become essential.

"Another problem is that of exchange between different nations. To cite an example, my own country, when peace is re-established, will have to import very largely to replenish

to import very largely to replenish depleted stocks. This will have a disastrous effect on our money unless the states control exchange. I therefore consider that the state control of import and export trade must continue for some time."

The Czechs' claim rests on suzerainty exercised over the country by the kings of Bohemia in the fourteenth century and the fact that coking coal is more essential to them than the Poles. They point out that the rail-road through the district is the only connecting link between two sections of Czecho-Slovakia.

Defined District No. 1 embraces East Vernon, Oklaunion and the Box school community. If the Harrold commissioner's precinct were created in a defined district, the only way other roads in the county could be built would be by the creation of other defined districts in the west part of the county, or by a county bond issue.

County Judge E. L. McHugh says, however, that even though the Harrold petition is granted and an election held, it would not stand in the way of a county bond issue. The bonds of that district could be obserbed by vote of the entire county instant in the East Vernon Oklaunion dis-
