## OIL MEN OPPOSE TWO PER CENT TAX AT MEETING TODAY

COMMITTEE WILL ATTEND HEARING AT AUSTIN ON TUESDAY NIGHT.

## DISCUSS OTHER MATTERS

Will Ask Legislature to Refrain from Enacting Laws That Will Handicap Industry.

FORT WORTH, Tex., Feb. 3.—Oil producers from all sections of West Texas together with some operators from other sections this afternoon will select a committee from among themselves to go to Austin to protest against proposed unfavorable legislation. This committee will attend the joint committee hearing at Austin Tuesday night.

Bills dealing with taxation and conservation of oil and gas production formed the chief topics at the conference. There are several bills dealing with the gross production taxation before the Texas Legislature. One bill proposes a two per cent gross production tax. Oil men are opposed to this tax on the ground that Texas oil fields are not yet proven and wild catting is not only necessary but is often very costly. Some of the oil men are favorable to a one per cent tax for the coming year with a possible cut down in ad valorem taxes to order that the burden will not be too heavy for those who are proving the Texas territory. The two percent gross production tax would not be a charge of four cents per barrel against the producer. The present tax is one half of one percent gross production. Most of the oil men, it was said, do not particularly oppose raising this to one percent provided the law does not impose too drastic regulations on how drilling shall be done.

It is also cited that the production tax is heavily taxed by the federal government, and that little relief is expected for at least a year. Because of this, they feel the state should encourage development for at least another twelve months by holding down the taxes to the lowest possible figure. There is also a bill before the legislature which would impose a two percent tax on gross receipts of refiners. The oil men believe that this bill is against the best interests of the state as the refinery industry is just beginning to develop on a large scale in Texas.

With regard to conservation methods, the oil men ask that the legislature do not adopt a lot of laws which have been tried and proven dangerous in other oil producing states.

Charles E. Anderson Sr., of Austin, who has extensive interests in the Burk Burnett field, is in Wichita Falls for a few days. Several other Austin men are here on similar business, including Judge Haughton Brownlee and J. M. Edwards, former state treasurer.

## Electra Refining Association Plant Nears Completion

The Electra Refining Association's plant at Electra is to be ready for operations by March 1, according to the Electra News. Crude oil to the amount of 100,000 barrels has already been stored for use when the refinery is in operation, this representing an outlay of a quarter of a million dollars. All of this oil was produced on property of stockholders of the refinery, it is stated. D. F. Cross and W. T. Waggoner and sons own the majority of the stock, it is stated.

## Operations Are Handicapped By Road Conditions

The rig of the Watkins Farm Oil Company recently purchased by the company for their operations in the Iowa Park shallow field, has been moved out to the location, a short distance northeast from the original Watkins well, according to reports from officers of the company. Operations are due to start as soon as the condition of the road will permit. It is also reported that the Midway Oil Company is ready to begin drilling on their 20 acre tract, south of the Watkins well. Rains have put the roads and the fields in such conditions that operations are practically impossible, and until the ground dries out more little activity is expected.

IRRIGATION PLANS WELL UNDER WAY FOR ORGANIZATION

REPORT IS SUBMITTED

Engineer and Those Interested in Project Are Enthusiastic Over the Results.

Organization of the Wichita Falls Irrigation District can begin by the first of April, that being the time set by V. L. Sullivan, the engineer of the project, for the completion of a sufficient amount of the survey to permit the organization to be launched.

Several changes from the first preliminary survey which will result in a material saving of money and time were found practicable in this second survey, Mr. Sullivan stated.

One of the most important phases of the project is that it will furnish a water supply for a city of 100,000 people in addition to providing irrigation for the district.

Irrigation of these lands of the district will increase the valuation several times, as this supplemental water supply will make crops certain where before one dry spell at a certain time has spoiled the entire season's crop.

# Market Report

## Cotton Market

By Associated Press.  
**NEW YORK, Feb. 3.**—New England advisers indicating that most manufacturers had granted the demand for a 48 hour week and that there was no danger of any general labor disturbance except for the possibility of a strike at Lawrence, where workers were insisting upon the 48 hour week with 54 hours pay made a favorable impression on sentiment in the cotton market here today. Buyers also found encouragement in the comparatively firm showing of Liverpool, while selling was held in check by the reports of a widespread campaign for reduced acreage and determined holding of old crop cotton in the south. The opening was firm at an advance of 35 to 46 points and the market sold about 45 to 50 points net higher right after the call with March touching 23.17, May 22.93 and July 21.15.

The early buying movement carried the market up to 23.73 for March 22.54 for May and 21.67 for July, active months generally selling some 95 to 107 points net higher. This made an advance of approximately 2 1/2 cents a pound from the low level in the case of May contracts and the market net enough realizing to cause reactions of some 10 or 15 points later in the morning. Otherwise there was very little selling however, and the market held steady within a few points of the best around mid-day.

Cotton closed firm.

## New Orleans Cotton.

**NEW ORLEANS, Feb. 3.**—General rains in the belt causing further delay to new crop work, resulted in a strong buying movement in cotton today. In the first half hour of business prices rose 53 to 76 points.

A more favorable opinion concerning the labor situation among the mills increased the demand for contracts. In the trading up to noon the advance was widened to 57 to 59 points.

The market turned quiet but steady, standing at 1 o'clock at a net rise of 53 to 76 points.

Cotton closed steady at an advance of 52 to 108 points.

## LEGAL NOTICES

**ORDINANCE NO. 254.**  
 An ordinance cumulative of other laws relating to the driving and operating of service cars, fixing a period of residence for owners and drivers of service cars, requiring owners and drivers to register, and fixing a penalty.

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the city of Wichita Falls, Wichita county, Texas.

Section 1. Every owner of an automobile and every driver, who desires to operate same as a service car, or as a car for hire, except persons operating bus lines, shall before the commencement of such operations, be a bona fide resident of Wichita county, Texas, and shall have resided in said county for at least six months next preceding the commencement of said operations.

Section 11. Every owner of an automobile, who operates same as a service car, shall file with the city clerk of the city of Wichita Falls, Texas, his name, address, the license number of his automobile, and the make of the automobile so used as a service car.

Section 111. Any person who violates any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of

a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not to exceed \$200.00.

This ordinance shall be construed and held to be cumulative of any and all other laws relating to the driving and operating of service cars. The ordinance shall take effect, and be in force from and after its passage as the law directs.

### WANTS TO POOL CLAIMS OF ALLIES AGAINST GERMANY

ITALIAN DELEGATE SUGGESTS ESTABLISHMENT OF SINGLE FINANCIAL FRONT.

### FORCE ENEMY TO PAY

Says Allies Should Be Compensated in Proportion to Amount Expended During War.

By Associated Press.

PARIS, Feb. 2.—Proposals for the establishment of a single financial front for the Allies have been submitted to the Entente Ministers here by Signor Crespi, member of the Italian delegation, according to a statement made by him today. After saying that the central powers must compensate the Allies for the damage suffered during the war, Signor Crespi said:

"On the other hand, all the Allies have suffered immense losses and they must all benefit from the indemnities which the enemy is to pay. Each one should receive in proportion to the effort it has made. Thus smaller states that have spent more than larger ones in comparison to their wealth ought to receive larger indemnities in proportion. Absolute fairness ought to be preserved in the division of indemnities."

**Suggest Common Pool.**  
The simplest way to carry out the actual distribution would be to put the entire fund into a common pool, which could be periodically apportioned among the different nations. The fund should be augmented by taxes of a universal character levied on all states, enemy, allied or neutral, the last named having benefitted from the sacrifices made by the Allies. Such taxes might be levied on exports and imports and also on coal and raw materials. It seems to me only fair that countries which have benefited and even grown rich through the suffering and sacrifices of the Allies should be made to help compensate the Allies. Such a tax would not weigh more heavily on one state than on another, since it would be universal. It would naturally have the effect of raising prices on some certain particular products in all countries alike.

**Should Pay Allies' Debts.**  
"The money should be forced to pay off as soon as possible the Allies' debts. The international tax would furnish interest on the rest and a sinking fund for paying it off eventually. In my opinion, the enemy ought to be allowed to pay, not only in gold, but in raw materials and finished products. Part of their debt might be covered by bonds which they would take up gradually in exchange for goods delivered to the Allies."

Question of Working Day.  
"Another important question involved is that of the length of the working day. A day's labor in Germany before the war was very long. If it continues so now, they will be able to produce more cheaply than we can. Therefore international laws on this question have become essential. "Another problem is that of exchange between different nations. To cite an example, my own country, when peace is re-established, will have to import very largely to replenish depleted stocks. This will have a disastrous effect on our money unless the states control exchange. I therefore consider that the state control of import and export trade must continue for some time."

**ASSUME CONTROL OF TURKISH RAILROADS**  
WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—An official report to the state department today announced that the French and British authorities have assumed control of all railroads in European and Asiatic Turkey, in accordance with the terms of the armistice and that the Allies have taken over a constant police and the German and Austrian banks there.

### COMMISSION TO ADJUST MATTERS WITH THE POLES

TRUCE IS ARRANGED IN CONTROVERSY OVER TESCHEN COAL FIELDS.

### DISPUTE OVER BOUNDARY

Czecho-Slovaks Are Contesting Control and Disposition of the Output of Mines.

By Associated Press.

PARIS, Feb. 2.—The Allied commission which leaves for Poland next Saturday to adjust controversies between the Poles and Czecho-Slovaks over the Teschen coal fields has been able to arrange a truce between the two nationalities only pending the arrival of the commission and personal examination by it of the situation there. Accordingly the arrangement prescribes the sections where the Poles and Czecho are to exercise civil administration and military occupation and regulates the operation and disposition of the output of the mines. As soon as possible after its arrival the commission will go to Teschen to examine the matter at issue. This, although most unknown to the outside world has been a very important and dangerous factor affecting relations between the newly created states.

**Title to Duchy Involved.**  
Title to the Duchy of Teschen is involved in the controversy. This duchy was formerly a part of the crownlands of Austrian Silesia and has a population of less than 500,000. It is about the size of Rhode Island. It is valuable because the coal it produces is the only coal within the boundaries of either Poland or

Czecho-Slovakia which will coke and it is regarded as indispensable to the manufacturing interests of each state. The Czechs' claim rests on suzerainty exercised over the country by the kings of Bohemia in the fourteenth century and the fact that coaling coal is more essential to them than the Poles. They point out that the railroad through the district is the only connecting link between two sections of Czecho-Slovakia.

The Poles, on the other hand, hold that the section should be divided along ethnological lines. This system would give them control.

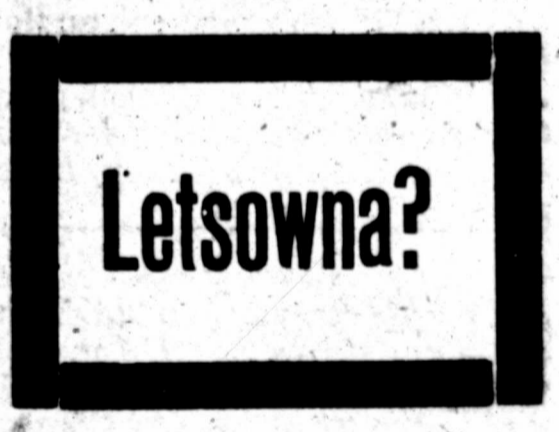

# HARROLD PLANS TO VOTE ON \$250,000 GOOD ROAD BONDS

Special to The Times.

VERNON, TEXAS, Feb. 3.—A new situation developed in the plan for a county-wide bond issue for good roads Tuesday afternoon when it became known that a petition had been circulated in the Harrold commissioner's precinct asking for the creation of a defined roads district and calling for an election on the issuance of \$250,000 in bonds.

This petition was presented to County Judge E. L. McHugh. Its preparation was faulty and for that reason was not filed. It is not known whether it will be corrected and presented again.

The Harrold precinct is one of the largest in point of area in the county but has a small voting strength, which is principally in and around Harrold. Probably the voting strength on a bond issue, which is limited to property tax-payers, would not very much exceed 100. There are three voting boxes in the precinct, Harrold, Ronda and Mack. The thickly populated territory north of Harrold is in the East Vernon-Oklahoma commissioner's precinct.

Most of the area of Harrold precinct is the Waggoner ranch property. Probably three-fourths of all the Waggoner ranch property is in this precinct. All of the producing oil wells in the county are in the precinct. It was proposed by the petitioners to build only about 11 or 12 miles of road. One road to be improved extends about four miles north toward Elliott to the precinct line. Another improvement proposed was the main highway from the Wichita county line to the line of the Oklahoma precinct on the west.

The Harrold precinct probably has the largest tax valuation and the smallest amount of roads of any precinct in the county, due to the valuable oil lands, the railroad mileage and the Waggoner ranch.

District Can Be Created.

If the precinct is created into a defined district and is not absorbed in a county-wide bond issue, it means that there will be a gap of something like four miles in the pavement on the Colorado-to-the-Gulf Highway between Oklahoma and Harrold. It would isolate the Elliott-Guyer community north of Harrold and make it impossible for that section of the county to get roads, except through a county bond issue which would absorb all defined road district issues.

This situation is brought about by the fact that one defined district cannot be absorbed by another defined district. Defined District No. 1 embraces East Vernon, Oklahoma and the Box school community. If the Harrold commissioner's precinct were created in a defined district, the only way other roads in the county could be built would be by the creation of part of the county, or by a county bond issue.

County Judge E. L. McHugh says, however, that even though the Harrold petition is granted and an election held, it would not stand in the way of a county bond issue. The bonds of that district could be obtained by vote of the entire county district at the East Vernon-Oklahoma district issue would be absorbed.

## Unusual Weather Conditions Obtain Over Northwest

ST. PAUL, MINN., Feb. 3.—The northwest has passed through the most unusual January from the standpoint of weather in its history. South Dakota cared for swarms of robins and flocks of ducks.

Minnesotans went house boating on the Mississippi.

Golf was played outdoors in Saskatchewan and tennis matches took place in St. Paul.

The Duluth Bonspiel, an annual memory of ice and screaming winds, was delayed because of the absence of ice.

Chickens began laying at Prince Albert, nearly a thousand miles northwest of Minneapolis.

Influenza killed hundreds of moose and deer in the Canadian wilderness. Dearest cold weather is blamed.

Big game failed to migrate from Yellowstone Park, in Wyoming.

All of these statements have been vouched for by leading newspapers in the districts.

About the time the South Dakota legislature convened, the robins came back and chirped in the capitol yards. Near the statehouse is a pond which is fed by warm water springs. The ducks never left it. They are protected.

At Billings, Mont., a resident was hurrying along the street late at night when he was attacked by a cloud of mosquitoes. He botched a few of them and took them to a Billings newspaper to add weight to his story.

Outdoor golf was being played at a number of country clubs when Texas was buried under a blizzard.

The last Sunday in January brought out the tennis fans. The hard courts were dry and football weather prevailed.
