(By Associated Press.) BERLIN, Monday, May 12.—The declaration by Chancellor Scheidemann in the national assembly today that the peace terms were "unacceptable," brought the members of the assembly, the spectators and those in the press gallery to their feet in a hurricane of cheers and applause. The chancellor reached the climax of his statement on the peace terms ten minutes after he begun. The chancellor paused in his address and then thundered out the word which announced the German government's rejection of the Versailles conditions

AUSTIN, TEXAS, May 13.—Eight M. & P. Burk O. & G. 1000 hundred oil companies now make Mid Field 300 quarterly reports to the state comptroller of Texas. 



Jackson, Walter Cline, Nat Chenault and S. L. Fowler. Mg. Wood then promptly lined every man present as a member of the club, with the result that promises were obstanted for the club, with

of 24 houses, as follows:
Wood, 5; Huff, 3; Henderson, 3;
Huey, 3; Reid, 2; Curlee & Johnson,

An attempt will be made to create
a club of 100 members, all men with
sufficient means to be able to build
one or more houses, even if the venture financially is a losing one.
"We'ye all made money in Wichita
Falls," Wood told the members of the
board. "If we're any kind of citizens
we ought to be willing to spend some
of it just to keep the city alive and
hustling, and to provide homes for
good citizens who haven't got as much
money."
