





#### **Credit For Dependents**

A taxpayer is entitled to a credit for each person other than husband or wife, whether related to him or not, and whether living with him or not, who during the taxable year was dependent upon and received his chief support from the taxpayer provided the dependent was either (a) under 18 years of age, or (b) incapable of selfare becoming more and more support because mentally or physically defective.

The credit for dependents is as "The people are too damned based upon actual financial dependency and not mere legal dependency. It is not necessary





cut in half. These will grow into side branches to provide shade and protection to the upper surface of the branches in hot weather. The pruned water sprouts will become side branches which deelop buds and grow peaches the second year.

From the outside of the tree remove about one-third of the current season's growth with hand shears. The branches removed should be burned to prevent harboring borers which

may return to the live tree. When pruning young apple and pear trees select four or five of the strongest branches and thin out the others. This will prevent an upright growth with trees should be pruned to re-

move all branches which cross or rub. Trim all branches about the same length so that the tree will not appear lop-sided.






