DECLARES HE IS NOT TRYING TO SERVE "GENTLEMEN" WHO WISH TO EXPLOIT MEXICAN POSSESSIONS AT PRESENT.

TALKS TO SALESMEN

"Way to Estainish Our Sovereighty Is to Respect Mexico's." He Says. De-clares Force Is Wrong Way and Long Way to Proceed.

Detroit, Mich., July 10.—President Wilson aroused great enthusiasm at the World's Salesmanship Congress to day by urging that business men carry justice and fair dealing into the ports of the world, particularly those of Mexico and thereby establish confidence in American principles. His efforts, he declared, will be to serve all America by serving Mexico herself for her best interests without using force and not to serve the few "gentlemen"

When the president asked the crowd what it desired at the end of all the present world troubles, it shouted "peace" in one voice, and then he ad ded that his wish was "permanent

peace.
"I heard some men say," he said,
"that they want to help Mexico and
the way they propose to help her is to
overwhelm her with force. That is the wrong way as well as the long way.

"After fighting them, you would have a nation full of justified suspicion. Thus you would not help them,

GERMAN SUBMARINE MERCHANTMAN FIRST OF FLEET TO PLY IN ATLANTIC

CAPTAIN CLAIMS FEAT PUTS END TO BRITISH BLOCKADE ASSURANCES

Baltimore, July 10.-Definite announcement that the great German submarine-merchantman Deutschland which reached Chespeake Bay yesterday is the first of a fleet of such craft that was built to ply regularly in the trans-Atlantic trade, was made early today by Captain Paul Konig, master of the super-submarine.

From the customs house Captain Konig returned to his vessel, joining his crew in the crimped quarters in which they have lived for more than three weeks. So far no arrangement has been made for either officers or men to live ashore while the heat is preparing for her return voyage.

Upon delivaring his ship's papers to the office of the North German Lloyd line today, Captain Paul Konig issued a formal statement declaring his voyage across the Atlantic had broken England rule of the sea.

At the same time the captain disposed finally of the report that he carried a message from Emperor William to President Wison, saying there was no foundation for the story.



RAPID JOURNEY TO

D. P. Talley Says Roads in This County Are Among Worst Found
On Trip

After making the trip to Colorado After making the trip to Colorado springs in two and two-thirds days, D. P. Talley of this city is not as proud of Wichita county's roads as some folks, Delieving there is very great room for improvement. He writes The Times of his trip as follows:

"C. W. Hendricks and I have just completed what I consider a remarkable overland trip in my auto, as compared with what has been possible in the past "five years." Five years ago I made this same trip in what our party considered sitendia. what our party considered splendid time taking us five days. Two years ago I took this trip and made it in three and three-fourths days, then aplendid time. This time we made it in two and two-thirds days, and our running time on the best roads

ago I took this trip and made it in three and three-fourths days, then aplendid time. This time we made it in two and two-thirds days, and our running time on the best roads was not over 30 to 35 miles an hour. "We attribute this quick trip to three things; first, the roads are better than ever before; second, an eight cylinder Cadillac will pull hills and sand and get away after 'slow downs' quicker than the cars I have heretofore travelled in; third, we were fortunate in encountering no wet roads. "We left wichtis Falls at 6:45 a.m. July 5 and arrived at Amarilio at 7 that evening, leaving there at 7:45 p. m. and making camp twenty miles out, near the Canadian bridge at 9 o'clock, making 264 miles that day. We left that camp at seven on the morning of July 6 and reached Raton, New Mexico at 6:25 p. m. we left there at 7:15 p. m. and camped sixteen miles out, up in the Rockies at 8:35 p. m., 497 miles from Wichita Falls. We left there at 5:30 on the morning of July 7 and reached Trindad at 6 o'clock, left there at 7:30 and arrived in Colorado Springs at 3 p. m., July 7.

"We made every foot of the way to Raton Pass on high and the balance of the pass on the second gear, and wish the exception of two very unusual short, steep hills we made every foot of the way to Raton Pass to Colorado Springs in high gear. This speaks well of the Colorado to Guit Highway, particularly in dry weather. BELL-ANS THE ROBERTSON INSURANCE LAW

A Question Of Vital Importance To Every Citizen In Texas To Be Voted On At The Coming July Primary.

Eight years ago seventeen life insurance companies of the North and East volun-tarily withdrew from our State, rather than meet the reasonable requirements of our law, which only required them to loan or invest in our state about forty per cent of the money paid to them by Texas people for

surance policies.
These companies had been doing business in Texas for many years and taking out of Texas an average of about Six million dollars per year, yet all of them combined had loaned to Texas farmers less than one million dollars.

in 1908, Texas passed a law which required all companies to invest or loan in Texas securities about forty of each one hundred collected from Texas people, and while these seventeen companies refused to comply with this law, there were a great comply with this law, there were a great many of the foreign companies which met the requirements of the law, and are here today doing business and prospering and making loans in Texas as the law requires.

And, there has been built up and established thirteen Home Companies, which have complied with this law, and today our Home

companies and the forty foreign companies, doing business in obedience to the Robertson Insurance law, have loaned and invested in Texas more than forty million dollars, over forty times as much as the seventeen com-panies, which withdrew, had invested in all

Do you see any real reason why these Companies, which are not even operating under our Texas laws, and which are not citizens of Texas and have no interest in Texas, should be permitted to dictate to the people of Texas as to what kind of laws they should have? Do you not think it would be a very dangerous policy for the people of Texas to allow the big corporations of the North and East to force them to repeal a

good law, just in order that some special law for their benefit might be passed?

The people of Texas should not be deceived. There is no demand for the repeal of this law upon the part of the people. It is a well known fact that the substance of the Gibson Bill, which the foreign compan ies have sought to have passed to take the place of the Robertson Insurance Law, was promulgated by attorneys employed and paid by these foreign companies, and practically every argument which has been advanced for the repeal of the Robertson Insurance Law and the passage of the Gibson Bill, can be traced to these sources.

The sworn statements of certain New

York life Insurance Companies were intro duced before the last legislature and became a part of that record, and these sworn state ments contained items paid by New York Life Insurance Companies amounting to \$5,000.00 to one attorney in Austin and \$2,000.00 to a law firm in Dallas, and showed the payment of other sums of money to other attorneys, and these sworn state-ments, made by these companies to the State Insurance Department, as the law requires, specifically stated that these items were paid "on account Robertson Insurance Law." A copy of these records is in our possession and if contradicted will be published in full. We hope our good people will not be deceived. There is no demand upon the part of the people for the repeal of this

For the purpose of misleading our people it has been held out to them that if this law back to Texas and lend large sums of money at low rates of interest. Suppose it could be admitted as true they would voluntarily loan a little money in Texas, if they could get the agent's brokerage of two per cent is added. it would be no cheaper; in fact, not as cheap as the loans which are now being made in Texas, because this brokerage, which runs for the life of the loan, is all charged up in

the first note and usually paid in advance.

For instance a \$10,000.00 loan is made for five years at a rate of six per cent and two per cent; that is, the lender gets six per cent and the loan agent two per cent for a period of five years, which equals ten per cent of the loan; or on a \$10,000.00 loan, the agent's commission is \$1000.00, for which the borrower gives a second lien and pays it usually at the end of the first year, and very frequently this commission is deducted from the face of the loan and the records show a \$10,000.00 loan, when in fact the farmer who borrows the money actually gets only \$9,000.00, but pays six per cent interest on \$10,000.00.

Texas into Oklahoma to find where these conditions actually exist and the farmers of Oklahoma are glad to find money that can be borrowed at straight eight per cent, because they are accustomed to paying six per cent and two per cent, which is higher than eight per cent, and frequently pays addi-tional bonus and inspection fees to get it at that rate, and yet they tell you interest rates are cheaper in Oklahoma than Texas. Ask the man who lives in Oklahoma what

he pays for his money.

Again, they try to deceive the people by claiming that Oklahoma, though a smaller state than Texas, has more money loaned on lands. Whether that's true or not, they fail to tell you that Oklahoma has no homestead law. Every farmer can borrow money on his land regardless of how small the number of acres, while Texas he must first set aside two hundred acres as a homestead and can only use the excess as collateral to secure loans; therefore, a great majority of the farmers of Texas do not have sufficient lands upon which to borrow money, which accounts for the fact that there are more

Therefore, if these Eastern Companies are sincere in their desire, let them come on and lend their money and we are sure that no one will object to their making the rate just as cheap as they desire to make it, and if they also desire to write life insurance in Texas, all they will have to do is to comply with the law, just like more than fifty other companies ing, and come on into our State and do both a loan business and insurance business.

in further comparison of the rates be-tween Texas and Oklahoma, we call your at-tention to the following: The Crop Reporter, a publication of the Bureau of Statistics, under the authority of the Secretary of Agriculture at Washington, D. C., shows that the average rate of interest paid by farm-ers in 1912 in Texas was 10.3 per cent; in Oklahoma 12.10 per cent. In 1913 the rate in Texas was 9.97 per cent and in Oklahoma 10.58 per cent, and we doubt not that if more recent statistics were available that the ra-

tio would continue to be in favor of Texas.
Buts you are told about how much the big New York Companies have loaned in lowa, indiana and other States, and that is true, and that is exactly why the people of Texas were justified in passing the Robertson In-surance Law and that is why they are justified in keeping it in force. These Companies have always preferred to lend their money in the North and East and that is why they refused to obey our laws and withdrew from our state.

You have heard it said that Texas has no more right to demand the investment of money collected for insurance premiums by oreign companies than it has to demand the investment of money collected from the people of Texas for McCormack reapers or Standard cultivators, and this statement, like most all the other statements made by enemies of the Robertson Insurance Law, is without force and shows clearly that the party making it has no conception of the un-derlying facts, or else is willing to deceive the people who have had no opportunity to ascertain the whole truth for themselves. ascertain the whole truth for themselves. When you buy a McCormack reaper or a Standard cultivator, you get the implement, and all the money which you paid belongs to the party who sold you the reaper or cultivator and he has a perfect right to use it as he pleases, but when you buy an "old line" life insurance policy, the law requires that a part of the money which you pay for it shall be set aside as a reserve fund and this fund constitutes in a practical sense. this fund constitutes in a practical sense, the cash value which every "old line" policy icyholder and may be withdrawn by him at any time. Therefore, the cash value, or the reserve on Texas policies, belongs not to the Companies, but to the policyholders, and they have a right, through their laws, to require that all or any part of it be invested in the securities of their own state so that the money which the officers of these life in-surance companies hold in trust for the people of Texas in part at least may be used for the development of the resources of our own state. Furthermore the reserve on Life insurance policies is a trust fund, and the law requires that this trust fund be invested in certain classes of securities which are regarded as a safe protection to the policy holder.
