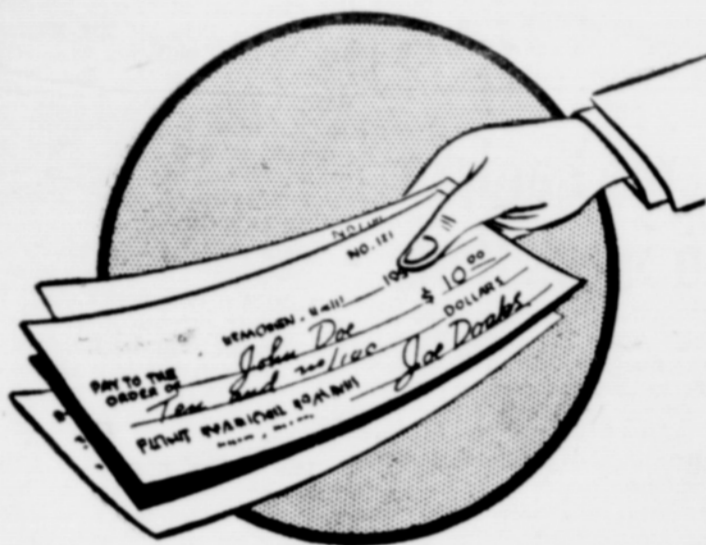

It will be necessary for all persons registering vehicles for 1956 to bring their Title and 1955 Registration Receipt. Due to a change in our registration procedure, we will require these and will not take the information for the re-registration from our files as we have done in previous years.

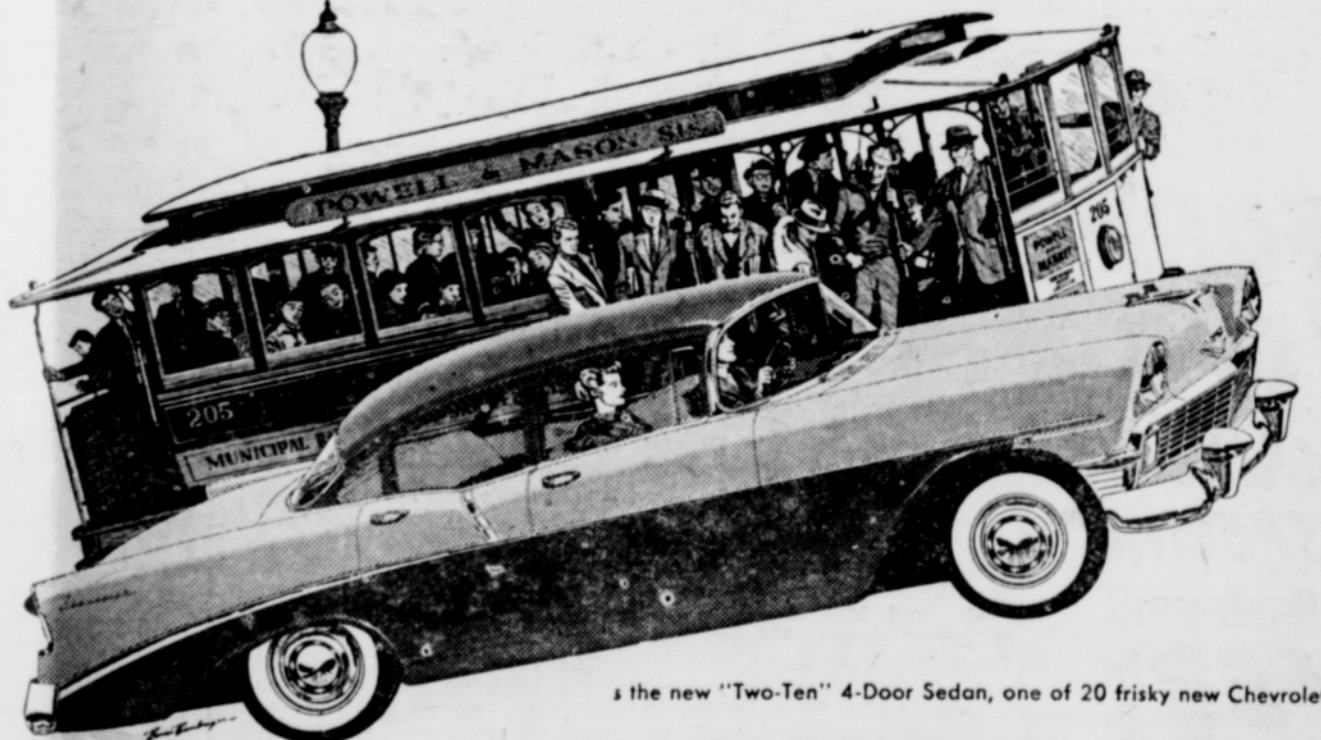

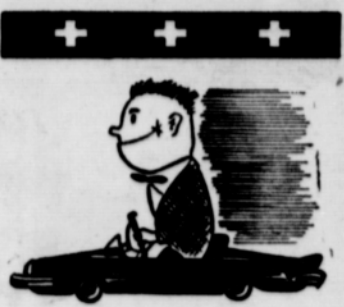
