



Some day the amateur movie artist will be as familiar as the amateur photographer with a kodak. Today we come upon the domestic motion picture machine—in the back yard, maybe—with a kind of thrill. People ask, "Is it the same size?" meaning, does it put the same size picture on the screen.

Of course the answer to this is that the size of a picture on the screen is determined by the distance between the projecting machine and the screen—not by the size of the picture originally taken.

But first let us consider a typical movie amateur whose work has attracted considerable attention, and who really represents the sort of enthusiasm we associate with the word amateur.

Mrs. E. John Brandeis of Fairacres, Omaha, Nebraska, a charming "fan" with a camera, is the niece of John Brandeis, prominent in the Northwest, and a conspicuous member of the Omaha Chamber of Commerce.

She is a well known society matron of the younger set of Omaha, New York and Paris. Her beautiful estate, "Fairacres," on the outskirts of Omaha, is one of the show places of the Northwest. She maintains two homes in New York, one at the Knickerbocker Hotel and an apartment on Riverside Drive.

Incidentally, for her own pleasure and in loyalty to the West, she recently played the leading role in a motion picture entitled "Where East Meets West," which was made under the auspices of the Omaha Chamber of Commerce, with the personal supervision of Harry Levey, directorgeneral of the Educational Department of the Universal Film Company. The purpose of the picture is to take the city of Omaha visiting throughout the United States. It will be shown to the members of the 8000 Chambers of Commerce in the United States.

The picture itself is a triumph of modern photography and shows wonderful panoramic views of Omaha and its environs which boast of much scenic grandeur. Omaha is a notable spot in United States history, being on the route of the Lewis and Clark expedition and the spot where those intrepid explorers negotiated the first treaty with the Shoshone Indians, whose hunting grounds were in the locality of the present side of Omaha.

Mrs. Brandeis showed her altruism by volunteering to play the star role in the "Where East Meets West" picture and gave up her time, estate, automobile and blue ribbon mare in the interest of her city. Although this was her first appearance before the camera, Mrs. Brandeis proved to have the grace and poise of the professional star, and throughout the picture showed her ability as a horsewoman and motorist. She drove her French racing car and spirited mare, winner of innumerable ribbons, throughout the picture. Beautiful scenes of her estate are also shown throughout the picture.

As further evidence of her interest in her home city she is writing a history of the city of Omaha dating from quaint records of the medicine men of the Shoshones before the arrival of Lewis and Clark on down to the present day.

Many of the Shoshone Indians are the personal proteges of Mrs. Brandeis, who has the great distinction of being the first and only white princess of this tribe of Indians. The present chief of the Shoshones made a special trip to her estate to confer this honor on her for her commendable work in behalf of this once populous but rapidly disappearing tribe. There is only one restriction placed on Mrs. Brandeis as a Shoshone princess, and that is that she must

wear the lone eagle feather which constitutes the headdress of the Shoshone brave at the front of the headband instead of the back.

Mrs. Brandeis is said to be the only society woman in the United States who owns and operates her own motion picture camera. The eamera, which is a wonderful piece of craftsmanship, cost \$3500. It weighs only 32 pounds and, therefore, is easily handled. Yes, her hobby is motion pictures, and at Fairacres she has a motion picture theatre built expressly for her according to her own plans, as well as a fully equipped and

well appointed laboratory where she develops and prints her own negatives.

Mrs. Brandeis has many thousands of feet of films in her own private collection, and among other interesting topics has many prints depicting the Shoshone Indians in their war dances and picturesque feasts. Many scenes of the Shoshones are brought into the Omaha Chamber of Commerce picture, the Indians making a special trip to Fairacres where they gave their grotesque war dances on the lawns of the estate.

made for charitable organizations and other societies. She is shortly going to Bryn Mawr, Pennsylvania, at the special invitation of Miss Helen Taft, president of Bryn Mawr, to take motion pictures of this most beautiful institution for the higher education of American women.

Wherever Mrs. Brandeis travels she always brings along her ribbon-winning mare, her French

automobile and her motion picture camera.

Mrs. Brandeis is typical of the movie amateur in her invasion of "occasion." The result of the work of the amateur is many records of social events not hitherto thought of as subjects for the screen.

One movie amateur has been picturing his grandchildren since each was a few days old. The first pictures show the nurse with her little bundle of humanity. Then Father trying to hold the fragile infant. Then Mother, when she is sitting

up. At last here is Baby crawling, and afterward taking its first steps. The result is that Baby is seen growing up on the screen. One film is reserved for each family in Grandfather's circle. To each film bits are added—twenty, forty, a hundred feet at a time.

In some cases this particular amateur has pictures of the weddings that began the domestic dramas. A certain 3 o'clock wedding in an ivygrown church was recorded last summer as the bridal procession came down the sunlit path from the church door just after the ceremony. No objection, of course, to fragments of courtship as beginning these real life, happily biographical acreen dramas.

It is the experience of motion picture amateurs that it is easier to get people to pose than in the case of the ordinary fixed position shapshot, and that they are less critical of the result.

Leonardo De Vinci as an Anatomist

EONARDO DA VINCI, the painter of "Mona Lisa" and "The Last Supper," is now recognized as the first great scientific anatomist. Although he accomplished so much toward a correct understanding of the human body, his work was destined to have no tangible, traceable influence on the immediate development of anatomy and of medicine, because as a writer in the Journal of the American Medical Association points out, it was not to become known generally until many generations had passed and then only through fragmentary records. Van den Brock points out that Leonardo's work in other sciences also remained sterile in the same sense as his work in anatomy. He is said to have studied the question of aviation over many years and to have declared that the flying machine must be built like the body of a bird so that the aviator "can balance himself and move through the air ke a big bird, to the everlasting glory of the nest where he was born."

As further examples of the scope of his interests may be mentioned his studies of plant life, his interpretation of the sea shells on the mountain tops around Florence, and then the note in large letters on one of his sketches: "The sun does not move." A child of free love, disinherited, disliked by his stepbrother, and often misunderstood, Leonardo, after 400 years, is taking his right place in history as one of the most gifted of men and as one of the most versatile and original of investigators.

"When Leonardo da Vinci died in 1519," says the authority above mentioned, "his anatomic notes and sketches passed by will to his faithful friend Melzi who, while he lived, guarded them as his most precious possession, but, unfortunately, this reverence did not pass with them to his heirs. Yet, notwithstanding their extensive, roundabout and still in large degree untracked travels, a very large part of Leonardo's anatomic manuscripts and drawings at last found safe abodes and became available for study and reproduction under favorable conditions.

"The fourth centennial anniversary of Leonardo's death has brought out a number of articles in which his work, particularly in anatomy and physiology, is discussed in the light of the latest investigations that anatomists; historians and

linguists have made of it. "It appears to be established beyond any question of doubt that Leonardo commenced to dissoct when he was about 37 years old in the hospital of Santa Maria Nova in Florence, that he continued this work in Milan, and that he dissected in Rome in 1513, when he was 61 years old, at which time Leo X, forbade further work of that kind. It is stated that in all he dissected more than 30 bodies of men and women at various ages, besides various animals. Nor is there any longer any question about the absolute originality and complete independence of his anatomic work, which he carried far beyond the requirements of anatomy as pertaining to art. This is shown in the remarkable circumstance that he paid more and closer attention to the internal organs than even Vesalius or the other anatomists of that periad. What interest has the artist in the cerebral ventricles, the internal arrangement of the heart, the course of the deeper nerves and vessels? It was a great love of anatomic and physiologic investigation, of science, that led him to work on and on through the years, stealthily, no doubt, with poor illumination and under many other difficulties, but to what amazing results!

"Hopstock, one of the editors of Leonardo's Windsor manuscripts, himself an anatomist, after a careful review of all the published manuscripts, gives in essence this estimate of Leonardo as anatomist:

"No one before him dissected so many bodies and no one understood the results of his diseaction so well as he; no one before him represented in drawings the muscles, vessels and nerves as they are, which he did; no one before him knew the heart so well, but whether he understood the circulation, or thought he had a definite idea of the correct explanation of the circulation of the blood, remains doubtful. He was the first to represent correctly the skelcton, to inject vessels with a solidifying mass, to make casts of the ventricles of the brain, to practice serial sections. As revealed by the notes, which cover a period of 30 years, and his marvelous red chalk drawings and impromptu sketches by the side of the dissected body, his work throughout is characterized by an almost uncanny accuracy, deep physiologic insight, untiring zeal and an unfailing sense of the beautiful."
