TOTAL OF 1543 NEW CASES OF INFLUENZA REPORTED IN DALLAS PAST WEEK

DALLAS, TEX., Jan. 31.—New cases of influenza reported in Dallas this week totaled 1543 up to noon today with twenty-one deaths.

ST. LOUIS, MO., Jan. 31.—For the first time since the disease was pronounced epidemic on January 19, the number of new cases of influenza reported to the health board today fell below the number reported on the preceding day.

According to the health board records, there were 523 new cases in the city during the last 24 hours as compared with 533 reported for the preceding period.

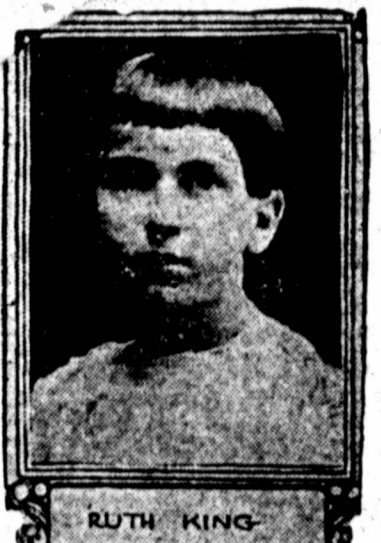

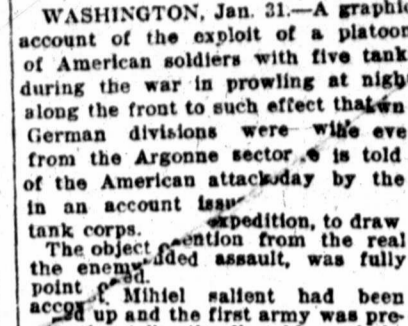

LOVE STORY AFTERMATH OF WAR EXCEEDS FANTASTIC SITUATIONS OF MOST DARING FICTION WRITER

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—The immigration bureau was seen in a new role today—that of a beneficent godfather of romance. The immigration authorities, it was announced, have decided to admit to this country Miss Emily Knowles, 21 year old English girl, and her baby, which is said to be the child of Perley Spiker of Baltimore. The admittance, however, is temporary, and at the end of three months the case will be taken up again. If, during the three months, Miss Knowles marries Guy Spiker, brother of Perley, she will be allowed to remain permanently in this country, it was learned.

The action of Spiker, however, cannot be condoned, the bishop said. TRACTOR SHOW TO BE HELD IN WICHITA, KAN. BEGINNING FEBRUARY 9

WICHITA, Kansas, Jan. 31.—Four million dollars worth of machinery will be displayed at the tractor show here, which opens February 9. Entries from almost 100 manufacturers have been received. This will be the largest farm power machinery show ever held in the world. It is not only the largest show of its kind, but the oldest—having been started here 19 years ago. Until 1918, it was held out of doors, on the street commonly known as thrasher or tractor "row."

FIFTH AVENUE MAY BE MADE ONE WAY STREET RESULT OF CONGESTION

NEW YORK, Jan. 31.—Fifth avenue, a thoroughfare that includes two of the world's greatest local points of travel, may be made a "one way" street in an effort to regulate the tremendous flood of vehicular traffic, it was learned today.

Statistics show that 28 vehicles pass 42nd street and Fifth avenue the first focal point, every minute in the day. Total cars passing that point in 10 hours last June was 17,997, and the number is said to be larger now. The traffic at 34th street, the second focal point, is almost as great.

BUSINESS COUNCIL PLANNING EARLY FOR CITY DEVELOPMENT

The Business council of the Chamber of Commerce plans to be a factor in the work of the organization to have a big part in the plans for 1920. The first meeting of the organization Friday afternoon.

Increasing of hospital facilities, reviving of the business district and a system of ornamental street lighting are three things that the council took hand right at the start. Some members said they would struggle along with the present lights if the ground were made after underfoot and contractors among the members were asked to obtain preliminary data on the next meeting.

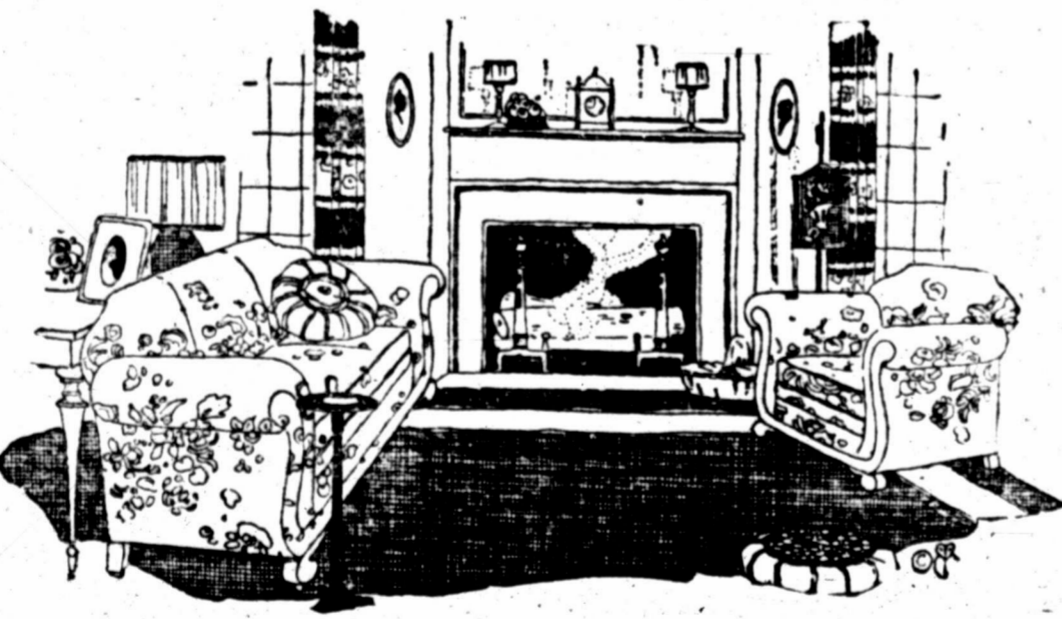

About a dozen years ago Fort Worth, then pennant winner of the Texas League, played a post-season baseball series with Wiley Blair's "Cincoes"—and the Wichita Falls aggregation of amateur and semi-pro ball tossers gloriously and triumphantly walloped the stuffing out of the Texas League champions.

Among the players who guarded that stonewall infield for Wichita Falls and who wielded a wicked willow on the offensive was H. F. Weldon, who three days ago was appointed to the 36th district court of the state of Texas.

Although he has practiced law for 21 years, Judge Weldon has been since his "kid days" a lover of clean outdoor sports, and there are scores of old timers in this city who still recall baseball games where "Finley's" big hat brought home the bacon for the home team.

Weldon began playing baseball with an amateur nine at Henrietta in 1892. Four years later he was signed up by Fort Worth of the Texas League, as a third baseman of promise—but a serious injury forced him to quit the club in the middle of the season and directed his energies towards the law as a profession. In later years, although studying law steadily, he played semi-professional baseball in Oklahoma City, Ardmore, Gainesville, Bowie and Wichita Falls.

Judge Weldon is also secretary of the North Texas Field Trial Association, and the owner of a kennel of pointers. He is a member of the Wichita Falls Golf Club, although his interest in trapshooting is feeble compared to the thrill he gets when ducks are overhead.

Golf is another sport that the new district judge has taken up within the last year. As a member of the Wichita Falls Golf Club he became interested in the old Scotch pastime, found that his old baseball swing seemed to fit the game—and promptly he became a "regular golf nut." He is one of the staidest players at the local club, and a golfer who can get a greater combination of distance-plus-accuracy out of a full mashie shot than any golfer in the Southwest; a somewhat rash statement,

BUREAU ADOPTS A BUSY 1920 PROGRAM IN NEW CITY PLAN

DECIDED UPON SATURDAY BY COMMITTEE OF WHICH MRS. KEMP IS CHAIRMAN.

WORK WITH CIVIC LEAGUE

Organization of the Residents of Each Block Included in Plans Suggested.

A very busy program for 1920, with adoption of a city plan as the chief feature, was decided upon Saturday by the civic and city beautification bureaus of the Chamber of Commerce, of which Mrs. J. A. Kemp is chairman.

Co-operating to the greatest extent possible with the Civic League, the bureau expects to enter vigorously upon the work scheduled for the year. City planning, which will include such matters as parkways, additions, street widening and street arrangement, will be the dominating purpose of the bureau, but numerous other activities are also contemplated.

Organization of the residents of each block into improvement associations, meeting regularly at some place in the block, is to be a novel and important feature of the 1920 activities. Some blocks are to be organized without delay, and the block plan extended as rapidly as possible to all parts of the city. These block associations are expected to play a very important part in the beautification plans for this year. Their work would not be confined to beautification measures alone; for instance, if lighting, water or telephone service were poor in the block, the association could deal with the proper authorities much more effectively than individuals could. While each association will be an independent "self-starting" affair, it is probable that each would be asked to elect a representative to a central council or body, which would correlate the forces and co-operate with the Civic League, the Chamber of Commerce and city officials on plans affecting more than one block.

Mrs. Kemp, as chairman of the bureau, announced Saturday the following personnel:

W. S. Curlee, vice chairman; Myles O'Reilly, second vice chairman; W. M. Friddy, Roderick Tait, Mrs. T. B. Smock, Mrs. J. A. Richolt, J. F. Lauck, Walter D. Cline.

Mrs. Kemp and Mrs. W. S. Curlee of the civic beautification committee of the Civic League conferred Saturday with A. Pharo-Gagge and Roderick Tait of the Kew Gardens company, which recently established offices here. Mr. Pharo-Gagge designed the landscape beautification scheme for White Sulphur Springs, West Va., Newark Bay and other places, and will work with the bureau in the 1920 activities.

ALCALDE TO BE CONSUL FROM MEXICO TO BERLIN

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 31.—Colonel Manuel B. Alcala will be Mexican consul in Berlin, according to a statement issued at the foreign office late last night. Marquis Joaquin Gonzalez de Gonzalez, the Spanish minister to Mexico, arrived here yesterday morning.

It is the understanding here that the Japanese government does not desire to take any action that can cause suspicion in America regarding acquisition of territory or other rights in Mexico that are not common to all nations.

He was engaged in the ranching business in Jeff Davis county and for a number of years had made his home at Fort Davis. He was a native of Pennsylvania coming to Texas in the early seventies being engaged as a surveyor. In that capacity he made land surveys over a large section of western Texas.

PROGRESSION OF NEAR SENSATIONS IN DIFFERENT DIRECTIONS HAVE FEATURED WEEK'S DEVELOPMENTS

Wichita Falls district during past week has seen a succession of near sensations in various points of the compass, including tests in other neighboring counties as well as in the confines of Wichita county, and though bad weather and epidemic of influenza which has kept the oil fields in a mild form, have effected an almost complete shut down in many instances and hampered developments elsewhere, there is promise that with seasonably fair weather next week a definite development of importance, one way or the other from various sections.

The proposal to bar newspaper men from the meetings of the directors of the Chamber of Commerce, if adopted, will lessen the usefulness of that body to Wichita Falls.

The Chamber of Commerce has been a very potent influence in the growth and prosperity of Wichita Falls, because it has had the interest, the support and the confidence of the great mass of citizens behind it.

The members of the Chamber of Commerce have little direct contact with the organization. Their interest has largely been maintained through the published reports of the proceedings of the directors meeting.

COMPULSORY MILITARY TRAINING. Seven republicans and two democrats voted for compulsory military training in the army re-organization bill and three republicans and two democrats voted against it.

It appeals to us not so much as a military measure as insuring that the youths of the present generation will have four months in the open air, under military rules and regulations and with physical training as much as an essential part of the work as training in the methods of warfare.

The youths and the nation will be more than repaid, we think, for the time devoted to compliance with this bill, if it becomes a law, and future generations will reap the benefits from it not only in physical well-being obedience to law and order and other strictly soldierly qualities, but also in the Americanization of the aliens who grow up in the crowded industrial centers with only dim realization of American customs and American ideals.

GIANT ORGANIZATION.

"For the present," notes the Fort Worth Star-Telegram, commenting on the annual meeting of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce last week at Abilene, "it is necessary only to say that a young giant has come to maturity in West Texas—that the West Texas Chamber of Commerce is now, beyond question, the biggest thing in the shape of a commercial body that has ever been brought into being anywhere in the country."

There is no question, we think, but that the West Texas Chamber of Commerce has played a not inconsiderable part in the upbuilding that the past year has seen, and its deeds of the past thirteen months that have elapsed since its organization are guarantee of the greater deeds it will encompass in the future because of greater strength and greater opportunities, if it receives the support it deserves to receive at the hands of West Texas communities.

There is some satisfaction, vicarious though it be, in the fact that of the \$300,000,000,000 indebtedness the nations of the world are under now as compared with \$40,000,000,000 before the world war, the United States owes only \$20,000,000,000 and it has an offset to that of half that sum due it from other countries for advances made during the war.

There is no explanation tendered with the statistical information from the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America that the membership of American churches has gone up 2,779,967 since the last previous church census in 1916 while the attendance on Sunday school has in the same time decreased 2,500,000.

Dana and the Bennetts probably are turning over in their graves since learning that their old papers—which used to fight each other hammer and tongue—are to be consolidated as the "Sun and New York Herald," a bit of newspaper nomenclature that preserves the names of both papers but is as awkward as it is unappreciated.

The Times is quite sincere in its request for short communications under the general heading, "For the good of the order," the "order" being of course Wichita Falls. There are many Wichita citizens with an interesting message to deliver—for the betterment of the town, for the alleviation of some existing nuisance or hindrance for the remedying of some admitted evil.

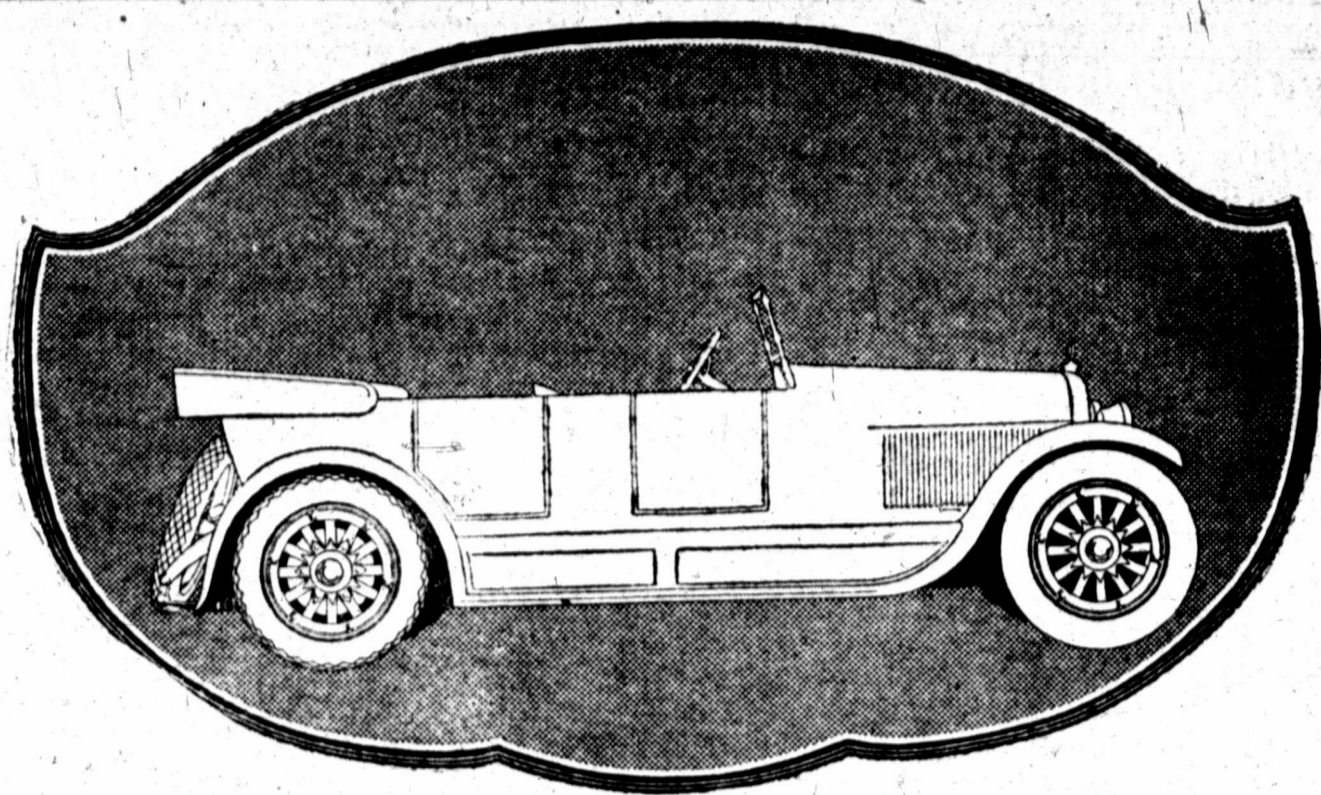
The car shortage in America, commented upon by everyone aware of the condition, extends to other countries. Production before the war had not reached the magnitude elsewhere that it had in the United States.

This means that comparatively few cars exist outside of the United States, and the post-war demand in other countries must be met by new production in plants that are not equipped to produce enough to fill the demand in their own countries, to say nothing of the demand in markets outside of their own boundaries.

Moreover, the larger wages now paid to foreign mechanics in Europe are bringing about a condition of prosperity there which will justify a more general use of motor cars, whereas, before the war motor cars were built for and used by the wealthier classes only.

The logical conclusion therefore is that if foreign makers cannot supply the needs of their own peoples, Americans have little to fear in the way of competition either in American or in foreign markets.

SUBMITS REPORT ON FINANCIAL CONDITION 1ST BAPTIST CHURCH

Running on a cash basis all through the year, meeting obligations as they matured, the First Baptist Church of Wichita Falls has a cash balance of more than \$4,000 at the opening of the new year, according to the audit just completed by Hutchinson & Smith, certified accountants. This splendid record is revealed in the audit announced by J. C. Mytinger, chairman of the finance committee, which shows a total receipt of \$25,877.67 for the entire year for general expenses and benevolences.

The general expense budget for 1920, which has been announced in detail previously, calls for \$18,500, an increase of approximately \$4,000 over the 1919 budget. The benevolences are consolidated with the Seventy-Five Million contribution, which amounted to \$175,000 in the pledges of the First Church.


