SAN FRANCISCO, July 3.—Balloting for a presidential candidate was resumed when the democratic national convention met today. Two ballots were taken before adjournment last night without any candidate receiving more than about one-third of the requisite two-thirds vote to nominate, but as the delegates assembled to the final session of the convention, predictions were made that a nomination would come without a protracted struggle.

Just as Harding's name filled the air as the probable republican nomine three weeks ago this morning on the final day of the republican convention, so William G. McAdoo's appeared to be in the ascendancy as the delegates assembled today with this difference, that the Ohio candidate had been agreed upon by the elements in control of the situation at Chacago, while the New York man's supporters here had still to fight a stubborn opposition with no definite assurance of success.

WILSON EXPRESS COX MAKES RAPID GAINS; M'ADOO LEADS FIELD, COX SECOND AND PALMER THIRD

AUDITORIUM, SAN FRANCISCO, July 3 .- Two big breaks Cox marked the seventh ballot in the Democratic national convention. New York and New Jersey both gave the Ohio governor big contribution from their delegations, sending the Cox boom upward to the great delight and demonstration of the forces opposed to McAdoo.

The changes on the seventh ballot showed Cox gained one nundred and one-half votes, McAdoo gained fifteen and a half votes, and Palmer gained two. This put Cox in second place for the first time. All the gains were made from the field. Between the seventh and eighth ballot the Virginia dele-

gates went out of the hall to caucus and decide if they should eave Glass and to whom they should throw their 24 votes. The McAdoo forces were waiting and hoping for the block. The invisible combination against McAdoo got a great deal of satisfaction over the gain of Cox but was forced to concede that McAdoo still was leading .

Iowa was expected also to break up on the next ballot, throwing a majority from Palmer to Cox and some votes probably for McAdoo. The delegation started out for Meredith. lowa delegates at the conclusion of the caucus said they would stand solidly for one more ballot for Palmer. Anti-McAdoo leaders did not want any break to that candidate.

The eighth ballot showed the first loss McAdoo has sustained. Cox during the whole balloting has shown a steady rise from one hundred and thirty-four on the first to three hundred

AT THE BIG MOMENT.

A championship test isn't always a matter of skill, courage and experience. These are big factors—but not always decisive enes.

Very frequently the test may depend upon an unknown and ungovernable quantity—the same being a matter of how your muscular and mental controls are working on the big day.

Last August or September, Johnston beat Tilden at Forest Hills. In the London championship Johnston defeated Tilden again.

Then Parke comes along and beats Johnston. Whereupon Tilden-promptly eliminates Parke in straight sets.

Johnston was at his best against Tilden. But against Parke he was undoubtedly off. Something had gone wrong. It may have been a momentary staleness, due largely to the Californian's slight physique and the strain of the previous week's play. It may have been a matter of digestion. There are times when one never knows. times when one never knows.

TRAINING FOR THE TEST.

A man may train carefully and properly for the big test—and then find on the big day that his game has slipped.

There is undoubtedly a certain element of luck, very frequently, in reaching a championship just as you are coming upon your game.

We recall two occasions when if the open golf championship had been played a week earlier Gil Nichols would have won.

On each of those two occasions Nicholis led big fields by decisive margins the previous week. He had come to his top form just a shade too soon.

But the next week he was slipping.

Hagen was at his best when the open championship arrived in 1914 and 1919. In 1915 and in 1919 the big week found him out of gear, playing badly, and his finished well down.

Why? He merely happened to be off his best game when the title week came around.

And very frequently physical condition may have something to do with the slump. One may be feeling unusually keen, in top physical form, and suddenly discover that everything is going wrong. These are the occasions that bring about dismay beyond any words.

ONE MEETING.

One meeting very often proves but little. Fulton isn't as good a heavy-weight as Dempsey is, but in that first and only clash it is entirely possible that he may have been out of gear, with Dempsey at his best.





THE COTTON CROP.

A recent survey of the cotton crop situation in ten Southern states, made by correspondents who covered 782 counties in the cotton-growing region, estimates the condition at 69.3 per cent of normal, compared with 65.4 per cent on May 25; with an indicated yield of 11,500,000 bales. The area planted to cotton is reported to be about one per cent greater than in 1919, while the condition is but a trifle lower than the ten-year average. Since this survey was made, weather conditions generally have been favorable, and if they continue so the actual yield may exceed the present estimate considerably; but it is pointed out by intelligent observers that June prospects in the past have been disappointed by unfavorable weather in July. Furthermore, it is reported—from the Texas fields, particularly—that the boll weevils are very active and are doing much damage.

From practically all portions of the

boll weevils are very active and are doing much damage.

From practically all portions of the cotton belt the report is that the crop is from a few days to as much as six weeks late, and continued dry and hot weather is necessary for its development, as well as for keeping down the ravages of the weevils. In many places the cotton is grassy, and farm labor is scarce; but the plant is receiving attention even to the neglect of other crops where conditions demand it. It will be noted from the market fluctuation that great stress is being placed will be noted from the market fluctua-tion that great stress is being placed upon the weather reports, which are always subject to variation and only reliable as temporary indications. Ex-pert opinion is that even if the pres-ent estimate of the cotton crop should be exceeded somewhat, the crop would fall below the actual demand for con-sumption, because the world is not producing enough of the staple to meet its needs, and the recent downward its needs, and the recent downward tendency of prices has not been war-ranted by actual conditions.

For the four years directly preceding the world war, the American cotton crop averaged about fifteen million bales; since then it has been considerably less than twelve million. The world needs more cotton now than it ever needed before, and will pay a good price for it if the crop be marketed with judgment and deliberation, instead of in the usual haphazard way of pushing it upon consumers faster than they want it, and so feeding the of pushing it upon consumers faster than they want it, and so feeding the speculators and manipulators. Growers know what that means; but will they profit by what they know?






