If I get drunk and have a wreck I don't want you to print my name in the paper and I don't want anything in the paper about my buying a house or selling a house. I have a friend who is getting a divorce, and you can leave that out too.

I want to see for myself whether the prices are cheaper in Friona or Hereford or Clovis. I want to know where I can buy a good second hand car, what's showing at the movie and who's having a sale. And you'd better do it too, because I gave you my dime.

Just because I don't have too much education, you needn't think you can take advantage of me. It doesn't make any difference if I don't want to do anything for my schools, church, city government or chamber of commerce.

I pay my taxes and I just gave you a dime and I want to see my name in this paper from time to time and I want it to be spelled right, too. I expect every name in the paper to be spelled right. I don't want any mistakes. If there are any mistakes to be made I'll make them, but YOU can't because I gave you my dime.

When I meet one of your people on the street I want them to give me the latest inside dope. I expect them to serve as publicity chairmen on any committee I want and I expect your employees to agree with everything I think or do.

And any time I want to call the paper and ask how many children Al Capone had or how much gasoline Lindbergh used on his flight to Paris, I expect them to know. I don't want to have to call back for the information I want.

Next week I'm going to start my own business here in Friona and I want a nice news item and picture about it. No, I don't expect to take any advertising with your paper. If you run the news story and picture about my opening I won't need any advertising.

And you'd better not give me that old stuff about you can't do it either, because I gave you a dime for that lousy sheet and it's MY newspaper.

All who attended last year's display will agree that it was a fine fireworks show, and another is promised this year.

During the program, the New Horizons Junior Study Club will operate a concession stand, featuring ice cream, hot dogs, cokes, candy, etc., to satisfy the whims of those attending.

Sarpalius, who left a broken home at age 12 to live at Boys Ranch, has pulled himself up by his bootstraps and achieved quite a name for himself.

In 1968, he served as state president of the Future Farmers of America. This was following his graduation from Boys Ranch. He also was president of the student body at Clarendon College, and participates actively in church work and spends much of his time working

and speaking with young people.

Sarpalius is now a student at West Texas State University, where he is working his way through college. He plans to teach or pursue political science upon his graduation from college.

Star Rates 3rd In NNA Competition

The Friona Star was advised this week that it was third best weekly newspaper in the nation, on the basis of contests sponsored by the National Newspaper Association.

The award was presented at the NNA convention, last weekend in Rochester, N.Y. The Star is to receive an engraved plaque, which will be mailed.

First-place winner was a newspaper in Folsom, California. Second place was won by the Williamston, Michigan, Enterprise.

The Star entered in the division for weekly newspaper up to 3,000 circulation, which included newspapers in towns up to twice the size of Friona.

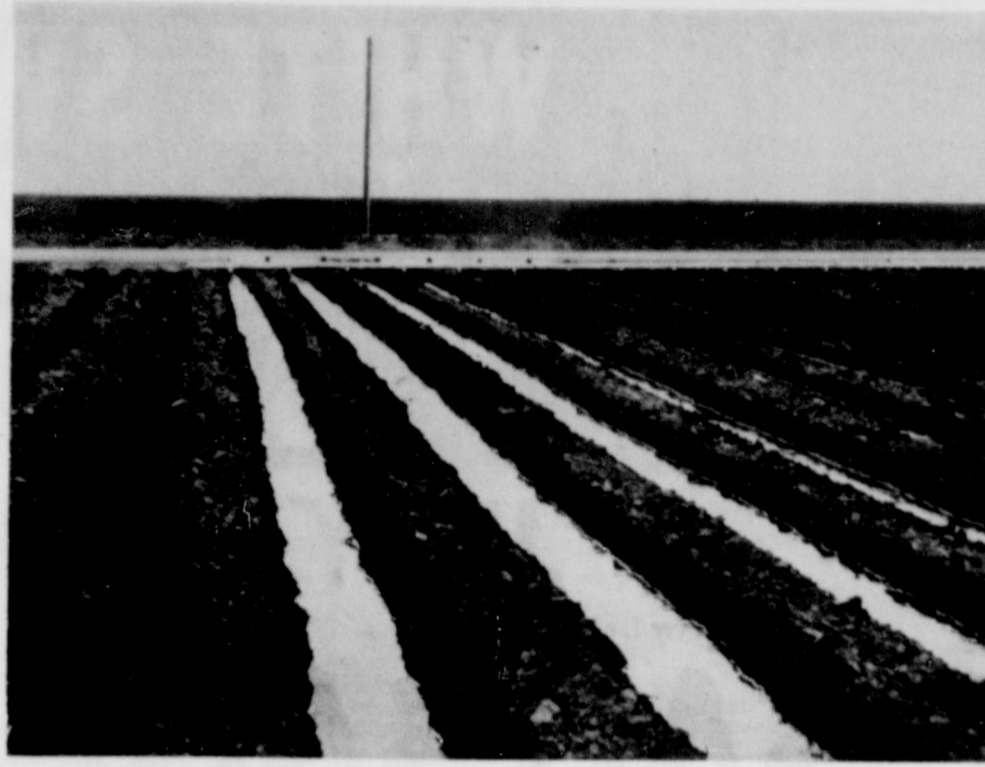

Imported water is coming—maybe! Until then the water we have will have to do. It is common knowledge that the Ogalla formation (the water bearing strata) is not being sufficiently recharged to last forever. If water is used unwisely and lost it is not doing anyone any good not to mention that this exhausts the water supply needlessly. If the water is used carefully perhaps it will last until water can be imported.

Presently, approximately 40% of the water pumped in Farmer County is lost and never used. This can be reduced, but not without effort. It will cost everyone who uses irrigation water time, money and labor. Shorter irrigation

runs will mean more rows to set which will take more time and labor, but they will save water. Tailwater return systems will cost money and time, but they reclaim water. Sprink-

ler systems cost money and labor, but they apply water efficiently. Efficient, water saving irrigation costs everyone, but without water what will this county look like?

Attention Students:

If you are a student who is working during the summer and you will not earn enough to owe any income tax (\$1700), it's not too late to go back and talk to your payroll office about completing a Form W-4E. The "E" stands for exemption. A recent change in the tax law allows your employer to let you take home all your pay under these circumstances. The new law allows your employer to stop withholding on students who will not earn enough to owe any income tax. It also saves the government the trouble of sending you an income tax refund next January or February.

Contract Awarded For 1500th Upstream Dam

The 1,500th upstream flood prevention dam to be built in Texas was contracted for construction this week, reports State Conservationist Clyde W. Graham of the USDA Soil Conservation Service.

East Fork Construction Company of Seagoville was low bidder for the contract.

The dam is Site No. 13 in the Hickory Creek watershed near Denton. The Hickory Creek project will provide flood prevention and recreation for the City of Denton while protecting cropland, roads, bridges and other property in the watershed. The dam will be the sixth in a series of 16 to be built in the watershed.

The project, including conservation land treatment in the watershed, is expected to keep 58,000 tons of sediment out of Garza-Little Elm Reservoir each year when completed. Garza-Little Elm serves as a water supply for Denton, Dallas and other cities in North Texas.

"The 1,500th dam marks another milestone in the watershed approach to resource management in Texas," Graham said. "Upstream watershed projects have vast environmental benefits: they not only cut flood damages but they also reduce erosion and sediment damage. And sediment is still our state's biggest pollutant. It fills lakes, streams, and harbors; it kills fish and ruins their spawning grounds."

Graham said watershed lakes also provide recreation areas while creating new fish and wildlife habitat.

The Hickory Creek project includes two lakes planned above the City of Denton which will supplement the city's long range recreation and flood control program. The city is buying land around the proposed lakes which will be converted into a 327-acre regional park. The city is working with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department in developing the park.

The creek below the park area runs through Denton and has a long history of flooding. The city has widened and concrete lined part of the creek to reduce flooding; however rapid

urban growth has intensified run-off, making the channel capacity inadequate. Massive expansion of the creek channel would be needed without the two upstream watershed lakes.

Jim White, City Manager for the City of Denton, says the Hickory Creek project will save the city several million dollars. Without the watershed project, he says engineering consultants estimate it would cost the city \$17 million to widen and concrete line the channel sufficiently to provide adequate flood protection.

"We're not only saving money through the watershed project," he pointed out, "but we'll also have a beautiful regional park with two watershed lakes. On top of that, the project will reduce flooding, erosion, and sediment damage which will benefit our city as well as the entire Trinity basin."

State Conservationist Graham said some 2,200 upstream watershed lakes have been plan-

ned in Texas in 118 watershed projects now in operation. The projects usually include a combination of stepped up soil and water conservation work in the watershed plus a series of dams to retard floodwater during heavy rains. Sediment storage space is provided in reservoir areas which form small lakes averaging 15 to 25 acres in size.

Other measures which can be included in upstream watershed projects include treating critically gullies areas, municipal water supply storage space, floodwater diversions, and cleaning out sediment-choked stream channels.

Sponsors of watershed projects secure all land, easements and rights-of-way needed for construction at no cost to the federal government. Sponsors also maintain completed projects. The Soil Conservation Service provides planning and installation services and administers construction funds appropriated by Congress.

Sponsors of the Hickory Creek project include the City of Denton, the Denton County Commissioners Court, and the Denton-Wise Soil and Water Conservation District.

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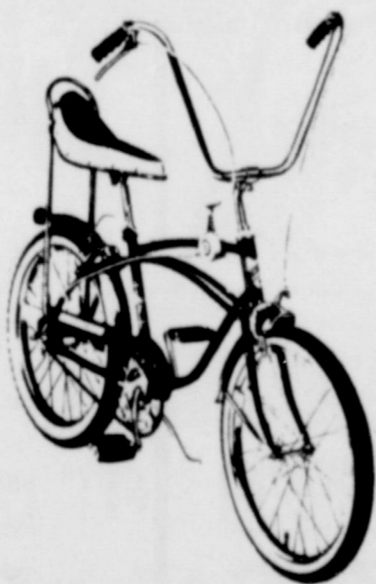

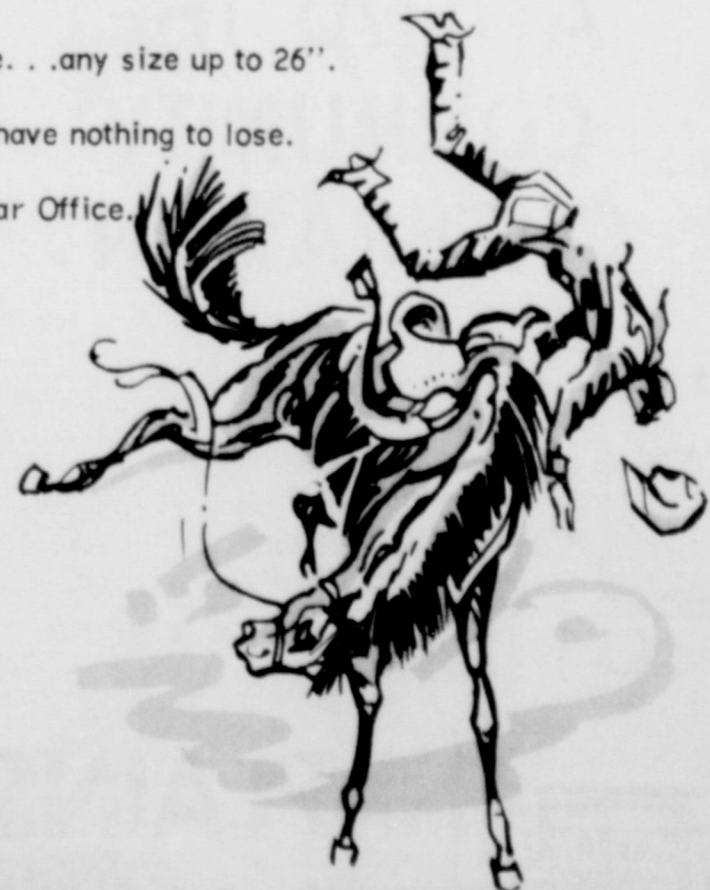

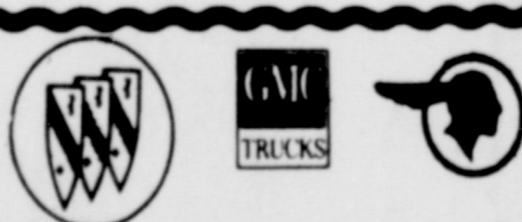

Pitchers for the Flyers were Coy Jameson and Robin Baize. Ancira pitched for the Oilers.

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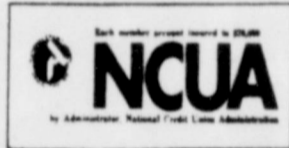

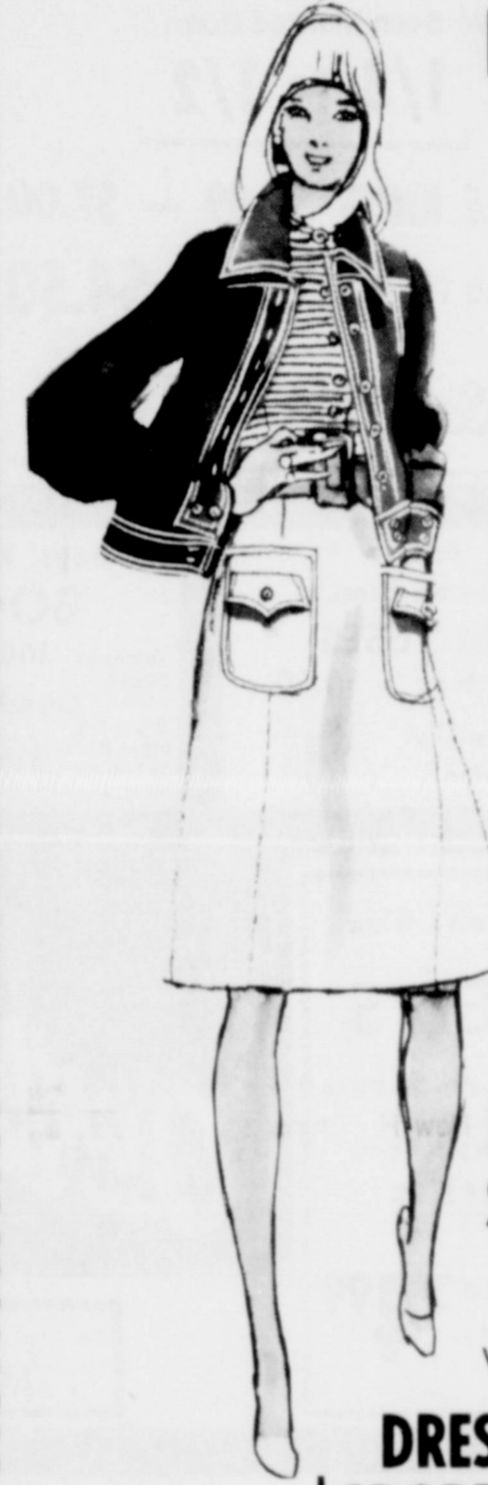
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Americanism Contest Winners Announced
