As we understand it, the last time a Hereford team won a district championship outright, they were in Class A with Friona. In 1944, as local fans will remember, a tie developed, with Friona and Hereford meeting here on Thanksgiving Day in a playoff for the district crown.

Hereford won that game, 14-13, having to pull off a long pass play in the game's twilight hours to erase a 13-7 Friona lead, as the Chiefs were bidding to claim their first ever win over a Whiteface eleven.

The Whitefaces then won the district title outright in 1945, and that is the last time they have achieved that trick in football. As we understand it, teams in the district in 1944-45 besides Hereford and Friona included Lumas (which Friona beat, 6-0), Tulla, Dalhart, Dimmitt and possibly White Deer and Panhandle.

Things have changed somewhat. This year, those schools are strung out from class A through AAAA.

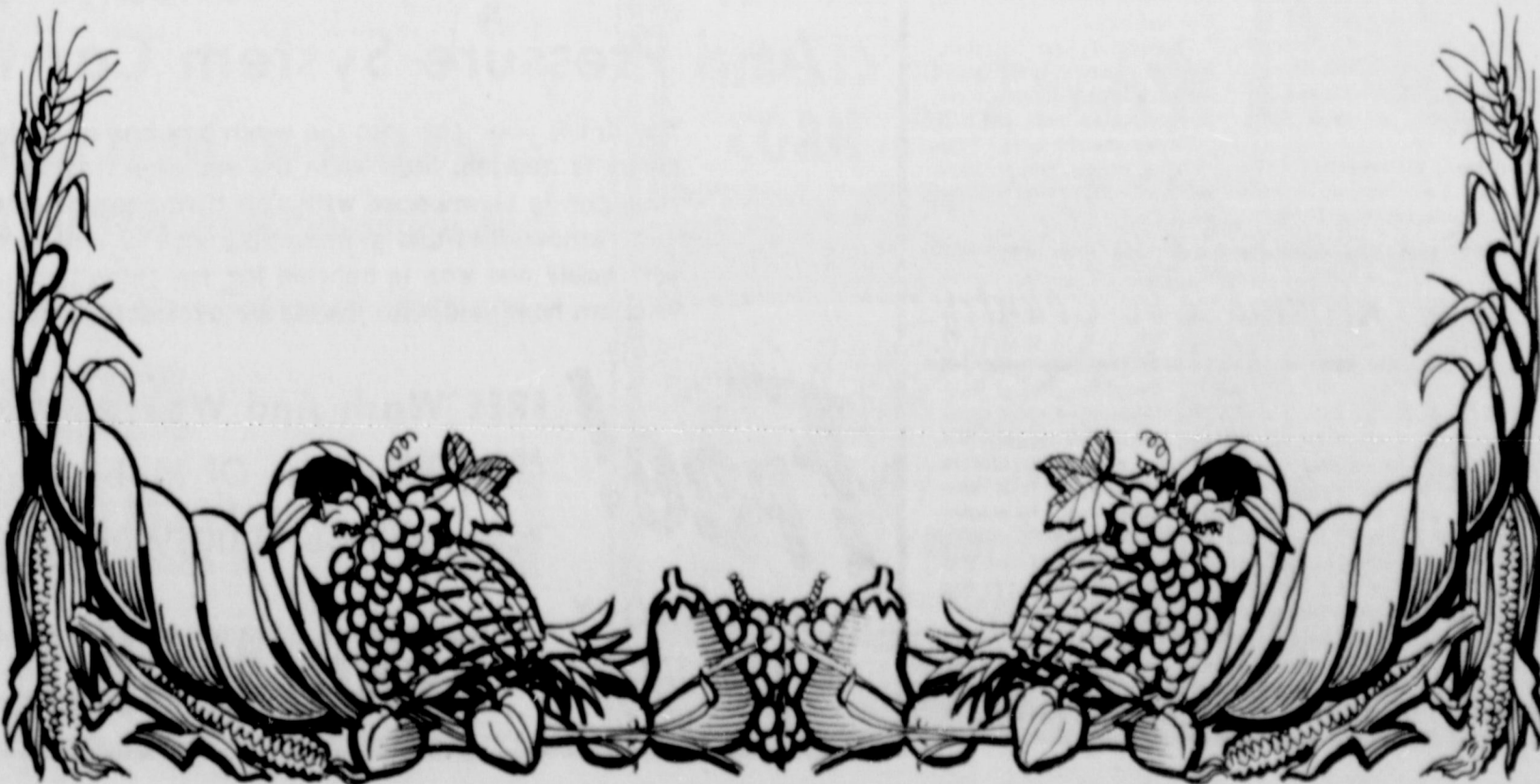

Close Finish Looms In Football Contest

One of the closest finishes in the history of the Friona Star's annual football contest looms this week, as two contestants are tied, and 15 others grouped within three points of the leaders, as the contest heads into its last week.

After a weekend that saw several upsets, leaders in the contest held their breath—but few of them dropped down very far, as most of their contemporaries also had bad scores.

The exceptions to this statement, among the leaders, were Mal Manchee, Duane Balze and Laverne Mabry. Manchee scored a 10 to claim the weekly first prize of \$5.00, and came from the 32nd name in the list up to a virtual tie for third. Manchee was six points behind the leader prior to the weekend, and now trails by just two points.

(The three Thanksgiving Day games will be tabulated and added to scores in the final week's contest.)

Both Balze and Mabry were lodged some 16 names down the list, but with scores of nine for the week, came up to a total of 102 points, just one off the pace. Thelma Watkins also had a nine, and now stands at 101 points.

F.G. Crofford, the pace-setter a week ago, lost his one-point edge, and goes into the final week tied with Jerry Loflin, each having amassed a total of 103 points during the contest.

Manchee was one of three crystal ball gazers who managed a score of 10 out of last week's proceedings. The others were Ray D. Fleming and Jimmy Pena. Fleming was awarded the \$3.00 check for second place and Pena took third, on the basis of their guesses on the Lazbuddie-Turkey score. Manchee pegged it at 28-14, Fleming at 24-14, and Pena at 24-20. Lazbuddie won, 44-7.

HUNTINGTON, IND., HERALD-PRESS: "An added commentary on the society in which we live in 1970 comes in the word of caution given by Congressman Teague of California to young persons expecting to go abroad... He tells them to be careful about violating foreign drug laws. He pointed out that 522 young Americans are now in overseas prisons for such violations. Most young persons do not realize that when they travel to a foreign country they are subject to that country's laws, or that foreign drug-abuse laws usually are much more severe than in the United States. Teague cited the case of a young Californian now serving six years and a day in a Spanish prison because he was found with 500 grams of hashish in his possession. He also noted that prison conditions in many countries are almost inhumane."

WALTHAM, MASS., NEWS-TRIBUNE: "Talk about police brutality. The head of the Ohio State Highway Patrol reports that his men fired more than 150,000 rounds of .38 caliber ammunition (during 1970). . . All of the bullets, however, were expended on the target range. Not a shot was fired at a living target during the year. 'We're proud of that record,' says (the) . . . superintendent of the patrol. 'Knowing when and where not to fire is as important as knowing how.' It's called professionalism."

**On The Farm
In Parmer County**

Texas is a giant in the agricultural industry and Texans have much to be proud of and to be thankful for regarding the food and fiber produced in this state. Thus the state's agricultural products will receive special notice during Texas Food and Fiber Abundance Week, November 15-21.

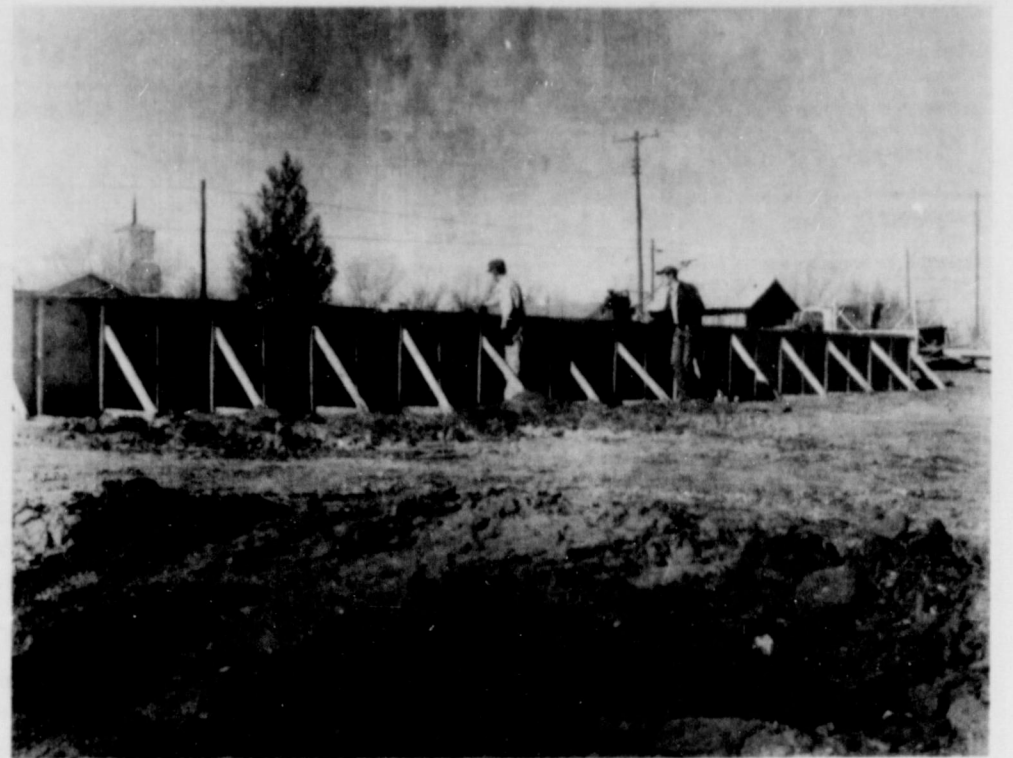
"Special observances are planned to emphasize that the people of Texas have a large stake in the vast amount of food and fiber produced by those in agriculture," explains Charles K. Baker, agricultural economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service which is assisting in promoting the week-long event. "Texans benefit both as consumers and as residents of this state due to the tremendous contributions of agriculture to the overall economy."

Agriculture in all its phases adds almost \$10 billion annually to the Texas economy, points out the economist. Cash receipts from farm marketings during 1970 were \$3.1 billion and are expected to reach the \$3.76 billion mark by 1976. Every dollar produced by agriculture has a multiplier effect of 2.7. This means that a \$1 million increase in agricultural income results in an increase of \$2.7 million in the total Texas economy.

Texas is the leading state in the production of cotton, grain sorghum, beef cattle, sheep and wool, and goats and mohair, and is second in rice production and third in peanuts, pecans and citrus. The state generally ranks third after California and Iowa in total crop and livestock cash receipts.

Baker emphasizes the fact that agriculture is one of the most efficient sectors of the overall economy. In 1970 each farm worker supplied himself and 46 other persons with food and fiber needs. Output per man-hour of farm work has increased 223 percent since 1950 to improve technology and management. The benefits are passed on to the consumer who now spends 16.5 percent of his disposable income for food—a drop of 19 percent in the past 10 years. Per capita food consumption increased six percent during that same decade.

The economist urges all Texans to participate in the observance of Texas Food and Fiber Abundance Week the week prior to Thanksgiving. "This is an excellent opportunity for all of us to reflect on the bountiful harvests that agricultural producers over the state reap each year to provide for us high quality, yet economical food and fiber products."

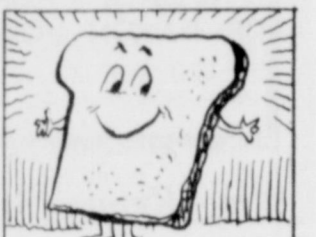

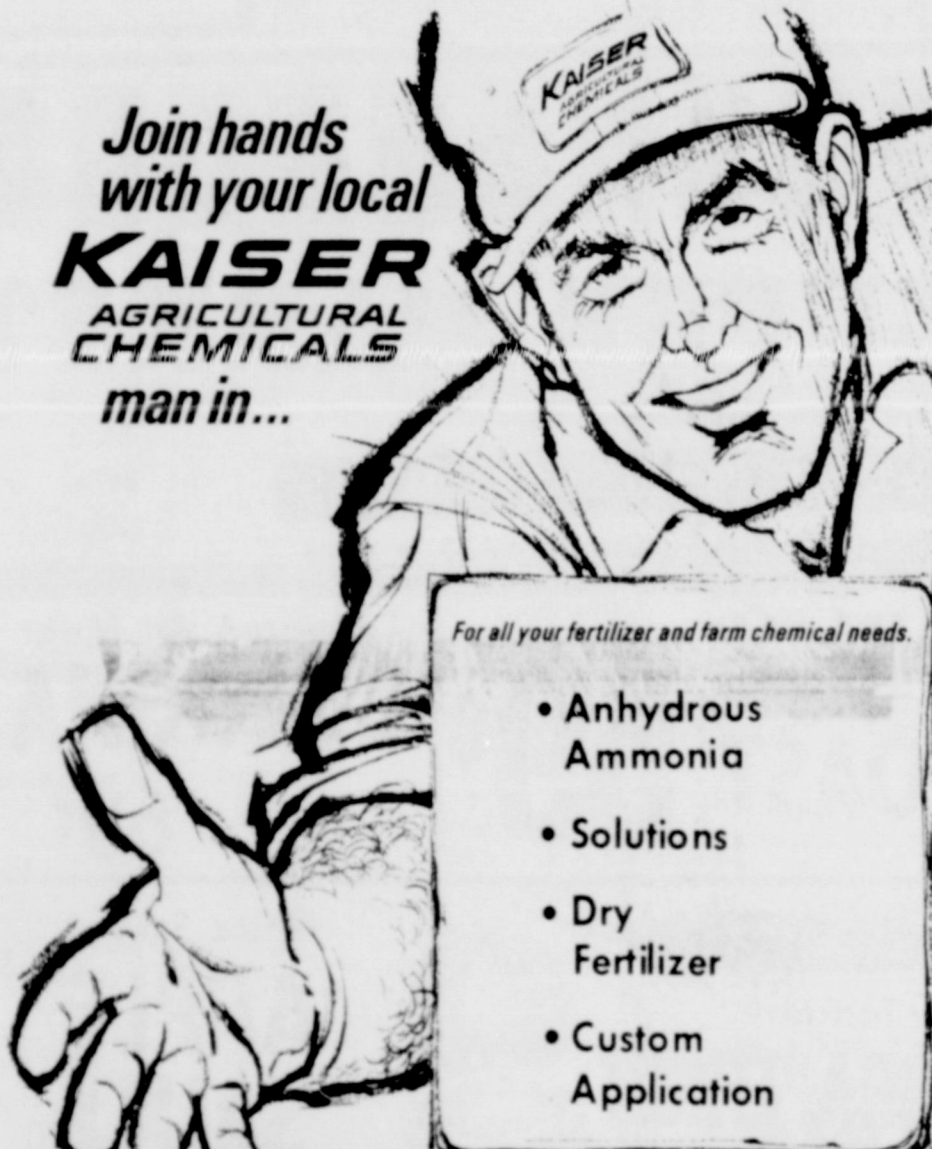

New Methods Employed For Erosion Control

The new farming methods used today have made new moisture and erosion control practices profitable. More and more sprinkler systems are being installed in Parmer County. This releases farmers from the old problem of having to run their rows downhill.

Rows run up and down the hill cause excessive rainfall runoff and erosion. With the new flexibility gained by the use of sprinkler systems, erosion and runoff can be profitably controlled.

One method used with increasing popularity is parallel terracing. This consists of a system of terraces arranged parallel to each other to eliminate short rows and improve water distribution.

Joe Jones, Ed Schilling and Otho Whitefield are three of many farmers who believe that soil and water must be conserved and have installed parallel terraces. They know that parallel terraces can save enough rainfall during a year on

a half section of land to equal the output of a six inch well. These men have seen parallel terraces, liked what they saw, and installed their own. For more information on how you can profit from parallel terraces contact the Soil Conservation Service in Friona.

At Home In Parmer County

With fall here and Thanksgiving and Christmas upon us I have decided to pass along some recipes that might come in handy for your holiday meals and through these chilly winter months. First a couple of ideas from

the pear growers on the west coast.

BAKED BREAKFAST PEARS
3 fresh winter pears
2 tablespoons soft butter
1 cup ready-to-eat cereal flakes, crushed
1/2 cup brown sugar
Halve and core pear. Place, cut side up, in shallow baking dish. Mix other ingredients and spoon over pears. Bake at 400 degrees for 15-20 minutes, until pears are tender. Serve warm with sour cream. Makes 6 servings.

CRANBERRY PORK & PEARS
Flour
6 pork chops
Salt and pepper
2 cups fresh cranberries
1 cup sugar
1 cup water
3 fresh winter pears
Dredge pork chops with flour, season with salt and pepper. Brown chops in small amount of fat. Remove pork chops to casserole. Add cranberries, sugar and water. Cover and bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes. Halve and core pears. Place in casserole with pork chops and baste with cranberry glaze. Bake, uncovered, 30 minutes longer, basting occasionally with cranberry glaze. Makes 6 servings.

APRICOT-NUT BREAD
1 cup dried chopped apricots
1 cup Imperial granulated sugar
2 tablespoons shortening
1 egg, well beaten
1/4 cup granulated sugar
1/2 cup orange juice
2 cups sifted flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon soda
1 teaspoon salt
1 cup chopped nuts

Soak dried apricots for 20 minutes. Meanwhile, cream together 1 cup granulated sugar, shortening and egg. Stir in 1/4 cup granulated sugar and the orange juice. Add dry ingredients. Blend well. Drain apricots: stir apricots and nuts into batter. Bake in greased and floured loaf pan (approximately 8" x 4" x 3" at 350 degrees F, 65 minutes or until done.

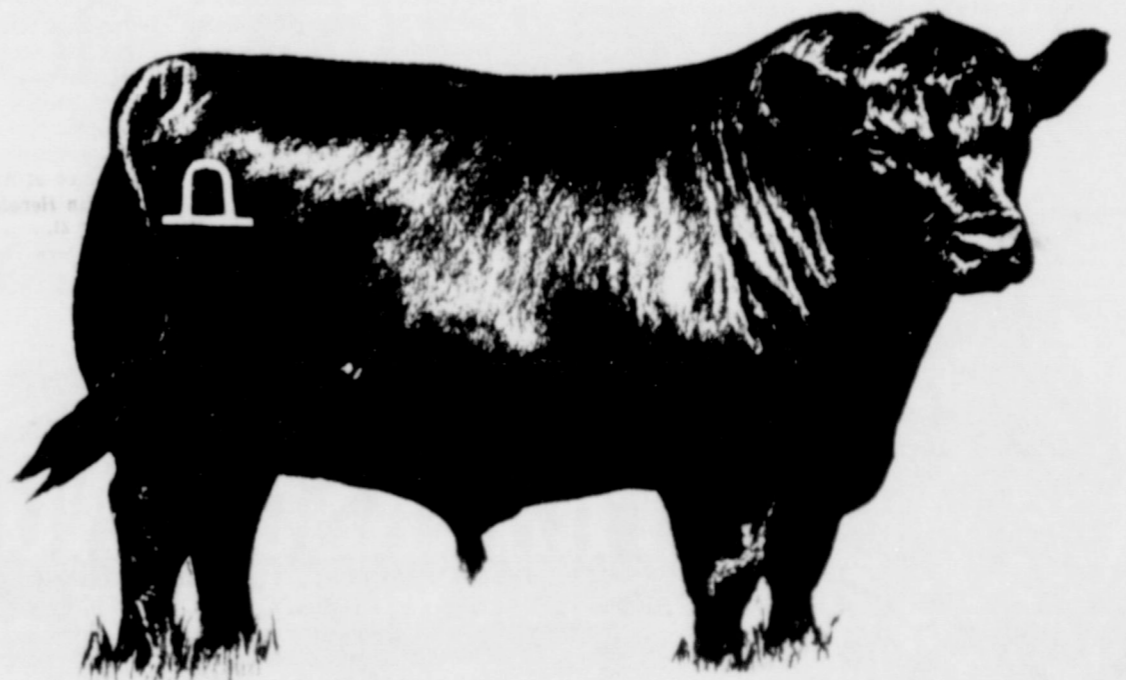

Miss Jacque Eilbert, Stratford, Iowa, now holds the title of "International Shorthorn Lassie Queen."

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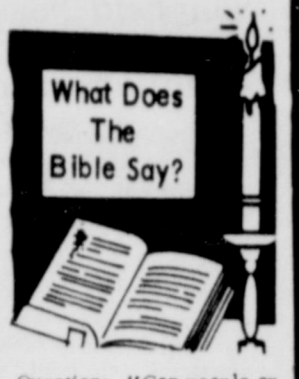

MAJOR CATEGORIES

Chiefs Lead Opponents In Season Statistics

It will come as no great surprise to fans who watched the Friona Chieftains lose close games this fall to learn that the Chiefs dominated their ten opponents, in most of the season statistics.

Friona led their opponents in first downs, 143-123; in yards rushing, 2074-1692, and in total offense, 2562-2492.

Opponents held an edge in passing yardage, 800-488, and in one other important category--scoring. It is interesting to note that the Chieftains, out-

scored 185-143 on the year, led their opponents in points scored during the first half, 91-84.

However, the opponents had a commanding 101-52 edge during the second halves of the ten games.

Turnovers hurt the 1971 Chieftains, as they lost the ball 37 times to 24 for the opposition.

The yards rushing and total offense figures were considerably better than the marks established by the 1970 team, although the Chiefs of that year finished 6-4, compared to 3-6-1 for this fall.

Opponents completed only six more passes than did the Chiefs, but their passes gained more per play, as the team was out-gained by 312 yards through the air.

In the individual offense departments, six different players emerged as leaders, covering seven departments, indicating that there was no superstar on the 1971 team.

Bill Bailey was the leading rusher, with 841 yards on 125 carries, a nifty 6.7 yard-per-carry average. Bailey's total yardage is the highest since 1965, when Tony Peres set the school record with a whopping 1761 yards. Bailey gained 1391 yards his junior and senior years.

James Bartlett was second with 436 yards. An indication of the team's balance is seen in the fact that junior Louis Lee won the scoring title for the season, and scored all 30 of his points in the team's last two games. Johnny Bandy was second with 24 points.

Mike Royal, who had led the team in scoring as a junior, was fourth this year with only 18 points, and Bailey, who was third, held down the same spot this season.

Royal had a fine record as kickoff return leader, averaging 23.6 yards returned on 12 runbacks. His longest run was 35 yards, but he got 20 yards on almost every runback.

Johnny Bandy's heads-up 65-yard punt return for a touchdown against Dimmitt gave him the lead in that department, although the Chiefs really didn't return many punts this season (only four in all).

James Bartlett was the leader for pass interceptions, with two, including one against Abernathy which he returned 67 yards.

Bandy completed 33 per cent of his passes, and James Sims completed 31 per cent of his.

On the defensive side of the ledger, Bill Bailey was the team's leading tackler, edging out Mario Peres with 120 tackles to Peres's 112. Kevin Wiseman had 90 and Mike Royal 89.

LITTLEFIELD FALLS

District 3-AA Turns Actions To Indoors

The last basketball suits have been issued and the last group of footballs in District 3-AA have been stashed away, to gather dust until next summer.

The district, after a fierce struggle in determining champions, lost its playoff representative last Friday night, so now, all eight schools are engrossed in the gymnasium sport where a couple of football's lower-division schools are expected to battle for the title. Morton and defending champion Dimmitt are the top choices for the basketball laurels.

Littlefield, which tied Floydada for the football and got the playoff ticket, was stumped by Roosevelt 27-7 in bi-district last week, ending the football year for the district. Roosevelt, representing District 4-AA, will now play Childress in Plainview Friday night in the regional round.

The Opportunist Eagles from Roosevelt took advantage of two Littlefield mistakes, a fumble and a stray pass, to get their first two scores. And when on offense, Littlefield's all-state runningback candidate, Ralph Funk, drew defenders like a magnet attracts nails. Funk gained 149 yards for the game ("there's no way in the world to stop a guy like that," commented Roosevelt coach Houston Powell after the game) but he was able to pick up only about 50 in the first half.

A fumble recovery at the 13 put Roosevelt in position to score its first TD and an interception triggered the second TD march. The Eagles scored once each in the third and fourth quarters and had all their points before Littlefield managed to score.

The Wildcats' scoring drive measured 75 yards, with Funk picking up 54 yards, including the last one. Littlefield stayed with a ground game, which had carried it to the playoffs, in the drive.

The touchdown was Funk's 26th of the season as he wound up his schoolboy career with 156 points for the year.

Roosevelt wingback David Vasquez scored twice for the winners, and quarterbacks Don Jackson and Ricky Hightower scored on one-yard sneaks for the other touchdowns. "What really helped was being able to take advantage of their mistakes," commented Houston after the game, "and getting two quick touchdowns. You are never going to stop Funk: he's too good of a back. I just knew at any moment he was going to break a long one on us."

The loss for Littlefield was only the third of the year, as the Wildcats closed out their first year under coach Jerry Blakely with a 7-3-1 record.
