

County Scores Ditch Trash Abuse

Crackdown Slated On Trash Violations

★★ ★★



TRASH PROBLEM. . . One of the worst examples of the violation of dumping laws by depositing trash in barrow ditches is this ditch northwest of Lazbuddie on Running Water Draw.

The Parmer County Commissioners this week issued a plea to county residents to refrain from using barrow ditches to dump trash and dead animals, or for draining sewage.

At the same time, the commissioners issued a public notice that violators will be prosecuted to the full limits of the law. Fines for such violations can run from \$15 to \$200.

The problem seems to be particularly acute in the Lazbuddie area, on one particular road which intersects Running Water Draw. Residents of that area (two miles west and five north of Lazbuddie) have made a virtual dump ground of the west side of the county road running north and south.

Everything from junked car bodies to dead animal carcasses has been dumped in the ditch, which is against the law.

"This is a hazard to the public and to adjoining farms as well. Elimination of this practice would be a big asset to the area," said a representative of the commissioners court.

Should the area receive a hard rain, this trash and debris could

be washed for miles, and would create a real hazard to adjoining pasture and farmland, it was pointed out.

The Lazbuddie area has a dump ground located a mile east and a half mile south of Lazbuddie. This dump ground is maintained, and residents are welcome and urged to use the facility.

Raymond Treider, commissioner for the Lazbuddie precinct, said that dumping trash along Running Water Draw had always been a problem, but that the situation has worsened in recent months until it reached the drastic proportions it now has.

Another violation seen on some farms is the practice of running electric fences on county right-of-way. This hinders the county from maintaining the ditches, and also presents a safety problem at times.

"The commissioners would appreciate the public's cooperation in this matter. It would really benefit everyone if people would take their trash to an officially designated dump ground," Treider said.

Interest Sought For Additional Baseball

Friona's baseball leaders have called a meeting for Thursday, April 13, 8 p.m. at the high school cafeteria, to explore the possibility of securing a local charter for the Senior Division of Little League, and add two additional teams to the older league.

The league, for boys who will be 13 before July 31 and will not reach their 16th birthday before August 1, has operated here for the past two years, under a charter at Texico-Farwell.

Friona, Bovina and Farwell have each fielded two teams for the past two years. Friona's teams have been sponsored by Benger Air Park and Hi-Plains Feed Yard. Bovina's teams are Charles Oil and Shirley Grain. Farwell's entries have been Security State Bank and Helton Oil.

Last year, over 30 players came out for the two local teams. Baseball officials indicate that if this number could be increased by 15 or 20, this would be plenty of players for a local four-team league.

There would be certain advantages in having a local league. One would be that all of the games could be played lo-

cally at the new park, eliminating travel. The remaining four Farwell and Bovina teams could then, if they wished, form another four team league.

"Adding two teams might 'water down' the program locally for a year or two, and it would also require additional coaches, sponsors, etc., but we think it is worth pursuing," said a spokesman.

J.R. Dickerson of Clovis, district director for the Senior Little League, will be on hand Thursday for the meeting.

Parents of boys in the senior age group are urged to attend and voice their opinions of the proposed expansion. Sign-up lists are also to be placed at Friona High School and Junior High, to get an indication of player interest.

Chamber To Push For Showbarn In Friona

The Friona Chamber of Commerce set out to coordinate a local drive for a livestock showbarn as a highlight of its monthly board meeting Tuesday morning at Earl's Parmer House Restaurant.

Board member Carrol Gatlin, who made the motion, said "I think we would be doing a dis-service to Friona if we did not, as a chamber of commerce, pursue the building of the county showbarn in Friona." Gatlin was named by chamber president Dale Cary to be in charge of the project for the group.

The matter of the showbarn has been under considerable discussion since the recent Parmer County Junior Livestock Show.

The show has been held in Friona for the past 25 years, under sponsorship of the Friona Lions Club for many of the early years, and directed by the Friona Young Farmers and Parmer County Livestock Show Assn. in recent years.

Members of the chamber board expressed the thought that all of the money for such a building should be raised prior to the beginning of construction. Various members were of the opinion that the estimated needed money could be raised.

At a countywide showbarn meeting in Bovina Tuesday night, a representative of each community was chosen. It was estimated that a minimum investment of \$32,000 will be needed to get the project started.

Dwain Manefee is Friona's representative. Each community will make their final bid at a similar meeting next Tuesday night. A drive is currently underway to secure pledges of donations to the project.

It was the consensus of the group that the community making the most attractive proposal would get the building.

In other business, the board voted to pursue the matter of securing a full-time manager for the chamber, with each of the directors expressing their opinion as to the need for a manager.

Problems involved, such as raising enough money each year to pay the manager's salary were discussed. The chamber is currently in the process of holding its 1972 membership drive. Several who were paid members in 1971 have not as yet paid their dues.

Other matters discussed Tuesday included a sick leave policy and possible vacation replacement for chamber secretary Peggy Bryant, and preliminary plans for the Chamber's annual Fourth of July observance.

County's Voting Strength: 3600

Approximately 3600 Parmer County residents will be eligible to vote in the May 6 primary, including 1475 in Friona, it was revealed this week by figures from the County Tax Assessor-Collector's office.

The figure is an increase of about 11 per cent over the number of registered voters for 1971, which stood at 3233 in the county, and is somewhat better than 1972's total registration of 3438.

However, the total is some 280 shy of the all-time record established in the last presidential election year, 1968, when 3870 persons registered to vote.

Officials in the tax assessor-collector's office were at a loss as to why this year's total registration did not top the former record, especially in light of the additional voters in the 18-20 age bracket who are eligible to vote this year but were not in 1968.

"It just seemed that people forgot to register, in spite of all of the reminders," said a clerk in tax assessor-collector Hugh Moseley's office.

It was pointed out that an additional 462 voters had registered between the old cutoff date of January 31 and last Wednesday, April 5, which was the deadline for registering for the

May 6 primary.

This is an indication that many had forgotten the old deadline. "Or perhaps they were lax, because of the new procedure for registering," it was pointed out.

The Friona precinct led the county with 1325 registered voters as of March 1. An estimated 100 additional voters were added by the April 5 deadline.

Following are the official figures as of March 1 for the county's voting precincts.

Blark: 75; Lakeview: 61; Friona: 1375; Bovina: 626; Rheas: 60; Farwell: 658; Oklahoma Lane: 193; Lazbuddie: 305. Total: 3353.

Requirements Hiked For H.S. Graduation

The Friona School Board approved the recommendation of the high school administration to increase the graduation requirements from 20 to 22 credits beginning next year. The action was taken at the board's regular meeting Monday night.

Students slated to graduate in 1973 and 1974 will be permitted to graduate under either the new or old credit plan.

"We feel this will help to enrich our high school program for the students," said Superintendent of Schools Alton Farr.

"Many students currently graduate with 24 or 25 credits, so this is no particular hardship," Farr said. The superintendent pointed out that the basic requirements would not change. The two additional credits will be in elective subjects.

Also discussed was a possible change in the test exemption procedures for seniors. This matter was tabled.

In other business, the board elected new officers for the year. John Blackburn, who has served as board secretary, was named president. Steve Mesenger was re-elected as vice president, and Floyd Schuler was named secretary.

The board canvassed and approved the results of the recent trustee election, and installed

two new board members, Ronald Smiley and Wesley Barnett.

Board member Leroy Johnson was named to present the diplomas for the eighth grade graduation, and John Blackburn was chosen to hand out the high school diplomas at graduation.

Tax assessor-collector Porter Roberts' contract was renewed for 1972-73. Roberts reported that collections during March amounted to \$3,206.64.

The board approved the transfers of three families of children from the Bovina school district into the Friona district for next year. Superintendent Farr reminds parents that the deadline for such transfers is June 1.

Members of the board are making plans to attend the annual workshop for school board members at West Texas State University April 26.

Guest speaker at the annual Teacher Appreciation Night, which is sponsored by the Parent-Teacher Organization, will be W. Clark Ellzey, teacher, lecturer, marriage counselor, camp director, writer, television performer, world traveler, airplane pilot and deputy sheriff.

At the present time he is teaching a course for married students and conducting a graduate seminar on marriage and family relations at Texas Tech.

The meeting, which will be held in the grade school auditorium, will begin at 8 p.m. Friday.

A special feature of the meeting will be presentation of five and ten year awards

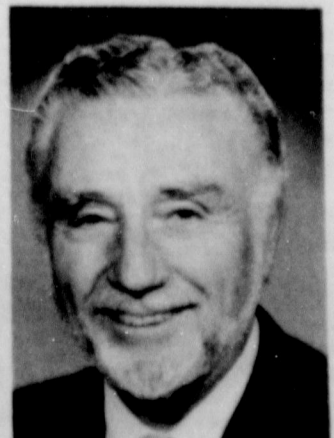
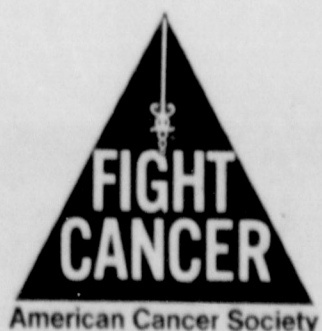

(Did you ever think how it might be if all churches and pastors were pitched in the thing to let it match the pastor to the church? Wow! I would sure be distrustful of the possible conclusion there. Ha. It might be more truthful than I can stand...)

A comic strip the other day had a computer suggest a dog as a possible dating prospect for one particular student.

Have you seen the ad where the small car is driven into the shop, plugged into the computer and told it has low battery water? It reminds me of my son's Sizzler set.

I think my greatest revolt comes when the--and pardon my usage of the phrase at this time of the year--Internal Revenue computer yells out, "Lindley, not a little more in the pot, boy." I really have a personality clash with that one.

Cattle numbers can be expected to increase again during 1972.

According to the latest figures from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, major gains across the United States in 1971 were in beef cow numbers and beef heifers. From January 1, 1971 to January 1, 1972, beef cow numbers increased about three percent while beef heifers 500 pounds and over being kept for cow replacements increased six percent.

This holdback of heifers emphasizes that the expansion of beef herds is coming soon.

In recent years, cattle numbers have increased primarily due to the increased demands for feeder cattle by feedlots. In 1955 only about 10 million head of cattle were fed in the 23 major feeding states compared with 25.3 million head last year.

Furthermore, cattle feeding should continue to grow. Consumers are now demanding grain finished cattle instead of those finished on grass. In other words, they are demanding a higher quality of beef. This can be illustrated by the fact that 59 percent of all the beef produced in the U.S. in 1970 graded USDA Choice while back

in 1955 only about one-third was equivalent to that grade.

Officials of the Screwworm Eradication Program at Mission are sounding an alarm to livestock owners throughout Texas. Screwworm cases continue to mount and totaled 188 as of April 5, or 73 thus far in April. At the end of April last year, only 21 cases had been confirmed, and no cases were recorded during the first three months of 1970. Twenty-nine cases were recorded on Monday of this week, 28 on Tuesday and 16 on Wednesday. Case outbreaks moved up from South Texas through the Hill Country into the Big Bend Counties of Terrell and Brewster this week, and into Hamilton County, in central Texas. With the most critical months ahead, 1972 is predicted to be a rough year.

Mexico cases are far ahead of those reported a year ago, following a mild winter when many fertile fly populations survived, officials added. Hot-spotting of all known cases is underway, officials said, urging livestock owners to check their animals regularly and to treat all wounds. Containers and information for mailing worm samples may be obtained from county agricultural agents.

**Farmers Reminded Of
Farm Program Dates**

Prentice Mills, Parmer County ASCS office manager, this week reminded farmers of the upcoming deadlines for the 1972 farm programs. Farmers participating in one or more of the 1972 programs have a number of dates to remember and deadlines to meet.

- These are:
1. May 1 is the final date for reporting wheat, barley and set-aside.
 2. May 3 is final date for completing cotton transfers.
 3. April 30 is the date on which 1971 crop wheat loans mature.
 4. April 17 through April 28 is sign-up period for cost-share assistance under REAP-conservation program.
 5. July 15 is final date for

reporting all feed grain and cotton acreages.

6. June 10 is final date for sugarbeet producers to report 1972 planted acres.

A part of the above mentioned dates are important to all farmers in this area and some to only a few. The people at the ASCS Office suggest that farmers might do well to set up a "Farm Program Calendar" for themselves as these dates are so important and failure to observe one of them usually results in a financial loss to the persons involved.

The big one to remember is the first one listed above—May 1. This date is very important to practically every farmer in this area. This is the one that most program payments hinge upon.

At Home In Parmer County

As weather gets warmer, spring fever sets in, accompanied by lighter and more carefree fabrics.

"Those thin, transparent or translucent fabrics are grouped together into a major category termed 'sheers.'"

Sheers include bolles, organzias, georgettes, batistes, lawn and chiffons. Some are crisp, while others are soft.

"This season they are plain, printed, flowered, embroidered, flocked or woven with a wallpaper stripe, plaid or dotted design."

Sheers may be of natural fibers such as cotton, wool or silk; man-made fibers, or—more commonly—a blend of two fibers such as cotton and polyester.

When buying sheers, whether in ready-to-wear garments or by the yard—it's important to note specific care instructions.

"The trim, style of a garment or particular blend may cause the manufacturer to recommend special care procedures." "When in doubt about how to care for a clothing article, it's best to either have the item dry-cleaned or to hand launder it. When laundering by hand, don't use chlorine bleach or wring or twist the garment."

In sewing with sheers, consider what you'll wear under the sheer and decide if it should have an underlining, lining or both. Seams and darts will show through when the sheer is used alone. An underlining of a supple but opaque fabric, or an underlining of self-fabric will usually conceal seams and dart edges.

"Sheers lend themselves to a variety of design possibilities." For example, a bodice may be underlined, the sleeves left

sheer and the skirt lined with an underskirt that's seamed and hemmed separately.

"Collars and cuffs are appropriate for crisp sheers, but the seam allowances must be trimmed to hairline width."

A double folded bias binding makes a better neckline finish for a plain neckline than a shaped facing.

Buttons and button loops make the best closings. Where there are machine-worked buttonholes, be sure to use an interfacing of matching colors.

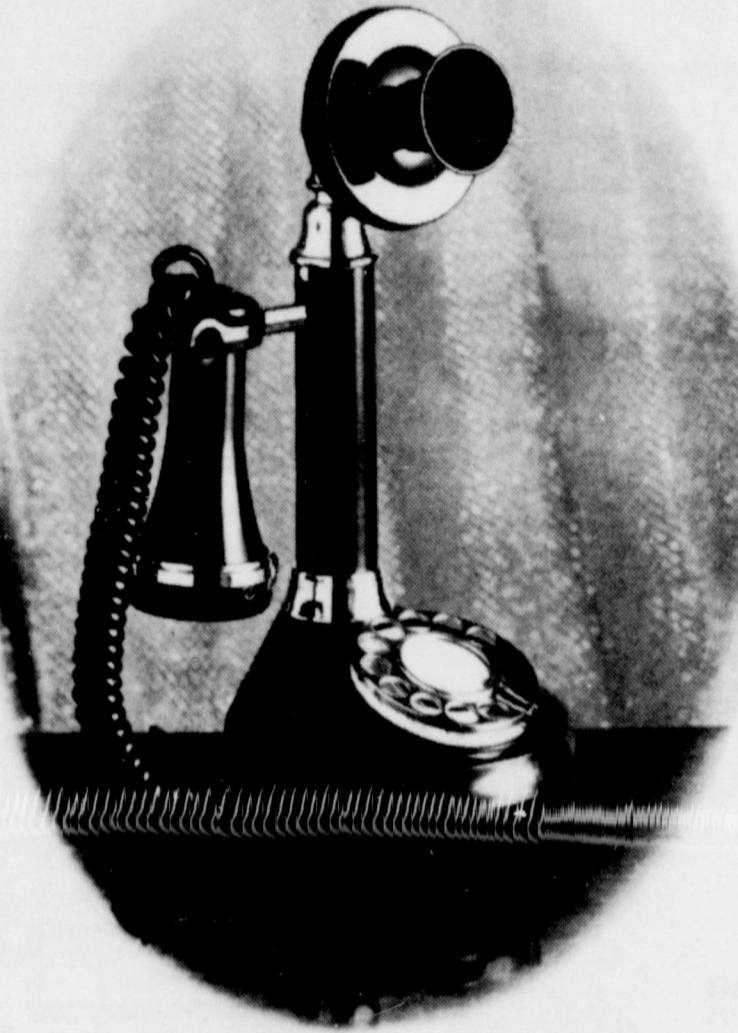
"On skirt with straight lines such as a full, gathered skirt, the hem should be four to eight inches wide." On a circular or bias skirt, use a rolled or narrow machine-made hem."

Sheers can create special moods for spring and summer. "If you're interested in a graceful, light and feminine look, then they're right for you."

Read Mark 14:66-72

We believe the gospel is for everyone; but when the call comes to us personally to proclaim and witness--perhaps leave home and friends and go to a far land to work among strange people--are we committed enough to accept the call?

As time went on, Peter's faith deepened. He could cut across current opinion and accept those whom his Jewish brethren had taught were beyond God's love.

Like Peter, we become brother to all persons when God has made His home in our hearts.

PRAYER: Deepen our faith, O Lord, so that when You call us to share Your work, we are ready to go where You lead and willing to love as You love. Amen.
