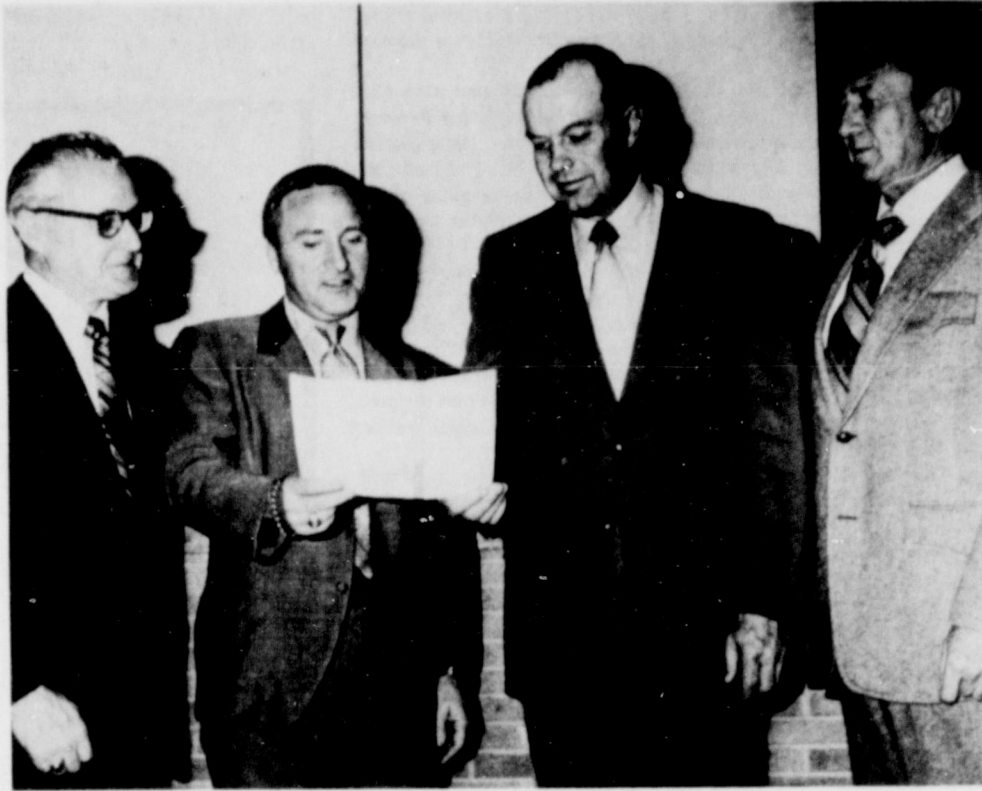
Cary, who is manager of Friona's Production Credit Assn. office, is one of the four new directors who were elected to the board by the voting members in late December.

CHALLENGE ISSUED

Large Crowd Attends Water, Inc. Meeting

Several hundred residents of Parmer County attended a meeting in Bovina Monday sponsored by Water, Inc. The meeting was called to bring the local residents up to date on plans to bring a supply of water into the county.

Representative Bill Clayton of Springlake, who also is executive director of Water, Inc., presented the background which led to the forming of the organization. He also showed slides depicting California's Oroville Dam project, and compared it to the proposed plan for Texas.

Also speaking was Leon Hill, Amarillo, regional director of the Bureau of Reclamation, and Norman Flaigg, Austin, Area Planning Officer.

Flaigg addressed himself particularly to the cost of the proposed project to import water from the Mississippi River. Early estimates place the cost at between \$10 and \$12 billion. "Is this too high?" Flaigg said. He pointed out that the nation's expenses at the height of the Vietnam conflict had cost \$27 billion per year. And the space program spent \$30 billion in ten years, landing a man on the moon.

"Physically, this project is entirely possible. However, the financing has to be worked out," Flaigg said.

A.L. Black, a director of Water, Inc. served as master of ceremonies. He challenged those attending to join Water, Inc., and pay an annual dues to the organization which is working to implement the program.

"When you figure the difference of the value of your land between dryland and with water,

I think you'll agree that it is worth it to keep a water supply," Black told the group.

In his presentation, Clayton showed charts pointing out how the population of the state and nation is expected to grow by the year 2020. Texas alone is expected to have a population of 30 million.

He also pointed out that the High Plains produces a large percentage of the nation's food and fiber, and would need to continue to do so in the years to come.

MEET TONIGHT

Kiwanis Club Is Organizing Locally

Twenty-five to thirty area men, will assemble Thursday night, 7 p.m. at Friona State Bank to complete formal organization of the new Kiwanis Club of Friona, Texas.

Presiding at the meeting will be Jack Smith, field representative of Kiwanis International.

Also on hand will be Dean Herring, District Chairman of New Club Building and Mel Manchee, Rodney Laubhan, Randy Farr, Gene Campbell, Travis McPherson and others representing the Kiwanis Clubs of Hereford, sponsors of the new Kiwanis Club.

Work to be completed at tonight's meeting will include formal indoctrination of new members, a welcome to the Kiwanis International organization, and the election of a president, vice-president and treasurer. The new club's secretary, in accordance with Kiwanis practice, will be appointed.

Charter date for the new club will be announced at a later time.

Kiwanis International, of which the new Kiwanis Club of Friona will be a part, is a men's service organization founded in Detroit in 1915. It currently numbers about 270,000 members in 5700 clubs located in the United States and Canada (considered the two "home countries") and 33 other countries of the world.

The stated purpose of Kiwanis is "service to youth, community, and nation." Its motto is "We Build."

According to Jack Smith, Kiwanis Field Service Representative, "Kiwanis Clubs furnish their members the opportunity to work in concert with others of like persuasion in needed and rewarding community projects. These run the entire gamut from taking shut-ins to church to rebuilding a city park, or organizing and operating a junior league baseball club."

Smith said that in recent years Kiwanis has adopted the policy of devoting its major energies each year, or each two years, toward accomplishing one prime objective. The current one, he said, is helping stamp out drug abuse through an educational program called Operation Drug Abuse.

As a member of the Board of the Defense Orientation Conference Association, Dr. Kay has had an opportunity to be informed about national defense.

Within the past two years Dr. Kay has visited defense installations in the United States, Belgium, West Germany, East Germany, Greece, Italy, Spain, Hawaii, Thailand, Taiwan, Quebec, Korea, Okinawa and Japan.

He is an exponent of the free market, private ownership of property and limited government rationals and has delivered more than 2500 addresses on the principles of the American System of Private Enterprise, the nature of man, comparative economic systems and the religious, historical and moral values that have contributed to our economic well being.

Following a business session, during which new officers will be elected, there will be a drawing for door prizes. Terms of Ray Landrum, Bill Teel, Richard Collard, Charles Scates, Ralph Roden and Alvin Gaines are expiring.

School Board Election Called For April First

Superintendent Alton Farr announced this week that a trustee election has been called for Saturday, April 1 in Friona, for the purpose of electing two members to the school's board of trustees.

Two members of the board have terms expiring. They are W.D. Buske and Richard Collard. Neither has indicated whether or not he will be a candidate for re-election. Buske is completing his second term on the board, and Collard has served one full term, plus part of an unexpired term after being appointed.

Holdover members of the board are Steve Messenger, John Blackburn, Leroy Johnson, Floyd Schueler, and David Grimley.

Application forms are available in the superintendent's office. Deadline for entering the race will be March 1.

The election will be held in conjunction with the annual city election, at the old city hall (Law Enforcement Center).

License Plates Go On Sale February 1

Texas License tag sales begin February 1 and motor vehicle owners are receiving renewal applications from the Texas Highway Department in Austin for obtaining the 1972 license plates.

High Moseley, Parmer County tax assessor-collector, said owners can order their tags by mail by sending the 3-part renewal application, registration fee and \$1 to cover the cost of mailing.

Applications should be sent to the local courthouse office and not to Austin, Moseley said.

License plates can be obtained in person at the county tax office, he added, by using the 3-part applications.

Deadline for displaying the new tags is midnight April 1st.

Parmer County Citizens are also reminded that January 31 is the last day to register to vote for 1972 elections. However, if one forgets to register by the deadline he may register at a later date and his name will be added to the supplemental list of voters. He must register at least 30 days prior to the election in which he wishes to cast a vote.

Joe Douglas returned home to Friona this week after undergoing a heart operation at Lubbock's Methodist Hospital. Douglas is said to be recuperating nicely.

Mrs. F.G. Crofford has been hospitalized in Amarillo's Northwest Texas Hospital this week, following a car-truck accident near Emmitt last Friday.

Mrs. Crofford was enroute to the ball game at Tulsa. She underwent surgery on her right knee. She also had all the toes on her right foot broken, and sustained face and nose lacerations. She is expected to be hospitalized several more days in Amarillo.

Members of the Andy Hurst family were uninjured when their Travellall and trailer they

were towing overturned near Anton last Sunday afternoon.

However, extensive damage was suffered by the automobile and the new trailer, which the Hursts had pulled to Lubbock Friday for a first tryout.

Steve Bavousett continues to recuperate from an accident on New Year's Eve, in which he suffered multiple fractures of his left arm. Bavousett crashed into a cotton trailer near Slaton.

Bobby Ray Horn, who was seriously injured earlier this month in a farm accident, continues to improve at Parmer County Community Hospital.

Horn, an employee of Leroy Johnson in the 14th Community, received extensive injuries when he was crushed by a cotton stripper.

45 YEARS AGO--JANUARY 28, 1927

Friona and Farwell are to engage in a basketball game Friday, January 28. If the weather is good, the game will be played at Farwell on their outdoor court. If the weather is bad, the game will be played in the Friona High gym.

40 YEARS AGO--JANUARY 29, 1932

Ralph Roden, who has been assisting his brother, J.R., at the City Drug Store, departed early in the week for Fort Worth, where he will enter a school of pharmacy.

Mr. Roden has attended this school previously, and goes back to complete his course, after which he will become a full-fledged pharmacist and will very likely return to Friona to again assist in the work at City Drug Store.

30 YEARS AGO--JANUARY 30, 1942

Measles and mumps are now epidemic in Friona, it was reported this week by health authorities, who suggest some precautions to prevent further spread of the diseases. Children should not be taken to the doctor's office for diagnosis of possible contagious disease, it is pointed out, as this might expose other children to the diseases. Parents are asked to call the physician to the car, or have him visit the child in the home when any contagious disease is expected.

25 YEARS AGO--(Entire 1947 volume missing from file)

20 YEARS AGO--JANUARY 24, 1952

The Lazbuddie schools have been dismissed from Wednesday until next Monday because of widespread flu. On Tuesday, over 60 per cent of the students were absent, together with several teachers. The junior-senior banquet, originally scheduled for Monday, also has been indefinitely postponed.

15 YEARS AGO--JANUARY 24, 1957

The tragic news that 1st Lt. Tim Magness, son of Mr. and Mrs. H.T. Magness of Friona, was killed in the crash of a jet military airplane Sunday afternoon brought shock to the family and the community this week. Lt. Magness, a co-pilot in a crew of three, aboard the jet, was on a routine mission, having been to Arizona. The jet was headed toward Las Vegas when rough weather was encountered.

10 YEARS AGO--JANUARY 25, 1962

A delegation of 17 men from Parker County joined some 170 farmers from 13 neighboring counties in Austin Monday in an effort to assure passage of gas rate legislation. The men are members of the Plains Irrigation Gas Users Association, which has for several weeks been pushing for state legislation which would give farmers the same right of appeal to the Railroad Commission as is afforded cities in case of gas rate disputes.

5 YEARS AGO--JANUARY 26, 1967

The Friona United Fund distributed checks to its various components this week, with all of the participating units getting more than they requested. Steve Messenger, chairman, stated that the United Fund drive totalled \$6251.52, which represented 109 per cent of its goal of \$5733.00. The total was raised in only nine days, a possible state record this year.

From Around The Country

SAN MARINO, CALIF., TRIBUNE: "The main cause of inflation over the years has been increased government spending. It may have sounded 'businesslike' to make each piece of mail pay its way, but the government seems to have forgotten that all of its mail, including the military as well as the frank privilege of the politicians is carried without charge. Does it really want each piece to pay its own way, or is it trying to soak the rest of us for all the free-loading federal mail? The post office used to collect millions of dollars from magazines such as Look, but one after another they are dropping out of business. The government wanted to collect twice as much from Look. Instead it is going to get nothing. A lot of newspapers will be forced out of business unless government relents on its unprecedented postal hike."

We visited Stratford-on-the-Avon yesterday and also Coventry. Right now I think I would readily trade it for Friona-on-the-Frio. And you remember Coventry from Lady Godiva Fame--we will make a two-day trip to Bristol and Bath beginning in the morning--those were one of the hangouts of the Wesley Brothers--See, we are doing some studying while we are here.

I have conquered the money system and the subway (we call it the tube and underground over here).

We were down on Piccadilly Circus (square) last Saturday night after the Rugby matches and I think I saw about 6-1/2 million of the London residents there--none of them seemed to care that I was a Friona Chieftain--they were all still yelling for their team--and did for most of the night.

We have found the study of the 16th and 17th centuries to be most rewarding and I never cease to be amazed at how it all has affected the world--politically and religiously.

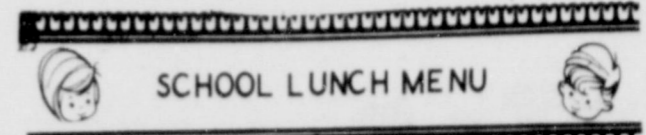

Fortenberry Receives Vietnamese Citation

The late James Richard Fortenberry received a posthumous medal from the South Vietnamese Armed Forces recently. The award was the Armed Forces Honor Medal, 2nd class. It was presented to Fortenberry's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Paul Fortenberry, of 1201 Virginia, Friona.

The letter accompanying the medal read: "Conscientious servicemen, they set an unwavering example of devotion to duty and tactful cooperation. With their depth of experience and abundant skills, they provided able and effective support for the Republic of Vietnam Armed Forces to achieve numerous outstanding accomplishments."

The letter was signed by Gen. Cao Van Vien, Chief of the Joint General Staff, Republic of Vietnam Armed Forces. It was forwarded to the Fortenberrys by

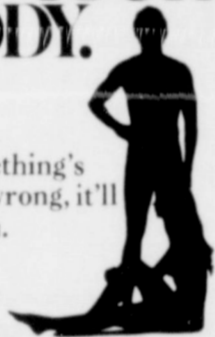
Verne L. Bowers, U.S. Adjutant General.

Sp. 4 Fortenberry, who was killed on September 24, 1970, had previously received nine awards. They are the Distinguished Flying Cross, Air Medal, Second through Eighth awards; the Army Commendation Medal and the Good Conduct Medal.

Prior to his death, he had received the National Defense Service Medal, the Vietnam Service Medal, Vietnam Campaign Medal, Aircraft Crewman's Badge and Sharpshooter Badge.

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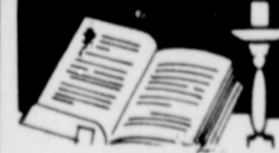

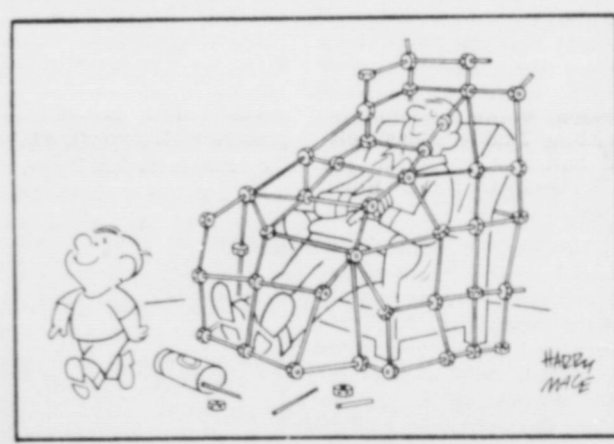

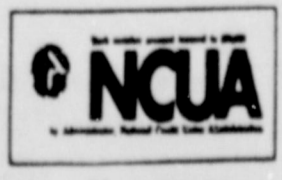

The film, entitled "A Day With the Cattle Feeder," features activities that take place at the feedlot during a typical day.

"The film features some of the top authorities in the cattle feeding business and provides one of the best views of the feed-

lot industry other than seeing it in person," says A.L. Outland, program chairman.

Highlights of the film include the beginning of the day's activities in checking pens, following newly arrived cattle, feeding programs underway, and shipping finished cattle to market.

"The cattle feeding industry on the High Plains is the largest single dollar earner of any segment of Texas Agriculture," Outland said. "It draws on the resources of cattle, grain, feed supplies and equipment from many areas of the state and is one of the largest users of credit and capital of any of the state's agricultural segments."

The film was produced through the assistance of the Texas Cattle Feeders Association, headquartered in Amarillo, which contributes thousands of dollars annually to the research of feedlot problems, and the promotion of Texas grain-fed beef.

According to Orts, there are three alternatives for handling cattle and sheep at slaughter:

1. The animals may be slaughtered if certification requirements have been met.
2. The animals will be held alive for the required seven days.
3. The animals could be slaughtered, with samples sent to a U.S. Dept. of Agriculture approved laboratory for testing. Meat from the animals could not be marketed until tests prove they are free of DES residues.

The new program will help provide further assurance that DES residues will not be found in the nation's meat supply, says Orts. Violators will be subject to criminal prosecution by the Food and Drug Administration.

Farmers To Be Polled On Production Expense

Approximately 25 Parmer County Farmers will be contacted in February by Mrs. Leon Smith (Jackie), a representative of the U.S. Department of Agriculture in a survey of farm production expenses.

Cary D. Palmer, Statistician in Charge of Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service said the local producers will be included with 700 others in the State and 10,000 in the Nation. Producers will be visited starting in February and asked to report their 1971 Farm Production Expenses. All information is confidential and only regional and national summaries are released.

Palmer said the survey will play a major role in helping farm program planners, farm groups, and analysts have a

better understanding of how farmers stand in the nation's economic picture.

The nationwide survey will show current buying patterns of farmers. It will indicate the kinds and amounts of goods and services bought to raise crops and livestock. The last farm expenditure survey was conducted in 1955 and purchasing patterns have changed drastically since then. Farmers now buy considerably more fuel, fertilizer, and machines, but less labor and different chemicals.

Information on Production Expenses plays an important part in the computation of the USDA monthly index of prices paid by farmers and is also used in determining net farm income.

Dr. Cope Appointed Area Feedlot Vet

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service has appointed an area feedlot veterinarian to serve the Panhandle region. He is Dr. Gene E. Cope who formerly was in private practice in Hereford.

"Cope is filling a new position which was created to serve the area's rapidly growing feedlot industry," noted Dr. John F. Hutchison, director of the Extension Service, in announcing the appointment. The Panhandle is now feeding about 2.4 million head of cattle a year, and animal health is a critical aspect of the industry. Statewide, 3.7 million head of cattle were fed in 1971.

The veterinarian will provide specialized assistance to feedlots to combat costly disease problems, said Hutchison. The estimated cost of diseases to the Texas feedlot industry is more than \$8 million a year. Cope will also be devoting some time

to swine disease control.

Cope is a native of Sterling City where he was reared on a ranch. He received his doctor of veterinary medicine degree from Texas A&M University in 1959. He served as a student assistant in San Angelo during the summer of 1958 and as an assistant veterinarian in Clarendon in 1959. He has been in private practice in Hereford for the past 12 years and has served as a consultant to feedlots on animal health problems.

The veterinarian is a member of the American and Texas Veterinary Medical Associations and the Southwestern Cattle Feeders Association. He holds Honorary FFA degrees from the Dimmitt and Hereford FFA chapters.

Cope served in the U.S. Air Force for four years. He and his wife, Betty, have three children.

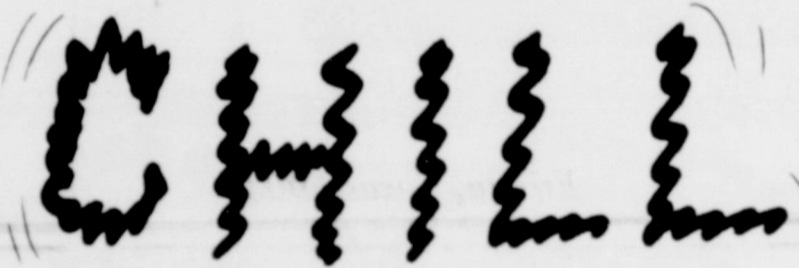

Care labeling of textile products for home sewers is a great convenience to the homemaker due to the development of numerous new fibers, fabrics and finishes. Proper laundering is important to the appearance and performance of fabrics.

By law, fiber content must be stated on yardage, either on a hangtag or printed on the bolt end. Many manufacturers also include care information. One fiber maker is taking the guess work out of caring for fabrics made with the company's fibers. Care and sewing instructions are printed continuously on tape which is then inserted along the fold of the fabric as it is being wound on the bolt. Thus, even a small cut of the material will contain a complete set of instructions. This procedure should certainly make friends among sewers everywhere.

Another new idea for our area is a 4-H project to be broadcast over television. Beginning March 11, "The Magic World of Electricity" will be televised over KGNC Channel 4 from Am-

arillo, at 12:30 p.m. This will be the first of a series of 6 thirty minute programs on electricity, its use and simple projects the youth can make at home. One does not have to be a conventional 4-H Club member to participate. To enroll in the project and receive your copy of "Mr. E's Tricks," the project booklet, drop me a card with your name and address. (Box 683, Farwell, Texas 79325).

Survivors, besides his wife, include three daughters, Mrs. Anita Powell, Friona, Mrs. Belle Maynard, Nowata, Oklahoma

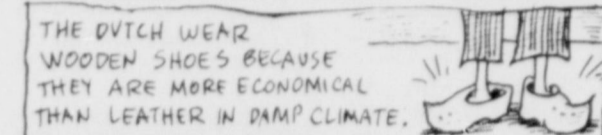

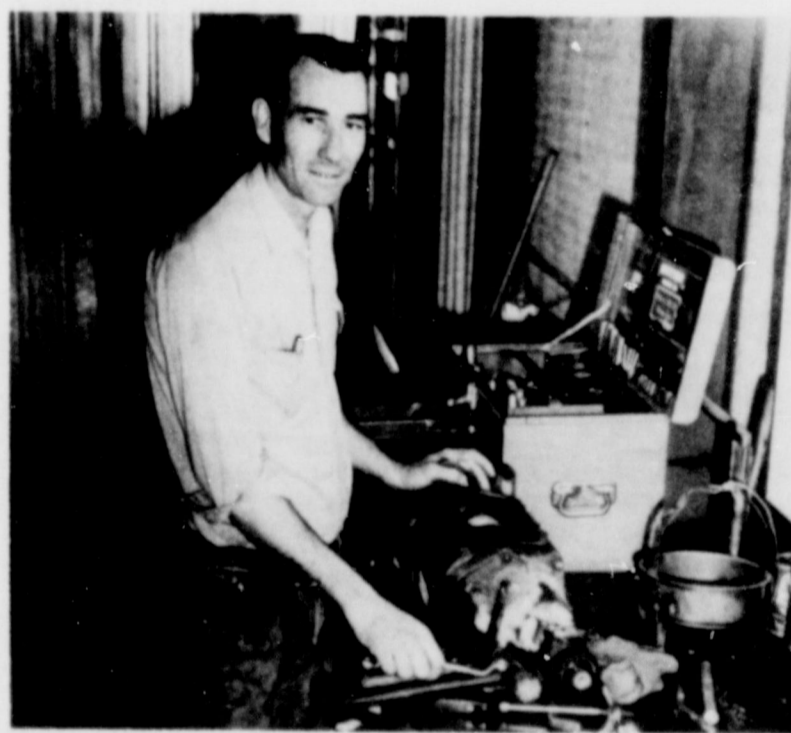

The score had been tied twice, 10-10 with 2:43 left in the first quarter and 21-21 with 5:27 left in the first half.

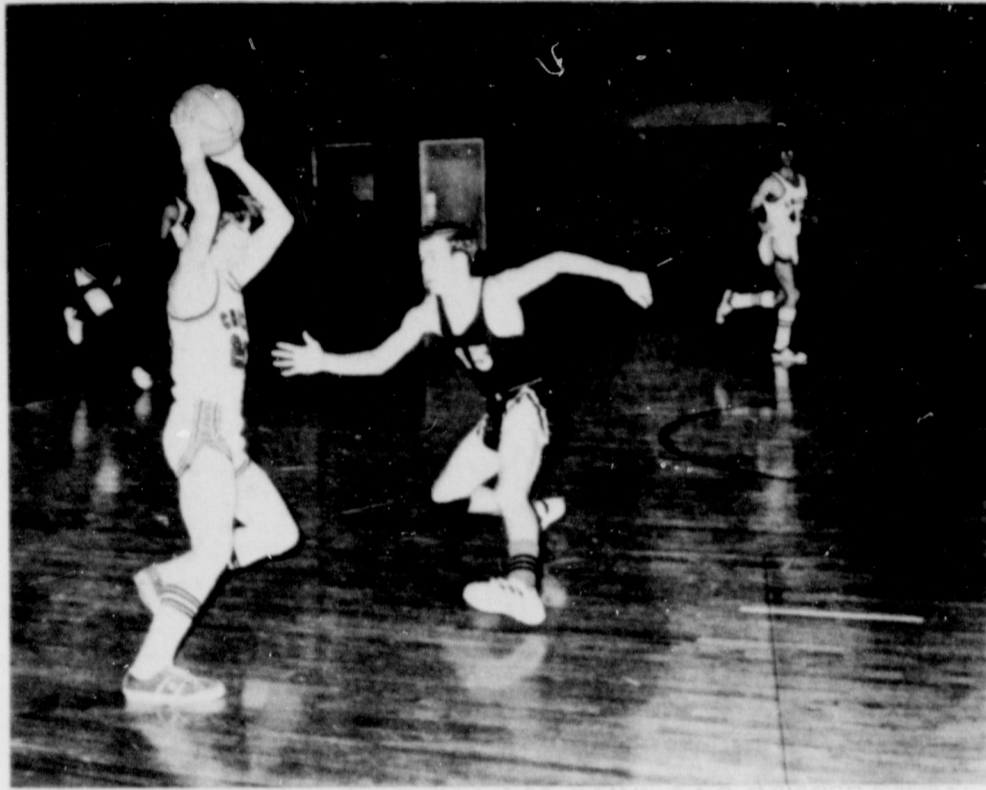
Friona tied it at 44-44 and then Dimmitt again took the lead 46-44 and never trailed after this.

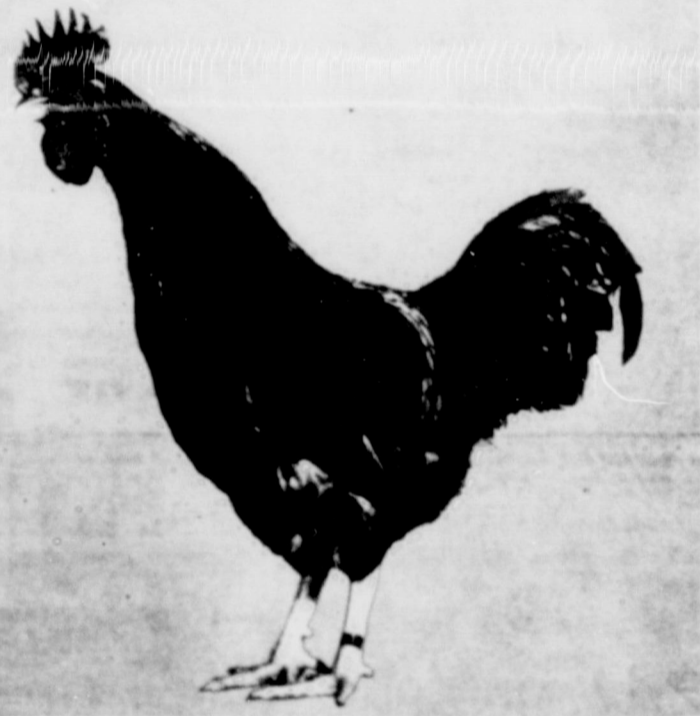

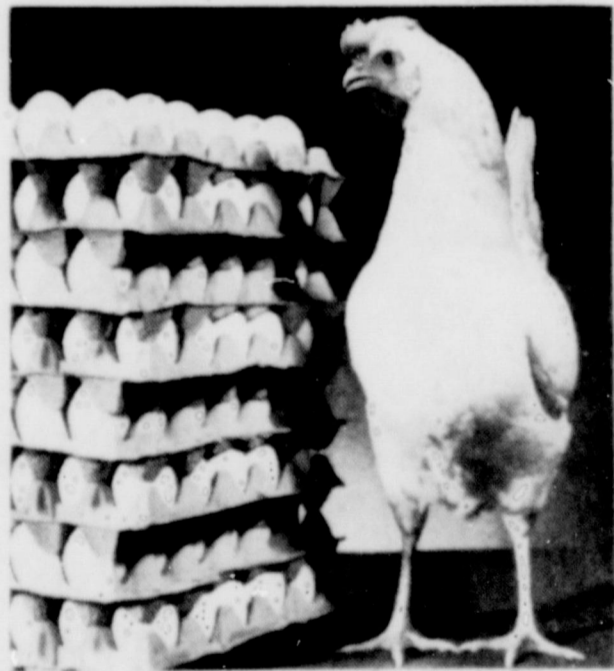

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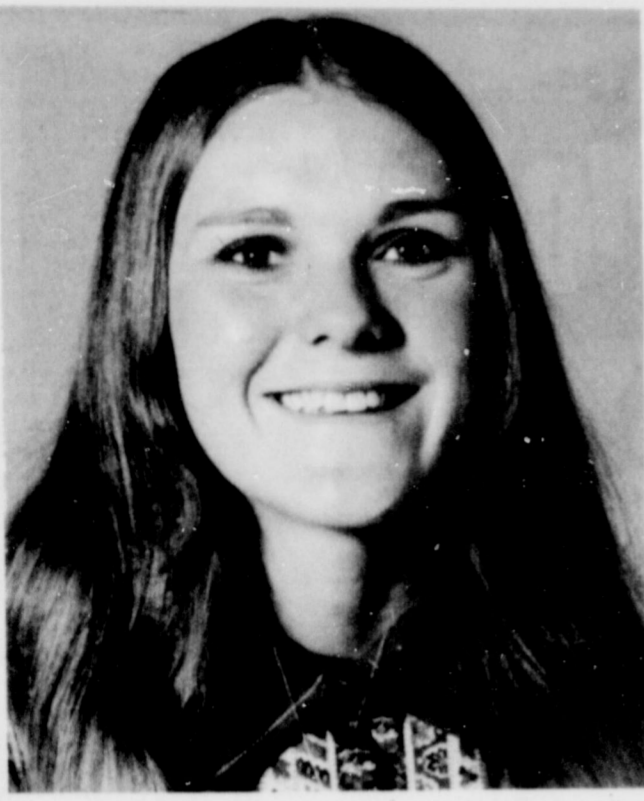
